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# Lockney Grad Jared Mosley to Enter ACU Sports Hall of Fame

ABILENE - One of the most distinguished classes in the 30-year history of the

ACU Sports Hall of Fame will take its place in ACU Athletics lore later this fall when they are inducted into the hall of fame during ceremonies at the Hunter Welcome Center.

The seven inductees are former director of athletics

and men's basketball standout Jared Mosley, football great Danieal Manning, former volleyball head coach Brek Horn, former women's basketball star Teresa (Rubart) Grounds, men's track and field standout Calvin Cooley and national champion football player Mike Lively. Former director of athletics Don Drennan is the recipient of this year's Lifetime Achievement Award.

Mosley, ACU class of 2000, was named the seventh director of athletics in ACU history in June 2004 and under his leadership, the Wildcats won 10 NCAA Division II national championships, 20 Division II regional championships and 46 Lone Star Conference championships. Some of his most notable achievements, however, were dedicated to raising funds necessary for two on-campus stadiums, guiding the athletics program from NCAA Division II status to NCAA Division I affiliation and a return to the Southland Conference, and negotiating

According to city manager Jeff Johnston there are plans to finish out the work on the new city pool with benches and a new parking lot. There might possibly be a cover for the sitting area and perhaps, more land-

A definite plan for the city is a new camera-based security system for the new pool which opened in 2015 and the new playground which opened in 2014. The pool and the playground will both be monitored by the security system. Johnston noted that the city is committed to protecting and maintaining taxpayers' investments in these facilities.

Prior to beginning work in the ACU Athletics' administration, Mosley put together one of the greatest careers in the history of ACU men's basketball. One of the most decorated basketball players to play for ACU, Mosley finished his career in 1999 as the 11th-leading scorer and eighth-leading rebounder in Wildcat history, and in his senior season (1998-99) he led his team to the Division II South Central Region championship game. He earned several honors during his senior season, including first team GTE academic all-America, first team NCAA all-South Central Region by the NABC, second team all-region by Daktronics-CoSIDA, LSC South Division MVP, and first team academic all-LSC. He also was awarded a \$5,000 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship.

Mosley was a 1995 Lockney High School graduate before attending ACU.

"Obviously anytime you are honored and recognized by your alma mater it is very special," Mosley said, "Abilene Christian University was an amazing place that provided some very memorable experiences and countless blessings to me and our family in our almost 20 years there. I owe a great deal of gratitude to not only my teammates and coaches, but to many community leaders, donors, and alumni who believe in educating and inspiring students in the life lessons that reside outside of the classroom. It was their encouragement and example that helped shape my future and strong belief that participation in sports can be one of the most meaningful classrooms a young man or woman may ever set foot

enforcement, we were told "We don't tell you everything." Here's my issue: We live in a small

town, and really, there are no secrets here. Secondly, when you take it upon yourself to discern what is or is not public knowledge, you run the risk of not only alienating the media, but causing mistrust between the public and the entity.

When entities keep secrets, why should the public trust them? Because they say so? That's not how it works.

When entities fail to cooperate with the media, the public begins to wonder if they are doing their job at all or what their agenda is.

And when I get word that these things are going on, I put it right here for everyone to read.

I believe that's my job and I also believe my team has the common sense to work with entities and develop relationships that help convey the news to the public.

But it has to work both ways. Perhaps you've heard of the "it's under investigation" excuse? That's when law enforcement or another entity deliberately withholds information from the press because they think it will somehow tip off the wrongdoer or hamper their investigation.

In actuality, it's better to say you are investigating something and ask for help from the public.

It was announced this week that trust in the national media is at an all time low. That sickens me and it should disturb the

We must have trust between the public and the entities and it's the media's specific job to get that information to the public in a proper manner.

Elected officials and those that work in the public domain are paid by taxpayers. They need to remember that those same taxpayers hold them accountable to not only do their job, but also keep them informed.

I hope readers of this column encourage your elected officials and entity heads to work with the media.

And to those that think they can withhold information or dictate what is good for the public to know, the laws of this country say otherwise and Freedom of Information Act requests work very well.

Do your job. Keep an open line of communication and the media will let the public know you are doing your job. Residents should know their hard-earned money is not being wasted. It's really pretty simple.

Texas provided them the opportunity to claim state-owned land that was available for homesteading. Plant My Feet is a novel that describes the many challenges and opportunities these pioneers faced.

The novel revolves around the main character, twenty-one-year-old unmarried Clay Long. Clay leaves his home and family near Waco in 1891, with very little except his horse and bedroll. His plan is to become gold prospector in Colorado. In Fort Worth Clay gets sidetracked. Luckily, he meets the Jackson family who is relocating from central Texas to the Llano Estacado or high plains, and they take a liking to him. They have a boxcar loaded with their possessions, and together the Jacksons and Clay ride in the boxcar to Chil-

dress. The Jacksons' son, Walter, who is about Clay's age, becomes a close friend. From Childress the group travels by horseback and wagon to Floyd County, where they establish homesteads and begin to develop the land.

The life of homesteaders was mostly hard work, but there were other aspects to their lives. Conflicts between neighbors and ranchers, social interaction in the community, romantic situations. and religious sues, complicated life. Indian scares and weather challenges are among many other events described.

After three years. Clay and Walter seek a more exciting and profitable life, so they leave their homesteads for the summer and head to the newly discovered gold field on Baldy Peak in northern New Mexico. They soon fall victim to the trickery of two swindlers,

which leaves their dreams and lances in bad shape. They get jobs while hoping to prospect part time on the side. In the meantime, they become romantically involved, which makes their lives even more interesting. One has to wonder what would have to happen to ever bring these fortune seekers back home to Floyd Country.

The novel covers a three-year period, with a setting in Floyd County Texas and the mountains of northern New Mexico. The Lone Star Community, Delia Plain, Floyd City, Lockney, Quitaque Creek, and the mining town of Marysville, New Mexico, are prominent locations in the story. The author was careful to construct early-day life and events with authenticity.





# Much needed rain likely in October

COLLEGE STATION -Many farmers needing moisture now are wondering when they can expect the promised moisture to arrive since it has been drier than normal in the summer, according to Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service county agents.

"It depends upon where you're at, really," said Dr. John Nielsen-Gammon, state climatologist and Regents Professor of Atmospheric Sciences at Texas A&M University, College Station. "The effects seem to come sooner in the northern part of the state than in the southern part of the state."

Unfortunately, he said September is too soon to expect wetter conditions related to El Niño anywhere in the state.

"But once we get in October/November, the northern two-thirds of the state should generally start to see abovenormal rainfall," Nielsen-Gammon said.

For South Texas, the enhanced wet conditions tend to be concentrated in December, January and February, he

"And often times there will be a dry month in the northern part of the state during those months," Nielsen-Gammon said.

Looking back, Nielsen-Gammon indicated there is no sure reason why the dry weather occurred this summer, but one conjecture is that it is connected with how temperatures evolve when you're coming out of a drought into something that favors rainfall.

"So far it hasn't been very different from 1957," he said. "When the 50s' drought ended, we had a very wet April and May, and then the summer was dry, and some places got back into drought before we started above-normal rainfall again in the fall."

# Floyd County Historical Museum "Memories, 1979"

ANNIE AND MATHER CARR

Annie Allen and Mather Carr first met when Annie was only a few days old. Being only six at the time, "This is going to be a great Mather was not very interested in a small infant. After a short time, the Allen family left Coryell County in 26,1903, Mather Carr and

shared with Mather.

The dugout was built of lumber, hauled by wagon from Canyon. It measured fourteen feet by twentyeight feet, had a plank floor and windows of glass. Annie and Mather furnished their home with furniture built by Mather, a few cooking utensils ordered from Sears, and other items given to them by relatives.

Living in a dugout was hard work, but Annie and Mather did not complain. Their water had to be hauled from Mather's parents' well until a well could be dug. Even then, they did not have a windmill until later. Annie burned cowchips for fuel, and these had to be gathered. After the chips were burned, the ashes had to be carried out. Chips were carried in for cooking and the ashes taken outside. It was an endless cycle.

Mather was an amateur photographer and enjoyed developing his own pictures.

He partitioned part of the dugout to use as a darkroom.

Mather and Annie's first child, Wesley, was born in the half-dugout on February 22,1905. The other children were born after the Carrs moved to their house in 1909. Horace was born December 20,1910 and their daughter, Almeda Maye was born August 19,1918.

Mather and Annie were part of the original Harmony Methodist Church that was organized on the fourth Sunday of April in 1904. Annie served as a Sunday School teacher and Mather as the superintendent. They continued their membership when the Harmony Methodist Church and Allmon Methodist Church merged in 1914 to form the Carr's Chapel Methodist Church.

Mather died November 23,1959, and is buried in the cemetery behind Carr's Chapel. Until recently Annie lived in the home she and Mather had built and moved to their farm from Lubbock in 1950.

Wesley, Annie Mather's older son, died March 12, 1976. Horace, their other son, is a retired fanner and lives in Floydada. Their daughter Almeda Maye Williams, lives in the Harmony Community. Annie and Mather have three grandchildren, Charles Carr. Sue Williams, and Bill Carr. Annie is especially proud of her seven great-grandchildren, David and Sandra Carr, Brent and Daralyn Williams, and Kevin, Stephanie, and Nathan Carr.

Annie and Mather Carr's life together spanned more than fifty years. They witnessed many changes in Floyd County, and they contributed to the history of the county. Their contribution will continue through the lives of the children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

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

# Reminder to Take **Hunter Education before** Heading to the Field

Special to The Hesperian-Beacon

AUSTIN — With hunting season right around the corner, it's time to get your hunter education certification.

To hunt legally in Texas, anyone born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must complete a hunter education training course or purchase a one-time 'deferral', good for one license year. Because the minimum age of certification is 9 years old, hunters under the age of 9 must be accompanied by a licensed hunter in the field. Hunters ages 9 through 16 must either complete hunter education courses or be accompanied while in the field. Deferral purchasers must also be 'accompanied' which means to be within normal voice control of a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older who has completed hunter education or who was born before Sept. 2, 1971. Hunters 17 and up must complete hunter edu-

To make this process easier than ever, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department now offers the option of completing training courses completely online for Texas residents 17 years and older.

However, TPWD also offers three other convenient methods of getting certified: the basic, enhanced and advanced courses, which involve classroom and/or field time.

The basic hunter education course is designed for novice and young hunters ages 9 and above and requires six hours of classroom instruction. The enhanced hunter education course is a combination of an online home study program and up to five hours of field training. The advanced hunter education course requires more than six hours of instruction and includes more content than the basic and enhanced courses.

Each of the courses costs \$15, and the passing grade for all courses is 75 percent.

Since mandatory hunter education first started in 1988, the number of hunting accidents and fatalities has declined to fewer than 3 per 100,000 hunters. Incidents involving those who had completed hunter education courses are only in the single digits each year.

To help improve hunter Friday, Oct. 23, 2015. safety, choose from one of the many flexible options to get your hunter education certification now. For more information and to register for hunter education programs, visit http:// www.tpwd.texas.gov/outdoorlearning/hunter-education.

The certification is valid for life and is honored in all other jail, but otherwise eligible. states and provinces.

Some federally controlled areas require all hunters using that site to have hunter eduthis includes Corps of Engineers property and most military reservations. Check with the specific area prior to going hunting.

According to the Texas Secretary of State's web site, to be eligible to vote early by mail in Texas, you must: be 65 years or older; be disabled; be out of the county on election day and during the period for early voting by personal appearance; or be confined in

An applicant who checks the Annual Application box will receive ballots for all elections during that calendar year, January through December.

Voters who are eligible and want to vote by mail, must submit an application each year to receive ballots for that year.

Mail ballot applicants must be aware that if they submitted an annual application in 2014 and want to vote by mail for the 2015 November election, they need to submit another application for this next election. Looking forward to 2016, a new application with the Annual Application box checked, must be submitted starting in January to receive ballots for each election to be held in the busy presidential election year.

The application for ballot by mail can be obtained in person at the clerk's office at the courthouse or can be requested to be mailed by calling the office at 983-4900.

Early voting for the Constitutional Amendment Election will be held Monday, Oct. 19, 2015 - Friday, Oct. 30, 2015.

# AgriLife Extension wildlife expert warns to be alert while hunting

SAN ANGELO - With dove season in full-swing are still very active. Optiand bow season for deer just mum spring growing conaround the corner, hunters should be aware of their surroundings, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service wildlife specialist.

"While folks stock up on shells, buy their licenses, prepare for their trips and head afield, they may be forgetting one critical component of a successful hunting trip: safety," said Dr. John Tomecek of San Angelo.

"While we normally think of hunter safety as pertaining to safe practices while shooting, handling a firearm, and knowing what is beyond your target, there is one component, especially during dove season, that is often overlooked and that's venomous snakes."

er, a mainstay of the dove and early deer seasons across Texas, means snakes ditions mean there is plenty of tall vegetation across fields and pastures this fall to hide the reptiles.

"Most cropped fields favored by dove hunters have had little human activity for months, making them preferable for snakes to live in," he said. "Large numbers of bird hunters in the field, especially exuberant young hunters may unintentionally run afoul of our serpentine friends."

Tomecek said there are some simple, commonsense precautions to remaining snake-safe in the field. First, when walking in tall vegetation, keep an eye on where you are about

Tomecek said hot weath- to step. Additionally, when crossing open ground, watch your path as you approach as snakes may be basking in the open.

"While the hunter focuses on the birds flying overhead, they may miss the critters at their feet," Tomecek said. "Second, when retrieving birds or empty hulls, look before you reach. Snakes may be under nearby vegetation and easily frightened, which may result in a strike. These hiding places also include large clumps of prickly pear cactus, under which snakes often lie.

"And finally, to prepare for a safe hunting trip, know the locations of nearby hospitals and bring a snake-bite kit with your other first-aid supplies in the field. If you or a hunting partner is bitten, remain calm and attempt to identify the type of snake. This will help medical professionals know what antivenom to administer.

"So have fun, but rememof an enjoyable hunt."

The preparations that are needed to accomplish a district title consist of, "getting to practice early to throw and catch, during practice come out with the win. If we to work hard, and then after



# Pope Francis Visits the US


is requesting generosity in the direction of Central and South Americans yearning to come to the country.

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

Post Master Altie Nelson, with the help of the USPS design department in Ft. Worth, created the final design that will be featured. Script Printing owner, Bobby Gilliland, is producing a fall-themed envelope to compliment the cancellation.

On October 7, anyone can bring in their mail or an envelope to be cancelled at no cost.

The postmark will be stamped on all mail going through the Floydada Station for 60 days and then the date on the stamp will be removed. This is the eighth cancellation event that Nelson, who has

served as post master in Floydada for three years, has been involved with. During her 26 years as a postal employee, she has taken part in various cancellation events ranging from Star Wars to Elvis...and now Pumpkin Days.

The post office will produce a finished product, called a cache, which includes an envelope, a postage stamp from the Summer Harvest stamp series and cancelled with the commemorative stamp. Caches are collected by stamp enthusiasts, and anyone who would like a memento of the occasion, and may be purchased in the post office lobby for \$3 each.

The timing of the Annie Taylor improvements would be spring 2016, so that the park and softball fields would be ready by summer 2016. But weather and othtors can affect that timing.
