Xcel's TUCO 345 kV transmission project under construction

Construction is in full swing on Xcel Energy's TUCO-to-Oklahoma 345-kilovolt single circuit transmission line project – a key addition in the company's Power for the Plains initiative that will connect area customers to lower cost power supplies outside the region and boost the reliability and capacity of the area's transmission system.

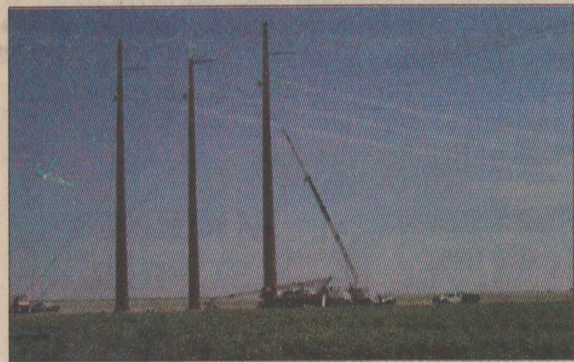
The TUCO line is a \$185 million high-voltage transmission link that will run approximately 200 miles from the TUCO Substation near Abernathy, Texas to a new substation just inside the Oklahoma line in Beckham County. From that point, Oklahoma Gas & Electric (OG&E) will continue the line to a point near Woodward, Okla.

Steel H-frame structures for the new line are being erected north and east of the TUCO Substation in Hale County, and construction will progress eastward through Floyd and Motley counties before heading north into Hall and Collingsworth counties. The line is scheduled to be in service by June 2014.

The line is expected to add at least 500 megawatts of capacity to the regional electrical grid. Its purpose is to reduce congestion on the regional transmission system, improve reliability and improve import-export capability between regional power markets.

The TUCO line and other transmission enhancement projects across the region were identified as necessary improvements by the Southwest Power Pool (SPP), the regional transmission organization that coordinates reliability on the transmission system serving portions of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Times have changed, but signs of Dougherty remain

Dougherty East of Floydada lays the quiet town of Dougherty. Established in 1928 and named for Francis (Frank) M. Dougherty, the town is the home of several families, a post office and a gin.

Dougherty lies on the edge of the Caprock at an elevation of 3,077 ft.

The town is located on FM 28 in southeastern Floyd County and was once on the Fort Worth and Denver Railway.

Named for Francis M. Dougherty, a school was built in 1929.

According to the Texas State Historical Association, Grace Garner was the first postmistress of Dougherty.

"For a time Dougherty prospered, but when U.S. Highway 62/70 bypassed the town by three miles, the community faltered," according to the TSHA. "In 1948 Dougherty had a church, a post office, three businesses, and 150 people. Conditions remained similar in 1980, when the town had 135 people, a school, a post office, and four businesses. The population was 100 in 1990 and 109 in 2000.

Frank Dougherty, also spelled Daugherty, was a merchant and Texas legislator. He was born in Florence, Alabama, on February 13, 1826, son of Isaac Dougherty. He was raised near Oakland, Mississippi, in Yalobusha County.

He came to Hopkins County, Texas, at the age of 18 and worked at various jobs including ranch hand and clerk in a store.

According to the TSHA, "after 1850 Dougherty relocated to McKinney in Collin County where he ran a mercantile business and began to accumulate a fortune. While in Collin County Frank Dougherty

was elected to the Texas House of Representatives. He served one term from 1855 to 1856. One historian lists Dougherty among the dozen candidates elected in 1855 with the support of the American Party or Know-Nothing Party.

"On November 6, 1856, Frank Dougherty married Louisa Huffman in Collin County; the couple had four children.

"In 1858 Dougherty moved to Gainesville and sold goods there until 1861 when the Civil War began. Although he had not supported secession, Francis Dougherty enlisted in the Confederate Army in 1862 and was elected captain of Company A of the Sixteenth Texas Cavalry. Dougherty fought with the Sixteenth Texas in the Red River Campaign at the battles of Mansfield, Pleasant Hill and Jenkins' Ferry. He remained with his unit throughout the war.

"Following surrender Frank returned to his mercantile in Gainesville where he remained until he sold the business in 1878. Dougherty then turned his attention to farming, ranching, and a career in banking. He also served two more terms as a Democrat in the state legislature from 1879 through 1881 as a representative of Cooke County.

"Dougherty was an investor in the Denison and Pacific Railway and reportedly donated to several charitable causes. In 1904 Dougherty had a house built for him in Terry County near Brownfield, Texas, a town founded by Dougherty's son-in-law. The Old Daugherty House still stands and is a recorded Texas historic landmark.

"Although his headstone does not list a death date, Frank Dougherty was buried in Brownfield Cemetery sometime after the first burial occurred there in 1905."

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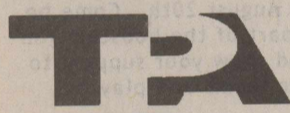

The Paperboy Big thirst is big issue

As you've noticed, there is a population shift taking place in the United States. More than 1,000 people a day are moving to Texas alone. That number is increasing.

There are still illegal immigrants coming into Texas. There are babies born in Texas. This population growth coupled with a long drought has the state needing water.

The bottom line is this: Texas needs an enormous amount of water. While neighboring states Oklahoma, New Mexico and Louisiana are also experiencing growth, they are not in the poor position Texas is concerning our most precious resource.

Consider this, by 2030, just 17 years, Amarillo will grow by 57,000. That's about a 29 percent jump. And it's a drop in the bucket.

Take a look at the following:

El Paso	308,000
San Antonio	690,000
Austin	900,000
Rio Grande Valley	627,000
Dallas-Fort Worth	2,500,000
Houston	1,936,000

The rate of growth is incredible. Texas will surpass California sometime in the next decade to lead the U.S. in population. In fact, according to data from the Texas Water Development Board, here in the next few years, you'll see over 1 million people a year moving to the Lone Star State.

A few weeks ago I wrote a column about the increase in oil and gas production and stated Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana would continue to boom amassing great wealth in the process. Just add water.

In researching the TWDB website, of which there is a dizzying amount of data, it becomes clear quickly the urgent need for water. Basically, Texas needs double the water it has access to.

We've known for awhile that we were going to need water. But the brutal drought which affected such a huge area really brought the need to light.

It's crucial that Texas' water needs be met. I expect a number of things will take place the more people talk about it. I can envision reservoirs, well fields, buying water from other states, desalinization plants, aqueduct systems, etc...

I'm thankful there are brains smarter than mine working to figure this all out.

It would be fantastic if we had a few harmless floods in between now and 2030. Lord knows we're going to need it.

Museum News

From The Floyd County Historical Book "Memories," 1979

PROVIDENCE

Only a few bricks, some piles of rubble and many memories remain of Providence School. The 56 year-old building was recently razed after standing vacant since 1970.

Residents of Providence, mostly German-American of the Lutheran faith can still visualize themselves, their children, or grandchildren sitting at the school's old wooden desks and hearing the handbell that summoned pupils to their classes.

They also remember the after-school functions—the Halloween parties, Christmas programs, and spring activities. But most area school-aged children are now bused to schools in Lockney, 14 miles south-east of here.

The Providence Com-

munity in the northwest corner of Floyd County was named by W.J. (uncle Jack) Lowom for his home town in Providence, Alabama, where he was born on August 19, 1854. He married Miss Crebella Cebell Alexander, who was born on September 18, 1867, in Providence, Alabama. They were married on July 5, 1883 and came to Floyd County in March, 1891, where they homesteaded on one section of land in the northwest corner of Floyd County. They later turned it back and took four sections a few miles northeast.

The first Providence School was a wooden building with a bell tower, erected about 1910. Mrs. Ted Boedeker attended church services there before the present Trinity Lutheran Church Building

was constructed.

Ewald Quebe, who was a student in the small frame, two-room schoolhouse remembers that tile first four grades were taught on the stage and instruction went through the ninth grade. "We got out drinking water from a windmill," he said, "Everybody dipped their cups in the tank."

The school faculty was usually composed of two teachers and a combination teacher-principal-custodian.

Teaching there shortly before the school closed were Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Groves and Doris Weatherly, now of Plainview.

Providence School had a lunchroom and its baseball team played South Plains School, recalls Wilfred Stoemer who served on the school board seven years.

"Our children got a good

education out here," said Stoemer. After finishing the eight grade at Providence, youngsters from the community went to Lockney "where they were readily accepted, fit in with the town students, and did well in their studies."

The original school building had rested on four sites, but not for long—without argument from area residents each time a move was anticipated.

The first move was about half mile east of the present Lutheran Church. Afterward, the school was moved north to about the middle of the section. The third move was to the northwestern corner and the last, diagonally across the road to the northwest. The school section has been donated by George Deeder.

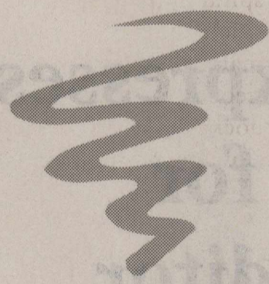

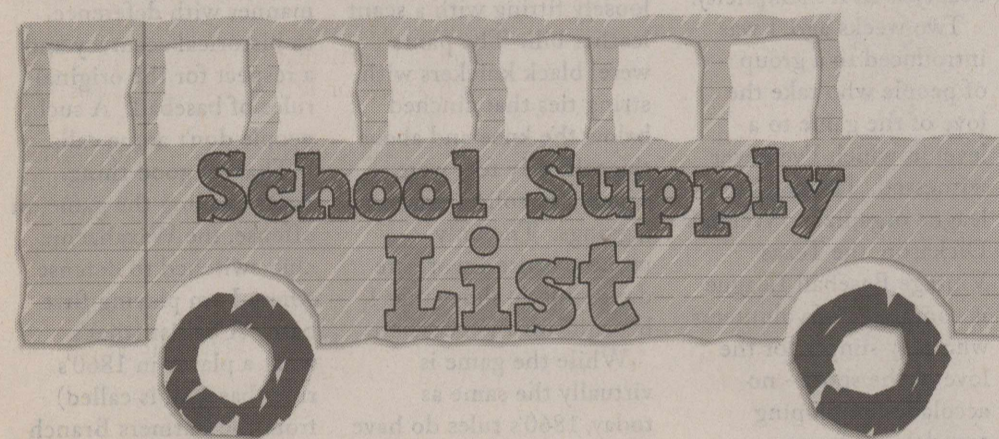

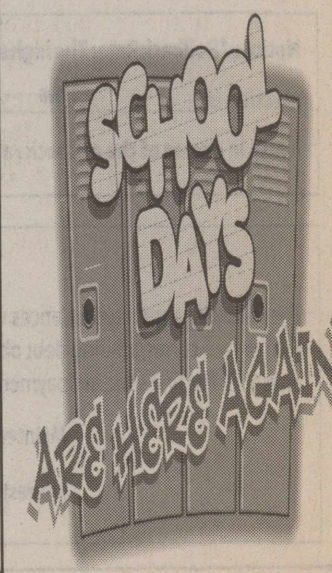

Assignment: Texas Take Me Out to the Ballgame

I've long had a love affair with baseball. From my days playing on little league teams in Bonham, Texas and playing high school ball at Dodd City, Texas, the

game has always been a source of fascination for me. To this day, I still love to play, watch, and coach whenever I can.



Baseball is as timeless a sport as we have in the United States. Since it's beginnings the game has virtually unchanged no matter the age of the players or the league. It's beauty is in it's simplicity.

Two weeks ago, I was introduced to a group of people who take the love of the game to a level in which I've never witnessed. Headed by league organizer Wendel Dickason, the Texas Vintage Baseball League is comprised of volunteers who play simply for the love of the sport - no accolades, no doping scandals, and no pay. They play for fun.

One caveat, however: they play under the 1860's era rules that harken to when baseball was still in its infancy.

On a steamy Saturday morning I met Wendel and members of three teams at the Farmers Branch Historical Park in Farmers Branch, Texas. While the entire squads weren't present, members of the Waxahachie Baseball Club, the Farmers Branch Mustangs, and the Carrollton Elites (I am told the pronounced is e-LITES and they get their name from a local, historic store) are on hand to play a game of baseball for the gathered crowd of a dozen or so.

With their permission, I suited up for the Waxahachie squad and played with them. My uniform is a far cry from anything I've ever worn.

A loosely fitting white shirt with loose sleeves and a simple, buttoning V-neck collar in which I wore a crimson scarf tied in a bow. The cap was loosely fitting with a scant leather bill. The pants were black knickers with string ties that cinched below the knee and above the calf. My feet were covered in solid crimson leggings. The only modern attire I wore are dark athletic shoes that I brought for the occasion.

While the game is virtually the same as today, 1860's rules do have some variations. Most notably:

The baseball used to play is a little larger than a modern baseball with a different stitching pattern and a bit softer in feel; The wooden bats are heavier than the modern versions and the thick handles are nearly as beefy as the barrels; The ball is pitched underhand; When hit, a ball caught off of a single hop results in the same outcome as catching a fly ball or line drive. It's an out; Defensive players wear no gloves; Game play is a bit less competitive than modern baseball; The umpire is present to keep the game flowing and not be a necessary arbiter of balls and strikes or called outs for that matter.

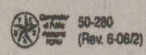
During the game I speak often to Wendel who is the umpire and tells me that the squads often play exhibition games at various historical reenactments around the

state. He also reminds me that unlike the hyper competitive nature of modern major league baseball, vintage baseball is played in a gentlemanly manner with deference to historical accuracy and a respect for the original rules of baseball. A such, people don't argue calls.

That's a good thing. After starting the game on offense, the Waxahachie club switched to defense where I am playing first base. A ballist (that's what a player in 1860's rules baseball is called) from the Farmers Branch club, adorned in his blue uniform and gripping a darkly stained ash bat, hits a fast roller to the short stop. He fields the ball cleanly and flings it to me.

Instinctively I place my right foot on the corner of the bag and stretch out with my left hand leading the way. I quickly remember that I am not wearing a glove and have to two hand catch the ball that's thrown hard from across the infield.

As soon as I adjust my feet, the ball is on me. I cradle it to the bottom of my sternum, catch the ball cleanly, and step back quickly. As soon as my foot hits the bag the runner is there as well. I don't know who touched the base first and am not sure he does either. With no umpire to mitigate the situation we shake hands and begin to talk about the play in a calm fashion - just like the game expects.

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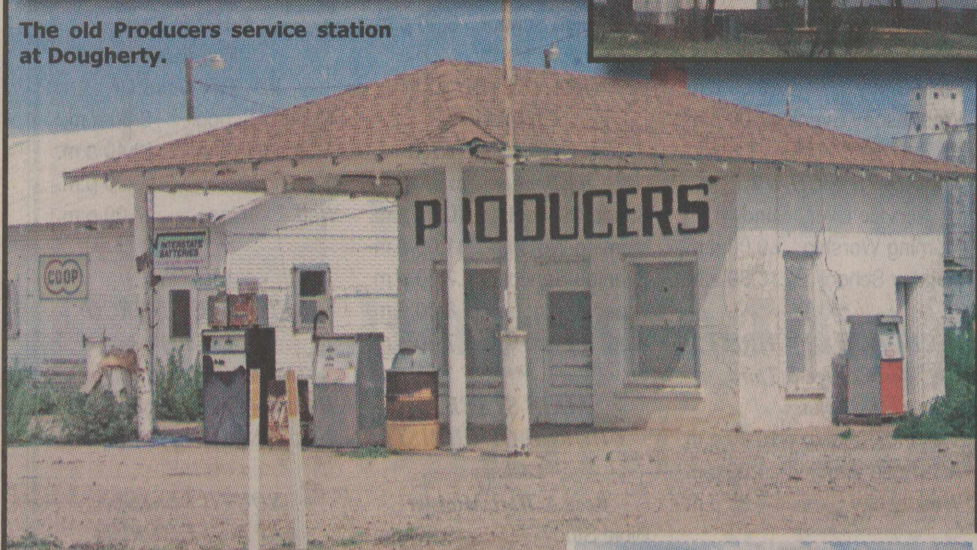

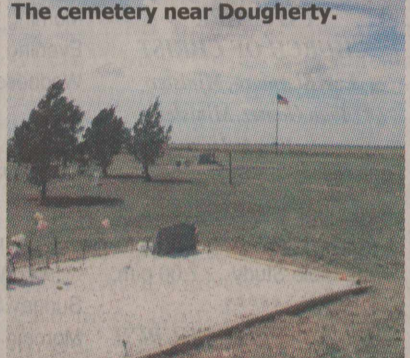

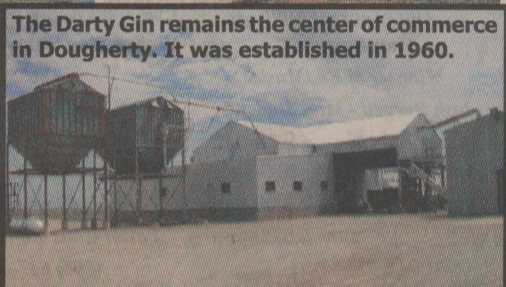
