Floydada City Council **Discusses Tax Rate,** in Maintaining Plaza

The Floydada City Council held a public hearing on tax rate before its regular monthly meeting in August on Tuesday, Aug. 18. The council agreed to hold the tax rate to 40 cents per \$100, the same tax rate as the city has had for several years.

Sue Ward appeared before the council and asked for help from the city in cleaning up and maintaining Centennial Plaza. She noted that there will a clean-up event on Saturday, Sept. 5 at 8 a.m., and she would appreciate any assistance from the city in this endeavor.

Dean Johnson, general manager of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, reported on the 2015-16 budget.

Johnson noted that the lake has come back. He said it is sitting at about 79 feet, and on May 15, 2014, it was at 51 foot. He added that recreation

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their August local sales tax allocations totaling \$760.2 million, which represents an increase of 7.6 percent compared to August 2014.

Hegar also said today that state sales tax revenue in July was \$2.4 billion, up 2.7 percent compared to July 2014.



LON DAVIS, JR. FAMILY

Long before the search for relatively contemporary roots became a popular pastime, man sought to

account for his ultimate origins, usually turning to the Bible for the answer. It is a need to define one

self and establish an identity. Man is the only creation with the power to reflect on its past and upon its future. When we search deep enough we discover that we share a tremendous heritage and an exciting bond in Floyd County.

Mr. and Mrs. William H. Davis of Hill County, Texas had a son, Lon, born on November 6, 1888.

Maggie Bradford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bradford, was born May 28, 1892 in Vernon, Texas. Lon Davis and Maggie Bradford were united in marriage on August 25, 1915 and a son Lon Davis Jr. is born May 17, 1918 in Quanah, Texas.

While working on his degree in Latin and mathematics at the University of Texas, Lon Davis was an associate professor of mathematics at the university and later became superintendent of public schools in Quanah. After making the decision to leave the educational field and enter business, the family moved to Floydada in 1920 where Lon Davis operated the ice plant until 1922 when he went into the cotton gin business with L. T. Lewis. The gin burned in 1926, but was rebuilt and owned by Lon Davis til his retirement from the cotton business in 1952. In 1930, he purchased the Marshall Elevator and sold to Kimbell Mills around 1940, but continued to operate the elevator until it was closed in 1950.

In 1955, Lon Davis once again entered the grain business forming a partnership with his son, Lon Davis, Jr. The grain elevator and warehouse which they built is located on East Highway 70 and still operated by his son. A very outgoing social family, they were involved in many varied activities, community

organizations and dedicated members of the First Christian Church. Never at a loss for words, Lon was always in demand to serve as a speaker or master of ceremonies for different organizations. "Casey's Trial", a comedy which the Rotary Club presented with 150 Floydada people in its cast found Lon Davis playing the role of the judge.

A vibrant personality with a high energy level, Maggie Davis was a tireless worker in social

organizations, Church affairs, her home one's own life because we and the work at the cotton gin office which she shared with her husband. She wrote poetry, did china painting, collected antiques long before it became popular, collected Indian rugs and pottery from her trips to New Mexico each summer. She had an avid interest in family history and traced her lineage back to William Bradford, who arrived on the Mayflower in 1620 and was the first governor of Massachusetts.

A second "son", Malcom Bridges came to live with the Davis family in 1931, graduated from

Floydada High School and went on to play football at Hardin Simmons College where he gradu-

He now resides in Houston, Texas with his wife, the former Juanita Rushing of Floydada.

were married on October 1950 in Dallas, Texas. It was on the same day as the annual event of the Texas-O.U. Lon graduated from Floydada High School in 1935 and Flo was a Floydada High School graduate in 1942. Lon went to Texas Christian University for his Bachelor of Science degree in geology and later to the University of Oklahoma for work on a Master's degree. While Lon was serving his country in the U.S. Navy as a lieutenant during World War II, Flo was working on a degree in fine arts and graduated from the University of Oklahoma.

It is not easy to write of are not yet history. Times change and we see things differently, perhaps a little wiser as time goes on.



You are the salt of the earth.— Matthew 5:13 (NRSV)

Throughout history, salt has been highly valued. It is used to preserve food and enhance the flavor of food. Salt is also used to mix with water for cleaning fruit, and it is an ingredient in toothpaste to help clean and strengthen teeth.

On January 17, 2013, I learned of another use for salt. It was the morning of the dedication service for the new church building for Prachakittisuk Church at Mae Sai, Chiang Rai, Thailand. As part of the dedication ceremony, an ice sculptor had carved a beautiful cross. Just as he finished the carving, one side of the cross broke off. The sculptor quickly put salt around the cracked area and then linked the broken part back to its

Disaster Assistance is Available for Crops that are Ineligible for Federal Insurance

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20, 2015 - Farm Service Agency Administrator Val Dolcini today encouraged producers to examine the available U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) crop risk protection options, including federal crop insurance and Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage, before the sales deadline for fall crops.

"Deadlines are quickly approaching to purchase coverage for fall-seeded crops," said Dolcini. "We remind producers that crops not covered by insurance may be eligible for the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. The 2014 Farm Bill expanded NAP to include higher levels of protection. Beginning, underserved and limited resource farmers are now eligible for free catastrophic level coverage, as well as discounted premiums for additional levels of protection."

Federal crop insurance covers crop losses from natural adversities such as drought, hail and excessive moisture. NAP covers losses from natural disasters on crops for which no perma-

program is available, including forage and grazing crops, fruits, vegetables, mushrooms, floriculture, ornamental nursery, aquaculture, turf grass, ginseng, honey, syrup, bioenergy, and industrial crops.

USDA has partnered with Michigan State University and the University of Illinois to create an online tool at www.fsa.usda.gov/ nap that allows producers to determine whether their crops are eligible for federal crop insurance or NAP and to explore the best level of protection for their operation. NAP basic coverage is available at 55 percent of the average market price for crop losses that exceed 50 percent of expected production, with higher levels of coverage, up to 65 percent of their expected production at 100 percent of the average market price, including coverage for organics and crops marketed directly to consumers.

Area Teams Ready for New Season Healthy Eating

LOCKNEY - Lockney, Floydada, Plainview, Crosbyton, Ralls, Petersburg, Motley County, Patton Springs, Valley, Silverton, Lorenzo and Plainview Christian all have one thing in common, they are all 0-0 and ready for the 2015 high school football season to kick-off. (See the Floydada and Lockney stories in the Football previews of each of the other teams that we'll be keeping an eye on this football season.

The Plainview Bulldogs broke their play-off drought last season, ending in a threeway tie with the Coopers (Abilene and Lubbock) for the District 4-5A title. This year the Bulldogs have to replace 2,000 yard rusher Warren Flye and quarterback Paxstyn Oldfield as well as several other key players that helped move the Bulldogs into the playoffs. Junior Warren Haresnape will take over at quarterback, after starting the last four games in 2014 due to an injury to Oldfield. Junior Trendan Jackson will move to tailback after playing fullback last season. Plainview returns 23 lettermen from last year's 6-5/3-1 bidistrict finalist team including six offensive starters and eight defensive starters. Plainview opens their season on Aug. 28 at 7:30 P.M. at Greg Sherwood Memorial Bulldog Stadium in Plainview by hosting Canyon Randall. They lost to Randall 21-0 last year. Plainview is picked third in their district.

The Crosbyton Chiefs try to repeat their deep playoff run of

last year Crosbyton returns 18 in the Jayton Football Classic lettermen from last year's 12-1/5-0 regional finalist team including seven offensive and seven defensive starters. Key returners include quarterback Tanner Clark and running back Elliot Rios plus the entire offensive line. Experience could help the Chiefs along the way but they will have to get pass state ranked Seagraves to make it past the regional finals. Crosbyton, preseason Preview.) Here are some short pick for District 3-2A-D2 champions, opens the season by hosting Tahoka on Aug. 28 at 7:30 P.M. The Chiefs won last year 34-7.

The Ralls Jackrabbits, under a new coach Jeff Caffey, have hopes of breaking through to grab one of the four playoff spots in District 3-2A-D2 although they are picked last in the six team district. Ralls returns 18 lettermen including six on offense and seven on defense from last years 2-8/0-5 team. The Jackrabbits will look for running backs Eli Van Gundy and Joseph Contreras to lead the way. Ralls opens their season at Sudan on Aug. 28 at 7:30 P.M. Sudan won last year 19-13.

The Petersburg Buffaloes were in an unfamiliar place last year by missing the playoffs. The Buffaloes return five lettermen from last year's 2-8/1-2 team including four offensive and four defensive starters. Tailback Issac Salas and running back Marcos Hinojos will be the leaders on the offense as the Buffaloes look to return to the playoffs. The Buffaloes are picked third in District 2-1A-D1. Petersburg travels to Jayton to participate on Aug. 27 at 8:00 P.M. when they take on the host, Jayton.

The Valley Patriots went 11-3/3-0 as state semifinalist last season. Picked first in District 2-1A-D1, the Patriots look to continue their playoff success as they return seven lettermen including two offensive and four defensive starters. Ashton Barclay, Germain Mendoza, Adrian Espinoza, Zack Stumbo and Jayton Smith will handle much of the load for the Patriots. Barclay and Espinoza combined for over 3,600 yards rushing and 83 touchdowns. Valley will also travel to the Jayton Football Classic to take on Ropes at 6:00 P.M. on Aug. 29 to start the season.

The Lorenzo Hornets are picked last in District 2-1A-D1 but they have six lettermen returning including three offensive and three defensive starts from a 4-6/0-3 team. The Hornets are young but sophomore linebacker Vicente Salinas will anchor the defense after making 92 tackles last year. Riley Scott and Armando Alcala will provide senior leadership. The Hornets will host Wellman at 7:30 P.M. on Aug. 28 to kick-off the season.

The Silverton Owls are picked third in District 2-1A-D2. With 10 lettermen returning, including three offensive and four defensive starters from last year's 4-6/1-2 team, hopes are high for the Owls. The Motley County Matadors will again look to make a deep run in the playoffs after an 8-4/2-1 regional semifinalist run last year. The Matadors return seven lettermen including three on offense and two on defense. Bryant Taylor, tailback and Marcus Ortiz, quarterback will carry much of the load this year. The Matadors are picked second, behind Guthrie, in District 9-1A-D2. They will travel down Texas Highway 70 to participate in the Jayton Football Classic when they take on Anton Aug. 28 at 6:00 P.M.

The Patton Springs Rangers look for their experience to help them this year. The Rangers lost only one letterman, returning six as well as six starters on offense and six on defense from a 2-8/0-3 team. Patton Springs always battles the number game of having enough players, week-to-week. Duncan Aumiller, Ethan Fernandez and Josh Tanner along with Noah Tanner, Josh Guzman and Trynton Burgess will try to pickup more wins this year including important district wins in District 9-1A-D2 where they are picked last. The Rangers start the season by hosting Lefors at 7:30 P.M. on Aug. 28.

The Plainview Christian Eagles are picked second in TAPPS 6-man Div. 2 District 1. New head coach and Lockney alumni Lucas Hall looks to take the Eagles back to the playoffs. The Eagles begin their season with a short road trip to take on the Cotton Center Elks at 7:30 P.M. on Aug. 28.

Use these tips from the United States Department of Agriculture's My-Plate website (www.choosemyplyate.gov) to combine good nutrition and physical activity to make the most of your summer!

First, maximize with nutrient-packed foods. Give your body the nutrients it needs by eating a variety of nutrient-packed food, including whole grains, lean protein, fruits and vegetables, and low-fat or fat-free dairy. Eat fewer foods high in solid fats, added sugars, and sodium (salt).

Next, energize grains! Your body's quickest energy source comes from grain foods such as bread, pasta, oatmeal, cereals, and tortillas. Be sure to make at least half of your grain food choices wholegrain foods like wholewheat bread, tortillas, pasta and brown rice.

Power up with protein. Protein is essential for building and repairing muscle. Choose lean or low-fat cuts of beef and pork, and skinless chicken or turkey. Choose seafood protein sources twice a week.

Quality protein choices come from plant based foods, too! Choose beans and peas (kidney, pinto, black or white, beans, chickpeas, hummus), soy products (tofu, veggie burgers, tempeh), and unsalted nuts and seeds.

Don't forget the fruits and vegetables! Get the nutrients your body needs by eating a variety of colors. Try blue, red, or black berries; red, green, or yellow

peppers; and dark greens days are long and there is like spinach and kale. Choose fresh, frozen, lowsodium canned, dried, and 100% juice options.

Be sure to also include dairy foods such as fat-free and low-fat milk, cheese, yogurt, and fortified soy beverages (soymilk) to build and maintain strong bones needed for everyday activities.

Hydration is critical in the warm summer months! Stay hydrated by drinking water instead of sugary drinks. Keep a filled reusable water bottle with you to always have water on hand.



Back to School Safety for Drivers. Bicyclists and **Pedestrians**

Just when summer is really starting to heat up in Texas, it is almost time for children to go back to school. Soon motorists will be sharing the roads with school buses, pedestrians, bicycle riders, and lots of new teen drivers taking their first car to school. According to the National Safety Council, teen car crashes spike in September when they are driving to and from school. Drivers young and old need to be vigilant because child pedestrians can be very unpredictable. They're easily distracted and can often run into traffic or out from behind parked cars. Looking out for children rather than expecting them to look out for us is our best defense as drivers.

Distracted driving is always dangerous, but it is especially dangerous in and around school zones. According to the Texas Department of Transportation, crashes in school zones are most commonly due to driver inattention, failure to control speed, and failure to yield the right-of-way at stop signs. As responsible drivers, we need to put down the phone and pay attention in school zones. In fact, it is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone.

Whether your oldest is just starting kindergarten or taking that first trip to school in his or her own car, parents can play an important role in keeping their children safe. For young children, make sure they know the rules about school bus safety when it comes to boarding and getting off the bus. If you are transporting children to school, remember that children under 13 should always ride in the back seat in a car seat (including a booster) or seat belt depending on whether they fit properly in the seat belt. Teen drivers and their parents should be aware of the Texas Graduated Driver License Law and the restrictions it puts in place, including no cell phone use at all and no more than one passenger under 21 in the vehicle unless the passenger is related to the driver. And, most importantly, always stress buckling up on every trip - even on those short trips to and from school!

Amy Kress, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent in Floyd County, reminds drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians to follow these safety tips from the Texas Department of Transportation to prevent needless tragedies.

Tips for Driving in School Zones

• Put away your cell phone. Cell phone use is banned in active school zones, and violators face fines from \$200 to \$500.

· Always obey school zone speed limit signs. Remember, traffic fines usually double in school zones.

· Drop off and pick up your children in your school's designated areas, not the mid-

· Keep an eye on children gathered at bus

· Be alert for children who might dart across the street or between vehicles on their way to school.

Tips for Bicyclists

As a bicyclist, you should wear a helmet and obey all traffic laws, including the fol-

- · Stop at red lights and stop signs.
- Pay attention to lane markers.
- Ride near the curb, traveling in the same direction as traffic.
- · Use a light on the front and a red reflector or red light on the back of your bike while riding at night.

Tips for Pedestrians

- · When there is a sidewalk, use it! Most pedestrians involved in traffic crashes due to walking in the roadway.
- · Remember, texting or listening to mobile devices can distract you from your surround-
- · Always cross at intersections and pay attention to the control signal. Look left, then right, then left again before proceeding and try to make eye contact with drivers before you cross the street. If a crossing guard is available, wait for the guard to lead
- Look for traffic when stepping off a bus or from behind parked cars.
- · As a passenger, get in or out of a car on the curb side of the street.

Motorists can make a big difference by remembering to drive with extra caution when driving in and around school zones. Your slower speed and extra attention may very well save a life!

Lockney Longhorns Long for Playoff Spot

LOCKNEY - After getting close to breaking the playoff drought last year, the 2015 Lockney Longhorns look to break through this year, in part due to a change in UIL rules that will now allow four teams from all the 2A districts to advance.




