Floyd County Historical Museum "Memories, 1979" Lon davis, Jr. Family

Long before the search for relatively contemporary roots became a popula pastime, man sought to account for his ultimate origins, usually turning to is a need to define one self and establish identity. Man is the only creation with the power to reflect on its past and upon its future. When we search deep enough we discover that we share a tremendous heritage and an exciting bond in Floyd County. Mr. and Hils. Wavis of Hill Davis of Han Cou, Tex November 6, 1888.
Maggie Bradford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henr Bradford, was born May 28 1892 in Vernon, Texas. Lon Davis and Maggie Bradford were united in marriage on August 25, 1915 and a son Lon Davis Jr. is born May While working on his degree in Latin and math degree in Latin and of Texas, Lon Davis was an associate professor of mathematics at the university and later became superintendent of public schools in Quanah. After making the decision to leave the educational field and enter to Floydada in 1920 where Lon Davis operated the ice plant until 1922 when he went into the cotton gin business with L. T. Lewis. The gin burned in 1926, but was rebuilt and owned by Lon Davis til his retirement from the cotton business in 1952. In 1930, he purchased the Marshall Ellevator Mills around 1940, but bentinued to operate the continued to operate the
elevator until it was closed in 1950 .
In 1955, Lon Davis once again entered the grain business forming a part-
nership with his son, Lon
Davis, Jr. The grain ele vator and warehouse which Highway 70 and still operated by his son. A very outgoing social in many varied activities community
organizations and dedicated members of the First Christian Church. Never at a loss for words, Lon was always in demand toserve as a speaker or master o ceremonies for different or

Floydada High School and went on to play football at Hardin Simmon College

Lon Davis, Jr. and Florine Cates, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buren C. Cates,
were married on Octobe
1950 in Dallas, Texas. It was on the same day as the annual event of the TexasCotton Bowl, where the Cotton Bowl, where the marched as a drum majorette with me "Pride Oklahomä" university marching band. Lon graduated from Floydada High School in 1935 and Flo was a Floydada High School graduate in 1942. Lon went to Texas Christian University for his in geology and later to the University of Oklahoma for work on a Master's degree While Lon was serving his country in the U. S. Navy as a lieutenant during World War II, Flo was working on a degree in fine arts and graduated from the versity of Oklahoma. It is not easy to write o

## Back to School Safety for Drivers, Bicyclists and Pedestrians

Distracted driving is always dangerous, but it is especially dangerous in and around
school zones. According to the Texas Deschool zones. According to the Texas Department of Transportation, crashes in school zones are most commonly due to driver inattention, failure to control speed, and failure to yield the right-of-way at stop
signs. As responsible drivers, we need to put signs. As responsible drivers, we need to put
down the phone and pay attention in school down the phone and pay attention in school
zones. In fact, it is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone.
Whether your oldest is just starting kindergarten or taking that first trip to school in his or her own car, parents can play an important role in keeping their children safe. For young children, make sure they know the rules about school bus safety when it comes to boarding and getting off the bus. If you are transporting children to school, remem-
ber that children under 13 should always ride in the back seat in a car seat (including a booster) or seat belt depending on whether they fit properly in the seat belt. Teen drivers and their parents should be aware of the Texas Graduated Driver License Law and the restrictions it puts in place, including no cell phone use at all and no more than one passenger under 21 in the vehicle unless the passenger is related to the driver. And, most importantly, always stress buckling up on every trip - even
from school!
