I have worked in both hospitals, Floydada and Lockney. They were both good places to receive care. Floydada always had financial problems, and finally fell prey to them. We as a county will be remiss if we do not help our sister hospital survive. We need it. We must support it. We must support the physicians who have faithfully remained to provide medical care to us.

I don't understand the 25% for Lockney and 75% for Floydada ratio of the tax money. This may need to be re-evaluated. Maybe I am missing something. I don't claim to know all the facts of why things are this way, but come on let's get on the same side and quit acting like our government leaders working against each other.

We are a community of friends and neighbors. Let's get on the same page and pull together. I want this Hospital to continue to be there. I go there for treatment as do all of my family. Many people from Floydada go there. People from Silverton, Quitaque, Turkey, Matador and surrounding communities come there. When I need more complicated treatment I am sent where I need to go and don't have to spend the night in a loaded-up emergency room in Lubbock.

Think about it---We have lost our car dealership---how do I get my car worked on?? I need local things. If we don't care there's something wrong with us.

As a career worker in the health industry what we have here in our county needs saving--lets cash in a CD or two and rescue our health care ...

Come on folks speak up. Let's save what we have and try to not let this community die because of selfishness, prejudice, and short sightedness.

Yes, I have love and respect for our hospital---my life was saved there in 1958----as well as the child I was pregnant with at the time. Then in 1995 again I was septic and given 50 % chance of survival--I made it!

Let's join hands and support this hospital, with our thoughts, prayers and our--Yes our money!

Lockney City Council Getting tough on run-down Properties

The Lockney City Council met Tuesday, April 23rd at Lockney City Hall.

The first item was to review the Consent Items as provided. Members moved to accept, and the Items were approved unanimously.

The minutes to the two previous meetings, March 19 and March 30, were presented. Members moved to accept, and those minutes were approved unanimously.

Management of the City Swimming Pool was discussed. Two individuals presented their proposals for management: Patricia Reyes and Frank Hernandez. Council members heard presentations and prospective managers were excused. Members discussed pool maintenance, sub-contracting, and legal issues related to the swimming pool management contract. It was moved to accept Mr. Hernandez's proposal. That moneed to be raised to fund some of the costs of cleaning the city and options were discussed by the group.

Poling commented, "We need to make this an 'our' problem as opposed to simply the City's problem." Council members agreed that numerous entities within the community are vested in some of the worst properties. It was decided that citations would begin to be issued and enforced by legal means.

Manager Poling presented the need to consider someone for the McKenzie Municipal Water Authority Board of Directors. The seat is up for renewal on April 30, 2019. The appointment was tabled until authorities determine is residency is required.

The Council moved into Executive session. Upon reconvening, a motion was made to increase the City Secretary salary by \$500/year. The vote was approved unanimously. A second motion was made to increase the City Public Works Manager

)1: Trapezoidal bed cover



Pickup truck beds look rectangular. They are not. They are trapezoids. Who knew? I know now.

It seemed like a good idea at the time to construct a cover for our Ford truck bed. Why spend good money for a fancy fiberglass cover when sturdy plywood should work? And wouldn't my carpenter husband, Hugh, be able to handle any design challenges by phone? In retrospect, what was he

MUNN WELCH thinking when he said OK?

Long-distance do-it-yourself carpentry is DIY enhanced - one self on site, doing the work, and the other self off site, advising.

If the off-site self doesn't see the finished project till it's done, that just raises the ante. Ask me.

My partner in crime, Terri, helped me. First we had to correctly cut our 2x4's for the slightly trapezoidal frame. We collectively dredged up various time-blurred memories from trigonometry, geometry and algebra and talked about



hypotenuses and Pythagoras. We contemplated calling either her dad or my high school math teacher. (I'd already discussed it with Hugh and didn't want to bother him again.) We kept thinking we might be on the right track. Wouldn't our above-named mentors be proud of us if we didn't have to call for help?

At one point Terri said "We're taking sine and cosine here." Somehow that line struck me funny. Only after you've been out of school a few decades can you find humor in math.

Ultimately we quit drawing triangles in the dirt and adapted somebody's roof slope formula to set the miter saw. It worked. I recommend roof slope formulae.

Next came the plywood. No matter how you slice it, one piece of 4x8 plywood won't cover a roughly 6x7 pickup bed, and two pieces is overkill. That's plywood for you. But when Hugh suggested we should incorporate hinged flaps right behind the cab to open to the sides, we felt good about having the extra plywood. When there's a trapezoid in the mix anything can happen. And did.

We sized our big aft piece of plywood to reach from side to side, making it big enough to furnish drip ledges on either side and across the rear, and attaching that expansive piece not only to the 2x4's of our supporting trapezoidal perimeter frame but also to a 2x4 placed crosswise about two feet ahead of the front-to-rear mid-point, said piece serving primarily as a crosswise resting surface for the two afore-mentioned hinged flaps, the operative word being "hinged." We tried piano hinges first, but even after we scrutinized the piano to know exactly how to install piano hinges, they proved too flimsy. So we opted for regular hinges instead, which I installed, each correctly on one hinge half and each wrong on the other. (Terri wasn't there.) It takes a special brain to get hinges only half-wrong. I have a special brain.

Closing advice for would-be DIY pickup bed cover build-

Plywood comes in different grades. Be sure you buy the right grade before cutting it into trapezoids. Just saying.

AMARILLO, Texas (April 23, 2019) - As the region approaches its peak storm season, Xcel Energy is reminding Texas and New Mexico customers how to prepare for possible electricity outages.

"We continue to strengthen the power grid that serves our area to make it more resilient in the face of high winds and lightning, but outages do happen. Now is a good time for customers to think about how they will manage if a storm disrupts their power service," said Brad Baldridge, director of Customer and Community Relations for Xcel Energy in New Mexico and Texas.

Xcel Energy provides customers several ways to communicate with the company during outage events. The "My Account" feature at xcelenergy.com includes an outage map that shows where outages are occurring, how many customers are affected and when power is expected to be restored. Customers may also report outages online and sign up to receive email, text or voice message updates on power restoration times. These same features are also included on the free Xcel Energy app that can be downloaded from Apple Store or Google Play. The app also shows past electric use information and provides a secure payment portal.

"Our customers want convenient ways to communicate with us, and they like the freedom of servicing their accounts from anywhere," Baldridge said. "Our electronic customer service tools have improved the customer experience significantly, and we hope to make these features better every year."

Customers may also call an Xcel Energy customer agent at 1-800-895-1999 to report outages or downed lines.

While most outages are restored within a couple of hours, extreme weather events such as the wind storm of March 13 can disrupt service for extended periods. Though these events are uncommon, customers should still be prepared by:

Having an evacuation plan in the event of long-term outages, especially if caring for disabled family members or small children

Stockpiling nonperishable food items and bottled water Checking batteries in flashlights

Outages caused by spring storms can also present hazards to Xcel Energy employees and the public. Customers should always assume an electric line, even one that is on or near the ground, is energized and therefore dangerous. Customers should never touch or move a downed power line.

Xcel Energy crews are prepared to deal with the worst types of storm damage and outage situations. The company routinely stages employees and supplies in key locations ahead of storms when possible, and has invested hundreds of millions of dollars in upgraded power systems to improve reliability and provide more options to reroute power on the expanded network.

In the event of widespread outages caused by storms, Xcel Energy crews will prioritize efforts on large feeder lines in order to restore the largest numbers possible at once, then move to restore tap lines, transformers and individual service lines. 

USDA Extends Deadline for Market Facilitation **Program Payments**

Special to the Hesperian-Beacon

WASHINGTON, April 29, 2019 - USDA extended the deadline to May 17 from May 1 for agricultural producers to certify 2018 crop production for payments through the Market Facilitation Program (MFP), which helps producers who have been significantly affected by foreign tariffs, resulting in the loss of traditional exports. USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) extended the deadline because heavy rainfall and snowfall have delayed harvests in many parts of the country, preventing producers from certifying acres.

Payments will be issued only if eligible producers certify before the updated May 17 deadline.

The MFP provides payments to producers of corn, cotton, sorghum, soybeans, wheat, dairy, hogs, fresh sweet cherries and shelled almonds. FSA will issue payments based on the producer's certified total production of the MFP commodity multiplied by the MFP rate for that specific commodity.

"Trade issues, coupled with low commodity prices and recovery from natural disasters, have definitely impacted the bottom line for many agricultural producers;" said FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce. "The MFP payments provide short-

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tariffs to supplement the traditional farm safety net, helping agricultural productimes. 



Winds earn multiple medals in push to Regional Finals




to the Finals on Saturday in the 200m dash,



Econ Fair teaches valuable Lessons

The air bristled with excitement, determination, panic and down-right dread. Family members pulled wagons of supplies through the doors, students hustled back and forth across the cafeteria, and, every once in a while, one would hear a crash. But at no time, did the activity tempo slow.

I had just arrived at the Lockney 5th Graders' Economics Fair-and it was a madhouse, albeit, a madhouse with purpose.

For the last ten years, Lockney 5th graders have been put to the challenge. This threeweek project tests the students to come up with a product to sell, formulate the entire marketing plan, and then culminates in the presentation of said product and plan featured in a booth at the fair. The Economics project combines the Math and Reading curriculum by teaching students about banking, loans, costs, profits and counting money; the students must create a marketing plan, complete with poster and packaging, all of which meet the reading requirements.

Although the food items are the real draw for the community, I tend to look for those kids that strike their own trail and create unique items or game-setups. Turning in a circle to view the booths, I decided upon my first target. Parker Cochran had a Dartboard, complete with darts, set up. When asked why he chose this activity, he stated, "Everybody else had made food and snacks, so I wanted to do something different." Once you purchase your ticket, you get four darts to try your skill. If you hit the dartboard, just for playing, you get two pieces of candy. Out of my four darts--I got three to stick; however, Parker got all four in the dartboard, sticking within the Bulls-Eye ring. I gave him my candy. Angela Encizo had been looking forward to the fair for a couple years. Her booth was full of bright, colorful Flower Pens. She and her mom made the unique writing utensils by gluing the stems of silk flowers into the tip of the pens, then wrapping them with floral tape. When asked her advice regarding the fair: "Don't be nervous," she said. "It's not so hard.' Daniel Alvarado got his idea from Google but decided to change it a bit to make it, as he said, "our own." His table was full of clear plastic tubing, sealed and sold as bracelets. I asked how he made them: "We first glued this side, then added baby oil, then poured in glitter, then pulled together so we could glue this side. It made the bracelet. When


asked how he knew how big to cut the tubing, he said his sisters helped with that. Daniel picked out a glittering turquois piece for me--it was his favorite--of which I will use for a keychain. (My hands seemed to be larger than his little sisters' hands.) His advice: "Use your imagination and do whatever you want." As I was leaving his table, a group of elementary girls were all in a tizzy over the new fashion accessory. No doubt, Daniel sold all he had made.

Ciara Hernandez's table was covered with delightfully decorated cookies. Her Mom bakes cookies for sell, so she thought it would be a "good idea." With help from mom and grandma, Ciara baked 150 cookies over a period of three days. Ciara, herself, applied the bottom layer of icing, then her mom, Crystal, did the decorating. Her advice: "Get help. My mom and Grandma helped a lot."

Pepino Locos, or Crazy Cucumbers were what Jaylynn Moreno chose as her Fair product. How do you make the snack? According to Jaylynn, "You get a cucumber dip it into the chamo sauce (first, you peel and core the cuke), then dip it into Tajin sauce, fill the center with peanuts and Mexican Boltenneros (a spicy, hot, sweet gummy candy) and put it in a cup to eat." I asked how she came up with this idea. "My Tia likes showing me pictures of them, so I decided to make them," she replied. Yumm! Fifth-grade teacher and organizer of the event, Lorena Williams, stopped for a minute before everything got crazy. This annual event makes up one of the core lessons for the 5th graders in Lockney. "We create our educational outline, implementing ways to relate the economic lessons throughout the year. The students have to determine profit and losses of investing in a business, they learn to count money, and are given the opportunity to 'take out a loan' from the Principal, which must be paid back in full. They learn that you have to have a little collateral or some kind of asset to be able to start a new venture." Mrs. Williams stated that the fair is pretty consistent, but added, "We always try to make it more engaging for the community... we always strive to build bridges between the school and community." First, a product. Then comes materials purchased, items created, deposits paid ... SELL ... SELL ... SELL! At the end of the day, not only did the students have cash in their pockets, but they came away with something even more valuable-knowledge.
