WELCH ranch-style houses. Things had been going well. I'd managed to use the killer farm jack and two sturdy boards and two bricks to carefully tilt the piano incrementally to slide furniture dollies under it. What

could go wrong? A dolly doesn't keep a piano from tilting and falling. card purchase mentioned was I plan to remember that.

When a piano crashes, the strings vibrate for several seconds thereafter. Impressive. But when you hit the keys, expect nothing. I got nothing.

Disheartened, I texted my friend Terri. She was slated to help me refurbish the piano room the next day in advance of a family gathering complete with grandkids. Terri and son Gary headed my way immediately. Piano-savvy for his 16 years, Gary once tried to catch a falling piano. The episode knocked him out of sports for the rest of the year - tough for a weightlifter. Gary knew what he was getting into.

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. Golden Spread Redi-Mix, Inc., P.O. Box 31660, Amarillo, Texas 79120-1660, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for an Air Quality Standard Permit for a Concrete Batch Plant Registration Number 112904L005, which would authorize construction of two temporary concrete batch plants under Title 30 Texas Administrative Code § 116.611 (30 TAC § 116.611) near South Plains, Floyd County, Texas 79258. The following driving directions were provided: from the intersection of Highway 207 and County Road 2286, go west on County Road 2286 for 2 miles, south on County Road 149 for 1 mile, west on County Road 100 for 2 miles to the southwest corner of County Road 100 and County Road 129. This application was submitted to the TCEQ on March 30, 2015. The proposed facility will emit the following air contaminants: particulate matter including (but not limited to) aggregate, cement, road dust, and particulate matter with diameters of 10 microns or less and 2.5 microns or less.

The executive director has completed the technical review of the application and determined that the application meets all of the requirements of a Standard Permit authorized by 30 TAC § 116.611 which would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision to issue the registration because it meets all rules and regulations. The permit application, executive director's preliminary decision, and standard permit will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Lubbock regional office, and the Floyd County Courthouse, 105 South Main Street, Floydada, Floyd County, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review at the TCEQ Lubbock Regional Office, 5012 50th St Ste 100, Lubbock, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comment or to ask questions about the application. The TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing. You may submit additional written public comments within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice in the manner set forth in the AGENCY CONTACTS AND INFORMATION paragraph below.



person traveling the furtherest. Three men, Gilly, Jimmy Willson and Sam Spence were born with in five months of each other, were announced as the oldest men at age 93. Meda Watson, 95, was announced as the oldest woman present. Jennifer Cummings traveled from Houston to be at Old Settlers and celebrated with her grand parents.

County Judge Marty Lucke presented new inductees into the Floyd County Hall of Fame. Former Sheriff, Fred Cardinal, who passed away in 2008; former County Clerk, Marilyn Hardin and former County Judge, William Hardin were added to the Hall of Fame. Louis Cardinal, son of Fred, accepted the honor on behalf of his father. County Commissioners Lindan Morris and Mike Anderson assisted Lucke in presenting the awards.

Ricky Carstensen, minister of the First United Methodist Church in Lockney, presided over the memorial service before turning over the stage to East Street Band for the rest of the morning.

Sterling and Gleynn Earle Cummings

Sterling's father, Zach Cummings, and his grandfather, Jim Cummings, moved from Farmersville to Floyd County in November of 1916. Zach came by train to Plainview with the livestock and remembered thinking, "it was a heck of a cold place." People were ice skating on the old TLD well pond north of the train depot.

Shortly after moving, Zach Cummings was drafted out of Floyd County to go to World War I. After Zach returned from the war, he married his sweetheart, Oma Calahan in Farmersville on December 10, 1919.

Sterling was the 2nd of 6 children, 3 boys and 3 girls, born to Zach and Oma. He was born in Farmersville on January 6, 1923. His family moved back to the Liberty community in Floyd County when Sterling was 1. Sterling's mother's family, the Calahans, moved to Floyd county in 1924. Sterling's family later moved between the Roseland community and the Lone Star community until settling in the South Plains community in 1947. Sterling attended schools in Roseland, Lone Star, and South Plains. He was bused to Lockney High School for his Junior and Senior years. Sterling graduated from Lockney High School in 1940.

Gleynn Earle's parents, Earl and Gleynn Brian Nor-

man were raised in Crowell. After their marriage they lived in Foard County where Gleynn Earle's siblings, a brother and 3 sisters, were born. She was born on June 10, 1931 in Vernon. They moved to Crosby County and then to Floyd County in 1939. Gleynn Earle was in 2nd grade. Her father, Earl, farmed near Lockney and her mother, Gleynn, taught in the Lockney schools. Gleynn Earle graduated from Lockney High School in 1948 and later attended TSCW in Denton and WTSU in Canyon.

Sterling and Gleynn Earle were married on February 5, 1950 in the living room of her parent's home south of Lockney. They settled in the South Plains community, and built their current home in 1960. Sterling farmed there until his retirement. They were active in many community organizations over the years and attend the South Plains Baptist Church. The people in the South Plains community and especially those in the South Plains church remain some of Sterling and Gleynn Earle's closest friends.

They have 5 children: Norman Kimbal Cummings and his wife, Monica, of Granbury; Dee Earle and her husband, Mark Sanders, of Floydada; Paula and her husband, Robert Pyle, of Floydada; Zach Cummings and his wife, Sandra, of Lockney; and John Cummings and his wife, Tammy, of Waxahachie. Sterling and Gleynn Earle have 13 grand children and 15 great-grand children, and one more great-grand child will arrive in July.

Their children attended South Plains and Lockney schools. Eight of their grandchildren attended Floyd County schools, both Lockney and Floydada.

Two of their grandson's families live and farm in Floyd County, Jason and Lindsey Pyle, southeast of Floydada, and Dane and Robin Sanders, in the South Plains community.

Sterling and Gleynn Earle celebrated their 65th anniversary in February of this year. Their first date was to a softball game, and they spent much of their free time for the next 65 years playing in or attending various sporting events, either their own, their children's, their grand children's, or their great-grand children's! They have always been very involved in their children's lives.

Carl Lee 'Cobb' Gilly
Carl Lee also known as C. L. or Cobb, was born September 16, 1921 on the family farm north of Floydada.
His dad, John Vincent Gilly, came to Floyd County in 1900 and lived about two years in a half-dugout before returning to Virginia in 1906 to marry Mary Anna Parsons. He brought her back to a two-room house he had built and they settled into life on the Plains. They had five children with Cobb being the youngest.

Vince purchased the original farmland for \$1.00 per acre. That same land has been in the family for 115 years.

Cobb rode to school at Cedar Hill on horseback and

likes to tell his family about his lunch, a biscuit with jelly. He also liked to play basketball.

After high school, he and Gerald Lackey ran the Cedar Hill Store for a while. But good jobs were very scarce and the admonition of Go West, Young Man" plus the possibilities of employment, seemed the thing to do.

So at 19, Cobb and two of his buddies pooled their money (less than \$50.00) and drove to California in his old Dodge truck. One night, they saw a grassy area and thought that it would be a good place to sleep. So, they threw their blankets on the ground only to be awaken by a policeman. When they inquired as to what they had done wrong, the policeman said, "You can't sleep here. This is

Upon arrival in California, Cobb found a job washing dishes, then later a job at Douglass Aircraft as a riveter assembling airplane fuselages. The pay was 88 cents an hour, which wasn't all that bad.

After about two years, Cobb came back to Floydada and courted Lois Beard, the oldest daughter of Orb and Sarah Lackey Beard. As crazy as it sounds, months later,

without the two seeing each other in between, Lois took the train with Janette Lackey and met Cobb halfway in Flagstaff, Ariz., where they got married on February 1, 1942. That night, they drove back to Santa Monica in time for Cobb to make his 4:00 P.M. work shift. That was, as they say, the honeymoon.

In October, 1942, Cobb joined the Navy. Originally, he was to be a gunner, but he kept signing up for more training and eventually shipped out to the South Pacific where he served as a navigator for a six-man flight crew on a PV-1 Ventura Patrol Bomber. He was stationed in Guam, the Philippines and Solomon Islands. The plane was used for anti-ship patrol, photographic reconnaissance and bombing runs.

In 1996, 50 years after his service to his country, Cobb was awarded the U.S. Air Medal for Meritorious Achievement while participating in aerial flight.


After the South Pacific, Lois joined him in Seattle where he met his 18-month-old daughter for the first time. They later returned to Floyd County where Cobb, and his brother, Gene, worked the Gilly Family Farm.


Cobb and Lois raised two daughters, Barbara and Cathy. Lois passed away in 1995. He has shared his life the last 19 years with Wanda Williams who lost her husband, Aldean, in 1996.

Cobb's family includes daughters Barbara Christian and Dan Dwelle of Santa Fe, NM and Cathy and Steve Steger of Kenedy, Texas; three grand children, David and Angel Christian, Amarillo; Heidi Steger Reed and Trey Reed of San Antonio; and Josh and Windy Steger of Dallas; and four great grand children, Carly Christian, Cason Christian, Caitlyn Reed and Carson Reed.

If you ask Cobb about the highlights of his life, he will likely say the best trip of his life was the South Plains Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. In 2012, Cobb and Harold Bertrand from Floydada joined about 140 other veterans from the Lubbock area and flew to the capital to see the World War II Memorial, along with all the other memorials honoring our veterans. They were met by honor guards everywhere they went and Cobb said that complete strangers would come over, shake their hands and say, "Thank you for your service to our country."

The veterans placed wreaths on all the memorials, marched together and didn't get much sleep; however, Cobb said it brought back many memories and was the trip of a lifetime.

The House Build - Landscaping

't's been a while since I wrote anything about my house build but things have __ progressed: albeit slowly. The good news is the house is finished. For the past two years, we've enjoyed living in our farm style home north of Childress. The house

has everything we wanted: a small footprint, open design, out in the country but not too far from town. Above all we have great neighbors right down the county road and it is a place where my kids spend as much time outdoors as

RUSSELL they do inside. GRAVES Since 2011, however, Childress (like the rest of

Texas) was under a severe drought. With the drought came water restrictions and with the restrictions came the inability to water enough to establish a landscape. Therefore, my thoughts turned to drought resistant plants.

A year after we moved in, the landscape was still in limbo. All of the construction traffic had the soil in the front yard compacted and unable to grow anything. Since the soil is the foundation of all that grows, I had to get a handle on the problems therein. So with a chisel plow, I began the arduous process of ripping the soil and hoping for rain. In the late spring of 2014, the rain began to fall. Hindsight is 20/20 but I should have planted grass last spring. Since the rain has been scant here for four years I didn't want to spend the money on planting grass seed. So throughout the summer of 201, I just tended the soil.

In September of last year, I spent \$40 on a bag of annual ryegrass seed and after plowing the yard one last time, I broadcast the seed and used an old harrow to drag the soil. Again the rain fell and a couple of weeks later, I had a

good stand of grass in the yard.

Ryegrass is a cool season plant that grows well in the fall, goes a bit dormant during the cold months of winter, and then comes back vigorously in the spring. It has an aggressive root system that breaks up subsurface hardpan and while the grass was doing its thing below, above ground the cover was slowing the rainfall and letting it soak in and improve the soil moisture in a way that hasn't been seen in

Come spring, I was ready to complete the landscaping. Although I now have a well and can water at will despite water restrictions, I still wanted to be a good steward and plant grasses and ornamentals that were native and could thrive in our semi-arid climate.

So for the lawn, I opted for a buffalo grass/blue grama mix. Both grasses are native to the area, do well with little water, and can withstand our fickle weather. To plant the grass I used a Classen Turf Overseeder. The Classen is like a self propelled, no-till seed drill that lets you plant seeds without preparing the seedbed. In other words, I left the ryegrass in place and planted the new, permanent turf seed into the existing grass stand. The existing ryegrass provides thermal and moisture protection for the new seeds and hopefully, will help the new yard get off to a good start. With abundant moisture this spring, I am optimistic.

In the beds, I opted for a variety of plants including prickly pear, red yucca, verbena, coreopsis, and lantana. All are plants that are drought and heat tolerant and should do well. To figure out their placement, I hired a landscape designer to provide some aesthetic guidance.

Rainfall can make even the worst gardener look good. So far this spring, I look like I'm a pro.






