The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon's annual football contest begins today and will last for the next 11 weeks.



First Wind: Floyd County wind farm close to \$300 million dollar project; 100 to 200 jobs possible during construction phase

First Wind, a Massachusetts-based wind energy company, is currently pursuing a 100-turbine wind farm, a 200-megawatt project with the capacity to expand in Floyd County, according to First Wind's director of development Ben Fairbanks. Fairbanks was in Floydada last week and met with Floydada economic development director Sean Overeynder and participated in an interview with the Hesperian-Beacon to share First Wind's plans with the community.

"Right now we're in the financing process," Fairbanks said,. "There's no guarantee that we'll get through it

successfully. However, we do have 17 wind farms. Our goal is to finance the [Floyd County] project in September."

Local landowners may remember Fairbanks from an informational meeting First Wind hosted at the Unity Center in early July after the company bought out Westerly Winds' interest in the South Plains, Texas, project.

"During the construction phase," Fairbanks said, "we anticipate 100 to 200 jobs."

He noted that road and substation work will be done in December

Floyd County Historical Museum "Memories, 1979"

G.C. APPLEWHITE

Goree Calvin Applewhite came up the Caprock on his birthday January 22, 1903 when he was six years old. He was on his way with his parents to make his home in Floyd County. He celebrated his 81st birthday this year, 1977. He still lives in the Lone Star Community on the place to which his father brought his family in 1903.

His wife, Felicia Wallace Applewhite, came to Briscoe County at the age of two years. Her parents, brothers and sister came in two covered wagons, bringing stock with them. In 1918, they moved to Canyon where Felicia completed high school and became employed as a teacher in the Lone Star Community one-half mile from the home of Goree. At the close of the school year. May 7, they were married in Plainview.

For the next few years, they were in school in winter and on the farm in summer to harvest wheat.

Goree became a licensed preacher in services at Lone Star Baptist Church and was ordained at the Seventh and James Baptist Church in Waco.

In the meantime he preached at various churches. He has preached 57 years and has served as pastor of the rural churches of Antelope Flat, Love, Cedar Hill, Valley View and Hart.

He has his B. A. Degree from Wayland College and has taught in the public schools of Texas for 24 years. He was maintenance instructor, teaching flight engineers in Amarillo Air Force Base for three years.

Felicia, his wife, has a B. A. Degree from Baylor University, and M. A. Degree from West Texas State University and a Library Science Certificate from Texas Woman's College in Denton. She has taught in public schools and Wayland College altogether thirty-five years.

As a student in Baylor, she won a 100 dollar award for a three-act play she wrote for the Graham Paige Motor Company.

She wrote and directed a variety show at Warm Springs, Georgia for a dinner given in President Roosevelt's honor for which he complimented her.

She recently sold a magazine article titles "I Remember F. D. R. At Warm Springs," to Mature Living Magazine.

She writes a feature a week for The Lockney Beacon.

Their Calvin Wallace son, Applewhite was born March 3,1924 in Stillwater .Oklahoma. He completed grade school work in Lone Star rural school. His high school work was done in Canyon and Plainview. He attended Wayland College until he became member of United States Armed Service on February 22, 1943.

He was then in Louisiana 11 months in a special training detachment. He landed with the Normandy Invasion Forces for which he was given five battle stars.

His last theater assignment took his troop to Czechoslovakia. At he close of the war, he had enough service points to be discharged without further armed services duty.

Calvin is president and chairman of the board of directors for Projects Specialists Inc. of the Houston and Pasadena area. The company is in specialized engineering and construction for instrumentalization

and control with vibration analysis and field balancing, of heavy rotation equipment.

He has had twenty-six years Petro-Chemical in experience Industry. Projects Specialists, Inc. was organized ten years ago. The company now employs 100 employees of varying petrochemical qualifications.

Calvin and Pat Sutton were married when they were students at West Texas State University. Their home is in Pasadena. With Pat, the home comes first. Outside the home, she has taught a College and Career Sunday School Class and done other church work. She has also served as chairman of civic and church groups.

County commission approve tax rate increase by 4 to 1 vote

Floyd County commissioners met Monday, Aug. 25 in a special meeting including public hearings on the 2014-15 Budget and raising tax rates for 2014-15.

Commissioner Nathan Johnson made the motion that the property tax rate be increased by the adoption of a tax rate of \$.0665. Linden Morris seconded the vote.

All four commissioners—Johnson, Morris, Mike Anderson, and Amado Morales— voted for the tax rate increase, and County Judge Penny Golightly voted against the measure.

The ratification of this vote should result in the amount of property taxes collected to be increased by \$186,274 over last year by the adoption of the \$0.665 per \$100

valuation with \$252,524 in tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll for the 2014-15 budget year.

The Appraisal District allows a discount for early payment of taxes as follows: three percent if taxes are paid in October 2014; two percent if taxes are paid in November 2014; and one percent if taxes are paid in December 2014.

other commission commissioners uananimously approved consolidating voting precincts 18 and 24; and 23 and 24B for the Special Election, and bonding for Jimmy Finley, Chief

The court also reviewed county clerk Ginger Morgan's presentation of preliminary bids on a new phone system and wireless internet service under consideration.

Floydada City Council discusses raising residential water, electrical rates

By Kay Ellington The Hesperian-Beacon

Jeff Johnston manager recommended that the city raise electric and water rates to offset the loss in ad valoreum taxes of almost \$20,000, cover the payments on the landfill track loader and provide city employees with a 3% cost of living raise in the monthly meeting Tuesday, Aug. 19.

Johnston noted that the average residence uses about 10,000 gallons of water during winter months and 26,000 gallons of water during the summer months, and he recommended that city raise water rates for residences inside the city \$2.50 per thousand and for residences outside the city \$2.75. Annual impact for residences would be approximately \$22.50 in the city and \$30 outside the city.

Electrical rates will also have to increase, according to Johnston. He anticipates that Xcel will raise the city's electrical rates by 5.50%, and the city manager recommended that the city pass that expense along as a residential electrical increase to 5.75%.

Councilmember Sam Green made the motion that the council cap water

and electric increases based on the recommendations. manager's Councilmember Gabriel de la Fuente seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The council then discussed tax rates for the upcoming year. Councilmember Green made the motion that tax rates stay the same for the upcoming year, and Councilmember Bettye King seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

City manager Johnston noted then that the council must have a public hearing/ budget workshop then to discuss tax rates. He recommended that the hearing later this month with a goal to have an approved budget by the September council

In other action the council voted unanimously not to accept Producers Coop proposal to be the city's sole vendor for gasoline. Several councilmembers expressed a concern that such action would result in the loss of electrical customers for the city from other gasoline vendors.

The council approved unanimously the procurement of professional services policy for state and federal programs.

Jackson, representing the Lockney Fire Department, discussed the need to flow some hydrants so they could flush debris out of them. Jackson said the Department understood the water crisis the City is facing but at the same time knew that if hydrants are plugged with debris, then they might not function in an emergency situation. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality requires that hydrants be flushed periodically. Jackson said they would work with the city and could possibly wait until outside watering slows down in the fall.

Jackson also reported that they had applied for another Forestry Department grant to get a new truck for the department. He said they were looking for grants that would help

them build a new station as they are overflowing with equipment and any equipment that has water storage has to be stored inside to prevent it from freezing during cold weather.

Councilman Shad Schlueter reported that the 13 blocks of streets all around the city had received seal coating district used 141,000 but reminded the other gallons and was charged council people that only streets with curbs and gutters could receive seal coating. He said they would continue to work on the pot hole situation around town as time and money allows.



approximately 50 feet south of County Road 352, inside Floyd County and just north of the Floyd-Crosby line. For some while following the collision, Highway 207 was closed to traffic, with TxDOT workers diverting southbound and northbound lanes to alternate routes.

DPS officials Schwertner was traveling at a high rate of speed when his 2006 Chevrolet Silverado hit the back of a 2011 Chevrolet Silverado driven by Nancy

Cooper, 49, of Matador. Officials say the impact caused Cooper's vehicle to travel into the southbound lane, causing a head-on collision with a 1996 Jeep Cherokee driven by George Wilke, 60, of Post. Both Schwertner and Wilke were pronounced dead at the scene by a Floyd County magistrate.

Suffering critical injuries was Robert Wilke, 48, also of Post, a passenger in the vehicle driven by Wilke. He was transported to University Medical Center in Lubbock along with Cooper, who also suffered serious injuries.

As of Thursday evening had upgraded Cooper and Robert Wilke's conditions to satisfactory.

A rosary was held for Schwertner Friday at St. Alice Catholic Church in Plainview. Memorial services were held Saturday morning at St. Alice and Saturday afternoon at First Baptist Church in Floydada.

According to a family member, Schwertner, 2014 salutatorian of Floydada High School, was enrolled at the University of Texas in Austin and already had completed a six-week summer course. He was traveling home to Floydada for a break before the start of the fall semester when the accident occurred.


through early January, and that turbines would come in the

Timing is critical. "Wind farms have to be operational by the end of 2015 to be compliant with the production tax credit," he said. "Turbines have to be turning by then."

First Wind aims to offer electricity commercially in October or November of 2015. Their energy will be sold on the Texas ERCOT (Electric Reliability Council of Texas) market; it is not specifically earmarked for any municipality at this point.

The longer-range vision for First Wind/South Plains, according to Fairbanks, is to have a 12,000-square-foot operations and maintenance building that would employ 15 people full-time.

As for what attracted First Wind to Floyd County, Fairbanks joked, "It's always a good sign for this kind of business if your school mascot is a Whirlwind." The real reasons, though, were the consistency of the wind, and the flatness



of the terrain which spares the windmills from turbulence.

"The ability to connect to the new CREZ [Competitive Renewable Energy Zone] lines, the interconnection to the White River substation, and the Golden Spread point of interconnection for the Elk-Antelope Complex were real advantages," he added. "Plus there were very few environmental issues."

First Wind uses Vesta V-100 turbines, featuring three rotors each the length of a football field. Parts for these turbines come from all over the U.S., but they are assembled in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and are trucked to Texas from there.

Looking to the future, Fairbanks noted the positive impacts that First Wind will have on Floyd County, including tax benefits for school and hospital districts. "It is a close to \$300 million wind farm," he said, "and we'll need ongoing services, such as gravel, caliche, washing turbines, washing plates, and of course, landowners will receive royalties."


As for the future of wind energy, he said, "Regardless of what happens at the federal level, in Texas there will always be a place for wind energy because of the build-out of the CREZ."


