

Gary Mangold, M.D. WJ Mangold Memorial Hospital & Cogdell Clinics

"We are blessed, a million times over! This community, this area, it has been good

Dr. Gary Mangold met with me in his office at W.J. Mangold Hospital. We are surrounded by items that softly impart comfort—a toddler's crayon-drawn pictures hanging from the bookshelf; books (the kind that one can touch the pages), some, undoubtedly, favorites; and soft, classical, Spanish-dance guitar music flowing around

"There are lots of memories in this building. I've been walking these halls since I was a grasshopper," he smiles. "My life has been so happy-literally, I'm doing what I've always wanted to do. There was never any question in my mind," Dr. Gary states unequivocally. "I wanted to do what my dad did. I fell right to it-I've never ever wondered what I would do, never wished to do anything else—I just knew from early on. And as a young boy, I went on house calls with him...sometimes, he'd let me sit in his lap and drive. I'd go to the Emergency Room with him and watch him treat his patients... Walking into those doors, the first thing you'd smell was ether."

Practicing as Floyd County's "Dr. Gary," Dr. Gary Mangold has been caring for generations of residents for a little over 40 years, following in his father's footsteps.

William Johnson Mangold, M.D. was recruited to the Lockney General Hospital in the 1950s. The hospital was just a few years old at the time. The hospital facility was originally an army barracks building in Oklahoma, moved her by the pioneers that established the hospital.

Even in those early years, the hospital was set up with a full lab and x-ray capabilities. "Dad set it up like this deliberately," added Dr. Gary. "He bought the clinic and hospital and ran them singlehandedly for eight


Born (actually delivered by his father) and raised in Lockney, Dr. Gary graduated from Lockney High School in 1970. From here he went on to Texas Tech University and then Texas Tech University School of Medicine. After three years of residency in the Ft. Worth/Dallas metroplex, he and his wife, Brenda, returned to Lockney. "Dad was the only physician in town, so we moved to Lockney to help him out and give him a little bit of rest," stated Dr. Gary. But, that 'planned three or four years' turned into a decade, and then another, and another.

Brenda had been teaching while the couple was in the metroplex, but upon moving to Lockney, she retired and took on the role of full-time mom and constant supporter of her husband. Through those decades, Gary and Brenda welcomed three beautiful daughters-Allison, Lauren and Erin-into the family.

Practicing medicine in Lockney, the duo Dr. Mangolds were the only physicians at the clinic and hospital. "It was just me and dad for seven years," tells Dr. Gary. "I thought two-person on-call was pretty difficult, and Dad had done it alone for so many years. I'd have to go to Lubbock and get supplies, and as soon as I would get there, I'd head to a payphone to check-in. I knew where every payphone in Lubbock was!" he laughs, and then recalls, "Eventually, I got one of those radio phones," he adds with more laughter.

Together, the Mangold doctors searched for additional physicians that would reach the high standards that had been lived by for decades. Dr. Kevin Stinnett joined the team in 1990.

The completion of a new hospital in 1992 was the vision of Dr. Gary's father. He worked tirelessly on the comprehensive building project and was instrumental in the implementation and development of the facility. Just prior to the hospital's unveiling, Dr. Mangold passed away. He had given 41

years to the care and concern of the rural area's residents. The newly minted hospital was named in memorial to him.

A decade later, Dr. Shari Moore joined the physicians at W.J. Memorial Hospital; and then, in 2009, Dr. Cynthia Schleuter was added to the staff of physicians. And, in those years, the hospital has welcomed facility additions and remodels.

Dr. Gary looks back on the history fondly. "You know, when I walk down these halls, I see the old, original walls. The picture window in the lobby was where so many looked into the nursery at all the newborn babies. And the maternity ward—we delivered thousands of babies! I still see the old hospital room where my wife was when she had our last two daughters...it is so interesting to me that I can see, in my mind, the way that it was then, even as I walk though this modern facility today."

Speaking of babies, the hospital stopped delivering babies just as Dr. Gary was on the cusp of "delivering babies for babies I had delivered." He added, "What is so special is that I know three and four generations of families. I even have some elderly patients that I remember taking care of their parents when I first came. You just don't get that opportunity very much, and it is so very special.'

With Dr. Schlueter came some muchneeded time off, and at that junction, Dr. Gary also decided to cut back—and no more "on-call" for the senior physician. "My last night on-call was the day that my first grandson was born [in St. Louis]. I delivered my last baby here at the hospital and the next morning was in the car traveling to By Deon Fincher see my newborn grandson."

Although still seeing patients, grandchildren have been one of the joys that can pull Dr. Garv out of the clinic, but not for long. Although he has no definite plans on retiring, he admits that there will come a day, time, "I'm doing what I love!"

girls [his daughters] left home, all three of them, along with their families, will be living in the state of Texas. "We are so thrilled end up settling for a much smaller rate hike. to have them all together—a 5-hour drive to the metroplex beats that 12-hour drive, and we are looking forward this new opportunity. It's exciting that we will be able to spend more quality time with them. It's just real nice!"

Forty years holds untold memories—of babies born, of diagnoses, of achievements, of friends--within the walls of the clinic and hospital. For Dr. Gary, "lots of memories—so blessed—so happy!"

He summed up his years of service with one sentence. "My heart is so full of thank-

Gooch stated that to get to the budget number needed, the effective tax rate would not change; however, the city would be adding \$1.75 onto each water bill and would be adding \$1.75 onto each sewer bill. Gooch stated that the water rates were increased in 2017 and that sewer rates were last increased in 2014. Councilmembers agreed to the additions. Motion was made to approve the budget as presented. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Classic antique toys on display at Historical Museum

FLOYDADA – A new display has been composed at the Floyd County Historical Museum that will ring familiar to many. The exhibit features some turn-of-the-century toys from three collections: The Jerry and Cheryl Murry Collection, the William Boerner Collection, and the Miss Verlin Reeves Collection. The exhibit will be available for viewing during regular museum hours through the month of September.

From the collection of Jerry and Cheryl Murry: Fisher Price The Cackling Hen Pull Toy-Wooden Cut out with paper lithography. Said "cluck, cluck, squa-auck" – 1958; Mattel – Jack in The Box Plays "Pop Goes the Weasel" An 1852 English Nursery Rhyme. Metal – 1971; Fisher

Price - Timmy Turtle Pull Toy

Circa 1956; ILLCO Toy – Jeep with Donald Duck and Mickey Mouse, Battery Operated circa 1980-1990. 16"
Brown Teddy Bear. Hand Sewn, Stuffed with Straw. Circa – 1940?

From the William Boerner Collection: Plasco, Plastic Doll House Furniture (Marked "A Plasco Toy") Made in the USA. Circa: 1924 – 1935. 18" Molded Brown Hair. Has "Mama

Crier" that doesn't work. Cloth Body with Composition Arms and Legs. Circa: 1930s.

From the Miss Verlin Reeves Collection: 15" Tall, Wooden Doll House. Considered a "Miniature House". Circa: 1900-1920. Probably Litho Paper on outside displaying house features. Opens on left side to show two floors that are wallpapered. Miss Verlin wrote that this belonged to her sister, Mary. No sister Mary is listed in 1910 census, but there is a Daisey M. Reeves listed, so middle name might have been Mary. She was eight then so would have been born about 1902. However, another source says there might have been a 7th child. Brothers were Robert J. about 1898, Elbert 1904, Harvey 1907, Roy 1909. Miss Verlin was from Motley County, TX-May 28, 1895 – May 26, 1986.

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



THE FLOYD COUNTY **HISTORICAL MUSEUM MEMORIES 1979**

LEE AND ETHEL TRICE

When Lee and I came to Floydada (Floyd Co.), the population was only 2500. We moved our furniture to Floydada from Electra, Texas in a wagon. Also with us were the mules and horses to farm with. The ways of farming we had were quite different from what they have today. We used the horses and mules to pull the plows and wagons to cultivate and gather the crops. It was several years before we got tractors to do the farming with.

Each morning we were up at four o'clock to feed and water the mules and horses and also ,milk the cows before going to the fields. This was done morning and night.

Lee's parents were William Berry and Mourning (Mona) Woods Smith Trice. In their family were two sons and two daughters. The oldest son died when he was a baby, then my husband Lee. His sisters were Catherine and Margaret. William Berry born Aug. 10, 1880 in Gilmer, Texas and raised in Texas. Mourning (Mona) was born Aug. 11,1879in Beans Creek, Tennessee and came to Texas in a wagon with her parents where she and Berry met and married in Belcherville. Berry and Mona farmed and were in the restaurant business most of their married life. They are buried in the Floydada Cemetery.



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


Online private-land stewardship lessons available



I have stumbled upon a pattern. When I have a big, upcoming edition with a lot of writing to do to fill it, I find myself in my garden. That is where my mind can unwind and allow the thoughts, facts, scenarios to find their places; that is where I can stitch the things that have happened into stories; that is where I can track advertisers, place photos and, virtually, build the newspaper in my mind. All that gets done while I pull weeds, move around water, and guide errant plants back into their vining paths.

I've about gotten a handle on the mildew that was affecting my tomatoes and have been rewarded by having pickedfresh-off-the-vine tomato breakfasts this week with my iced coffee. Terry loves peppers on any dish we have, so he has been loving the daily handful of peppers from the few plants that came back after the May hailstorms. Again, due to the weather, I have a limited number of okra plants that are churning out a daily handful of okra pods—after about four days, we have enough to fry up for supper.

Interestingly, our squash, and I mean the yellow, spaghetti, zucchini-all of it has really not put on a lot of fruit. We get a zucchini here and there, or a couple little yellow crooknecks once a week, and the bugs all but devoured our spaghetti squash plants, so there hasn't been the overwhelming production of squash this year. I put out fertilizer and dusted for bugs last week, and this week the plants are a beautiful green and huge, but not a lot of baby squash. The cucumbers are kinda in the same boat. These past two weeks have brought aphids and those little suckers (literally) embedded themselves all over the cukes. I have been waged war on them, and the plants look okay, but the cucumber production has dropped drastically.

Which leads me to the conclusion that the lack of production may stem from the lack of pollinators. Early in the year I could peer into any of the squash or cucumber blooms and easily find four or five bees. As I examine the blooms this week, I'm lucky to find one or two bees on a plant! There is no doubt that the aerial spraying has impacted our pollinators, but I too, have contributed with my dusting.

There is a fine line that we walk in agriculture, and so often it is a blurry one. I have noticed a good amount of butterflies in and among my veggie and flower blooms this week, so hopefully, our pumpkins, watermelons, and cucumbers will continue to provide fresh produce for weeks to come!

Now...if I can just get them through this interminable



The Whirlwinds have eight members returning to lead the team in the 2019 season.



Pablo Morales will be back as QB for the Horns, and Anson Rendon, who had 700 rushing yards in the district season last year, will be back as Running Back.



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The Career and Tech Education building has been constructed with minimal work left (i.e. garage doors, equipment installation, etc.). Work continues on the main part of the building with pouring of concrete slabs as well as metal studs forming the classrooms. The final pieces of steel are being erected to form the library and cafeteria spaces. The final phase of steel erection will take place in the gym area of the building in the very near future.
