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### THE KINGDOM OF GOD

What is the kingdom of God as it is revealed to us in the scriptures? What is called "his (Christ's) kingdom" in Matt. 16:28 is called "the kingdom of God" in Mark 9:1, Luke 9:27. These are two reports of the same speech. What is called "the kingdom of heaven" in Matt. 19:23 is called "the kingdom of God" in Mark 10:23. Compare also Matt. 3:2 with Mark 1:14; Matt. 13:11 with Mark 4:11.

What Christ calls "my church" in Matt. 16:18 He calls "the kingdom of heaven" in the next verse. In John 18:36 Jesus calls the same "my kingdom." The apostle Paul refers to the "general assembly and church of the firstborn" in Heb. 12:23 and calls the same thing the "kingdom that cannot be moved" in verse 28.

It is the same as the "one body" in Eph. 4:4 and 1 Cor. 12:13. All who enter the "one body" are baptized into it Paul said. All who enter the kingdom enter it by being born of water and the Spirit Jesus said (John 3:5). The same act that puts one in the "one body" is the very act by which one is born into God's kingdom. These are not two different institutions.

The same body of people is called "the house of God, which is the church of the living God" (1 Tim. 3:15). Those who are baptized "into Christ" (Gal. 3:27) are baptized "into his one body" (1 Cor. 12:13). The one body is the church (Eph. 1:22,23), which is the kingdom of God. To be in one is to be in the other. Being "baptized into one body" (1 Cor. 12:13) is the exact same thing as "being born of water and of the Spirit" (John 3:5) to "enter the kingdom of God."

Are you in the kingdom of God or the kingdom of the Devil? There is no middle ground! Read Col. 1:13).

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

**AUSTIN** — Investigations of stock-loan scandals which have rocked the state for nearly 7 months moved forward on three fronts during the past week.

Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith announced plans to present to the grand jury here evidence compiled by Texas Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin's staff.

Martin said evidence includes material pertaining to federal Securities and Exchange Commission allegations that large bank loans were extended to high state officials by the Sharpstown State Bank in 1969. Money went to stock purchases by officials at the time Sharpstown bank head Frank Sharp was trying to get deposit insurance legislation passed.

Sharp was invited to testify within the next three weeks before the National Bankers Life Insurance Committee.

Committee asked Sharp to talk about bills in which he was interested in 1969 "and other matters that may be pertinent concerning Sharpstown State Bank, the National Bankers Life Insurance Company and any relationship with public officials."

Meanwhile, State Insurance Commissioner Clay Cotten turned over to district attorneys in Houston, Dallas and Austin results of his investigations of NBL.

Cotten said he feels insurance, embezzlement and conspiracy laws may have been overstepped but preferred to leave it up to prosecuting attorneys to decide if violations occurred. He offered names of five one-time NBL officers and directors prominently involved in his report.

Federal court at Houston set hearing this week to determine if a June 14 immunity order protecting Sharp from further prosecution or summons should be modified. Martin and Smith want to force him to testify before the Travis County grand jury hearing.

**COURTS SPEAK** — An Austin federal district judge upheld the local school district's desegregation plan calling for a minimum of cross-town pupil busing, holding against a federal government proposal for massive busing. Judge scored the federal government for its uncooperative attitude toward a compromise.

State Supreme Court rejected an appeal for A&M University employees who had paychecks stopped when it was discovered they were serving on the College Station city council.

In other decisions, High Court: Stuck by its original decision holding former president of the Sharpstown State Bank was not negligent in failing to investigate bonds offered as security on a \$470,000 loan.

Turned down the appeal of a Dallas oilman's widow in a law suit over his estate brought by the man's five daughters by an earlier marriage.

Upheld the will of multi-millionaire Robert A. Welch's sister leaving \$300,000 in Texas oil and gas property to the Welch Foundation.

Held against an Alice woman seeking damages from drug companies which manufactured the anesthetic she claims partially paralyzed her following 1963 surgery.

Reversed a lower court judgment and concluded the foreclosure of mortgage on the home of a Dallas couple who had paid \$420 more than their schedule called for was void.

Rejected disputed evidence of a remarriage in Mexico and backed a Nueces County trial court finding that a Corpus Christi man owes nearly \$24,000 in alimony to his former wife in Nevada.

**AG OPINIONS** — Texans under 21 may not serve on juries in Texas despite recently lowered voting age to 18, Attorney General Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded: Texas Industrial Commission

can open an extension office in Mexico City and pay salaries of employees there.

Governor is without authority to negotiate open-end contracts for computer supplies for state agencies.

County attorney of Cooke Co. will serve as 16th district attorney when 16th district court sits in Cooke County. District attorney of 235th district will serve that court in all counties where it functions.

Law passed last May 26 sets maximum compensation for assistant county school superintendents in all counties.

Renewal license issued by the State Board of Hairdressers and Cosmetologists June 2-Aug. 29, 1971, expire Aug. 31, 1972. Applicant for Sept. 7, 1971, board examination must pay \$15 filing fee with application and additional \$5 license fee.

SB 194 of last legislature repeals other acts on commercial drivers' license exemptions.

**MEDICINE AID SYSTEM CHANGED** — On September 1, State Department of Public Welfare will begin making payments directly to pharmacists for drugs prescribed to Texas welfare recipients.

Under current system, allowance for drugs is included in monthly assistance checks. Legislature this year appropriated \$11.9 million for new vendor drug program.

Welfare authorities believe the new system will provide improved prescribed medicine coverage and delay a cut in overall welfare payments for food, clothing and shelter.

However, some complained of welfare check cuts, since drug allotment no longer will go to recipients, and a few who get only payments for drugs will be taken off welfare rolls. Latter will be interviewed by Welfare Department to determine if they should still get cash aid.

**SCHOOL DISTRICTS WARNED** — At least 50 Texas school districts have been warned not to accept transfer students where the act would be interpreted as designed to impede desegregation or continue discrimination.

Dr. J. W. Edgar said districts were reminded of the April 20 Tyler federal court order forbidding transfers between districts where effect would be to interfere with integration or promote discriminatory treatment.

La Pryor, Uvalde and Carrizo Springs Independent School Districts were advised not to accept students from Crystal City (where Anglo parents apparently sought to move pupils out of Mexican-American dominated schools). Del Rio school district was warned not to accept 729 transferees from San Felipe ISD which serves Laughlin Air Force Base. San Antonio ISD was notified it may be in violation of court order if it takes 316 transfer students from Edgewood ISD.

Edgar said state aid for transferees would have to be withheld, and accreditation of receiving districts would be in danger.

# CLYDE GIRL SCOUTS GET MANY HONORS AND BADGES

CLYDE — Camp Lake Wood, the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council's resident camp on Lake Brownwood, closed its 16th consecutive camping season this week.

349 girls from 18 communities attended the three 12-day sessions camp. Of the total enrollment, 113 were Brownie Scouts, 149 Juniors, 74 Cadettes and 13 Senior Scouts. Each age-level program was geared to the interests and experiences of the girls. A Counselor was in charge of each patrol of eight girls to help guide them in planning and carrying out their activities.

In addition to counselors especially assigned to work with patrols of girls, the camp employed special staff — such as program coordinator, crafts director, swimming and small crafts instructor, office aide, registered nurse, cooks and kitchen aide. All staff participated in a full week of pre-camp training designed to acquaint them with the site and facilities; the Girl Scout program in an outdoor setting; and the health and safety procedures carried out by the camp.

Mrs. Ray A. Hoyle, the Council's executive director and camping administrator, stated, "our staff is committed to provide responsible leadership with good judgment; to offering campers an opportunity to broaden their horizons to gain

knowledge by acquiring skills; and to experience the happiness of friendships shared. We believe that girls who attend summer camps should have a growth experience as persons; that such a growth experience involves an acceptance of social responsibility, a sense of moral values and an awareness of spiritual values."

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## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — For some reason there has been an increasing interest in family genealogy. People often inquire how to trace their family tree — where their family originated and why the name.

Occasionally the National Archives here in Washington can give some reference but it takes quite a bit of assembled evidence before they can give any real help.

Numerous organizations are in the business of family history research but some have been known to manufacture a history to please the circumstances and hardly evidence on which an oath could be applied. A great many people have been duped. Some of these activities are rackets to play on the unsuspecting.

Of course, there is a degree of some egotism when we learn our ancient family had a coat of arms and why our names came out as they have. On the other hand there is satisfaction and information that we know our origins and have an appreciation of them.

Until about 1100 A. D. most people in Europe, the only people with whom we were familiar at that time, had only one name. This continues to be true in some primitive countries today.

As the population increased it became confusing to live in a village where perhaps 1-3 of the males were named John, a sizeable number named William and so on.

To distinguish one John from another, a second name was needed. Four primary sources furnished these second names. There was, for instance, a man's occupation, his location, his father's name or some peculiar physical characteristic, which identified him from others.

On the side of occupation, the local house builder, food preparer, grain grinder, and suit maker may be named respectively: John Carpenter, John Cook, John Miller and John Taylor. Location identified John who lived over the hill as John Overhill, the one who dwelled near a stream might be John Brook or John Atbrook.

Then the suffix on the father's name gave William's son the surname of Williamson, Jack's son became Jackson.

In some of the non-English speaking nations of Europe, the designation of a son had other spelling. In Armenia, the "ian" identified a son. In Scandinavia — Denmark, Norway and Sweden — the "sen" stands for son. In Finland, it takes the name of "nen" and in Greek "pulos." In Czechoslovakia and some of the Baltic nations "wicz" identifies the son and in Poland it is more likely to end with "ski." Spanish is often

"ez."

Prefixes in some nationalities denote son, such as "ap" in Welsh — the Scottish and Irish — Mas and Norman — Fitz. The Irish "O" denotes a grandfather. Indications are that physical characteristics played a part in creating surnames. Unusually small people might be known as Small, Short, Little or Lytle. A large individual just might be called Large, Long, Lang or Longfellow.

It is surmised that some people received their names from even certain animal characteristics. A sly person might be Mr. Fox. One not highly regarded for personal care might be named Hogg and a good swimmer became Fish.

Needing extra names for identification knights of old went a little further. The fighting men of the Middle Ages wore a metal suit of armor for protection. Since his suit of armor included a helmet that completely encased his head, a knight in full battle dress was unrecognizable. To prevent friend from attacking friend during the heat of battle, it became necessary for each to identify himself. They accomplished this by painting colorful patterns on their battle shield. These same patterns were woven into cloth surcoats worn over a suit of armor. Thus was born the term "coat of arms."

As this practice grew, it became more and more likely that two friendly knights unknown to each other might be using the same insignia and attack. It finally worked out to prevent this records were kept that granted a pattern to a particular knight and his family shared his right to display this evidence.

In some instances these records have been preserved and are in book form. Interest in heraldry is increasing. Perhaps some of the interest comes from a family pride to resent attempts of our society to reduce each individual to a series of numbers stored somewhere in a computer.

In some large libraries one might find in the genealogical department some leads on family history.

## New Tax Rate Notices To Be Sent To Eula Residents Next Week

EULA — Some four hundred tax notices will be placed in the mails next week, according to Mac Coppinger, Superintendent of the Eula Rural High School District. These notices will advise all property owners of the new assessed valuation placed on their property for school tax purposes. These tax valuations are the result of the tax equalization program employed by the school district to insure that each property owner pays only his fair share of the costs of operating the school. Many property owners will find that their assessment has been reduced, while a great many others will find their assessment has been increased; some assessments will remain approximately the same.

The taxes paid by the property owner is an 'ad valorem' tax — meaning 'according to value.' The state law requires assessment of this tax on an equal and uniform basis. To comply with the law, it was necessary to reappraise all property with in the Eula Rural High School District equitably and uniformly. All of the land has been set out on maps, as well as aerial photography, and appraised at so much per front foot, square foot or acre, depending upon the many factors that must be considered. All residences and commercial buildings have been measured and appraised separately from the land. Buildings were appraised by the use of a construction cost schedule which takes into consideration the type and quality of construction. Depreciation was applied depending upon age and condition. All appraisal data has been placed on permanent record cards. One side of this appraisal card reflects a sketch of the building, are age if known, the square foot area, the estimated cost per square foot or floor space and the amount of depreciation applied. This results in the present value of the building. The appraisal card also reflects a

detailed description of the land, and shows the legal description, the size and unit price per square foot or front foot. The total land value is then added to the value of the building, thus, the total appraisal value of the property is obtained. The assessor feels that he can now justify the assessment to the property owner, and states that the application of this same formula to newly developed properties in the future will insure a continuous equalization process.

The notices that will go out next week are not intended to be a summons for the property owner to appear before the Board of Equalization. To the contrary, they are merely to inform the property owner of the results of the equalization program insofar as his property is concerned. Any property owner who so desires, may go to the Eula High School Building on August 14th, from 1:00 A. M. to 4:00 P. M. to discuss his assessment. The appraisal staff employed to do this job will be glad to show the appraisal records of comparable properties and explain the value of the property or the method used in arriving at the assessment. These taxpayers who are not satisfied with the explanation offered by the appraisers may meet with the Board of Equalization.

The Board of Equalization will be in session August 14th, from 10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m., at the Eula High School Building, in Callahan County, to review all values placed on properties, both real and personal, and will hear any property owner who wishes to 'protest' his assessment. The board will have authority to compel the production of books and records, as well as other evidence of value, and to approve, raise or lower the assessment, depending upon the evidence presented.

## \$3,623 Savings Bonds Sold During June

BAIRD — Mr. Howard Farmer, County Bond Chairman, announced today that sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Callahan County during June were \$3,623. Sales for the first six months totaled \$57,774 for 44 percent of the 1971 goal of \$130,000.
