Sustaining with the Rain

What is the value of groundwater? To many, it is an invaluable resource.

Jim and Denise Doucette of Lockney understand the value of groundwater, which compelled them to install a large-scale rainwater harvesting system for their 240 acre ranch.

Beginning in 1998, the rainwater collection system was initially installed to prevent runoff from their 100 foot x 125 foot barn from flooding cattle pens. However, the Doucettes soon learned that water collected in the eight 3,000 gallon tanks could be used for their five horses and to supplement their well water.

"Anything we can do to reduce our usage of the aquifer is a benefit," Jim said.

With the first quarter of 2014 being extremely dry, some may argue that there hasn't been enough rainfall to make collection feasible. The Doucettes disagree.

Their farm received 0.40 of an inch of rain in April. From that, they were able to collect 1,000 to 1,200 gallons in each of their eight tanks. This amounts to 8,000 to 9,600 gallons of harvested rainwater.

By collecting so much water with so little rain, Jim believes rainwater harvesting could help supplement future water supply for rural towns.

"I hope it (rainwater collection) will provide small towns out here with a way to survive," Jim said. "The quality of life in a small town is one of the less underreported things in our society."

Denise said an understanding of the value of water by all portions of society is important to encourage sustainable water practices, including rainwater harvesting

"Just be without water for a day or two and you soon realize you really need to protect all the water that you do have. It's important to use it wisely and not waste it," Denise said.

Given the success of their current system, Jim and Denise Doucette said they would consider installing more rainwater harvesting tanks in the future. They said it would not be

that difficult to equip their current increases whenever there is a system to supplement groundwater used in their home. All that is needed is a pump and a water treatment (purification) system

"As the 2014 drought continues, many people will start to think about water conservation techniques, such as rainwater harvesting. It's important to plan ahead—since the price of water (or other resources)

demand." Jim said.

The High Plains Water District salutes this Floyd County couple for their water conservation efforts.



Floydada City Council approves Stage 2 water restrictions

Effective immediately, citizens of Floydada are on Stage 2 on the Drought Contingency Plan following a unanimous vote by the Floydada City Council.

Stage 2 restrictions are compulsory for all users and are intended to prohibit non-essential water use. Nonessential watering is described as but not limited to washing of windows, siding, eaves and roofs of houses with a hose; cleaning and washing of driveways, streets,


We are quickly approaching a time when America will officially be "fundamentally transformed" into something very unAmerican. In my opinion, it is a travesty.



FISD Board Considers Application for Limited Assessed Valuation Agreement

The Board of Trustees of Floydada Independent School District met Tuesday, April 15, 2014, to consider whether or not to accept the application of South Plains Wind Energy, LLC for a Limited Assessed Valuation Agreement. Board member Marty Lucke made the motion to hire the Underwood Law Firm to provide legal counsel to the district concerning a Limited Assessed Valuation Agreement. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Following this, the board adjourned to executive session for discussion on the application of South Plains Wind Energy, LLC. The closed meeting lasted for 15 minutes, then re-opened the public meeting. Board member William Dean moved that the board accept for consideration the Application of South Plains Wind Energy, LLC for a Limited Assessed Valuation Agreement for Qualified Property under the Texas Economic Development Act, Texas Tax Code, Chapter 313, subject to a possible refund of a portion of the application fee on the terms presented, and authorize the superintendent to acknowledge such acceptance and begin working with the Underwood Law Firm to take such action as appropriate to process the application on the district's behalf. The vote was unanimous in favor of this motion. Concerning the upcoming May election, no action was necessary to authorize the responsibility for preparing the ballot for Certification of Unopposed Candidates in the Floydada ISD general election. Vice President John Woelfel certified that Single Member District 3 Candidate Gracie Diaz and At-Large Candidate Lyle Miller were unopposed. Given their running unopposed, the board approved a motion for the cancellation of the May 10, 2014 General Election and declared unopposed candidates, Gracie Diaz and Lyle Miller, elected. The district recognized several students and educators for the month of April. Honored at AB Duncan Elementary, were students Yael Lara (pre-K), Alli Hernandez (kindergarten),

and Brody Hughes (kindergarten). AB Duncan educators of the month were Keyla Pesina and Rhoda Morales. The board also recognized Floydada Junior High student Alejandro Pinon (8th grade) and Floydada High School student Aaron Chavarria (11th grade). FJH/FHS educator of the month was Rita Cox.

Business Manager Sharon Rainwater presented the tax report, cash flow statement, and investment report. The M&O current tax roll is \$2,704,246.64, with net collections of \$2,606,028.04. I&S tax roll is \$318,662.03, with net collections of \$307,088.19. The percent of current roll collected is 96.37, compared to 97.22 percent this same time last year.

In other business, the board approved the minutes from the March 11, 2014 meeting, set the May board meeting for May 12th at 7 p.m., unanimously rescinded the termination of the probationary contracts of Hailey Schoeffel and Andy Roberts, then held discussion of the budget and tax rate adoption timeline and board meeting dates. Also, the board unanimously approved a motion to enter into an agreement with DK Haney to correct the gutter system at the high school at a cost of \$24,150.



Property Owners Should Soon Start Receiving Appraisal Notices for the 2014 Tax Year

If your property value increased in the last year, you will soon receive an appraisal notice from the Floyd County Appraisal District. Your city, county, school district and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set your 2014 property taxes.

Under Texas law, county appraisal districts are required to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. The notice contains important information about the property's location, ownership and property tax exemptions that have been applied to the property. It must also include an estimate of 2014 taxes by local taxing units.

Property owners who disagree with the appraised value of their property, the exemptions or any other action by the appraisal district have the right to appeal to the Floyd County Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling property owner protests. The notice of appraised value includes instructions on how and when to file a protest, a protest form and the Comptroller's Property Taxpayer Remedies. The deadline for filing a protest with the ARB is May 31, 2014 or 30 days after the appraisal district mailed your notice of appraised value, whichever is later.

The Comptroller's publication, Property Taxpayer Remedies, explains in detail how to protest your property appraisal, what issues the ARB can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the options of taking your case to court, the State Office of Administrative Hearings or binding arbitration if you are dissatisfied with the outcome of your ARB hearing.







The 501 Hung out to dry on Earth Day

arth Day was last week. You knew that. I observed the special occasion by harnessing the power of wind and sun to dry clothes the natural way. I didn't really plan my clothes-drying experience to coincide with Earth Day. Sometimes things just work out. And yes, "harness" is probably too strong a word, but it's the kind of term that sounds right here on the

Texas Concealed Handgun License course set for May 10 at SPC

LEVELLAND – South Plains College will offer the Texas Concealed Handgun License course on May 10 (Saturday) in the Law Enforcement Technology building in Room 115 on the Levelland campus. Space is limited.

Class will begin at 8 a.m., and will include breaks every hour and a one-hour break for lunch. The classroom portion will be completed by 3 p.m. and the length of the range portion will depend on the number of students. The cost is \$70 for students seeking their first license, and \$25 for students wanting a refresher course before renewing their license. Although renewals are now handled strictly online, the 15 or more changes in Texas firearms law last summer make a refresher course a good investment.

Students will need a handgun and 50 rounds of ammunition. They must pass a 25 question written test, and demonstrate safe and proficient gun handling, scoring at least 70 percent on a shooting test at distances ranging from three to 15 yards.

City of Lockney Stage 3 Restrictions

Stage three water rationing remains in effect for the city of Lockney with some adjustments. The water restrictions include: street addresses ending in odd numbers can water, wash cars or fill pools from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. and from 8 p.m. to midnight on Tuesdays and Fridays and even numbers can water on Mondays and Thursdays but outside use of water can only be done on the appropriate day when the wind is blowing less than 15 mph. Other restrictions include using hose-end sprinklers and automatic irrigation systems but the automatic systems must be controlled manually. Vehicle washing is restricted to designated days and hours and a handheld bucket or a hand-held hose equipped with a positive shutoff nozzle must be used. Operation of ornamental fountains or ponds is prohibited except where necessary to support aquatic life or if the system uses a recirculation pump.

Non-essential use of water is prohibited including: washing down sidewalks, walkway, driveways, parking lots, tennis courts or other hard-surface areas; use of water to wash down buildings or structures except for fire protection; dust control; flushing gutters or permitting water to run or accumulate in any gutter or street; failure to repair a controllable leak within a reasonable period

Stories of Hope and Healing During National Donate Life Month

Lubbock, Texas, April 22, 2014 –This April marks the 11th annual National Donate Life Month, a celebration commemorating those who have given the gift of life through organ, eye and tissue donation. For those whose lives have been saved by a transplant, National Donate Life Month provides a chance to share their story to encourage more people to register as donors.

This rings true for the Slate family of Littlefield, just outside of Lubbock. Mike Slate, 54, received a liver transplant in early March. Diagnosed with hemochromatosis and cancer, the only option for Mike was a liver transplant. Mike is doing well post-transplant and now looks forward to spending more time with his daughter, son and two grandchildren.

"We are so blessed that someone made the generous decision to say 'YES' to donation," said JaLee Slate, Mike's wife. "I have my husband back, my kids have their dad back and my grandchildren have their grandfather back."

Mike had his surgery at Baylor University of Medical Center in Dallas and is recovering there and looks forward to settling back at home soon.

Back in Lubbock, National Donate Life Month means something different for the Grusendorf family. Their daughter, Melissa Canale, 41, was always smiling and always helping others. An assistant principal at Atkins Middle School and a Sunday school teacher at St. Elizabeth's Catholic Church, she clearly adored her students. Melissa's greatest treasure was her family. In December 2010, she died after complaining of a headache and an earache that later caused an infection in her brain. She left a gaping hole in the hearts of her husband, David, their children, Ford and Ella, and her parents, James and Sherry. But by registering as an organ and tissue donor, Melissa kept

other families from suffering the same grief.

"We were so honored that Melissa chose to be a donor," said Melissa's parents, James and Sherry. "It did help ease the pain of her death knowing part of her would help others continue to live."

There are now 112 million registered donors in the United States, more than 5 million from the state of Texas. Everyday across the country, 75 people lives are saved through donation. Even so, the number of people in need of transplants continues to outpace the supply of donated organs. Today, more than 120,000 men, women and children across the United States are waiting for a lifesaving transplant and 13,000 of those are

from Texas. Countless more are awaiting the gift of tissue and others wait for corneal donations. Each day, 18 people die because the organ they needed was not donated in time.

In the state of Texas, you can register as a donor in three ways:

Electronically via the Donate Life Texas website: www.donatelifetexas.org At any Texas Department of Public Safety Office when obtaining or renewing your driver's license

At any Texas Department of Motor. Vehicle office when renewing your vehicle registration.

The council approved new penalties for failure to adhere to the water restrictions. City employees and sheriff officers will be able to issue tickets when violations are seen. The ticket will be hung on the entry door of the resident or business. All penalties will be added to the water bill and failure to pay will result in the disconnection of water services. Before water service can be restored, all applicable fines and reconnection fees will have to be paid. The new fine schedule is: first offense, \$25.00 fine; second offense, \$250.00 fine; and third offense, \$1,000.00 fine.



Comptroller's Office Encourages Homeowners to Take Advantage of Homestead Exemptions

One of the easiest ways a homeowner can lower his or her property tax bill in 2014 is to file a homestead exemption. A homestead is generally the house and land used as the owner's principal residence on Jan. 1 of the tax year.

Homestead exemptions reduce the appraised value of your home and, as a result, lower your property taxes. To apply for an exemption on your residence homestead, contact the Floyd County Appraisal District.

Available homestead exemptions include:

School taxes: All homeowners may receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption for school taxes.
County taxes: If a county collects a special tax for farm-to-market roads or flood control, a homeowner may receive a \$3,000 homestead exemption for this tax.

• Age and disability exemptions: Individuals 65 or older or disabled as defined by law may qualify for a \$10,000 homestead exemption for school taxes, in addition to the \$15,000 exemption available to all homeowners. Also, any taxing unit may offer a local optional exemption of at least \$3,000 for taxpayers age 65 or older and/or disabled. Older or disabled homeowners do not need to own their homes on Jan. 1 to qualify for the \$10,000 homestead exemption. They qualify as soon as they turn 65 or become disabled.

 Taxing units may offer a local option exemption based on a percentage of a home's appraised value. Any taxing unit can exempt up to 20 percent of the value of each qualified homestead. No matter what percentage of value the taxing unit adopts, the dollar value of the exemption must be at least \$5,000.

 Partial disabled veteran exemptions: Texas law provides partial exemptions for any property owned by veterans who are disabled, spouses and survivors of deceased disabled veterans. This includes homesteads donated to disabled veterans by charitable organizations at no cost to the disabled veterans. The amount of exemption is determined according to the percentage of serviceconnected disability.

• 100 Percent Residence Homestead Exemption for Disabled Veterans: A disabled veteran who receives from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (1) 100 percent disability compensation due to a service-connected disability; and (2) a rating of 100 percent disabled or of individual unemployability is entitled to an exemption from taxation of the total appraised value of the veteran's residence homestead. Surviving spouses are also eligible upon the veteran's death with certain restrictions. The residence homestead application must be filed if this exemption is claimed.

 Surviving Spouses of Members of the U.S. Armed Services Killed in Action: The surviving spouse of a member of the U.S. armed services who is killed in action is allowed a total (100 percent) property tax exemption on his or her residence homestead if the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the armed services member.




