## LaBaume achieves <br> lifelong dream

Fifty-one years ago, Sam Houston Stat Teachers College senior Jon J. LaBaume was looking forward to his graduation. He would ake his final class during the first summer ses-
ion, then retu
te.
However, his dream of walking across the stage to receive his diploma never took place But his dream will finally come true Saturday morning when LaBaume will be among the Sam Houston State University students who will formally have their degrees conferred during commencement ceremonies for the College of Sciences and the College of Fine Arts and Mass Communication.
LaBaume was a first-generation college student from Dublin, a small town in Central texas, and the first in his family to earn a de gree. Everything was going as planned for the completed his final class, bought his class ring and his yearbook, ordered invitations for his commencement ceremony, and took a tempo ary job in Austin with the Cotton Division of the United States Department of Agriculture
until something permanent came along. When he asked his supervisor for the day off to attend his graduation ceremony, he was
told, "I guess since you're a college graduate, told, I guess since you're a college graduate,
you think you know everything. If you want to take the day off, that's fine. But you're a temporary employee, and you won't have a job when ou get back."
"Inaume said he had no choice

missed my graduation," he said.
Not long afterwards, LaBaume took a full-
ime job with the USDA vation Service, which has since become the Natural Resources Conservation Service. He was employed to work in the Texas Panhandle town of Silverton as a conservationist by the USDA in 1963 and retired as an NRCS district conservationist in Floydada in 1998.
He and his wife Elaine raised a daughter,
Kelli (Childre), and a Kelli (Childre), and a son, Coy. He returned
to the SHSU campus once, in 1965, for the graduation of his sister, Jane LaBaume Truelove Bell.
As a student, LaBaume took classes in Old Main and at Country Campus and worked on campus in the meat lab. One of his memories
includes being mistaken for a prison inmate

The next Doctor I remember using over the next few ears was Dr. Von Andrews. He was a good doctor and 1 member him to be a good nd honest man. As I remem ber all the doctors that I shall name were good, honest, very nd very unselfish. Our fam ily did not use all that I shall name as people did not run to the doctor as much as we do now, and Floyd County had more doctors with what population we had.
The next two doctors that I remember were the Smith brothers, who had a hospital together. I think at one time Doctor Guthrie had when retired. Dr ion Smith was primarily a surgeon. He liked to talk with patients and would say most anything in reason that came across his mind.
He performed as many appendicitis operations as emember hearing about in Floydada. He also received many patients from out of
town. As we might notice many ailments might seem to go in bunches of clusters. That period of time seemed o be the appendicitis time. We now seem to have more heart trouble, strokes and cancer then we seemed to have had since World War II am not a doctor and these past stateme
my opinion.
Dr. George was a general practice physician and a very in medicine practice, for that day in time. I would consider Dr. George also a very good physiologist in dealing with his patients or anyone else that he had conversations with.
He told us one time that the world was going to fast.
He said it was alright to He said it was alright to
work hard but we should take time to rest an relax and we wouldn't have so much heart trouble and strokes. As he got ooo old to practice medicine he was still very interesting and informative to talk to. There were two more doc tors we never went to see were fine doctors and of very rood character. One was D Rhinehart, who didn't live in Floydada very long, and the other was Dr. Hopkins. I heard nothing but good about Dr. Hopkins. He and Mrs. Hopkins' daughte Aline Henry still lives here She was the prettiest girl I ever reme
In those times there wers some doctors that had the can thing of only two that I liked their service. They were in later years. One was $\mathrm{Dr}_{\text {r }}$ Ballard and the other was Dr Crum. You also remembe thers and have your preference, that is your privilege $m$ the past fifty years my wif selected Dr. Guthrie to be in attendance at
our oldest son's birth. That suited me just fine. One reason that she selected him was that her family had Dr Guthrie's papa years before, when both the Germany and the elder Guthrie lived in Pe tersburg.

If I remember correctly he and his family moved here just about the time or little before the flu epidemic Dr. Houghton was about the best for treating the flu. None of the doctors knew any spe cial treatment all they could and try to prevent pneumonia nd other complications from taking a hold of a patient My oldest sister and three of her children, my brother baby sister, mama and mysel were at home with the flu in the late fall of 1918. We had made a poor, cheap crop that year and papa and brother n-law, George had taken near the north field brakes to trap for coons, coyotes, bader and other fur bearing animals. They would skin wha hey caught, dry the hides and sell them at the fur market as We came home at Matador. We had poor over worked Dr. Houghton to come and see what he could do for ou flace through the snow. My sister Mary had the pneumo nia but he saved her life. Doc or Houghton was a great behever in carbolic acid to kil germs along with the other things used. I say he saved all our lives when we were sick Mama and the baby seemed to be immune to flu. I heard of several other people who seemed to be immune. Bro. Henry was sick and livestock. So mama let the horses and cows both have run of the feed stacks so they could get plenty to eat. She furned the cows and calves together and all the milking he did each day was mild enough for the baby.
My sister was
My sister was too sick to give milk for the baby and we commercial milk by what few neighbors, had the nerve to come to the door to ask i they could get something for us from town. Most people were deathly afraid to go into any one's house where the flu was. Many died and it was bury the get anyone to help bury the dad. The court house and ot
Dr. Houghton warned mama to wrap tow sack around her feet an not catch cold when she had to go out in the snow. Doctor Hough nd med several more years not us a very good doc tor until he died.
