Animal Shelter Cleans Up, Meets State Requirements

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In 2012, the Floydada Animal Shelter was rated "unsatisfactory" by the Department of State Health Services.

"I don't have anything to plug in fans to give the dogs more air, so I leave the door open so at least there can be a little flow of air going through," Floydada Animal Control Officer Lucio Vasquez told KLBK in August 2012. Back then, the animal shelter was a little shack out by the Floydada Landfill.

The old shelter had no running water, no electricity, and no records of the animals that were being kept there. "We didn't really have the facilities to keep animals," Vasquez said of the old shelter.

Floydada took the 'unsatisfactory' rating seriously and opened their new facility in November 2012. Now, in August 2013, the shelter is in good standing with the Department of State Health Services.

"When they came out to inspect us, the only thing we had missing was a sink, and we got one put in real quick, and they certified us to go ahead and run it," Vasquez said. They never had a sink at the old facility, but now they have one, and it's helping to make Vasquez's job easier. "Now, I don't have to carry water all the way out there, to water them and clean the cages and stuff, I just got two faucets where I clean everything up, so it's been really good."

DPS investigates fatal accident on Highway 70

According to Floyd County Sheriff Paul Raissez, Nicholas Torres, 34, of Lockney was struck and killed Wednesday night about 11:30 P.M. Torres was walking in the middle of the highway when he was struck by a Chevy truck driven by Arnoldo Perales. Perales was east-bound on US Highway 70 about one mile west of Lockney when the accident occurred.

Torres was pronounced dead at the scene. DPS continues to investigate to see if weather conditions were a factor in the accident.

Plainview group to open clinic in Floydada

PLAINVIEW — West Texas Family Medicine of Plainview will be opening Nov. 1 in the Cogdell Clinic building in Floydada.

The clinic will feature a full spectrum of family medicine

The West Texas Family Medicine of Floydada
- Cogdell Clinic will open with five employees.
The medical group, based in Plainview, has contracted with Caprock Hospital District, which serves Floydada.

"We're looking forward to a strong relationship with them (Caprock)," said Dr. Jon Watkins. "It was important to them to have a smalltown West Texas group come in instead of a large corporation."

Besides the main clinic in Plainview, the West Texas group currently operates a clinic in Hale Center, which opened in July 2012.

The group says that a strong medical presence in a community is important for commerce.

"Our group is committed to helping Floydada stay a viable community by providing medical services that allows them to have business opportunities that are going to look at what medical services are available in Floydada," said Dr. Mark McClanahan.

There is room for the clinic to grow.

"Right now we'll have a full-time, fully trained Physician Assistant there five days a week and a physician will be there two times a week," said Mark McClanahan. "If the clinic is utilized with adequate demand we would consider placing a full-time physician there."

In all, the West Texas group will invest approximately \$80,000 in the clinic.

"We plan on trying to improve the services of the clinic by adding lab services and bringing in an x-ray unit," Mark McClanahan continued.

The electronic medical system which will be installed can be shared real time with the Plainview clinic. Regardless if patients are in Floydada or Plainview or Hale Center, patient information will be available instantly.

"One of the things we want people to know is that it will be a Monday through Friday clinic ... due to our EMR (electronic medical records) connection, we'll have access to their records," said Mark McClanahan. "After hours, there is always a connection with one of our providers, whether they be mid-level or physician, that also has access to their records."

For patients planning on using the clinic, the group is ready to begin the transfer of medical

records now.

"If patients want to come to our facility in September or October and establish care, we can transfer their records into the group and when we open the clinic, those records will be available in Floydada," Mark McClanahan said. "If they will come by West Texas Family Medicine and sign a records release so that we can get their records and create a chart for them for Floydada."

The group says they are fortunate to have a strong working relationship with Texas Tech University.

"One of the things I think is kind of interesting is that Plainview has a family medicine residency program that's affiliated with Texas Tech and our clinic is closely associated with Tech," Mark McClanahan said. "In fact, one of the residents we are proctoring will join our practice in less than a year. That allows us to have the ability to pick and choose physicians to be affiliated with our group to serve the outlying communities."

The clinic will also feature Obstetrics.

"If pregnant patients choose us as their OB provider in Floydada, our plan is to deliver in Plainview," said Dr. John McClanahan. "Our connection is with Plainview's hospital."

TEA releases 2013 accountability ratings

AUSTIN - The Texas Education Agency today released the 2013 state accountability system ratings for more than 1,200 school districts and charters, and more than 8,500 campuses. The ratings reveal that almost 93 percent of school districts and charters across Texas have achieved the rating of Met Standard

"A transition to a new accountability system comes with a great deal of uncertainty, said Comm 2013 ratings confirm that the vast majority of districts and campuses are meeting the state's standards and providing a quality education for our

The 2013 ratings are based on a revised system that uses various indicators to provide greater detail on the performance of a district or charter and each individual campus throughout the state. The performance index framework includes four areas:

snapshot Achievement Represents a performance standard. alternative assessments, general iects. (All Students)

Student Progress - Provides an opportunity for diverse campuses to show improvements dependent of overall achievement levels. Growth is evaluated by subject (All Students; Student Groups by Race/Ethnicity; English Language Learners; Special Education)

Closing Performance Gaps - Emphasizes improving academic achievement economically disadvantaged student group and the lowest performing race/ethnicity student groups at each campus or district. (All Economically Disadvantaged Students; Student Groups by Race/Ethnicity)

Postsecondary Readiness - Includes measures of high school completion, and beginning in 2014, State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR®) performance at the postsecondary readiness standard. (All Students; Student Groups by Race/Ethnicity; English Language Learners; Special Education)

Districts and campuses with students in Grade 9 or above must meet targets on all four indexes. Districts and campuses with students in Grade 8 or lower must meet targets on the first three indexes (excluding Postsecondary Readiness).

Locally, all three campuses at Floydada ISD reached the "Met Standards" criteria however none received a distinction designation. Lockney High School and Junior High reached the "Met Standards" criteria but neither received a distinction designation. Lockney Elementary School was listed as "Needs Improvement". According to Phil Cotham, Superintendent, the Elementary missed it by one point in one indicator, Student

Cotham said, "It's not as bad as it looks. We are disappointed but we will work for improvement not only in this area but all areas on all campuses.'

Gilbert Trevino, superintendent at Floydada, said, "We are very comfortable that we are headed in the right direction. Even though we did not receive any distinction designation, we will be moving forward in a positive direction."

The STAAR program includes annual assessments for grades 3-8 in reading and mathematics; assessments in writing at grades 4 and 7; in science at grades 5 and 8; and in social studies at grade 8; and end-of-course assessments for English I, English II, Algebra I, biology and U.S

"Under the new accountability system, these designations recognize outstanding work at the campus level that would not be acknowledged in previous years," said Commissioner Williams. "Despite the many positive numbers, I am confident school leaders across our state share my concern for the number of campuses where improvement is still required, especially at the elementary level. If we can target our efforts in those grade levels today, the state will see improvements for all students in the years ahead."

Commissioner Williams noted that while the four components of the new accountability system are in place, future adjustments will be made based on district and stakeholder feedback. In addition, House Bill 5 (passed by the 83rd Texas Legislature) requires stronger measures of postsecondary readiness to be added to the system.

Councilman Bil Anderson of Precinct 3, was honored for his 15 years of service to the City of Lockney. Anderson has recently moved to Lubbock and resigned his council seat.

Anderson expressed his gratitude to the citizens of Lockney that put him on the council.

Matt Williams was appointed by the council to fill the unexpired term of Precinct 3 that runs through May 2015. Williams was sworn in by Mayor Rodger Stapp.

In other business, the council received the annual audit report from George Meriwether for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. He reported that the city was in good shape financially.

The council discussed the possibility of selling a service pistol purchased for a former police officer. City Attorney Lanny Voss was asked to research the law regarding the bid process for a handgun.

Following a lengthy executive session, the council voted to accept the resignation of City Secretary Charlotte Hooten. According to Shad Schlueter, Precinct 1 and acting City Secretary, at this time there will be no action regarding the filling of the position.

Dickie McCarty, Sheriff Paul Raissez and Schlueter presented departmental reports. During discussion of the city farm, Schlueter pointed out that the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality had requested that the city provide proof of certification on the pond lining and also install a fence around the city pond. An environmental engineer had been contacted to survey the pond and determine what will be necessary to bring the pond lining into compliance.

Sheriff Raissez reported that Cory Johnson had been hired by the county as a new deputy and that one of the other deputies is interested in purchasing a home in Lockney if they can find one.

Schlueter also discussed the expense of keeping the roll-off bins year-round. Since the beginning of the year, the roll-off service has cost the city in excess of \$16,000. The council wants to look at other options of providing this service to the citizens as this is too expensive to continue every month.

The council wants to remind citizens to get their weeds under control before citations are issued. The city will maintain the alleys up to within six inches of the fences where possible but home and business owners are responsible for front and backyards.





Wednesday, a representative with the Department of State Health Services said the shelter was in good standing and now meets all requirements as they outline.

Another thing Vasquez is happier with in this new place is the amount of space and the number of animals they can keep. "It's better for me because I don't have to put them down as often, and I hate to use that word, but a lot of times we had to do that, because out there, there wasn't much, I mean we couldn't keep them that long," Vasquez said.

Now, he often says they can keep dogs one or two months. That's also lead Floydada to start their own animal adoption program to try to help the dogs find a forever home. The program is named after Vasquez, and is called "Lucio's Dog House"

"It's hard to let them go when we have to, so it means a lot, like I said, it's a great blessing for us," Vasquez

In their most recent inspection, back in March 2013, the shelter had everything in place except for a sink and a top to the quarantine cage. Both were installed about a month later to meet the requirements.

Someday I'd like to go to the source and dine in the shadow of Mount Etna. If only I could talk my husband, Hugh, into a Mediterranean cruise, destination Sicily - or even a short ferry ride there from the very toe of Italy.

Interestingly enough, Hugh once lived in Sicily. It's where the military sent him. It wasn't paradise, but it beat Vietnam. He has fond memories of Mama Ilio's, a pizza place near the entrance to the naval air facility at Sigonella. A student of
