On a beautiful Wednesday afternoon, on March 31, dozens of Floydada residents turned out to celebrate the groundbreaking of the new pool and splashpad facility that voters approved in the bond election of November 2013.

A cross-section of city and school officials were on-hand to commemorate the new recreational space for area youth, and in a gesture that captured the community's commitment to area children, 12 FISD students—one for each grade—were given a shovel to join the mayor in turning the soil and in turning a new page for the city.

MURRAY MARVIN JULIAN

Murray Julian's great grandfather was Jubal Anderson Early, a famous genwon fame at Antietam, Fredricksburg, Chancellorsville, and was Major General, commanding a division at Gettysburg, and in Vicksburg. Murray's paternal grandparents, John Hennegar and Elizabeth Gammill Julian came to Capps, Texas from Tennessee, and the house in which they retired, is still standing in Tye, Texas. Murray's maternal grandparents, W. K. and Mary Frances Early, lived in Abilene, and wanting to come west to live, they traveled to Floyd County in 1906, where they bought a section of land from J.A. T. Pearson and one school section from the state 5&1/2 miles from southeast of what is now South Plains. This land was premium land, near the canyon with running water, and wood there for fuel. Paying \$7 an acre for the good land, they built a house with lumber hauled by 4-horse team and 2 wagons from Amarillo. Estelline was the nearest railroad at that time. Kendis and Janis Julian now live on this farm. Murray was born in Iberis, Texas where his parents Charles Preston and Sula Agnes Julian ran a cotton gin, in 1916. When Murray was small, the Julians with children-Elbert, Vera, Ruth, Clifford and Murray-moved here to the Floyd County farm, and Early built a new house where the Grigsby Miltons now reside. All the children attended school at Sunset with post office at Curlew. Elbert died in the terrible flu epidemic of 1918 and in 1921 the Julian Family moved to Trinidad, Colo-To register for classes contact rado where Murray finished

She taught schools at Las Animas, Crock, and then summer schools in the mountains near Trinidad.

Murray worked as a car salesman and butcher, and in 1933 on June 26, Bonnie and Murray were married in Denver at the home of her sister, Bernice and Otis Sandusky. They spent a wonderful honeymoon at Estes Park, where not long ago the terrible Thompson Canyon was flooded and nothing of their camp remains. Their first home was in Trinidad, but the depresssion was on, and work hard to find. In November 1933 they went to Hallandale, Florida, to visit Clifford and Caria Julian, and stayed with them until Murray found work in Miami. They moved there and in 1935 their first son, Terry, was born. Later moving to Hollywood, where their second son, Kendis, was born in 1939. The 2nd World War was on at this time, so when Terry was 6 and Kendis 2, they moved to Denver, Colorado and bought a home. Murray worked downtown Denver, but was never happy there, always wanting to get back to Texas. When word came that the old home place where now the Bill Harpers lived, and the Charles Joiners adjoined them, that help was needed, Murray and Bonnie sold their Denver home and on March 15, 1943, they came to live and to help their beloved "Uncle Charlie".



My Journey in Powerlifting

On March 28, 2014, a goal was reached that was on my mind for four years. I won state in the 220lb weight class for division 3. It was a day full of emotion and, without a doubt, a day that will never be forgotten. I am honored to have earned "strongest in the state", but achieving this type of victory required commitment to work. Determination and heart were necessary.

The race for the title began in 2012 where I competed in the 181 lb. weight class. My journey in these competitions may never have begun without the motivation of my first-ever coaches, Levi Bandy. He refused to let me quit. As a freshman, I failed to ever win at a meet, but I typically placed in the top five, even qualifying as a regionals alternate. I had a season high total of 1170 lbs. I ended the year absolutely determined. I made a bold guarantee to Todd Bandy, our athletic director, that I would be his first state champion during his tenure

as a coach. In 2013, I won my first meet ever in the 181 lb weight class in Bovina, Texas with a total of 1235 lbs. My ego grew while my competition shrunk; I was quickly rising as the best lifter in the region until the day that I competed at regionals. Going into the meet, my mind was telling me that nothing could stop me, and I proved that when I broke the regional squat record for the 181lb. weight class at 570lbs. My final total of the year was 1365lbs. but unfortunately the record did not stand when I bombed out (disqualified) on bench after failing all three attempts due to my overconfidence and lack of humbleness; a new lesson was learned as I approached my junior year.

My third year lifting was very unique, my winning streak continued while I slowly became more humble and showed appreciation for the sport that I loved so much. The year 2014 consisted of me gaining a ton of size and strength as my determination level arose. I was now competing in the 198 lb. weight class, but I was not the favorite in the region. My mission to win the regional meet was accomplished as I not only won the meet with a total of 1530 lbs, but I also broke and currently own two regional records. Those two records are the squat (615 lbs) and total weight (1530). at state and although I denly let a shot of cockiness not smart, which resulted in to fifth place. Satisfaction

an easy year in terms of sports and powerlifting through the many challenges and obstacles I faced. It all began on Aug. 21, 2014 when I dislocated my elbow while falling to the ground in football. The largest setback was on the verge of forever ending my high school athletic career. Instead of becoming weak, I chose to become stronger than ever by abiding by the phrase that I live by, "Till I Collapse." What I meant by that is that I could fall a hundred times, but never would I fail to get back up. I continued rehabbing and in the end, made my left arm dominantly stronger than my right as I entered the powerlifting season. I continued my invitational-meet winning streak by extending it to twelve meets in three years. I was on my way to the fourth consecutive regional meet when I was faced with another difficult decision. I was forced to choose between attending my brother's wedding as his best man or competing at regionals. That choice took me two months to make, but I managed to make it work by attending both thankfully and I went on to win regionals and advance to state for the second year in a row. All the lessons I experienced I took in and went in confident. I was predicted sixth place, but I was not letting the predictions get to me this year. After my 635 lb. squat, I jumped out to an early lead but fell behind five pounds on bench press after only benching 350 lbs. Then the characteristic of heart came into play as I was faced by the challenge to dead lift a weight I had never even dreamed of doing, which was 590 lbs. If I pulled it I won, if I didn't I would get second. It was my last lift ever and I made it memorable, everything I had left in me I put it all out and came away with the win. I will never forget that moment and I thank everybody who supported and helped me get through it all. I'm going out in a place that I consider the "top", with a career high of 1575 lbs, and I truly have enjoyed lifting for myself, the school, and the community. Over the past few days' news of the plane that crashed in France has been blowing up the news feeds with every major news broadcasting station covering this ordeal. New evidence arises everyday telling a new part of the story. What goes on inside the cockpit can tell a whole lot about what is happening inside the plane. In this story the cockpit is the main source of evidence that is letting investigators know what happened prior to the planes decent.

Flight 9525 was prepared to take flight but ended up taking off 20 minutes late. Patrick Sondenheimer was the captain while Andreas Lubitz was the co-pilot the only two allowed to be in the cockpit. After reaching cruising altitude on the recording of the cockpit there is a sound of a seat being pushed back while the captain tells Lubitz "you can take over". At 10:29 a.m. air traffic control radar detects the plane has started to descend. Three minutes later air traffic control center makes their first attempt to contact the plane, but they received no feedback. Shortly after there was in fact an alarm that went off in the cockpit following the



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Floyd County Appraisal District Reminds Businesses to Render their Taxable Property by April 15

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with the Floyd County Appraisal District by April 15, 2015. A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan.1 of this year. Property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or an agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2015. If a rendition is filed late or incomplete or not at all, a 10 percent penalty may be imposed. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request with the chief appraiser on or before April 15 to receive an automatic extension to May 15 or the next business day. The chief appraiser may also grant an additional 15 days after the postponed deadline, if necessary.
