Lighthouse Electric Co-op Retires \$2.2 Million in Capital Credits

Capital credit retirement checks were handed out to Lighthouse Electric Cooperative members at the 80th Annual Membership Meeting on Thursday evening, April 25, 2019, at the Floyd County Friends Unity Center in Muncy, between Floydada and Lockney on US Highway 70. The Lighthouse Board of Directors, at their March meeting in Memphis, Texas, prior to the Hall County District Meeting, authorized the payment of \$2,200,000 in prior years' capital credit retirements for 2019.

A health fair, meal, activities for youngsters supervised by Floydada High School Band members and adult leaders, door prizes, attendance prize goodie bags, visiting with friends and neighbors, and learning more about their cooperative's business—along with the opportunity to pick up prior years' capital credit checks - serve as the draw for members who attended.

The meeting kicked off with a Health Fair at 3:30 p.m. featuring health screenings by area health care professionals and informational booths manned by volunteers from local and area organizations. Registration for the business meeting started at 4:30 p.m., and the fish, chicken and barbeque meal catered by Danny's Pans & Hens started at 5:00 p.m., followed by the business meeting at 6:30 p.m.

General Manager Albert Daniel reported the biggest news of 2018 was the retirement of longtime General Manager, Bill Harbin. Bill retired after 31 years of service to Lighthouse members and employees. Sales of electricity were up 42% in 2018 over 2017. Lighthouse employees worked 74,407 man-hours and drove over 556,000 miles without a lost time accident. Employees achieved the Rural Electric Safety Achievement Program accreditation by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. Lighthouse continues to support our youth and local communities through contributions and participation in stock shows, Little League, youth basketball, school projects, scholarships, and civic activities.

Three Floydada Tracksters Advance to the State Meet

(LEVELLAND, TX) Luke Holcombe will be the lone Floydada representative for the Whirlwinds after claiming gold Friday in the boys' discus with a throw of 160'01"—a personal best distance for the Sophomore athlete. Luke also placed fourth in the Shot Put.

Two Lady Winds are advancing to the State Track & Field Championships in Austin in two weeks. Seniors Kiana Brown and Kylie Ricketts are advancing after claiming four medals over the weekend at the Class 2A Region 1 Track Meet. Brown won the girls 100m dash with a time of 12.41 seconds, then finished third in the 200m dash-25.72 seconds—with a time good enough to claim a wildcard spot at the State Meet. Brown's 200m dash time would have won all the other three regions races.

Ricketts picked up silver in two events: the high jump-clearing the height of 5'4"—and in 400m dash, where she crossed the finish line with a time of 59.77 seconds, a personal best for her.

The Lady Winds finished the meet with 35 points including 16 each from Brown and Ricketts, one point from Ali Gonzales - who finished sixth in the girls' discus with

a personal best throw of 104'08". The girls 4x200m relay featuring Brown, Ricketts, Clarissa de la Fuente and Erin Trevino added another two points to the team standings by placing 6th with a second-best-time of 1:50:17. The team's 35 points gave them a

seventh-place standing in the Regional Meet.

Brown will be making a return trip to Mike Myers Stadium (UT in Austin) in the 200m, while Ricketts and Holcombe are making their debut. The State Championship is Saturday May 11th.

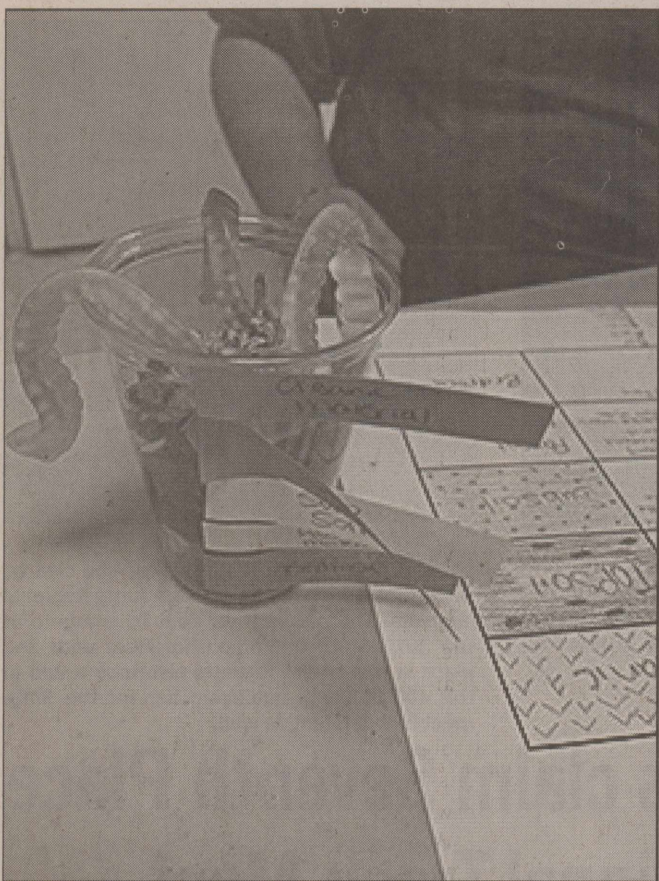

TFB names National Ag in the Classroom scholarship recipients

Ten teachers were chosen to receive financial assistance from Texas Farm Bureau (TFB) to attend the National Agriculture in the Classroom Conference this summer.

The conference, set for June 18-21 in Little Rock, Arkansas, is designed to show teachers how agricultural concepts can be used in subjects, such as reading, writing, math, science and social studies.

"Attending this conference helps equip teachers with the tools and understanding needed to incorporate agricultural concepts in their classroom," Jett Mason, TFB director of Educational Outreach, said. "It's an honor for TFB to assist these teachers in gaining valuable knowledge and skills."

The scholarship will help the recipients cover up to \$500 in conference registration fees, airfare or mileage to Little Rock. Two meals will also be reimbursed.

"This is a great opportunity for these teachers to learn how agriculture can be used in their lesson plans," Mason said. "The future of agriculture starts in these classrooms, and this is another way for Texas Farm Bureau to impact more students."

TFB received 76 applications for the scholarships.

This is the first year TFB has awarded multiple teachers with financial assistance, Mason said.

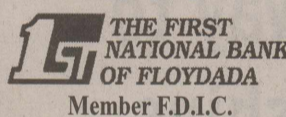

I am an avid 'natural-repellent' gardener if I can possibly manage. I like my honeybees buzzing around. It's always a blessing to find a praying mantis. And butterflies--don't get me started on butterflies. With that in mind, I am always on the lookout for information that will help me with my no-spray goals. This comes from a blog that I follow regularly from Kris Hubbard of Tennessee's Wild Wood Farms. Here are suggestions based on years of experience in his own heirloom-seed company and greenhouse: I wanted to talk about the use of Plants for Pest Control & Natural Insect Repellants in the Garden. Whether it is using the dried matter & oils of plants to repel insects, or by simply planting aromatic flowers using the companion method, we can help to rid the garden of unwanted pests. Below is a SHORT (and INCOMPLETE) list I have compiled of Problematic Pests and the Plants (and other tips) that have been used to Repel them, or Protect your Garden. **Ants:** Pennyroyal, Tansy, Catmint, Spearmint, Various Mint, Garlic. **Aphids:** Spearmint, Nasturtiums, Onions & Garlic, Orange, Basil, Stinging Nettle, Tomato Leaves. **Cabbage Moth:** Tansy, Thyme, Chamomile, Spearmint, Dill, Sage, Garlic, Hyssop, Oregano, Rosemary. **Caterpillars:** Pepper on plants leaves, Tomato leaves, Garlic. **Fleas:** Tansy, Garlic, Wormwood, Spearmint, Fennel, Pennyroyal. **Flea Beetles:** Wood Ash, Pyrethrum Flowers. **Flies:** Basil, Wormwood, Rue, Tansy, Mint. **Fruit Flies:** Tansy, Basil. **Fungus:** Pau D'Arco, Stinging Nettle, Horseradish, Sage. **Mice:** Wormwood, Mint, Spearmint. **Mildew:** Chives, Dried Sage, Stinging Nettle. [Powdery Mildew: Whole Milk with dried sage]. **Mosquitoes:** Wormwood, Garlic, Pennyroyal, Tansy, Sassafras- (can be placed in areas or rubbed on skin). **Moths:** Dried wreaths of, or the smoke of Rabbit Bacter, Sage, Mint, Wormwood, Rue, Cedar Smudge & Shavings, Pennyroyal, Lavender, Rosemary, Thyme. **Rats:** Fresh or dried Valerian root in trap, rats love Valerian root. **Slugs:** Dried Rosemary, Beer Cup Traps, Wormwood, Copper Pennies, Oak Leaf Mulch. **Snails:** Garlic, Cabbage leaf or Citrus traps. **Thrips:** Pyrethrum Flowers. **Tomato Worm:** Garlic, also can plant beneficial plants to bring in predatory wasps. **Weevils:** Garlic. **White Fly:** Nasturtiums, Basil oil used as spray.

Easy-peasy, right?? Yes, I know--there are lots of things in here that I have no idea where to obtain or even what to look for! But, friends, it's a start. I do know that Pau D'Arco can be bought in tea bags and is supposed to be healthy. I've tried it. My advice? Save it for the plants! As always, I love your comments, inputs, and suggestions! 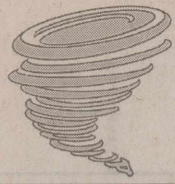

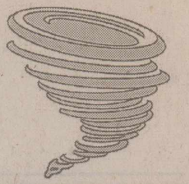

Winds earn multiple medals in push to Regional Finals

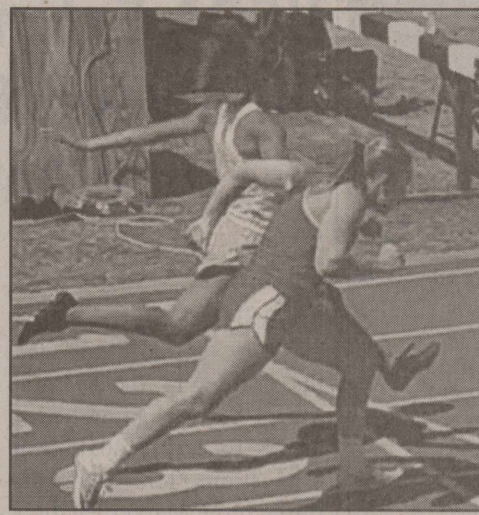

(LEVELLAND, TX) The Lady Wind track team scored points Friday at the Class 2A Region 1 Meet as Kylie Ricketts (Senior) claimed silver in the girls high jump. She and Gruver's Bailey Maupin (Freshman) both cleared 5'4", but Maupin cleared on her first attempt (Ricketts on the second attempt) to claim gold. Both jumpers will now advance to the State UIL meet in two weeks. Also on Friday, Luke Holcombe (Sophomore) tossed the discus 160'3" to claim gold for the boys and secure a trip to Austin as well. He'll be looking for more hardware as he competes Saturday in the shot put.

In the running preliminaries, Ricketts advanced to the Finals on Saturday in the 200m dash,

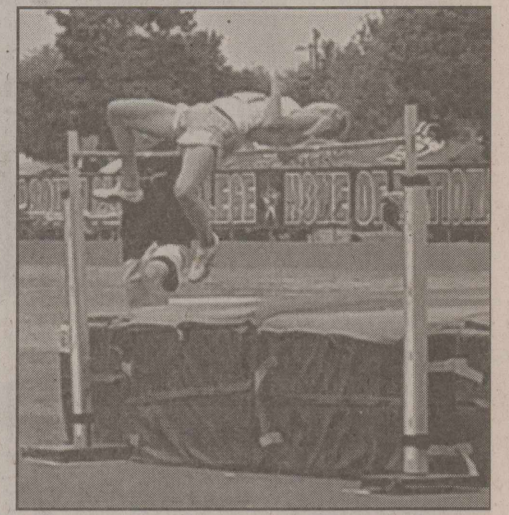
the 400m dash and as a part of the Lady Wind 4x200m relay. Kiana Brown (Senior) is advancing as well in the 100m dash, the 200m dash and as part of the relay team. In addition, Brown - a state qualifier from last year - will compete in the pole vault at 11:30am. Also competing for Floydada in the relay will be Freshmen Clarissa de la Fuente and Erin Trevino. Ali Gonzales (Sophomore) will also attempt to punch her ticket to Austin in the girls' discus. She was a gold medalist in both the District and Area meets.

Senior James Gibbens came up short Friday in the boys 3200m run but will get two more shots at a trip to State in the 800m run and the 1600m run. Junior Andrez Suarez will also get a shot as he qualified for the finals in the 300m hurdles.



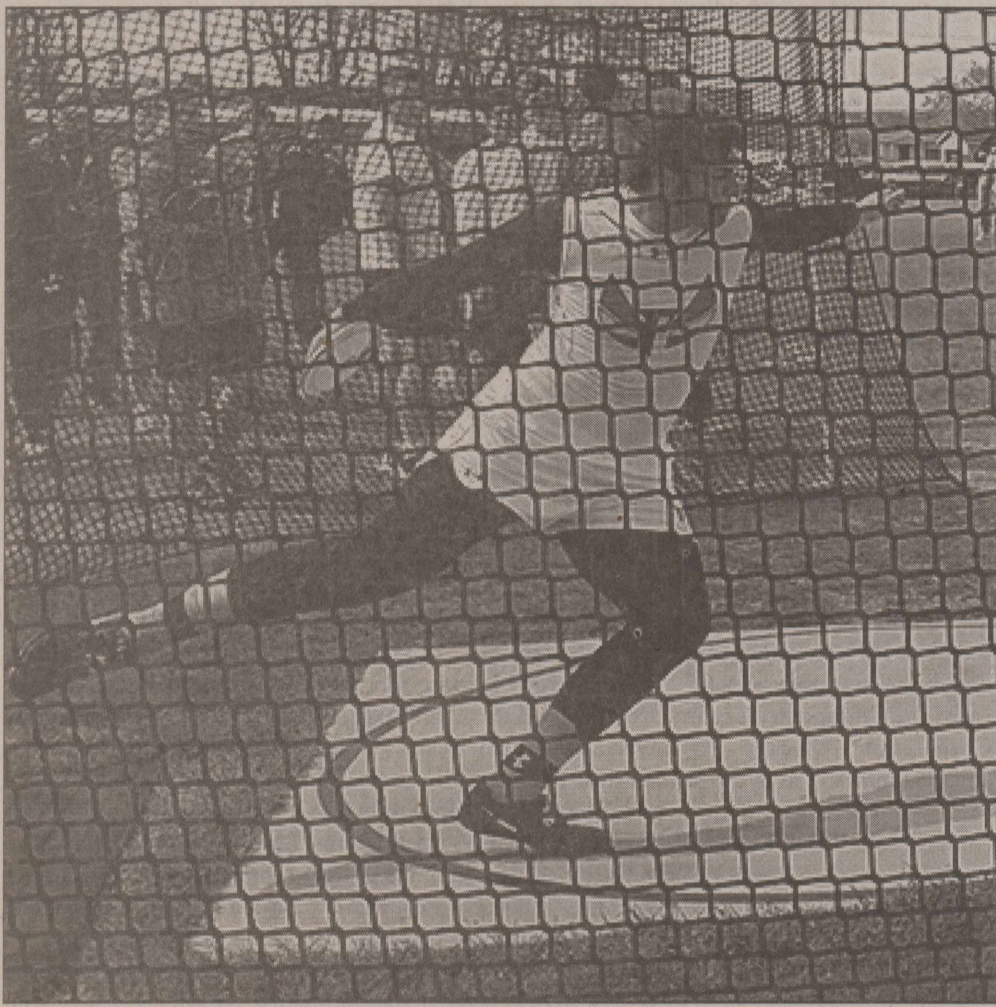

Holcombe Tosses His way to State Track Championships

(LEVELLAND, TX) Floydada sophomore Luke Holcombe made a big splash over the weekend at the Class 2A Region 1 Track & Field Championships, claiming gold in the boys discus. Holcombe threw for a personal best 160'3" to win the event and earn a trip to the State Championships in two weeks. Though not good enough to advance, he also took fourth in the shot put on Saturday morning.

The Whirlwinds picked up just one more point in the meet when junior Andrez Suarez took sixth in the 300m hurdles. Senior James Gibbens finished one spot out of the points with a seventh-place finish in the 1600m run. Floydada scored a total of 15 points over the weekend and lost to district-rival New Deal with 69 total team points. Holcombe will compete on Saturday May 11th at Mike Myers Stadium in Austin - his first trip to the State Track & Field Championships.

Lady Winds claim Seventh Place at Regional Track Meet

(LEVELLAND, TX) Kiana Brown and Kylie Ricketts combined for 34 of Floydada's 35 points over the weekend at the Class 2A Region 1 Track & Field Meet. Brown won the girls 100m dash and took bronze in the 200m; Ricketts claimed silver medals in both the high jump and girls 400m dash. The two senior anchors were joined by freshmen Clarissa de la Fuente and Erin Trevino on the Lady Winds 4x200m relay team, finishing sixth. Sophomore Ali Gonzales also claimed sixth in the girls' discus over the weekend. Brown and Ricketts are advancing to the State Track & Field Championships in Austin on May 11th. The top two finishers from each regional event gain an automatic bid to the event. The UIL also selects the ninth best performance in each event for a wildcard berth. With a third-place time faster than any other regional winner, Brown has earned the wildcard in the 200m dash. Floydada claimed seventh in team points over the weekend finishing behind team champions, Sunray.

Morales throws no-hitter against Lady Cyclones

CANYON - Hannah Morales and the Floydada Lady Winds needed only four innings to claim their Bi-District Championship Trophy, defeating the Memphis Lady Cyclones 15-0 on Tuesday, April 23. Morales only allowed one base runner in a dominating per-

formance from the circle that included seven strike outs.

Memphis went three up and three down in the top of the first. Floydada then got on the board with five runs in the bottom of the inning. Clarissa DeLaFuente led off by drawing a walk, moved to second on a passed ball, moved to third on an error then scored when a third strike was dropped as Morales was

thrown out at first on the play. Erin Trevino moved to second on an error and to third on a passed ball. Kylie Ricketts was hit by a pitch then stole second. Trevino stole home then Angela Vega walked. Ricketts stole home and Vega stole second then Emily Cisneros tripled to drive in Vega. Cisneros scored on a passed ball as the Lady Winds took a 5-0 lead after one inning.

In the top of the second, the Lady Cyclones again went down in order. For Floydada, DeLaFuente doubled with one out then stole third. Morales popped out but DeLaFuente was able to tag at third and score, giving the Lady Winds a 6-0 lead after two innings.

For the third straight inning, Memphis went three up and three down in order. In the bottom of the third, the Lady

Winds managed to cross the plate seven times. Ricketts led off with a single, then Vega singled and on the throw, Ricketts moved to third and Vega moved to second. An error allowed Ricketts and Vega to score. Cisneros walked then stole second and third. Kailee Sanchez drew a walk then stole second. Alyssa Obregon drew a walk then Denise Riojas tripled to drive in Cisneros, Sanchez and Obregon.

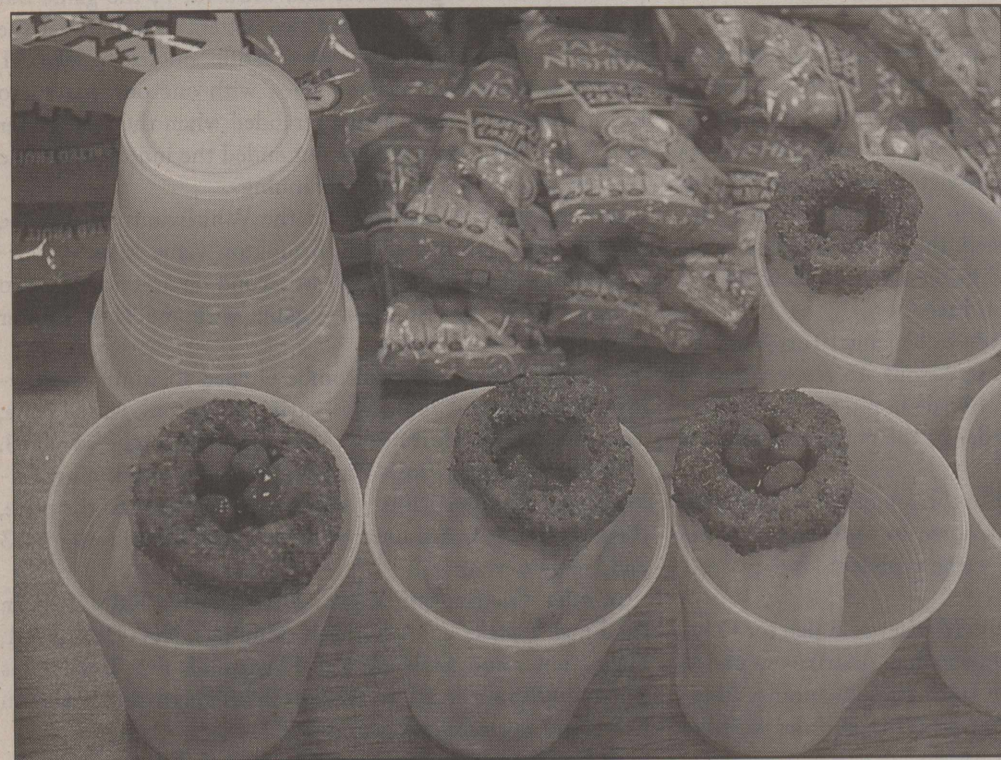

Econ Fair teaches valuable Lessons

The air bristled with excitement, determination, panic and down-right dread. Family members pulled wagons of supplies through the doors, students hustled back and forth across the cafeteria, and, every once in a while, one would hear a crash. But at no time, did the activity tempo slow.

I had just arrived at the Lockney 5th Graders' Economics Fair—and it was a madhouse, albeit, a madhouse with purpose.

For the last ten years, Lockney 5th graders have been put to the challenge. This three-week project tests the students to come up with a product to sell, formulate the entire marketing plan, and then culminates in the presentation of said product and plan featured in a booth at the fair. The Economics project combines the Math and Reading curriculum by teaching students about banking, loans, costs, profits and counting money; the students must create a marketing plan, complete with poster and packaging, all of which meet the reading requirements.

Although the food items are the real draw for the community, I tend to look for those kids that strike their own trail and create unique items or game-setups. Turning in a circle to view the booths, I decided upon my first target.

Parker Cochran had a Dartboard, complete with darts, set up. When asked why he chose this activity, he stated, "Everybody else had made food and snacks, so I wanted to do something different." Once you purchase your ticket, you get four darts to try your skill. If you hit the dartboard, just for playing, you get two pieces of candy. Out of my four darts—I got three to stick; however, Parker got all four in the dartboard, sticking within the Bulls-Eye ring. I gave him my candy.

Angela Encizo had been looking forward to the fair for a couple years. Her booth was full of bright, colorful Flower Pens. She and her mom made the unique writing utensils by gluing the stems of silk flowers into the tip of the pens, then wrapping them with floral tape. When asked her advice regarding the fair: "Don't be nervous," she said. "It's not so hard."

Daniel Alvarado got his idea from Google but decided to change it a bit to make it, as he said, "our own." His table was full of clear plastic tubing, sealed and sold as bracelets. I asked how he made them: "We first glued this side, then added baby oil, then poured in glitter, then pulled together so we could glue this side. It made the bracelet. When

asked how he knew how big to cut the tubing, he said his sisters helped with that. Daniel picked out a glittering turquoise piece for me—it was his favorite—of which I will use for a keychain. (My hands seemed to be larger than his little sisters' hands.) His advice: "Use your imagination and do whatever you want." As I was leaving his table, a group of elementary girls were all in a tizzy over the new fashion accessory. No doubt, Daniel sold all he had made.

Ciara Hernandez's table was covered with delightfully decorated cookies. Her Mom bakes cookies for sell, so she thought it would be a "good idea." With help from mom and grandma, Ciara baked 150 cookies over a period of three days. Ciara, herself, applied the bottom layer of icing, then her mom, Crystal, did the decorating. Her advice: "Get help. My mom and Grandma helped a lot."

Pepino Locos, or Crazy Cucumbers were what Jaylynn Moreno chose as her Fair product. How do you make the snack? According to Jaylynn, "You get a cucumber dip it into the chamo sauce (first, you peel and core the cuke), then dip it into Tajin sauce, fill the center with peanuts and Mexican Boltenneros (a spicy, hot, sweet gummy candy) and put it in a cup to eat." I asked how she came up with this idea. "My Tia likes showing me pictures of them, so I decided to make them," she replied. Yumm!

Fifth-grade teacher and organizer of the event, Lorena Williams, stopped for a minute before everything got crazy. This annual event makes up one of the core lessons for the 5th graders in Lockney. "We create our educational outline, implementing ways to relate the economic lessons throughout the year. The students have to determine profit and losses of investing in a business, they learn to count money, and are given the opportunity to 'take out a loan' from the Principal, which must be paid back in full. They learn that you have to have a little collateral or some kind of asset to be able to start a new venture."

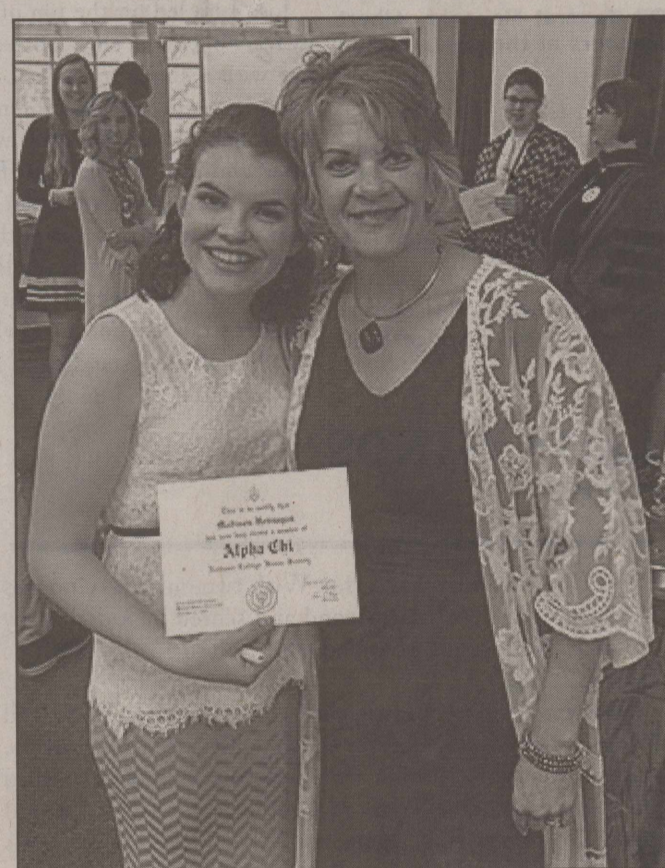
Mrs. Williams stated that the fair is pretty consistent, but added, "We always try to make it more engaging for the community... we always strive to build bridges between the school and community." First, a product. Then comes materials purchased, items created, deposits paid...SELL...SELL...SELL! At the end of the day, not only did the students have cash in their pockets, but they came away with something even more valuable—knowledge.
