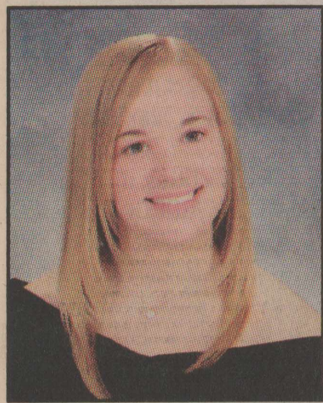

FISD Re-Employs Support Staff for 2013-2014 School Year

The Floydada Independent School District Board of Trustees met on Tuesday, April 16, 2013, to recognize the students, educators, and support staff of the month. Al-

yse Mendoza was the AB Duncan Elementary Student of the Month, Lily Maldonado was the Grade KG Educator of the Month, Casey Cage was the FJHS Student of the Month, Angelica Olvera was the 8th grade Student of the Month, and Terra Weden was the High School Educator of the Month.

The board entered into closed session for approximately 15 minutes to discuss the performance of Paraprofessional Per-

sonnel and Support Staff Members. Once reconvening in open session, the board unanimously approved the motion to re-employ the FISD support staff for the 2013-2014 school year as recommended by the superintendent and administrators. Also, the board accepted the following resignations: Regina Orr, Serapio Ovalle, and Pam Ricketts. Employment of Amy Kellison as the elementary counselor for the 2013-2014 school

year was also approved.

In other business, the board discussed the budget and tax rate adoption timeline and board meeting dates, entered into an agreement with the West Texas Public Schools Employee Benefits Cooperative, certified that all FISD subjects have access to instructional materials that cover all of the TEKS, and approve the changes to policy DCB (LOCAL) as recommended by TASB. Additionally, the board unanimously approved the motion to enter into the data-sharing and confidentiality agreement with AIR, BFK, and Gibson to administer an Educator Effectiveness Metric to teachers at Floydada Junior High School during the 2013-2014 school year.

After some discussion, the board unanimously agreed to enter into a consulting agreement with Moak, Casey, and Associates to handle all services

relating to an Application for Appraised Value Limitation on Qualified Property from Invenergy - a wind energy company - pursuant to Chapter 313, Property Tax Code.

Business Manager Sharon Rainwater presented the tax report, cash flow statement and investment report. M&O current tax roll was \$2,427,340.61, with net collections of \$2,359,811.58. I&S current tax roll was \$286,032.08, with net collections of \$278,074.62. The percentage of current tax roll collected is 97.22, compared to 96.54 this time last year.

There are several hallways at Duncan Elementary that need to be re-tiled. The board accepted the quote from Quality Carpet and Flooring to re-tile the hallways and other areas discussed.

The board approved the March 7, 2013 minutes and approved payment of the March 2013 bills.

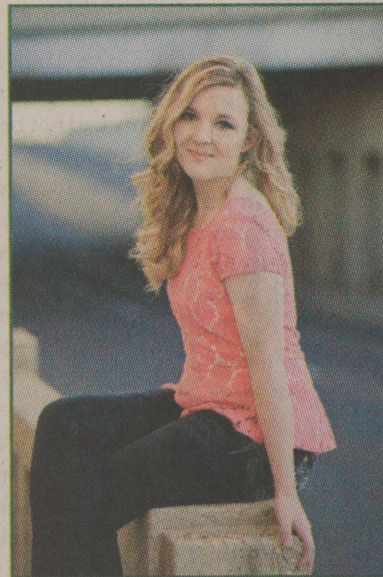

The Retirement Reception was held at the Massey Activity Center. Family and friends were treated to a meal and entertainment by a band from Plainview.

Excerpt from "Memories" - 1979

Copied from the Floyd County Historical Museum

Written by family of J. A. Baker

It was in 1886 and 1887 that Floyd County marked an influx of new settlers and the winter was most severe. Thousands of cattle froze to death and one man lost his entire herd of 3000 sheep. Although this early experience was most trying with disappointments, loss and suffering the most determined settlers were quick to recognize the great possibilities of this rich grass land and in spite of conflicting problems obtained a foothold here. They soon learned to adapt themselves to the new west, thus lessening their labor and suffering.

Late in 1887 towns began to stick up overnight it seemed. Before the county was surveyed or organized, eight or nine towns had come into existence, thus creating the immediate need for churches and schools. Among these towns were Della Plain, Curlew, Starkey, Aiken, Irick, and the original Lockney. Only two of these towns made much progress and they eventually moved to Lockney as some others

did later. The more successful towns were Della Plain and Mayshaw.

Early settlers staked out their own land in the mad rush for grass land since the county had not been surveyed or organized. Eventually when the surveying did take place it was found that Lockney was located on the corner of four sections thus necessitating removal of the town to a new site.

Lockney then was composed of a post office, school building, blacksmith shop, grocery store and a few dugouts for residences. A Mr. Covey was the first post master, the second was Wyly Davis and the third was my father, J. A. Baker.

The first school dates back to 1890-91 with D.F. Davis teaching who received \$50 to teach its thirty-one students. From 1891 to 1895 the one-teacher school of old Lockney was taught by Mr. Davis, Mr. J. F. Lockney and Sam Kelsey. The first state school was taught in an 8' x 10' harness shed in Irick.

In 1892, Postmaster Davis, wanted to leave the county because of the drouth which was driving away many other settlers. He persuaded my father and mother who lived four miles south of town to move to Lockney and take over the duty of postmaster which then paid a salary of five dollars a month. They put in a general store in connection with the post office and incidentally kept the post office for seven years and Mother is still actively engaged in business there.

It was in 1894 that my father bought 160 acres of land from Wyly Davis, and this became the site for the new Lockney. The town received the name from J. F. Lockney, editor of the Floyd County Times in Mayshaw. It was now more important than ever to establish a school since Della Plain had failed in this respect.

In the fall of 1894 or 1895 a college was organized. This was the only school in the vicinity at that time and all grades were taught. Lockney Christian College was closed near the beginning of World War I.

A modern elementary school building replaced in

1945 the building destroyed by fire. It was in 1929 that a large modern high school building was erected. Along with our schools came our churches. The first Sunday School was organized in 1889 in Della Plain. Worshipers had no meeting place to call their own but met in first one store building then another or went dugout to dugout. The church was later moved to Lockney. Lockney had the first church building within about a 60-mile radius. When the first church was built here, there was none at Floydada, Lubbock or Plainview. A college quartet went to Lubbock many time and sang in the courthouse or on the courthouse lawn before a church was built there. I have seen converts baptized in open tanks when ice had to be hewn out with an axe in midwinter. There never seemed to be any ill effects.

Lockney has been almost wiped out by fire three times, thus destroying records valuable for history. The city incorporated in 1908 or 1910 with city council government consisting of a mayor, secretary and alderman.

We have always had a town paper as far as I can remember. Mr. Romulus Jones was the first editor and the paper was named Lockney Ledger. The editor has changed a number of times. I once thought I was very efficient at hand setting type as I worked on the Lockney Ledger for some time.

Mail service in the early days was carried on by stageline, a hack drawn by horses. Passengers rode the stage also when it wasn't too heavily loaded with mail. The first railroad was a branch road from Plainview in 1910. In 1928 a great celebration marked the entrance of two railroads, Acme Pacific, and Fort Worth and Denver. Airplanes, motor freight lines and star mail routes add to the convenience and swiftness of mail service travel.

Electric lights and power service came into use here in 1916. Lumber yards appeared the same year. Rotary Club was organized and creameries were set up in 1929. In 1937

the first paved highway came through Lockney.

I don't remember just when or where I heard the first radio, but I do remember when we paid ten cents and sat down by something and listened with a tube to our ears. We all saved out dimes for those occasions.

Our town has been and still is supported mainly by fanners and ranchers. My mother kept the ranchers' money in the post office safe until the First National Bank was established in 1903.

I have no record of when the first cotton gin was built here but I remember a very prosperous one was operated for some time by C.R. McCollum and later by R.A. Stalcup until it burned just south of where our new modern hospital and clinic now stands.

Perhaps the most interesting and doubtless the most profitable development in the Panhandle-Plains in the past half century is that of shallow water irrigation. From a single experimental well drilled in Baily County in 1910, irrigation has advanced until at present hundreds of wells provide rain when and where wanted on thousands of acres in this area. As early as 1911 a well was drilled on the E. H. Perry farm southwest of Plainview six miles. Judge William McGehee, pioneer citizen and county judge, was the first to possess a well in Floyd County. Mr. McGehee started irrigating about 1911, his first venture, like many others, was moderately successful. Artie Baker, former Lockney banker and son of pioneer family, was one of irrigation's foremost supporters. Recent development has centered around Lockney and the north, west and northwest portion of the county where some farmers operate as many as six or more wells on their farm.

An alfalfa mill has been established here in recent years to take care of the large acreage and numerous yearly alfalfa cuttings in the area because of the advantage of irrigation. Other main crops are cotton, wheat and sorghums.

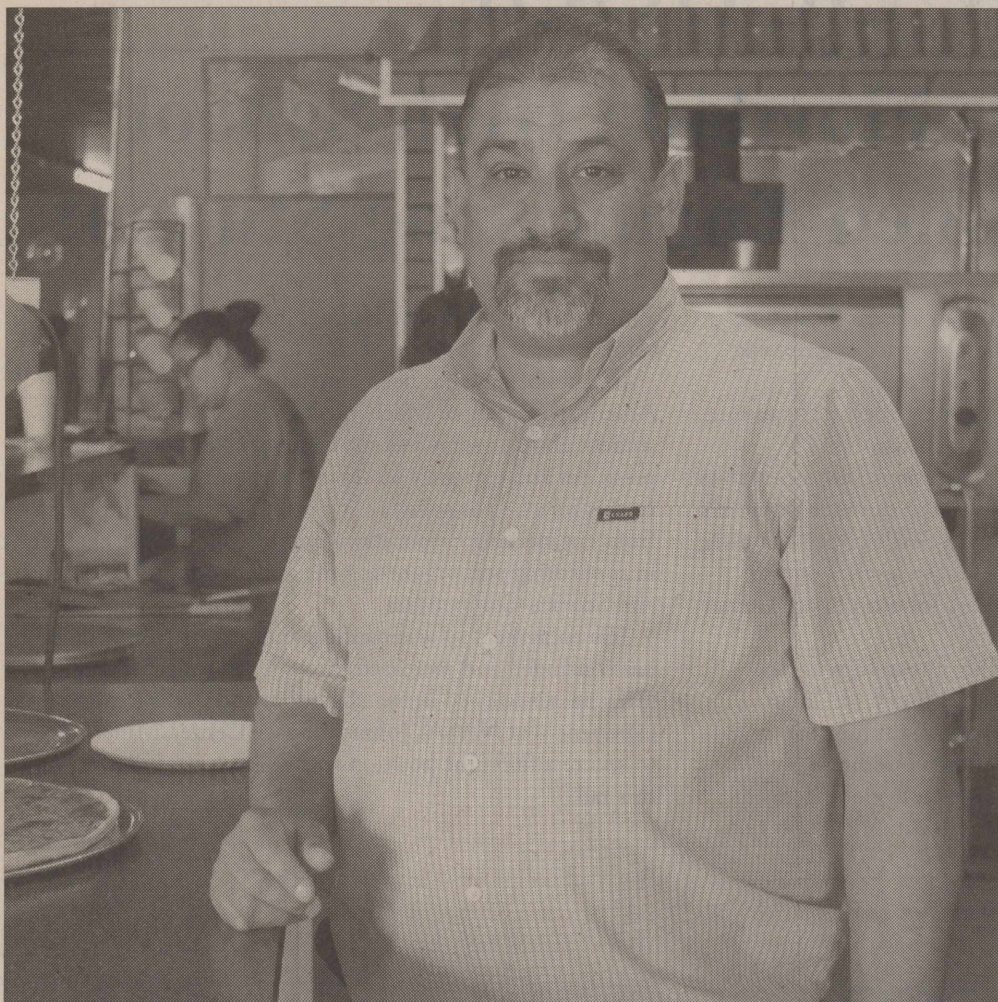

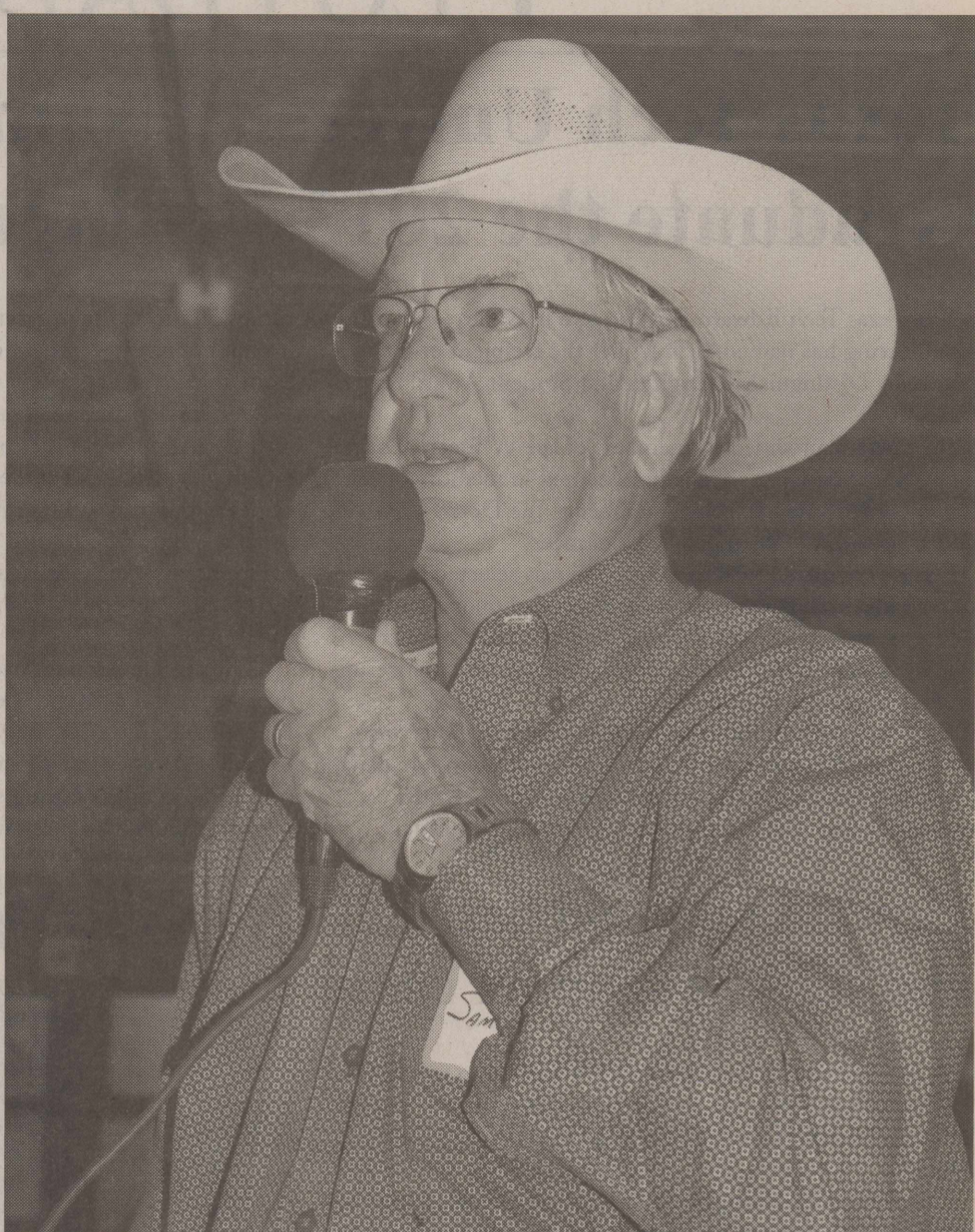

Remembering that probably half the Civil War dead were never identified because there were no dog-tags or official next-of-kin notifications.

Quoting from an article I read....
"It was a shared loss I the sense that so many dead belonged to everyone because they weren't identified as belonging to any single one. These were also not the kind of deaths that society believed were appropriate at the time. They were gruesome and happened far away from home. Death without dignity imperils the meaning of the life that preceded it, so a day of Memorial was meant to restore the dignity of those lives, underscore the contributions that had been made and in some way ratify how important the courage and sacrifice had been. It was an important part of the nations mourning. I'm not sure we spend enough time looking at the purpose of any of our

national holidays." Let us remember, the present is a product of the past and the extraordinary actions that individuals have taken on our behalf. We are the beneficiaries of what they have done, and it behooves us to try to carry on their commitment, their belief in this nation—as Lincoln described it, the "Last best hope of each"—and to dedicate ourselves to the propositions that were at the heart of what these men did and died for, such as the equality of humankind and liberty. These things are no less important today."

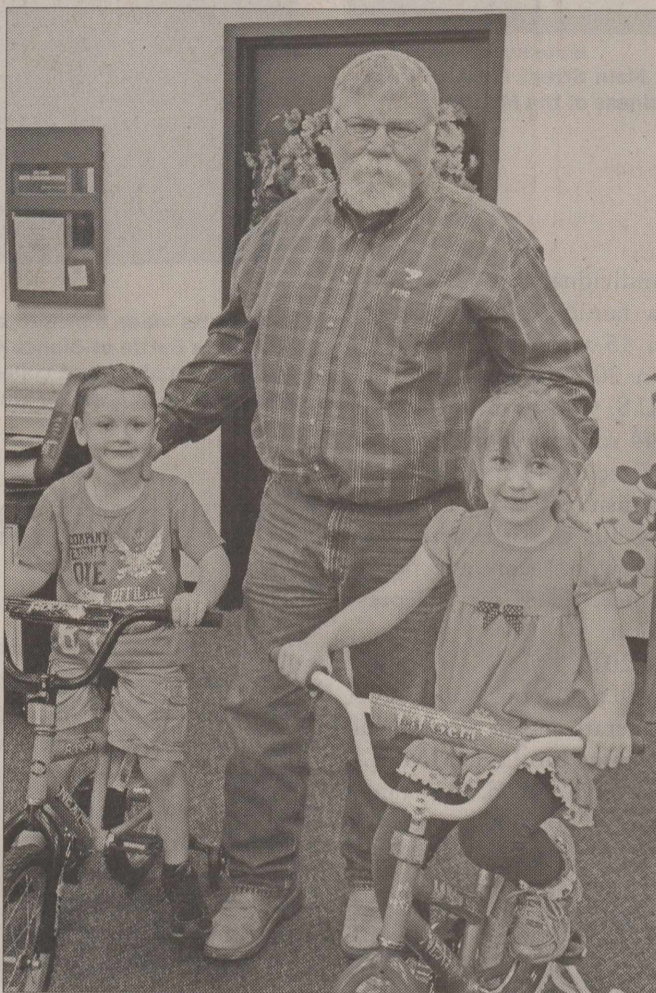

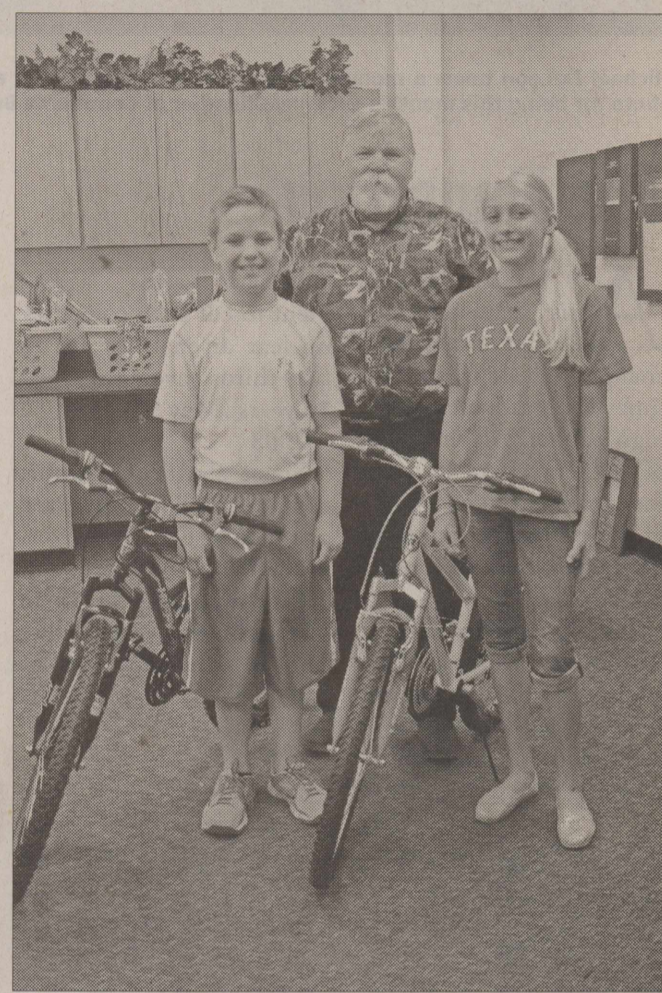

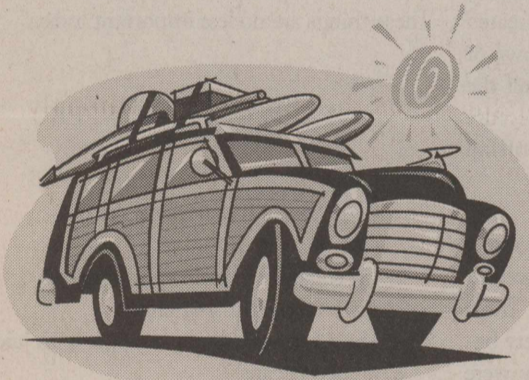

Cotton Market Weekly

Collapsing technical support, concerns about demand, and forecasts for rain in West Texas weighed heavily on the cotton market this week as July futures lost 463 points through Thursday's session at the Intercontinental Exchange (ICE) in New York, and December lost 226 points. Settling at 81.78 cents per pound Thursday, down 164 points, it was the lowest close for the July contract in 15 weeks. Trading volume was an estimated 34,568 contracts, the largest in more than a month, versus Wednesday's cleared volume of 20,112.

The freefall came despite a slightly better than expected export sales and shipment report, a rally in the grain markets and a weaker dollar, according to one analyst. However, the lower prices seemed to motivate inquiries from textile mills, according to reports from Liverpool and Beijing.

Wednesday was the best day this week for cotton futures at ICE as all contracts except July posted slight gains at the close of trading. All contracts were trading higher early in the session before pressure returned to the front month. Analysts offered little explanation for the day's activity.

Tuesday was the market's worst day as all contracts posted triple-digit losses. In fact, nearby contracts suffered their steepest declines since May 1 as speculators appeared to become more aggressive sellers when prices fell below key technical support levels. July cotton led the downward move by settling 192 points lower at 83.86 cents, and December was not far behind as the contract ended the session at 84.15 cents, down 145 points.

Traders and analysts noted the much improved planting progress reported

by USDA for the week ended May 19. According to the department, the 15-state average was 39 percent compared to 23 percent the previous week and the five-year average of 52 percent. Texas farmers had planted 29 percent of anticipated acreage versus 20 percent the previous week and the average of 42 percent. The progress in Texas may be a reflection of the ongoing drought and the reluctance of farmers to plant dryland acres until the last moment.

Current forecasts mention the potential for thunderstorms in West Texas through the end of next week, but meteorologists were quick to point out they were not expected to be "drought busters."

Mississippi continues to lag at only 23 percent complete, up from just 7 percent the previous week. Last year, farmers in the Magnolia State had planted 93 percent of the crop; however, recurring and occasionally heavy rainfall has interfered with planting. Planting in California and Arizona was virtually complete in the most recent reporting period.

USDA also reported export sales of U.S. upland cotton totaled 101,700 bales in the week ended May 16, up 37 percent from the previous week but down 54 percent from the four-week average. China, Turkey and Vietnam were the week's featured buyers. Net sales for delivery in the 2013-14 marketing year totaled 36,400 bales, and South Korea and Mexico were the featured buyers.

Export shipments for the week totaled 232,900 bales, down 24 percent from the previous week and 28 percent from the four-week average. China, Turkey and Vietnam were the primary destinations.

The application will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Lubbock regional office, and the Lockney City Hall, 218 East Locust, Lockney, Floyd County, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Lubbock regional office of the TCEQ.

The executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the application indicates that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. **The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.**

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING You may submit public comments, a request for a public meeting or, request a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. **The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published.** After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After technical review of the application is complete, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of this application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice the executive director may act on the application. **If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided.** According to the Texas Clean Air Act § 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing"; (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect, must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any request for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. **If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period.** Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

MAILING LIST In addition to submitting public comments, you may ask to be placed on a mailing list to receive future public notices for this specific application mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk by sending a written request to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

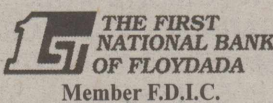

worked there when it closed in 2006. Campbell was baptized in Friendship Chapel Christian Methodist Episcopal Church in 1951. He served as secretary of the finance committee of C.M.E. Church annual conference in 1963, a position which he currently holds today. He received several Layman of the year awards from the conference. And was elected alternate delegate to the C.M.E. Church General Conference which was held in Memphis, Tenn. In 1932, and elected to delegate to the General Conference four years later, which was held in Birmingham, Ala.

Campbell met and married Louise Davis in 1969 and is the father of two children: Althea Green of Amarillo and Cornelius Campbell of Childress, Texas. He is also the grandfather to five grandchildren.

He was elected to the FISO Board of Trustees in 1992, was assistant director and later director of Community Action Center in Floydada from 1968-1973. He is currently the manager of Campbell Frame out of his residence.

Pioneer Woman of the Year Betty Jones was born March 9, 1924 in Grayson County to Jess and Lilly Mullins in Preston, TX, located right on the Red River between Dennison, TX and Woodville, OK.

She lived on her grandmother's farm with her parents and 4 brothers: J.D., Lee Orville, Garland, and Roscoe (who are all now deceased).

Betty started to school when she was 7 years old, attending a three-room school that taught three different levels ("little, middle and big" by her memory) in Preston Bend. She graduated salutatorian from her eighth grade class and attended six weeks at Dennison High School.

Life was different then, according to Betty they didn't have money then and she doesn't have much money now...the only difference now is that she's not starving."

Her father worked on the dam that was built for Lake

Texoma, and eventually submerged Preston, as well as did odd jobs after they moved out to the farm.

While living on her grandmother's farm the government moved in box cars for them and other families to live in. They had no electricity or running water and would light their boxcar with coal oil (kerosene) lamps and cooked with a wood burning stove. She was happy as a lark, though, and didn't know she was poor and was taken care of in some way or another.

For fun, Betty would play jacks with her cousins and go to church on Sundays.

She would also spend much of her time at home cooking while her brothers were out working.

A major part of Betty's life is, and has been for a long time, revolving around music.

She remembers the day the instruments showed up when she was about 12 years old.

Her first instrument was the piano and then they bought an old guitar from Sears Roebuck. Her brother Lee Orville played the guitar first and then she learned. They had a family band with J.D. on the fiddle, Roscoe playing the banjo-ukulele (a little banjo about the size of a ukulele with 4 strings), Garland was on the guitar, and Lee played the mandolin, with Betty accompanying on the piano.

Their family band played at 4th of July picnics, school houses, churches and square dances and also on the radio for about a year. Their neighbors would drive them into town on Saturdays to play on the radio.

Back then they had a battery radio and listened to the Grand Ol' Opry, Chuck Wagon Gang, and Milton Brown. Betty also liked to listen to country music, Ma Perkins, and Stella Dallas (a soap opera on the radio).

When she was 21 she married Pete (C.P.) Jones on February 2, 1946, right after World War II. They had a son Cecil nine months and few days later. Her husband was in the Army during WWII, joining in 1942. They wrote letters back and forth while he was in the Army.

They lived in Sherman until

1951 where they were ranchers and then moved to Higgins, TX. Betty was just as much a cowgirl as her husband was a "cowman" as he liked to be called. She would help her husband on the ranch driving the pickup spreading cow cakes and leading the cows, honking and hollering, and they'd follow her. Pete and Cecil would drive them on horseback.

They worked for Bryant Edwards in Higgins, TX for 50 years. They took care of the ranch in Higgins and then moved to the Clarendon ranch from 1951-55. They lived on the east side of the JA Ranch from 1955-73. Bryant had bought 55,000 acres of the JA Ranch and they were in charge of its care.

At Clarendon she started playing with different bands and attended Bob Wills Day in Turkey, Texas. She attended every year for about 30 years and would accompany the fiddle players in the fiddle contest playing guitar.

Pete, Betty and Cecil stayed in Henrietta until 1997 until Pete had a stroke and couldn't work anymore.

Then they moved to Lockney, TX.

Around 2000, Betty started playing with Molly Huffman. She knew how to play fiddle and learned that Betty played guitar and they played at the rest home. She's been playing every Wednesday since then, and now with her son Cecil who plays the upright bass, playing country western, gospel and bluegrass music. They play at various locations like the Prairie House in Plainview once a month, they appear live the second Saturday every month at the Elk's Restaurant in Plainview, as well as at the Lockney Health and Rehabilitation Center.

Betty goes to the Lockney Senior Citizens Center every Thursday evening to the pot luck, bringing her famous chocolate pie and is often called to play dominos during the week.

Pioneer Couple of the Year was awarded to William Kinsey (Bill) Sherman and Mary Jo Bonner. Bill was born in Haskell, Texas on June 14, 1935 and Mary was born February 2,

1935 in Ropesville, Texas. Bill and Mary graduated from Lockney High School in May 1953. Bill attended Texas Tech and Mary went to secretarial school in Plainview. They were married on June 4, 1954, in Lockney and moved to Lubbock where Bill continued studying at Tech. Mary worked for an accountant. They moved back to the family farm in 1956. From there they purchased land in the Lone Star Community and built their adobe home from the earth on that farm, they still reside in that home today. Another notable achievement is the establishment of a large pecan orchard that remains in production to this day in northern Floyd County.

Bill was chosen Outstanding Young Farmer of Floyd County in 1961, Outstanding Young Farmer in the Region and went on to be a state finalist. He was awarded the Hoblitzelle Award for the Advancement of Rural Life (\$5,000) in 1964.

Mary was named Conservation Homemaker in 1968, given by the Fort Worth Press and went on to win the district title also.

Bill and Mary raised their five children in their home in Floyd County: Mark Elder (deceased), Karla Gayle (Amarillo), Joni Kay (Lubbock), Mac Aron (Lockney), and William Robert "Billy Bob" (Lockney).

Bill and Mary enjoyed a fruitful life in Floyd County. They have been members of the Main Street Church of Christ where Bill has served as Deacon and Elder and they still attend the same church they started in 1956. The couple has enjoyed the country lifestyle and still remains connected to the land to this day. Bill has developed a talent for woodwork, which is evident in the many items of craftsmanship throughout the couple's self-built home. Mary can still be heard playing the piano or you may catch her doing artwork in all mediums. The couple remains active in the community and continues to attend sporting events and school functions as dictated by the many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Known and loved by many, the couple has become a fixture

of Floyd County. Affectionately known as "Momma Jo" and "Daddy Bill" they continue to contribute to the charm and ambiance of the country lifestyle and Floyd County in general.

2013 Lockney Senior Awards Assembly held

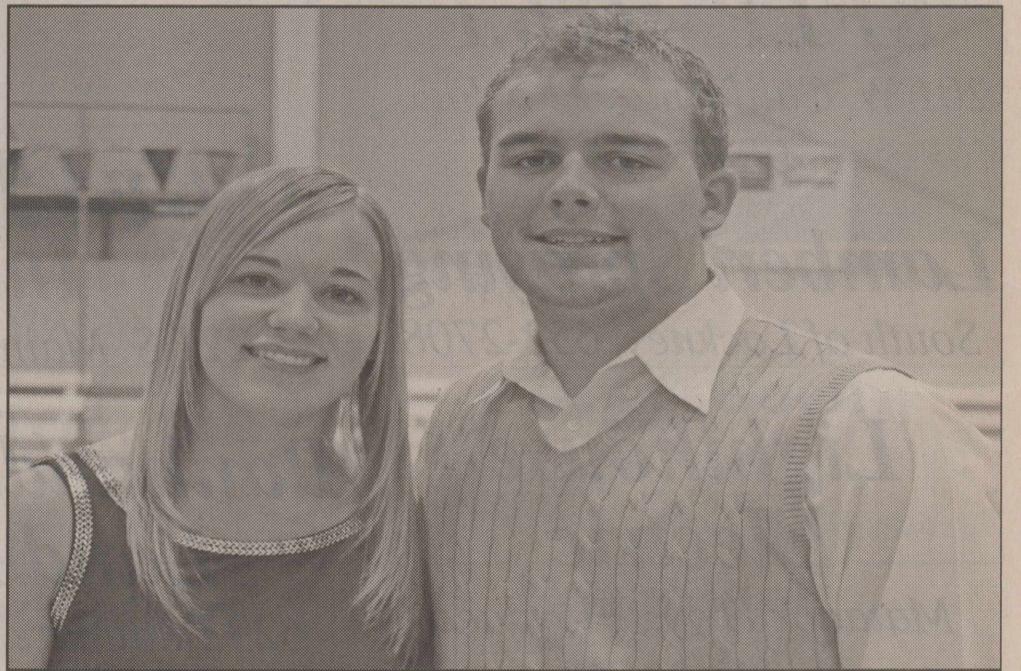
