LOCKNEY - Floydada Lady Winds, following a two and one-half hour rain delay, needed a change of venue and eight innings to defeat the Post Lady Lopes 12-11 in the Area round of the 2A UIL Softball playoffs on Friday, May 3. Denise Riojas delivered an RBI single in the bottom of the eighth to drive home Alyssa Obregon with the winning run and advance the Lady Winds to the Regional Quarterfinals against West Texas Stinnett.

Post took the early lead with one run in the top of the first. Marisa Gutierrez singled to lead off the game. With one out, Gutierrez stole second then moved to third on a fielder's choice out by Kendra Finch. Auddrey Moreno reached on an error then stole second. A throwing error allowed Gutierrez to score, giving the Lady Lopes a 1-0 lead. Floydada answered in the bottom half with two runs of their own. Clarissa DeLaFuente reached on a dropped third strike then Hannah Morales reached on a four-pitch walk. Alexis Cruz entered to run for Morales. Erin Trevino reached on a fielder's choice as DeLaFuente was forced out at third but on the throw to first, Cruz ran home with the Lady Winds first run. Trevino moved to second on the play. Kylie Ricketts was hit by a pitch then Angela Vega

singled to drive in Trevino as the Lady Winds took a

2-1 lead after one inning.

In the top of the second, Miranda Perez led off with a home run to center, allowing Post to tie the game. Aubrianna Perez singled but Cayce Britton grounded into a double play then Marissa Luna struck out. For Floydada in the bottom of the inning, Riojas was hit by a pitch to lead off, then DeLaFuente walked with one out, Trevino walked to load the bases. Ricketts hit into a fielder's choice as Riojas was forced out a home. A passed ball allowed DeLaFuente to score, giving the Lady Winds a 3-2 lead after two innings.

For Post in the top of the third, Gutierrez led off with a single. Bailey Tidwell followed with a single as Gutierrez moved to third. With one out, Tidwell stole second then Gutierrez stole home to tie the game. Tidwell then stole third then with two outs, an error allowed Tidwell to score, giving the Lady Lopes a 4-3 lead. In the bottom of the inning, the Lady Winds added three runs. With one out, Kailee Sanchez singled then Obregon reached on an error. With two outs, DeLaFuente doubled, driving in Obregon. An error allowed K Sanchez to move to third and Obregon to move to second, then on the same play, Sanchez managed to score. Morales doubled, driving in DeLaFuente as the Lady Winds took a 6-4 lead after three innings.

Post went down in order in the top of the fourth.



Everyone that received some rainfall had a prayer answered. As we all continue to pray for rain in moderation, remember the fellow Texans and Americans that suffered devastation of life and property from the severe weather in our prayers also.

The Great State of Texas is just 18 short days from the end of Regular Session of the 86th Legislature. Bills are moving at breakneck speed and 254 Counties are caught in the balance. There are several bills that could be beneficial to the citizens of Floyd County and several that are not. As the Legislators work to address, what they refer to as the big 3, the budget, school finance and tax-payer relief, County officials statewide are hoping that a Special Session is not needed. I'm not sure how much "tax relief" the citizens will receive if the State continues to control the appraisal process, but I am sure that it will not be as much as the tax-payer will be told they are

This month I am going to highlight the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector. What is a Tax Assessor-Collector? The Tax Assessor-Collector calculates property tax rates for the County, collects taxes for the County (and sometimes for other taxing entities) and collects various other fees for the State and County. What does a Tax Assessor-Collector do in Texas? The Tax Assessor-Collector in Texas has the following duties and responsibilities: (1) Calculates property tax rates for the County, (2) Collects property taxes for the County, (3) May collect taxes for cities, schools and other local taxing entities, (4) Processes motor vehicle title transfers. (5) Issues motor vehicle registrations and licenses, (6) May process boat titles and registrations, (7) Register voters and may conduct elections, and (8) Collects various other fees for the State and County.

The Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector is Ms. Delia Suarez. Ms. Suarez was appointed to the Office on December 28, 2005 by the Commissioners Court. Ms. Suarez then ran for the unexpired term which ended December 31, 2008. Ms. Suarez took office for her first full term on January 1, 2009 and is currently serving her 3rd full term.

The Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector doesn't have to worry about calculating tax. rates and collecting taxes because of the Floyd County Central Appraisal District. The Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector has all the other duties described above and a few more. She is required to receive continuing education each year on the operation of the office of Tax Assessor-Collector. She also must receive continuing education in the operation of elections, the registration of voters and stay current on the requirements and changes in procedure of registering and titling vehicles.

THE HUGH NELSON FAMILY

William and Mary (Rardin) Nelson and three children-Oscar N., Lessie Lee, and Hugh J.- Moved from Atwood, Ilinois to near Houston, Texas in 1900. They survived the Galveston flood. They soon moved to Johnson County, Texas and later to Rhome, Wise County, Texas.

My father, Hugh J. married Lydia Ann (Lena) Ford in 1906 in Wise County. Six children were born to them there Opal, Raymond, Carl, Herman, Lloyd, and Deane. William Nelson died in 1909 and was buried in the Fairview Cemetery

The Hugh Nelsons moved to Floydada, Texas in June, 1917, and settled one and one-fourth miles northeast of the Lakeview School. Oscar Nelson and mother Mary moved December 1916 to Floydada, near Lakeview. In early 1918 Hugh had the chicken pox followed by the children, then all had whooping cough, measles, and roseola. The latter part of 1918 we had influenza. Alma Ruth was born in 1917 and Lena Mae in 1921 in Floyd County. The day Lena Mae was born I took the smallpox. Eight or ten days later Mother and baby had smallpox. Dr. Andrews had vaccinated us but the vaccine was no good. Two brothers had already had smallpox and also several families in the community.

Lakeview had a good school in a nice brick building with four class rooms and a large auditorium above them. Several non -denominational churches used the auditorium for church services by taking turns. It was also used for school programs and funeral services.

Our household things, farm implements, and horses were shipped to Floyd County by train. Cows could not be shipped because of the ticks. On arrival they had to buy cows. The horses were accustomed to eating threshed oats so they had to learn to eat maize heads. We had to learn how to burn coal for heating and cooking instead of wood.

Many covered wagons (prairie schooners) passed by our house-people moving west. They often stopped for water a our lace because the windmill was near the road. The mirages on the plains fascinated me.

At present I (Opal Nelson Higgins) live in La Mesa, California, Raymond and Estella in Plainview, Texas, Carl (a World War II veteran) in Dimmitt, Herman and Ethel in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Lloyd And Fannie Ruth in Borger Texas, Deane and Clovelle in Beliflower, California, Alma Ruth in Floydada, Lena Mae and Klyce Ooley in Plainview Texas. I am thankful that after seventy years all eight of us are still living.

My parents, Hugh and Lena, grandparents, Jasper and Sonora Ford, grandmother Mary Nelson, Uncle Oscar Nelson Aunt Jessie and Harvey J. Newberry, their son Paul Newberry, and Great Aunt Ida Reeves are all buried in the Lakeview

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

With all these cool, moist, foggy mornings of late, my garden seeds are pushing their heads out of the soil! Although that is always such an amazing thing to me, it also means that I've got to get into gear and start making their support systems. Which brings me to a great accomplishment!

Today, Terry and I got our large arbor completed. I've had it marked out for months; however, gathering some of the materials and finding the time to dedicate to the job turned out to be a bit longer than expected. I needed to get our spaghetti squash seeds in the ground, so this ended up being 'the weekend.

What a beautiful sight to behold! Standing on the southern end of our garden, our arbor is eagerly waiting for those squash vines to start crawling up and over the wire. We will also be planting our watermelons and some of our cantaloupes alongside the arbor so they, too, can grow up rather than sprawling all over the ground. And, of course, our vining okra.


Not only does 'growing vertical' help control killing fungus, but it keeps the fruit off the ground and its moisture. For those with limited space, growing vertically solves those problems with "I need more room for planting!"

As to the garden, it is doing well! Our Indian corn and our first planting of sweet corn are standing tall enough to make out the rows. Both types of peas have pushed their leaves out to the sunshine--another trellis will be needed by the end of the week. I've got squash, honeydew, and a variety of pumpkins all coming up in various parts of the garden-mostly where the fruit got left last fall. I suspect that I will thin some of those out, but the majority will get to stay where they are and flourish.

We planted clover instead of grass in one area and it is now a bright, green, lush carpet! It's still tiny, but the coverage it has given to this 'soon-to-be-breakfast-spot' is far more than I had expected. We will be sprinkling that seed around in different garden beds to help with the soil condition as well as to provide a nice blanket to hold in the soil's moisture.

What's planned for this week? My green-tomato seedlings have gotten stronger with the warm days, so I hope to get some of them planted where our winter garden produce is bolted and seeding. I have another variety of cucumbers that need to get into the ground, and now that the corn is up, I need to plant my beans in and around

This time of year, when those seeds are poking out their heads and I can identify them, is one of my favorite seasons. I am overwhelmed and amazed at nature's ability to create such beauty!



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
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

Fourth Graders create Freedom Quilt





TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are

on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period; and the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period. 
