No banquet would be complete in this area without the



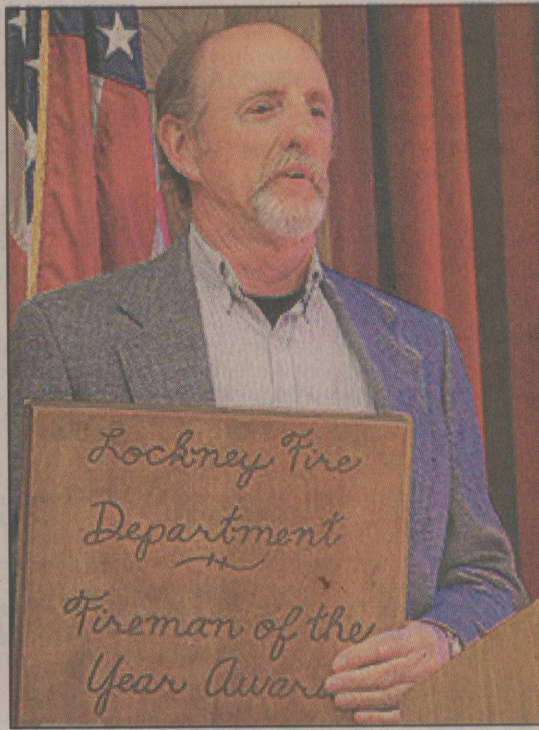

FHS Track Teams 2nd in District 40 medals, 20 athletes advance

NEW DEAL, TX - The Floydada Varsity Boys and Varsity Girls track teams, each, took second place over the weekend at the 2019 District 4-2A meet in New Deal.

Coaches Pake Freeman and Athletic Director Todd Bandy commented, "Each year we go into these track meets with quite a few less athletes than everyone else, and yet, we show up and compete. This year we had several district champions (some 2x and 3x defending champs), area advancers, and teams filled with under-classmen (freshmen and sophomores) who without their contributions we would not have had the success we did. Last week's results were not the results of two days, but the results of a season's worth of hard work and commitment. As coaches we couldn't be prouder of these teams. They represented the town and Floydada High School well. Please

congratulate these young men and women when you see them around."

The boys' team claimed 24 medals from the event and will send 12 members on to the Area event next week. James Gibbens led the team with two gold medals and one silver, winning the 800 and 1600 meter runs and placing second in the 3200-meter event. Luke Holcombe claimed gold in both the Discus and Shot, and Gabe de la Fuente led the team with four medals placing second in the sprint relay, the 800-meter relay, pole vault and third in the 100-meter dash. The girls' team were led by seniors Kiana Brown and Kylie Ricketts who claimed seven gold medals between themselves. Brown took first in the 100 meters, 200 meters, pole vault and the 800-meter relay. Ricketts also took gold in the 800-meter relay, the 400-meter dash and the high jump. The girls ended the meet with 16 medals and will send eight members on to the Area event next Monday.

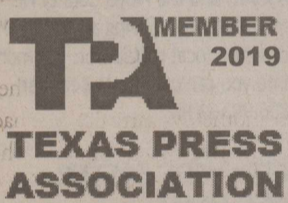

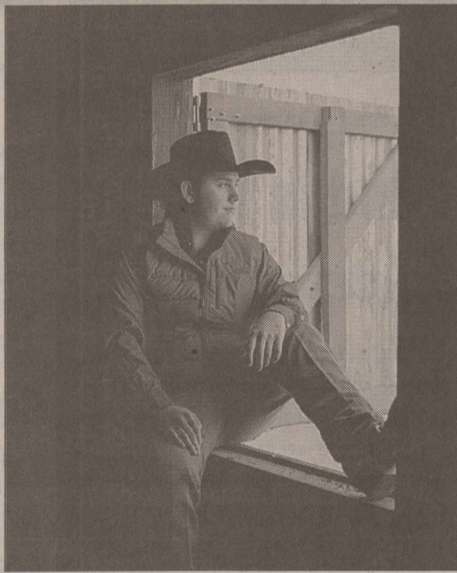

Floydada City Council Meeting

The Floydada City Council met in Chambers, Tuesday, March 26, 2017.

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended that Mark Williams be given a variance to construct a new metal building. The variance would affect Lots 19-20, Block 05, Texas Addition. Councilmen approved the motion.

There are no races for the May 4, 2019 election that are being contested. Councilmembers voted and approved an Order of Cancellation for said election.

City Manager, Darrell Gooch requested that Ordinance 19.3 of the policy handbook adjusted. That policy, written in 1984, allows for per diem rate reimbursement for employees travelling out of town on business. Gooch recommended the following adjustments: Breakfast rate-increase from \$5 to \$12.50; Lunch rate-increase from \$12.50 to \$15.00; Dinner rate-increase from \$15.00 to \$20.00. Council members approved the

resolution unanimously.

Manager Gooch recommended that Phillip Smitherman be reappointed to the Mackenzie Water Authority. Council members approved the resolution unanimously.

At-Large-Councilmember Tanner Battey submitted his resolution effective after the April meeting. Gooch asked that councilmembers send him names of prospective individuals to fill the position. He will approach those individuals to obtain their acceptance for consideration. Councilmembers resolved to deny acceptance of Councilmember Battey's resignation for one more month. The vote was unanimous.

The Floyd County Museum had requested HOT funds to reimburse some of the expenses involved in the renovations to the Barrow Building located on Missouri and Main Streets. Councilmembers agreed to give the Museum \$1,200/year for the next three years. The members approved the resolution.

Manager Gooch recommended that "Interim" be removed from the Interim City

Secretary's title. Council members approved the recommendation to make Patty Lowrance's title City Secretary.

The council broke into Executive Session.

Upon reconvening, the Council stated that they agreed to purchase the .87 acre tract of land adjoining Annie Taylor Park from County Commissioner David Martinez. The purchase price agreed upon was \$5,300. Legal recording will take place, allowing the City to resume work on the City's Park. Councilmembers approved the action.

Councilmembers approved minutes from the February meeting, and all bills were deemed payable.

Councilmembers present were Mayor Bobby Gilliland, Councilmember Betty King, Councilmember Steve Lloyd, Councilmember Gabe DelaFuente, Councilmember Dana Crossland, Councilmember Gail Dubois, and Councilmember At-Large Tanner Battey. City Secretary Patty Lowrance and City Attorney Karen Houchin were also in attendance.

THE FLOYD COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM MEMORIES 1979

THE HARMON ROBERTS

Harmon Wesley Roberts was born August 10, 1895 in Wise County, Texas. He was the fifth of eleven children born to John Frost and Sally Harmon Roberts, who had moved to Texas from Manchester, Tennessee in 1894. He was also the nephew of Frank Harmon, early day furniture dealer and mortician in Floydada. The Roberts family moved to Floyd Co., in 1901 and settled in the Antelope Community, later moving to the Baker Community, Floydada, and back to Baker. Both John and Sally are buried in the Lakeview Cemetery.

Jura Frances Dunn was born in Erath Co., the seventh of the nine children born to Ambrose Wade and Nora Ella Luzby Dunn. The family later moved to Childress and on to Floyd County in 1917.

Harmon and Jura, nicknamed Judy, met at the singing and parties held in the community and were married February 20, 1922. The wedding was to have been in Crosbyton but when the one who was to have stood up with them did not show up, the young couple with the wife of the forgetful witness, and the preacher went to the field where he was threshing feed and had the wedding there. Consequently it has been told many times that they were married behind the barn! They built a two-room house in the Mr. Blanco Community where they continued to live, building on to the house as each of their three children - Herman, Macyl, John Ambrose and

Gladys Jurahee-were born.

About 1932, Harmon traded his farm for a ranch at Post, Texas, but what good is a ranch without cattle? Being unable to finance the purchase of cattle, the couple traded the ranch for a drug store in Lorenzo, Texas. After several moves, the family was living on a farm north of Friona when World War II was declared. It was here that they saw their oldest son, Macyl, off to war where he was to give his life for his country, on Eniwetok Atoll in the Marshall Islands, in February 1944. There were more moves, and the Roberts family finally came back to Floyd County, for good in 1951. Johnny had married Jeanette Dudley in Rye, Colorado in 1950. Gladys then married Travis Jones in Floydada in 1952.

Harmon dealt in Real Estate for a short time after moving back to Floydada and then in 1955 he bought a Hardware Store with his son, Johnny. The store was located on the west side of the square. It was later sold and Harmon entered semi-retirement. His last work was done at Thompson's Pharmacy. He died in Jan. of 1971. Jura was active in home demonstration work for years and now enjoys her church (The New Salem Primitive Baptist) and her four grandsons, two of whom are married, and her two granddaughters and one great grandson. She has spent many hours making many beautiful quilts which are treasured by those of us lucky enough to receive them.

She was preceded in death by her daughter, Jessica Torres; her son, Jona-

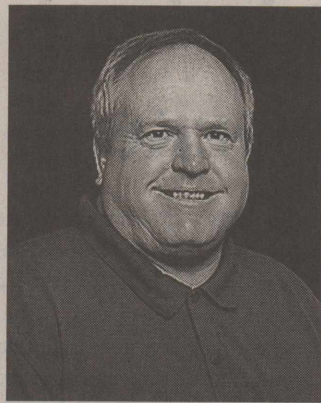

Sam was born February 1, 1952 in Floydada. He was known to be a loving father and granddad, a dedicated farmer, a loyal friend and a passionate City Council member.

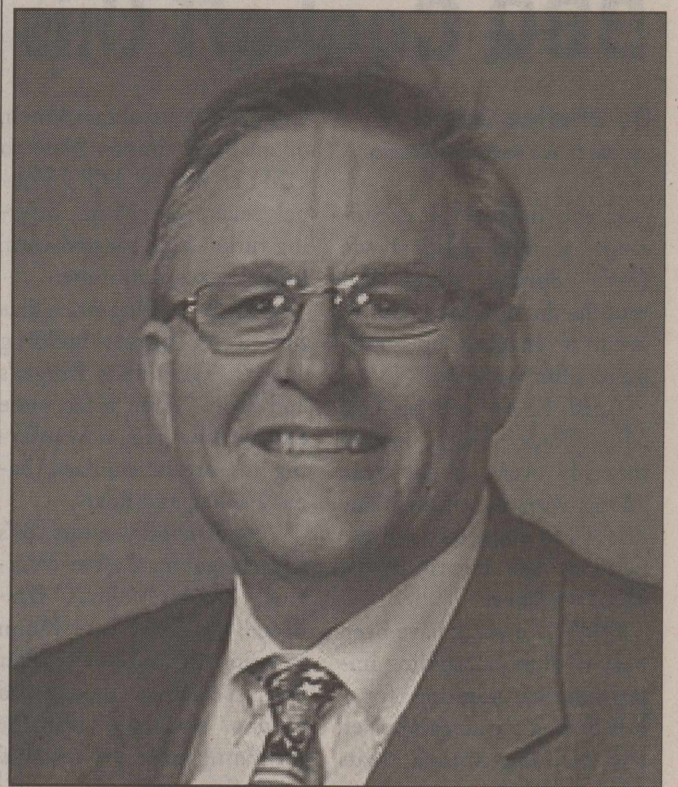

What's Up?
by Deon Fincher

From a gardener's standpoint, I had a FANTASTIC week! I'm (and my garden) are LOVING this sunshine! And with spring sunshine, seed planting becomes a priority. Which is exactly what I got to do! I took my little self right down to ACE in Floydada and loaded up with their biggest and best-looking tomato and chili plants. To those that have yet to purchase yours... just know, that those first premier plants are in my garden. (smile) And, "No, I do not apologize."

Someone recently asked me when I generally start planting my garden. If the squash is starting to sprout in the garden from last year's seeds, I plant. Have I had to replant after a freeze? Yep. But, more times than not, my little plants just get an early start. One of the benefits of living in Texas!

So, let me review what I did this past week. As I said, I got tomato and chili plants and got them planted in my new boxes. I am a firm believer in companion and ground-cover planting, so in those same boxes I planted carrots, cilantro, and sage—ideally, herbs and plants in the same 'flavor circle' tend to do great in the same soil.

We decided to expand and improve our corn-growing ground. We've extended several feet outside our western fence, and with a few feet on the inside, we believe we will grow an acceptable crop. To hedge our bets, we purchased a dump-truck load of fill dirt to improve that outside-fence garden plot. In just a few hours, Terry and I got about 1/3 of that load into our corn beds. Thinking we were going to get a good bit of rain, we went ahead and planted our Indian Corn. Yay! We've still got to finish moving that dirt into the row area, but along with some fine manure and a bit of old hay, our corn is going to be popping out of the ground! Now, I just need to get the sweet corn in their little beds—hopefully, I can get to that this week.

With this warmth, my lettuce and kale beds are "growing crazy!" I harvested and froze, 32 cups of kale—which equates to four meals in which we will be dining on fresh greens next winter. This harvest was obtained from only six of my kale plants, all of which lived through the winter and are getting a head-start this spring...and, I still have a 4 ft. by 4 ft. garden box of kale ready to be picked.

While picking around on the kale, I noticed that I have some onions that continued to grow through the cool weather, the 32 heads of garlic that I planted a month ago appear to be on steroids, dwarf broccoli that I planted last November is putting out miniature heads that add fantastic texture and flavor to our, what is becoming, daily salads, and my carrots have jumped into overdrive.

As I write this today, it is apparent that my gardening escapades for the week exceed my space for this column. Just know that flowers have been re-potted in the front, and seeds are soaking for the back, I've got two arbors ready for my vining plants and all of my beds have either been tilled or are already prepared for planting. I just have to find the time! Until next time, keep on gardening!

New CSP signup period announced Deadline May 10th

Farmers have until May 10 to apply for funding under the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), the largest working lands conservation program in the country, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) said.

"CSP continues to be a very effective tool for private landowners working to achieve their conservation and management goals," NRCS Chief Matthew Lohr said. "It is the largest conservation program in the United States with more than 70 million acres of productive agricultural and forest land enrolled."

NRCS plans to invest up to \$700 million for new enrollments and contract extensions in fiscal year 2019.

The 2018 Farm Bill made several changes to the conservation program, which helps farmers and ranchers take the conservation activities on their farm or ranch to the next level, according to NRCS.

Signup will be similar to previous years, but new contracts will be eligible for increased payment rates for practices such as cover crops (pictured above) and crop rotations that can prevent runoff of nutrients from cropland. Those higher rates were among the changes that the 2018 Farm Bill made in the program.

NRCS now enrolls eligible, high ranking applications based on dollars rather than acres. For fiscal year 2019, NRCS can spend up to \$700 million in the program, which covers part of the cost for farmers and ranchers implement-



ing new conservation activities and maintaining their existing activities.

CSP also now provides specific support for organic and for transitioning to organic production activities, as well as a special grassland conservation initiative for certain farmers who have maintained cropland base acres.

The program is offered in all 50 states and the Pacific and Caribbean areas through continuous sign ups. The program provides many benefits including increased crop yields, decreased inputs, wildlife habitat improvements and increased resilience to weather extremes.

CSP is for working lands, including cropland, pastureland, rangeland, nonindustrial private forest land and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe.
