W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital named on Top 20 Critical Access Hospital list

LOCKNEY - W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital was recently named one of the Top 20 Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) for "Best Practice Recipients - Patient Satisfaction" in the country. The rankings were recently announced by the National Rural Health Association (NRHA).

The Top 20 Critical Access Hospitals, including W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital, scored best among critical access hospitals as determined by The Chartis Center for Rural Health for Patient Satisfaction.

The Top 20 Critical Access Hospital winners are those hospitals who have achieved success in the overall performance based on a composite rating from eight indices of strength: inpatient market share, outpatient market share, quality, outcomes, patient perspectives, cost, charge and financial stability.

Those hospitals that have been recognized as Top 20 Critical Access Hospital "best practice recipients" have achieved success in one of two key areas of performance: Quality Index-A rating of hospital performance based on the percentile rank across the five categories of Hospital Compare Process of Care measures; and Patient Perspective Index-A rating of hospital performance based on the percentile rank on two Hospital Compare HCAHPS measures ("Overall Rating" and "Highly Recommend").

"W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital is proud of the efforts of its physicians and staff who have contributed to our hospital achieving this designation," said Jim Heitzenrater, CEO. "Our results as a top 'Best Practice Recipients - Patient Satisfaction' means our community can count on us to deliver the services they need now and in the future."

An awards ceremony will be held during NRHA's Critical Access Hospital Conference in September in Kansas City, MO.

Comanchero Canyons Museum Calls for Rendezvous on June 29th

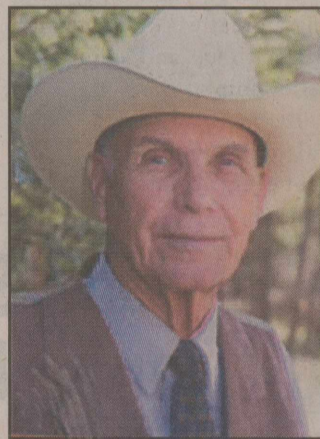
QUITAQUE - The Comanchero Rendezvous, a gathering and annual fund raiser for the Comanchero Canyons Museum, will kick off in Quitaque at 10 a.m. on Saturday, June 29th. To be celebrated is the rich history of five counties, Floyd, Motley, Hall, Briscoe, and Swisher, shaped by an association with the Caprock escarpment and historic trails.

Activities include a hamburger lunch, outside exhibits of the pioneer days, flint knapping, blacksmithing, artifact identification, inside exhibits and new displays, and recognition of a very special guest.

At 10:30 a.m. Motley County native son, Alvin Lynn of Amarillo, will be honored for his contributions to the preservation and interpretation of history of the Caprock and Panhandle with a book signing. A science and social studies teacher first, Lynn has also served as a steward for the Texas Historical Commission, unselfishly donating his time on preservation projects throughout the region. The avocational archaeologist became the author of Kit Carson and the First Battle of Adobe Walls. According to S.C. Gwynne in True West Magazine; Lynn spent 15 years following the 200-mile trail made by Carson's 1864 military expedition, recovered 1,800 artifacts and corrected many historical errors. Among Lynn's discoveries was the Kiowa village Carson attacked, where relics had rested undisturbed for 150 years.

Following the book signing, a grilled hamburger lunch will be offered for \$8 from 11:30 to 1:00, as part of the annual fund-raising activities. Over 125 people were served last year, and planners are hoping for even more this year.

Artifact Identification will be available for collectors who would like more information on their treasures, artifacts, or fossils. Returning from the Cherokee Nation and Muskogee, Oklahoma, will be flint

knapper Vyril Keeter, who has now been invited to the Smithsonian three times to demonstrate his craft. Cotton Elliott of Quitaque will be back blacksmithing with his creations of the popular Indian-style bracelets and other items made at the anvil.

An outdoor display includes wagons, a windmill, the blacksmith shop, and a log cabin handcrafted by Ronnie Carpenter of Quitaque. Inside art and exhibits range from fossils from the Little Ice Age, Paleo to Historic Native Americans, The Texan Santa Fe Expedition of 1841, The Red River War of 1874, to Charles Goodnight and the F Ranch. The museum is located at 200 S. Third Street in Quitaque, south of the First National Bank building.

Comanchero Canyons Museum is dedicated to telling and preserving the history of the 19th-century commerce between the settlements of New Mexico and the Indian Nations of the Southern Plains.

Caprock Hospital District

FLOYDADA - The monthly meeting of the Caprock Hospital Board of Directors took place last Tuesday morning at the EMS Building in Floydada.

No members of the public were present for the public forum. The first order of business was a request by EMS Director Gooch to purchase Cardiac Monitor. The cost of the machine was stated at \$36,098. After discussion, a motion was made to approve the purchase and the vote in favor was unanimous.

Gooch was on an ambulance call during the meeting but stated that when making such requests, she always works to find a grant to cover a portion of the purchase. It is her desire that grant funding will cover a portion of the \$36,000.

The EMS report of calls for the month of May are as follows: Medical-16, Trauma-2, Cardiac-4, Dog Bite-1, Mental Health-1, Patient assessments-3. There were no transportation calls.

President Brienne Glasscock reviewed the request from the West TX Family Clinic staff for installation of new entrance doors that allow for handicap access. President Glasscock noted that she had contacted Plains Plate Glass and Reed's Glass, both of Plainview. They had directed her to Continental Automatic Doors of Lubbock as the only provider of sliding glass, handicap access doorway installers in the area. Glasscock stated that their bid which included the doors, frames, electronic mechanisms and installation came to \$5,810. A motion was made to accept the bid from Continental Automatic Doors and begin the work. The vote in favor was unanimous.

Bids for the Asbestos Abatement on the campus of the old hospital had been received and were opened and viewed. The bids for the Abatement alone, ranged from \$278,000 to \$323,875. There was a question in regard to one of the bids regarding scope. The board asked Glasscock to get verification. A motion to allow Glasscock to make the decision based on the additional information was proposed and voted for unanimously.

The board opened and reviewed the Demolition bids for the old hospital campus. The range of bids started at \$107,200 and ended with \$145,000. Based on the information involved, the board moved and voted unanimously to take the bid of \$120,000 by M. Hasty Construction Co., Inc. for the demolition. It was noted that Hasty Construction Co. had performed the most recent demolition, of the Sears Bldg. in Floydada, as well as the demolition of the county's jailhouse in 2016.

Board Member Denice Payne stated, "We have tried tirelessly to get that building back in use," however, due to the effects of time, weather and non-use, utilization of the current building is not feasible. "The demolition of the structure will bring about a positive impact on our community."

There was no further business. Members present were President Brienne Glasscock, VP TK Farris, Secretary Matthew Rainwater, Taylor Sue and Denice Payne. Abby Battey was also in attendance.

Interment followed at the Floydada Cemetery.

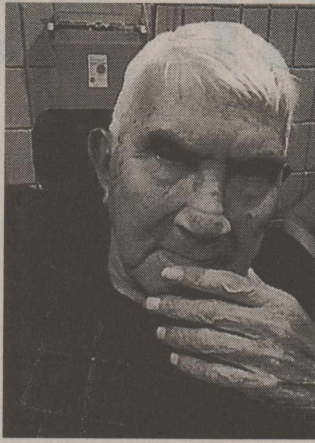

USDA explains 2019 MFP

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) released information regarding how USDA will treat prevented planting acres with regard to the recently announced 2019 Market Facilitation Program and 2018/2019 disaster relief legislation, see below.

What is the purpose of the Market Facilitation Program? What is the legal authority?

The Market Facilitation Program (MFP) assists farmers with the additional costs of adjusting to disrupted markets, dealing with surplus commodities, and expanding and developing new markets at home and abroad, consistent with the authorities of the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Charter Act.

Last year, soybeans had the highest MFP payment per bushel. Should I plant soybeans this year to get the highest payment if I have the opportunity?

You should plant what works best for your operation and what you would plant in any other year, absent any assistance from USDA. 2019 MFP assistance is based on a single county payment rate multiplied by a farm's total plantings to the MFP-eligible crops (outlined below) in aggregate in 2019.

Those per acre payments are not dependent on which of those crops are planted in 2019, and therefore will not distort planting decisions. Your total payment-eligible plantings cannot exceed your total 2018 plantings.

2019 MFP-eligible non-specialty crops: alfalfa hay, barley, canola, corn, crambe, dry peas, extra-long staple cotton, flaxseed, lentils, long grain and medium grain rice, millet, mustard seed, dried beans, oats, peanuts, rapeseed, rye, safflower, sesame seed, small and large chickpeas, sorghum, soybeans, sunflower seed, temperate japonica rice, triticale, upland cotton, and wheat.

My fields never dried out enough to get any crop in. Do I get a 2019 Market Facilitation Program payment?

No, USDA does not have the legal authority to make MFP payments to producers for acreage that is not planted. To qualify for a 2019 MFP payment, you must have planted a 2019 MFP-eligible crop. Producers unable to plant their crop should work with their crop insurance agent to file a claim.

I filed a prevented planting claim, and I am going to plant a cover crop to prevent erosion. Does that count for 2019 MFP if it's on the 2019 MFP-eligible

list you announced in May?

If you choose to plant a cover crop with the potential to be harvested, because of this year's adverse weather conditions, you may qualify for a minimal amount of 2019 MFP assistance. You must still comply with your crop insurance requirements to remain eligible for any indemnities received.

I heard that I could get 90% of my crop insurance guarantee as a prevented planting payment through the disaster bill. Is that true?

The Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Act of 2019 gives the USDA the authority to compensate losses caused by prevented planting in 2019 up to 90%. While the authority exists, USDA must operate within finite appropriations limits. It is highly unlikely that the supplemental appropriation will support that level of coverage in addition to crop insurance. Congress appropriated \$3.005 billion in assistance for a wide array of losses resulting from disasters throughout 2018 and 2019, requiring USDA to prioritize how it is allocated. The Department plans to provide assistance on prevented planting losses within the confines of our authority.

If I plant a second crop

or cover crop, can I still get my full prevented planting payment? What about an MFP payment?

You must comply with crop insurance requirements to remain eligible for a full prevented planting indemnity. USDA encourages you to visit with your crop insurance agent to ensure you are aware of those various options for your operation. If you choose to plant a cover crop with the potential to be harvested, because of this year's adverse weather conditions, you may qualify for a minimal amount of 2019 MFP assistance.

I have heard that only acreage in a declared disaster area will qualify for prevented planting under the Disaster Relief Act. Is that true?

USDA is currently evaluating the new authority provided under the Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Act of 2019. However, it is generally true that producers with qualifying losses in a Secretarial or Presidentially-declared disaster area will be eligible for Disaster Relief Act assistance. Producers with qualifying losses outside of those areas will have eligibility determined on a case-by-case basis.

I have a revenue protection policy with a 'harvest price option.' Do I get the

higher of the projected price or harvest price for my prevented planting payment?

The Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Act of 2019 gives the USDA the authority to compensate losses caused by prevented planting in 2019 and also provides additional authority to compensate producers on the higher of the projected price or harvest price. USDA is currently exploring legal flexibility to provide assistance that better utilizes the harvest price in conjunction with revenue and prevent planting policies.

If I am prevented from planting but manage to get a cover crop or a forage in the ground, am I able to hay or graze that prior to November 1, given the forage shortage we're going to experience?

USDA encourages you to visit with your crop insurance agent to ensure you are aware of those various prevented planting, cover crop, and harvest options for your operation. USDA is currently reviewing the prevented planting restrictions in the Federal Crop Insurance Act to determine what options may be available to address this and other issues. Further clarity regarding this haying and grazing date will be forthcoming.

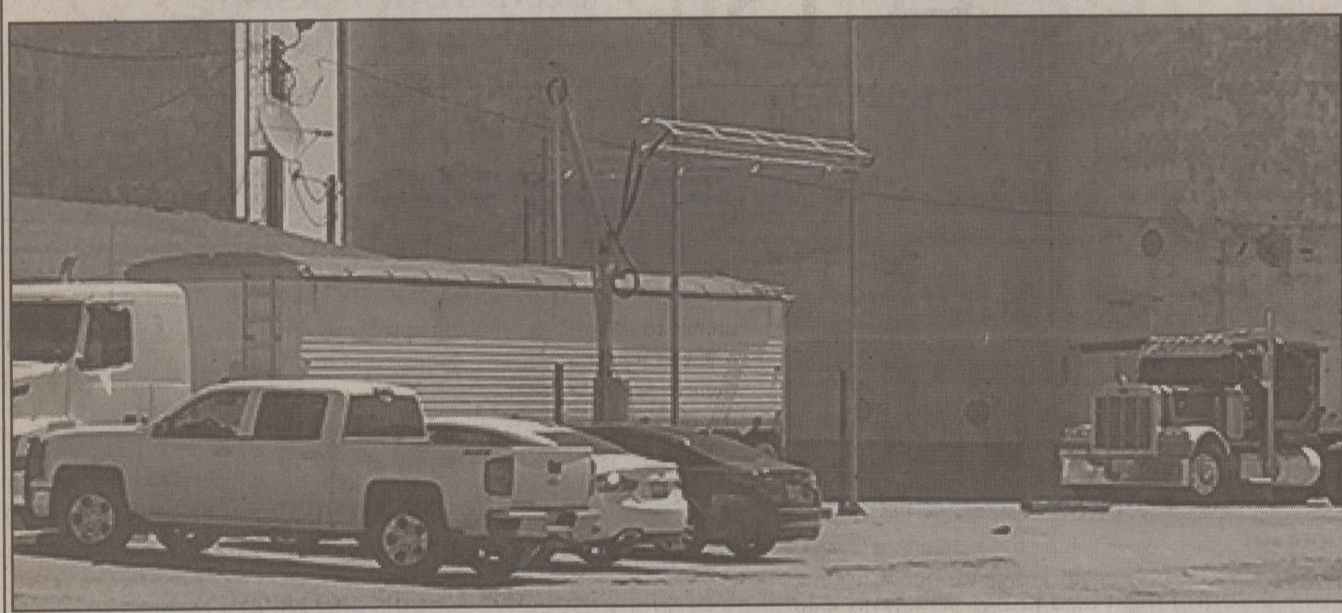
What if I don't have crop insurance? How do MFP and disaster relief programs work for me if I'm prevented from planting due to natural disasters?

Crop insurance is not required to qualify for 2019 MFP assistance. However, USDA requires that a producer plant a 2019 MFP-eligible crop to qualify for the 2019 MFP assistance.

If you choose to plant a cover crop with the potential to be harvested, because of this year's adverse weather conditions, you may qualify for a minimal amount of 2019 MFP assistance.

The Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Act of 2019 gives the USDA the authority to compensate losses caused by prevented planting in 2019. Producers with qualifying losses in a Secretarial or Presidentially-declared disaster area will be eligible for Disaster Relief Act assistance. Producers with qualifying losses outside of those areas will have eligibility determined on a case-by-case basis.
