## County Commissioner Meeting

Floyd County Commissioners met April 8th meeting. The first order of business was to announce raianing certifications by county staff: Sheriff Raissez completed the NIMS Training Emergency Response and Linda Nichols completed her Certified Asst. County Treasurer training equirements.
Cristen Brooks, Floyd County's Family and Community Health Extension Agent presented her activity report from February and March. Agent is hired. Brooks reported on the March photography contest, Floyd County Friends Unity Center Gala (The bldg. is used frequently by the $4-\mathrm{H})$, Rotary Club presentation, the Educational Presentation contest April 29, Shooting Sports contest April 19 and the Regional contest hosted by Floyd Country, May 18th, and District Roundup on April 29th. During the Parent Leader Association meeting on March
19th, the parents voted to combine the Lockney and Floydada 4 -H clubs into one county club. and Floydada 4 -H clubs into one county club. its work with SOS, that is desperately in need o canned or frozen foods.
County Judge Marty Lucke presented the County Investment Report: The county has three CDs ( $\$ 200 \mathrm{~K}$ ) of which $\$ 2,064.32$ o interest was reinvested. healthiest diet for their rabbits. While that is admirable sometimes the freshness of the feed and the consistency of the nutrition are more important than the brand of pellets.
Ideally, show rabbits should have a diet low in protein and fat and high in fiber. Free-choice timothy hay is an excellent addition to any rabbit's meal. Always make sure the lent addition to any rabbit's meal. Always make sure the
feed is fresh; rabbits will not condition well on stale pellets. A healthy base diet is more effective at getting your rabbit in top condition than any supplements you could throw in. Provide the proper environment. Proper housing doesn't stop at a well-made cage. The cage must be located in an area with excellent ventilation. The surrounding temperature should not get above 85 degrees at any time of the year at least unless you take measures to keep your rabbit cool but must be protected from predators and precipitation It must be kept in a quiet area so your rabbit will not be stressed. compromise your bunny's immune system. It's also ver important to keep the cage clean. Not only will this help prevent disease such as coccidiosis, but it will keep you're your rabbit's coat from getting stained.
