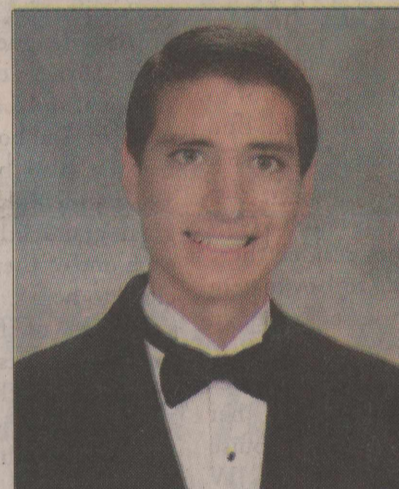
Kameron Hunt, son of Rodney

and Sharon Hunt, is the Salutatorian for Lockney High School's class of 2014.

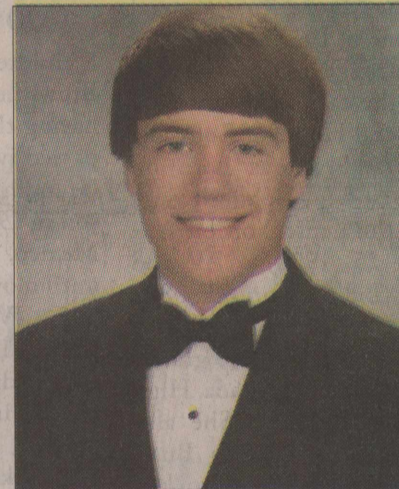

As a junior, Hunt was selected as first team All-District Middle Infielder in baseball, All-Region Band, third place individual and first place team in number sense at the

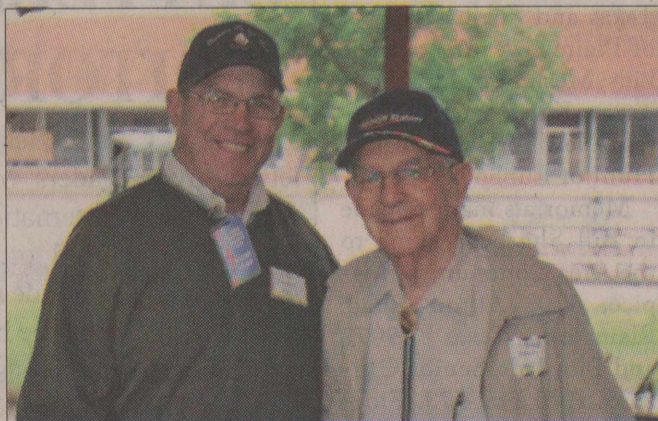

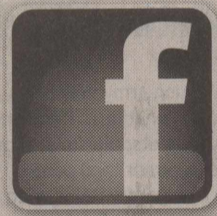

## The Paperboy What is the prognosis, doctor?

If your town were a patient and in the clinic for a checkup, what would the prognosis be? Would the doc say you had 50 years left as a viable community? How about 20? 10?

Yesterday I drove through Carey, Texas. Carey won a state championship (before classifications) in basketball in the 1930s. Today, there is a viable church, some houses, and an old gymnasium that housed that great basketball team.

Carey sounds like a lot of communities we know about doesn't it?

Most adults I know have jobs. The vast majority of them have normal routines where they come in at 8 or 9 a.m. and leave at 5 p.m. The rest of the day is spent doing chores, living on children, watching TV, surfing the web or any number of things Americans do.

Some of us are crazy enough to risk it and own a business. We employ people and depend on people to do their best. Many times, we end up doing too much ourselves, which takes us out of a standard routine.

When you own your own business, you are also subjected to criticism. Even haters.

There is a false notion in this country that just because your name is on something, you're rich. Well that may be the case for a few, but ask your neighbor who owns a business just how rich they've gotten since the drought started in 2011.

Yes, those in the oil and gas industry have done well. Those in the agriculture sector have done poorly. When ag-based communities are in droughts, people hurt and businesses close.

Back to the doctor and the town. What would a doctor say about your town?

We'd all like to think that the prognosis is great and the town will be around for 100 more years. Most of the time, that's just not the case.

The rains over this past week have restored some hope for the immediate future. Sure we can use more, but we take the rain, give thanks and don't look back.

None of us knows what the future holds, but we do know there is no future without a longterm solution to water. It doesn't matter if it's Wichita Falls, Lubbock, Lockney or Hollis, Okla. Without water, you can't have a town. There's a lot of mayors and county judges who probably have sore knees from praying for rain.

So this week, the prognosis is better than it was early last week. The doctor just left the room and we were told we're not done yet. That we still have a chance.

Now, with some extra spring in our step and a clearer head, it's time to roll up our sleeves and get busy. Let's do the hard things that will make our communities even more viable. Let's think outside of the box and do the impossible.

It's time that residents reengage with their communities and improve them. Let's show the haters what can be done when people are ready to fight. Let's show them that side of us that makes us special.

Drought, recession, discourse ... we can overcome these things and be stronger and better. Let's be defined by how tough and resilient we are. We can take the opportunity to show our youth what it takes to be mentally tough and set an example before them of how to give our towns long-term viability.

The way I see it, it's now or never. It's time to take pride in our communities and let our best shine.

Those traveling the greatest distance were Brian and Jaci Clark and their children, Erin, Matthew and Andrew who traveled 594 miles from Colorado, to see Jaci's grandmother, Oleta Wilson, named Pioneer Woman. Brown was also name Oldest Man in attendance at 93 and Ruby Gooch was the Oldest Woman in attendance at 96.

Following the recognition of the honored attendees, Wylie Chaney and the East Street Band provided entertainment for the few that were in attendance as Laura Turner shuttled people to Oden's Chevrolet to eat lunch in a covered ATV.

Only four food vendors stayed open and thanks to Oden's Chevrolet, the Danny's Fins and Hens catered luncheon was held under the truck lot shed.

After lunch, the clouds broke and the sun came out just in time for the parade. Even the cattle at Cow Pattie Bingo seemed happy with the rain and made three people very happy. Scott Taylor won the \$500 prize, Neta Marble won the \$300 prize and Johnny Nichols won the \$200 prize.

### 2014 PIONEER WOMAN: Oleta Wilson

Our 2014 Pioneer Woman of the year is 95 year old, Oleta Wilson.

Wilson came to Floyd County before she was a teenager. She attended a Floyd County school and participated in many school activities and sports. She had always lived in a small town atmosphere and did not know much about the hardships of rural life and having to make do with what you had in your pantry or cellar.

She married the love of her life at an early age, during the depression years.

The newlyweds received fifteen dozen "Brown Leghorn Fertile Chicken Eggs" for a wedding gift.

Our Pioneer Woman learned how to fill the incubator with eggs and how to turn each egg to a different position twice a day so the eggs would hatch properly. Selling eggs and cream was a way the young couple could have a little extra money for needed staple grocery items.

The bride had so many things to learn, but her mother-in-law lived nearby and she and the bridegroom were great teachers for the young wife. This lady learned the art of quilting and piecing quilt tops. She has made and given many quilts to friends and family members through the years.

A practical lesson that she learned early in her married life was that you can provide a way for baby ducks to get into a tub of water to swim, but you must also provide a way for them to get out of that tub of water. (All the baby ducks drowned.) She also learned you don't take the lid off of a 55 gallon barrel of chicken feed and let the chickens feed themselves. (The chickens flew into the barrel of feed and smothered themselves to death.)

As a young mother, she took her first child to the barber shop for a haircut. The child was about a year old and that

barber charged 35 cents for the haircut, the same price as an adult's haircut. She could hardly believe this.

Since she was and still is a very talented lady, she purchased barber instruments and did most of the future hair cutting for the family. She never had any training in that field, but she is a wonderful hairdresser. At her present age, she still does her own hair, when she wants to do it, and it always looks great, maybe a little wind-blown on a windy West Texas day.

To our Pioneer Woman and her husband, three children were born. The family was a farming family and everyone did their share of work. You talk about cooking, this lady could prepare a banquet of food from scratch and she has never used measuring spoons or measuring cups. She prepared meals and took them to the field to feed the hired men working on their "threshing crews" when they were doing custom harvesting to get extra income, or just harvesting their own crops. Even today, this lady enjoys baking and taking pies or cookies to her friends and neighbors.

She always had a garden

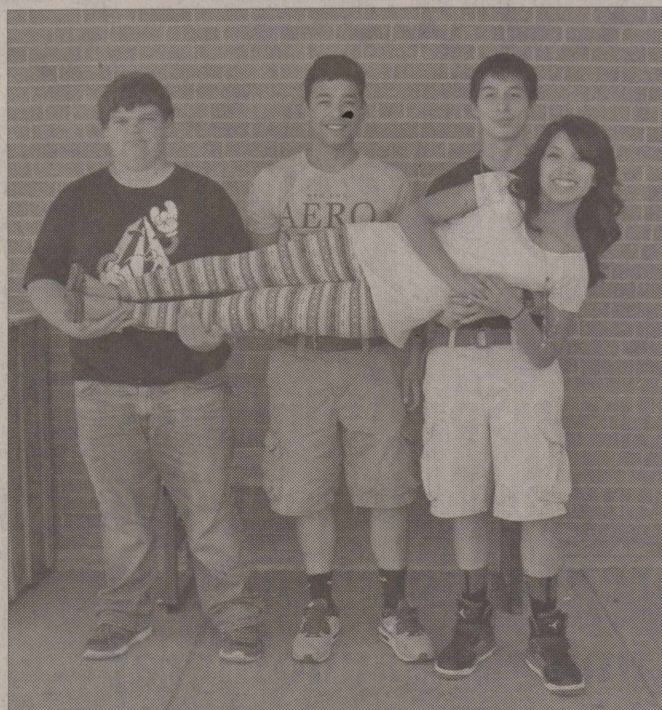

## SPC Reese Center to offer two CNA classes in June

REESE CENTER – South Plains College will offer two courses in Certified Nurse Aide training at the Reese Center campus.

The first class, June 16 through July 7, will meet on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturday from 7:30 a.m. to 12:10 p.m. in Building Two Room 206. Janet Copeland is the instructor.

The second class, June 23 through July 24, will meet Mondays through Thursdays from 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. in Building Two Room 206. Mary Frances Berry will be the instructor.

The cost of the course is \$300 for tuition and fees. Participants can earn 60 hours or 6.0 Continuing Education Units. The textbook will be "Nursing Assistants A Basic Study Guide 10th Edition. A maximum of 10 students will be accepted.

Students learn the necessary skills to work in long-term care, home-health, or hospital environments. A method of instruction providing detailed education, training and work-based experience, and direct patient/client care, generally at a clinical site. Specific detailed learning objectives are developed for each course by the faculty. On-site clinical instruction, supervision, evaluation and placement are the responsibility of the college faculty. Clinical experiences are unpaid external learning experiences.

Upon completion of the 60 hours of classroom and 40 hours of clinicals, each student will be required to take the State of Texas Certified Nurse Aide Competency Examination with NACES. Students now will submit their own applications and testing fees directly to NACES after completion of the class.

On-site registrations will not be accepted for this course. Students must pre-register and

provide proof of immunizations which includes Hepatitis B Series, 2-MMRs since 1981, Tetanus no older than 8 years, Varicella shot or proof of illness, and have a current negative TB test no older than 6 months prior to the first day of class. A flu shot will be required of all students enrolled between Oct. 1 and March 31. Valid state issued photo identification and social security card prior to enrollment (names must match on both documents and not expire before the end of class) also will be required.

Students will not be allowed to register or pay for this class without all requirements being met. Criminal background checks will be performed for all students. CPR certification is required and it is not included in tuition fees. Other supplies not included in the tuition and fees are blood-pressure cuff and stethoscope. Criminal Background checks will be performed on all students. No refunds will be given for criminal background checks.

The Certified Nurse Aide Clinical is a health-related work-based learning experience that enables the student to apply specialized occupational theory, skills, and concepts. Direct supervision is provided by the clinical professional. This course is required for all students taking the Certified Nurse Aide class.

The cost of the course is \$200 for tuition and fees. Participants can earn 40 hours or 4.0 Continuing Education Units. The clinicals will be taught off campus. For the first class with Copeland, clinicals will be offered from 6:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Tuesdays through Saturdays from June 26 through July 9. For the second class with Berry, clinicals will be announced.

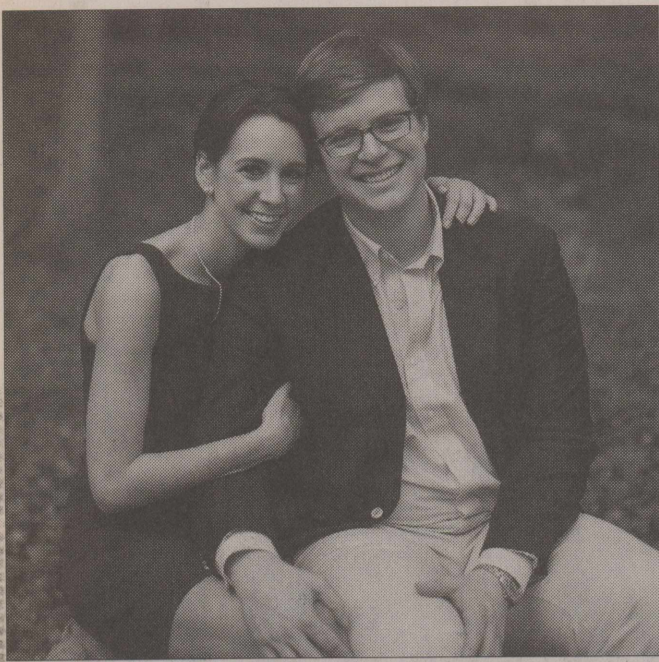

Hannah Victoria Smith is the 2014 Valedictorian from Plainview Christian Academy and graduated with honors.

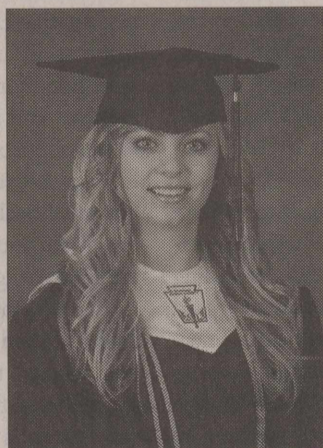
Hannah is the daughter of Kyle & Shelly Smith.

WARE FAMILY

W. P. (WILLIE) AND  
GRACE WARE

Willie and Grace Ware settled in north-east Floyd County east of the Cedar Hill Community after their marriage in Floydada, September 3, 1924. The ceremony was performed by J. Pat Horton, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Willie came to Floyd County horseback in 1921. He was known as Will or Bill, but family called him Willie. He passed away, June 13, 1969. Grace came to Floyd County in 1923 with her parents, W. R. And Rosa Miller Beard/ She passed away December 12, 1965.

Willie was the son of John Alien and Mollie Gibson Ware. Willie's father, John Allen, was the son of William Bateman and Martha Ann Hamilton Ware, the eldest son of William Bateman's 22 children.

John Allen Ware was engaged in farming in Brown County, Texas where Willie and a twin sister were born, July 9, 1883. The sister did not survive birth. By the time Willie was two years old, he and his older brother, Carl, had lost both parents and were living with separate uncles.

Willie grew up in Scurry County where he attended school in Snyder. He left home when he was 13 and did not see any of his family for several years. He worked as a cowboy on various ranches in Kent, Scurry and surrounding West Texas counties. He lived in Briscoe County for a number of years before moving to Floyd County in 1921. In Briscoe County he owned a ranch on the Little Red. He was married and had two children, Oliver and Ernestine. Ernestine died during a flu epidemic,

February 17, 1919, at the age often. Oliver lives at Quitaque, Briscoe County, Texas.

Grace Beard Ware was the daughter of William Franklin And Rosa Miller Beard. The Beard family came to Floyd County from Anniston, Callhoun County, Alabama by the way of Hall and Hale Counties, Texas. Grace was born July 26, 1900 in Anniston, Alabama. She attended schools in Hall in Hale counties. She went to Lipperts Business School and worked at the Western Union in Plainview.

Early in their marriage Willie and Grace purchased land on the edge of the Caprock which they developed into a cow-calf operation with some farming.

Willie and Grace were the parents of four children; Billy Glenn, Wayne Raz, Little Joe and June Elizabeth. Bill died September 3, 1964. Little Joe died shortly after birth, September 17, 1929. Raz continues to live on the home place in the Cedar Hill Community and June lives at Hart, Texas.

June started to school in Plainview, went to school at Floydada and graduated from Lockney High School. She attended Texas Tech University and West Texas State University where she majored in art and minored in English. She also attended Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona, and John Robert Powers Modeling School. After graduating from W. T. S. U., June taught school in the elementary grades in Dimmitt, Dalhart and Hart, Texas.

In 1963, June married De Wayne Brown of Dimmitt, Texas, son of Bernard and Ruth Aven Brown. June and De Wayne live in Hart and are both active in church and civic affairs.

June is a member of the school board of which she is secretary, and Beta Sigma Phi sorority in which she has served as president. In 1968, June was featured in Outstanding Young Women of America. De Wayne is a graduate of Texas Tech University with a degree in finance. He is engaged in farming, associated with Farmers Grain Company in Hart, and active in the grain business on the state and national level. Presently, he is a director of the National and the Texas Grain and Feed Association. He has served as president of the Panhandle Grain and Feed Association. They are both active in the First Baptist Church, where De Wayne has serves as treasurer and June teaches a Sunday School class. They are the parents of two sons; Ware and Blair.

Willie was a young man at the turn of the century. He grew up on the frontier, an orphan making his own way from the age of 13. As well as working on various ranches and developing his own operation, he was involved in trail drives, was an accomplished left-handed roper who knew and owned good horses. He was a typical cowman, respected for his integrity. He was strong-willed, always ready to defend the right. The word of a cattleman is his bond. This is the pioneer ethic Willie Ware lived by. As an example, a close race for district attorney developed between John Stapelton and Dick Stovall. Dick Stovall asked Willie to vote for him. Willie said that he would. Later, John Stapelton saw Willie and asked for his vote. Willie said "John, I am sorry I have already told Dick I would vote for him, but I will buy you a hat."

John said, "I don't need a hat, I just want your vote."

To which Willie replied "John I have given my word to Dick."

After the election which John won, Willie appeared in John Stapelton's office with a hat. Willie had given his word. (This story was told to Raz by John after Willie's death, as an illustration of his integrity).

Willie took great pride in his children. He, however, required of the boys. Bill and Raz, long hours of hard work, instilling in them the values and qualities he esteemed. This was no more than he required of himself. June, or rather Junie, was her dad's special little girl. She often went with her dad riding her horse, Texas, which Raz and Bill teasingly called Old Blue. If June and Texas did not keep the pace Willie expected, he would give the horse a spat which hastened the trip. A delightful part of the trips was the sack lunch which included biscuits with butter and sugar.

Grace had a quiet, warm, dignified manner. She was very intelligent, and avid reader, well informed on current events. She was an excellent cook, who was accustomed to preparing meals for hired help, branding and harvest crews, as well as for her family. In the frontier tradition, anyone who came by was invited to eat. The nearby breaks are dotted with plum thickets. Grace knew where the best plums were to be found which she made into jelly. This jelly she served with fluffy biscuits. Also, fortunate visitors received a jar of her special jelly. She made a wonderful potato soup; it was almost worth being sick to have her bring a piping hot bowl. She was a good mother and a patient wife. She enjoyed, most of all, her grandchildren and it was great delight for them to go to "Ma's".

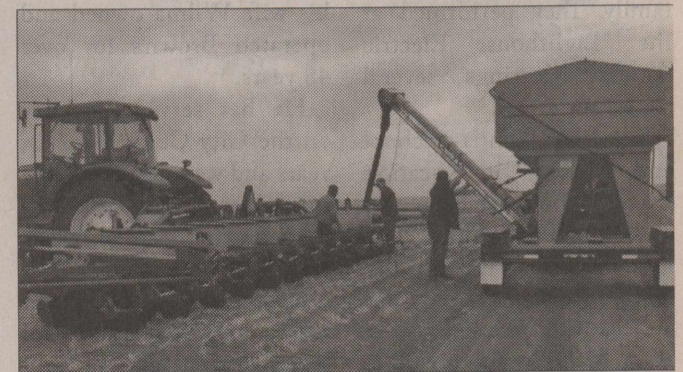

**COLLEGE STATION** — Texas beef producers can soon vote in the upcoming Texas Beef Checkoff Referendum June 2-6.

Voting will occur at all Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices during regular business hours, said Dr. Susan Ballabina, AgriLife Extension associate director for program development at College Station. Ballabina said the statewide election is being conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture in accordance with provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code.

"If passed, the producer managed program would be financed through a refundable \$1 per head assessment at each point of sale," Ballabina said.

"The money would be used for promotion, marketing, re-

search and educational efforts of beef and beef products in Texas, the U.S. and/or internationally. Funding decisions would be made by the Beef Promotion and Research Council of Texas whose members would be appointed by the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture from nominees submitted by the Texas Beef Council."

Ballabina said eligible producers can vote at any AgriLife Extension office regardless of where they live or where their cattle are located. Producers may vote as individuals or as a legal business entity. Youth younger than 16 years old must have a parent or guardian co-sign their ballot. Persons unable to access an AgriLife Extension office during the voting period can request a mail-in ballot from the Texas Department of Agriculture between May 19 and June 2.

If passed, Ballabina made the following points concerning the checkoff:

- Assessment collection would begin Oct. 1.
- A producer who has paid an assessment to the Texas Beef Checkoff may obtain a refund of the amount paid by filing an application for refund with the Beef Promotion and Research Council of Texas within 60 days after the date of payment.
- The Texas Beef Checkoff program differs from the current U.S. Beef Checkoff in two ways, though the Texas program may complement and extend the U.S. Beef Checkoff efforts. First, the U.S. program requires half the revenue be paid to the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board, but all the Texas Beef Checkoff assessment would be managed by the Beef Promotion and Research Council of Texas. The second difference is the Texas Beef Checkoff assessment is refundable.
- Individuals are considered "non-producers" and are exempt from the proposed assessment if they own cattle for less than 10 days or serve as a dealer or order buyer in the sales transaction. Non-producers are also ineligible to vote in the referendum.

## USDA Seeks Comments to Amend Soybean Request for Referendum Procedures and Announces Dates of the Soybean Request for Referendum

WASHINGTON, April 23, 2014 — The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is seeking comments on proposed amendments to procedures for soybean producers to request a referendum on the Soybean Promotion and Research Order as authorized under the Soybean Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Act. USDA also announces the Request for Referendum will be held May 5, 2014, through May 30, 2014, in county USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices.

The Act requires that a request for referendum be held every five years following the initial referendum. The previous request for referendum was held in 2009. Only eligible soybean producers wishing to request a referendum on the Order participate. Those producers who do not want a referendum on the Order would not participate. Participating in the request of referendum is voluntary. Eligible producers participating in the request for referendum must certify that they or the entity they are authorized to represent paid an assessment at some time during January 1, 2012, through December 31, 2013. USDA would conduct a referendum only if at least 10 percent of all eligible soybean producers, no more than one-fifth of which may be soybean producers in any one state, requested a referendum.

This action would amend the procedures to request a referendum by removing the specific number of producers eligible to request a referendum. The number of producers eligible to request a referendum would be replaced with language that allows the Secretary of Agriculture to up-

date this number based on information provided by FSA. For the purposes of the 2014 Soybean Request for Referendum, the number of eligible soybean producers identified through FSA soybean acreage reports for crop years 2011 and 2012 is 569,998. Additionally, this rule would replace specific USDA and FSA Web site and office addresses with more flexible language.

The 70-member United Soybean Board, authorized by the Act, administers a coordinated soybean promotion and research program designed to expand uses of soybeans and soybean products in domestic and foreign markets.

The proposed amendments to procedures were published in the March 4, 2014, Federal Register. **2014 PIONEER COUPLE:** Norman and Edith Muncy

The Pioneer Couple of the year for 2014 is Norman and Edith Muncy.

Exactly eighty years ago babies were born to two Floyd County pioneer families, children inheriting blessings, a work ethic and expectations acquired from the endeavors, resolve and discipline of their own parents and ancestors. Each grew up surrounded by love, standards and commitment modeled on a daily basis for what would build successful, productive lives. These two eventually fell in love, married and never veered from the course set those years ago.

Floyd County has always been their home, a land and community neither ever considered leaving, but choosing instead to follow their own path, one also forged of resilience, purpose and resolve. Their lives here have been their destiny and promise, a past filled with no regrets, God's grace and their thanksgiving.

The female counterpart of this pioneer couple was born to Robert Aaron Garrett and Kitty May Montague Garrett on May 15, 1934 in Floydada, the baby of three girls. She graduated from Floydada High School

where she was a twirler for two years and drum majorette for two years for the Whirlwind Band. She attended college at West Texas State University and twirled for the Buffalo Band for two years before transferring to Texas Tech University. She served as deputy county clerk for Floyd County in the early 1950's.

The Pioneer Couple's male honoree was born to Robert Buckner Muncy and Allie Mae Crawford Muncy on December 27, 1934 at Muncy, Texas, a rural community established by his grandfather, Rev. R.E.L. Muncy in the late 1800's. He competed in, and was active in all sports, graduating, too, from Floydada High School. He immediately went into the grain elevator business at Muncy, farming and ranching. Ranching was his first love, the pursuit of a life entrenched in western and cowboy tradition. Cattle and horses, the land and practices customarily associated with ranching have been his source of joy and pride. In 2008, he was named Resident Conservation Rancher, Region I, by the Texas Conservation Award Program.

## Wayland sets ground breaking for Jimmy Dean Museum

PLAINVIEW - Wayland Baptist University and the Museum of the Llano Estacado will hold a ground-breaking ceremony on Tuesday, June 24 at 2 p.m., signaling the start of construction on the Jimmy Dean Museum addition.

Donna Dean Stevens will be in attendance for the special event and the public is invited and encouraged to attend.

The approximately \$5 million project has been in the plans for a couple of years, with Lavin Architects in Amarillo designing the building. The museum will house memorabilia from Jimmy Dean's personal collection. The museum will depict Jimmy's life from its humble beginnings in Seth Ward, on the northeast side of Plainview, to his rise to fame as an entertainer and his success as a businessman.

The Deans donated \$1 million to Wayland in 2008, the largest cash gift in Wayland's history. After his death in 2010, Donna, who lives in Varina, Va., made plans to build a museum in his honor. She eventually decided to place it in Jimmy's hometown of Plainview.

"We are so excited to break ground on this project," said Rodney Watson, director of the museum. "This will be a fitting memorial for Jimmy and a great attraction to the community."

Watson said that along with personal memorabilia, the museum will contain audio visual elements that will enable patrons to view and listen to Jimmy in his roles as singer, entertainer, actor and sausage pitch man.

Dean's personal collection of memorabilia is currently in storage, awaiting the completion of construction on the project. A bronze statue of Jimmy Dean will welcome visitors to the museum. The bronze was sculpted by Paul DiPasquale and furnished by Hillshire Brands, the parent company of Jimmy Dean Sausage.

The sculpture is scheduled to arrive in Plainview next week and will be housed in Jimmy Dean Hall until completion of the museum addition. A reception and public viewing of the bronze will be held in Jimmy Dean Hall immediately following the ground breaking. The Jimmy Dean Museum is scheduled to be completed in time to celebrate its grand opening on Jimmy's birthday in August of 2015.
