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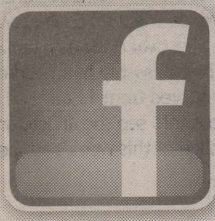

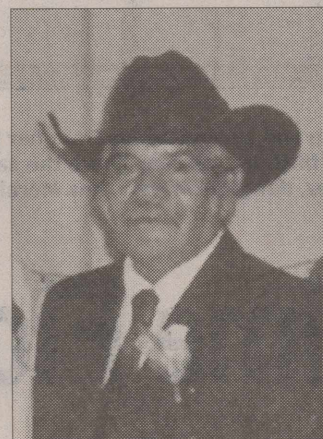

It's a powerful image (at least it was to me!), so I wonder why we're still plagued with such problems in our nation? Wouldn't knowing that if we spend all our money before the end of the month,

How's your relationship with God? The question really isn't, "Am I satisfied with God?" but it should be more like, "Is God satisfied with me?"

I wish I knew how to motivate us to do the right thing, right now. If you figure out how, let me know, will you?

BLAKE B. BARTON

Blake B. Barton (Bud) was born October 6, 1922, in the Barton Community in Motley Co. He attended White Star and Whiteflat schools and became a graduate of Flomot after he served 2 years and 8 months in the Navy. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bryson Barton of the Flomot Area. Mrs. Josephine (Jo) Barton, formerly Martin, died of a lengthy illness April 10, 1972. John Barton married again Jan. 14, 1974 to Ruble Cowart of Turkey, Texas. She is the rural area mail carrier. Bud is the only son of three children. He moved up to Floyd Co. to farm ten years before he met Mavis Clarke.

Mavis Clarke is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Clarke of Uttoxeter, England. Mavis was born October 28, 1922 in Uttoxeter. Her mother Emily Clarke, formerly Hunt, died of a lengthy illness July 3, 1946 and her father died of an injury to his leg, June 18, 1964.

Mavis came over from England by ship October 20, 1950. She traveled from New York to Bakersfield, California and lived with her sister. There she met Bud by letter correspondence for a year. July 21, 1954, he arrived to meet Mavis and there in the Methodist Church on Tuxton Ave. they married July 24, 1954.

They returned to Texas in August, 1954 to a two room house to continue farming. Their first winter with snow and wind and six degree below was a harsh one. The butane freezing up. Bud took another bottle that night to the south window and hooked it to the bedroom stove. With house just sitting on bricks, no rug, and blankets piled high it still was cold. That morning, Bud reached for his boots but they had frozen to the floor. Finally he knocked them loose.

They had three children, the first born, a son, Steve, July 30, 1955, in Matador hospital. Gradually building on to the house, their next two children were born also in Matador, Ann, August 9, 1956, and Christene, December 25, 1957.

Steve had just started school in Dougherty when in November 1961, they moved to a new house a mile from where they lived.

Ann and Christene started school in Dougherty through sixth grade. All three then went to Floydada Junior High for two years. Steve went to high school for four years. Ann three years, and Christene two years. Ann and Christene became graduates of Matador High.

After school Steve married Beverly Carver of Floydada, May 28, 1974, at the Floydada Baptist Church and now have two children. Shonda Sue, born January 29, 1975, and Bobby Bryon born July 10, 1977. Steve is employed at the Hale Co. Sand and Gravel and now living in Motley County.

Ann, after graduating, married Sidney Bruce McFall of Flomot, Texas, June 7, 1975 at the Methodist Church of Matador. They have one child, Rebecca Ann, born Dec. 16, 1977. Bruce found the Indian grave site on the Cogdell Ranch and it is now in the Floyd Co. Museum. He is now employed on the Lazy B ranch of Mollie Burleson.

Christene married Dan Jackson of Plainview, Texas October 6, 1977, by Judge Roy Smith of Matador. Dan is employed at Motley General Hospital as an assistance administrator and an LVN and now living in Matador.

Mr. and Mrs. Blake B. Barton have worked on their farm for 24 years now growing cotton, wheat, maize and raising a small herd of Angus cattle. He also custom harvests and does shop work for others.

Wit and Wisdom of Texas looks to show the readers the common sense and uncommon genius of many Texans from the past to the present. I hope you enjoy and delight in these comments.

"This country isn't bad. It's just worse. Worse the moment you set foot from the train, and then, after that, just worse and worse." - anonymous cameraman, in Big Bend to film U.S. Army pursuit of Mexican bandits in 1916

"The typical Texan is big and breezy, fond of strong language and strong drink.... Above all, Texans are lusty he-men." - Life magazine, 1939

"It was so dry once, the fish would crawl up out of the creek and hang around the back door, waiting for us to throw out some dishwater. Some years it got so bad out here we had to gather 'em all up and douse 'em with tick powder." - Warren Klein, Hill Country rancher

"Texas mystique has been created by the chemistry of the frontier in the crucible of history and forged into an enduring state of heart and mind." - T.R. Fehrenbach

There [in Big Bend] it lies in its gorgeous splendor and geological confusion, almost as if it fell from the hands of its Creator. It fascinates

every observer because it seems to be made of the scraps left over when the world was made, containing samples of rivers, deserts, blocks of sunken mountains, and tree clad peaks, dried up lakes, canyons, cuestas, vevas, playas, arroyos, volcanic refuse, and hot springs." - historian Walter Prescott Webb writing in The Dallas Morning News, 1943

"On the Plains, a scout was always glad to see a mesquite bush. In a dry climate - the climate natural to the mesquite - its seed seems to spring up only from the droppings of an animal. 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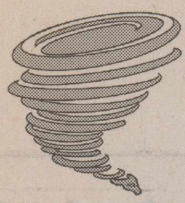

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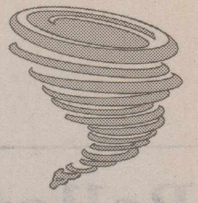

What it takes to become a Registered Nurse

There are several steps that go into becoming a Registered Nurse. The first and most important step in becoming a "RN" is to acquire the correct education. There are two paths that one can take, earning an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) or a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN). Obtaining an ADN typically requires only two years at a community or junior college, whereas a BSN typically requires 4 years at a college or university. Some say that RNs who are

ADN trained are considered technical-level nurses, and BSN-trained nurses are considered to be at a professional-level. Those with a BSN are more more eligible for better job opportunities than those with ADNs. Some programs are offered in cooperation with hospitals.

After receiving the necessary education, one must pass the licensing exam to actually become a registered nurse. The option exists to reach a higher-level in the nursing administration by receiving advanced practice or even higher-level nursing education, such as a Master of Science in Nursing (MSN).

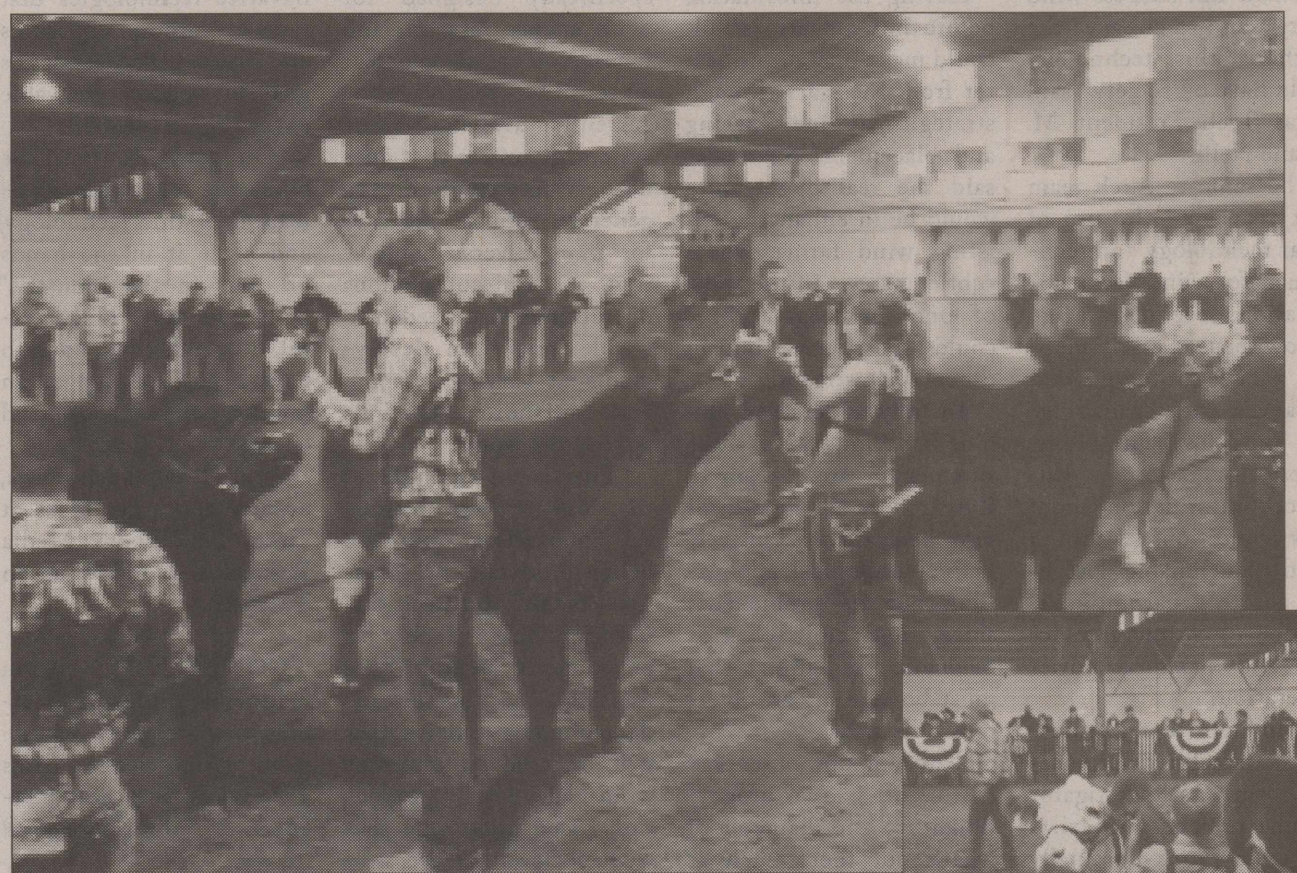

"Asking the colleges about my career and what kind of plan would be good for me was very beneficial towards how I want to start my college career," said senior Marcos Olvera.

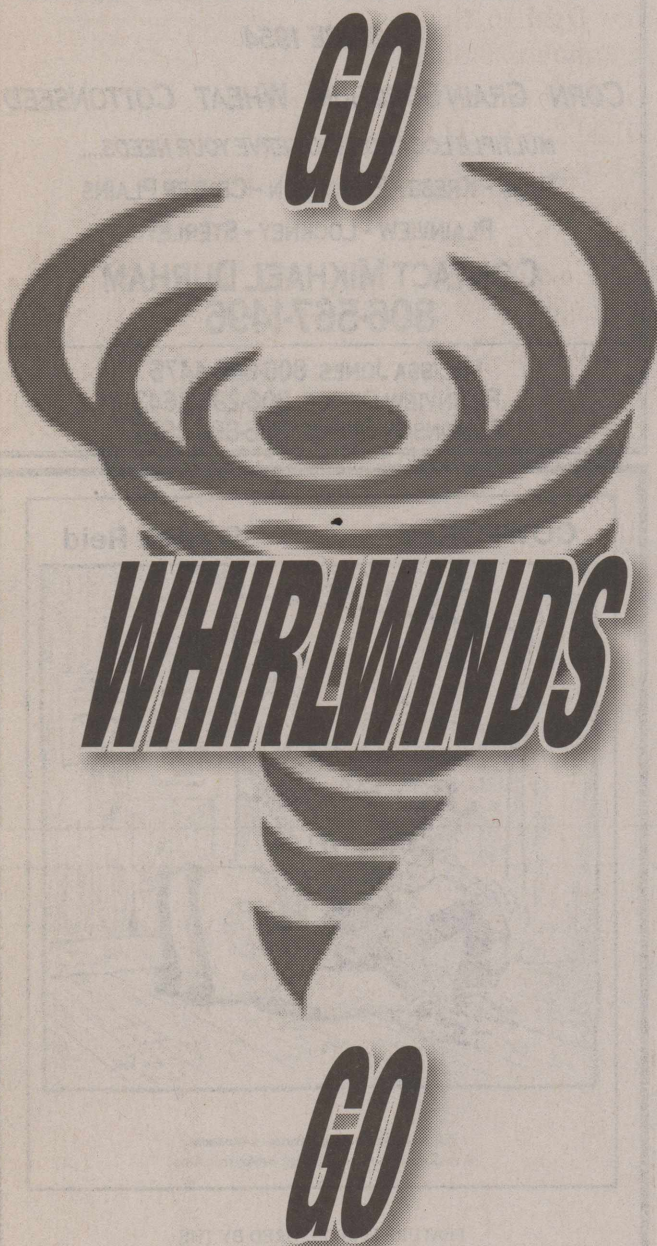

Smith, 110th Judicial District, District Judge; Marty Lueke, County Judge, Patty Davenport, District Clerk, Ginger Morgan, County Clerk, Lori Morales, County Treasurer, Lindan Morris, Precinct No. 2 and Amado Morales, Precinct No. 4.

In the High Plains Underground Water District board race, Jeff Sammann and Ronnie Hopper are vying for the district's Precinct 5 seat. There are certain areas in Floyd County's Precincts 9 and 23 not in the boundaries of the water board's Precinct 5 seat, and this race will not appear on those ballots.

Early Voting for the November 4, 2014

General Election, will be held October 20, 2014 – October 31, 2014, in the Courthouse Annex Community Room, Floydada, and the First United Methodist Church, Lockney. Voting hours are 8:30 a.m. – 5:30 p.m. weekdays. Please bring your current Identification for voting.

Election Day, November 4, 2014, there will be two Vote Center locations, where all Precincts vote. The Courthouse Annex Community Room will be the Polling Place in Floydada, and the First United Methodist Church in Lockney will be the other.

If you are 65 years old by November 4, 2014, or you are disabled, you may apply for an Application for Ballot By Mail. (ABBM) Contact the Floyd County Clerk's office at 983-4900 and an application for this election will be sent to you. After January 1, 2015, new Annual ABBMs will be sent to all who have active applications as of December 31, 2014.

Livestock Producers Reminded to Enroll in Livestock Forage Disaster Program

Since late 2011, livestock producers have endured weather disasters such as historic droughts, blizzards, floods and fires, awaiting Congressional enactment of a farm bill so that disaster assistance programs could resume.

When the Agricultural Act of 2014, also known as the Farm Bill, was enacted into law this February, U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack ensured that disaster programs were restarted in sixty days, by April 15, nearly eighty percent faster than our predecessors.

Five months later, USDA Farm Service Agency has approved more than 250,000 applications seeking assistance, exceeding Congressional estimates, and more applications are expected. To address demand, FSA has reassigned field employees, with many working overtime and weekends, so that livestock

producers get the help they need and deserve. Agriculture doesn't stand still, and neither does USDA.

If you've suffered livestock forage or feed grazing losses in 2011, 2012, 2013 or 2014, the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) may offer help. For ranchers who have not contacted FSA by September 30, 2014, the Budget Control Act of 2011 passed by Congress requires USDA to reduce LFP payments by 7.3 percent beginning October 1, the start of the federal fiscal year.

If you've already registered with your FSA office for LFP assistance, or have an appointment scheduled, you are not subject to the payment reduction. If you haven't yet contacted your local FSA office, please register, request an appointment, or begin an LFP application with your county FSA office by

September 30, 2014. You can also register online at www.fsa.usda.gov/disaster-register.

The Livestock Forage Disaster Program compensates for grazing losses due to drought or fire. Eligible livestock includes alpacas, beef cattle, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep or swine that have been or would have been grazing the eligible grazing land or pastureland.

If you are seeking help from other programs like the Livestock Indemnity Program, the Tree Assistance Program, or the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP), you'll need to complete your full application before September 30, 2014. Contact your local FSA office for more information or visit www.fsa.usda.gov.

Energy Department Awards Wind Researchers \$1.4 Million for Innovative Project

Texas Tech University researchers will receive \$1.4 million to develop a new radar prototype that will provide better measurements of the complex flow conditions in wind plants.

"This project is a testament to our researchers' commitment to better understand and harness wind energy, and to enhance the methods this technology could have on society," said Texas Tech President M. Duane Nellis.

The same research team that pioneered the use of radar technology and techniques for wind farm applications several years ago is now focused on developing a new prototype that enhances data availability, and provides semi-autonomous operation. Enhanced information about flow conditions within a wind plant enables proactive controls that minimize turbine-to-turbine interaction and maximize power generation.

John Schroeder, a professor of atmospheric sciences and principal investigator for the project, said existing wind farms nominally are underperforming relative to expectations.

"Wind farms are not putting out as much power as we would expect from them," Schroeder said. "With a better understanding of how turbines interact with each other, we may be able to make small adjustments that could be worth millions of dollars."

Having the information before the wind farm is built could make operations better from the start through strategic turbine spacing and placement. Schroeder said the real opportunity would be in enhancing existing wind farms, where subtle changes in the wake of one upstream turbine could positively impact others downstream.

To fully understand turbine behavior, careful measurements are required. Existing radar platforms have been used extensively in meteorological applications but are problematic since they emit electromagnetic radiation that must bounce off an object to return data.

"The amount of energy that comes back is proportionate to the diameter of what's out there, such as rain, snow or even birds," Schroeder said. "In a wind

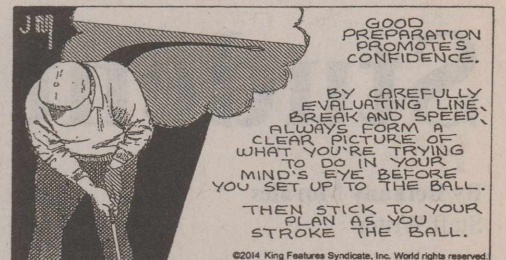
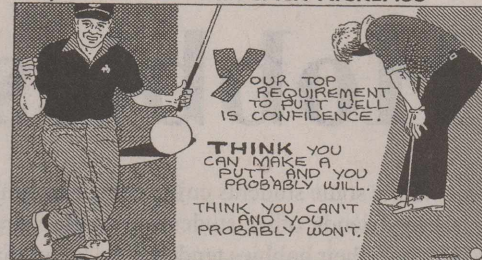
farm setting, there will be large towers and rotating blades contaminating the data. The challenge is in measuring the motion of the air while filtering out those influences."

The team will spend 18 months developing the new design that will be specifically designed for wind energy research and focused on enhancing clear air sensitivity relative to the currently available radar system. A system that does not rely on precipitation to generate returns provides for more diverse application. Semi-autonomous operation is also needed to enable long term deployments at varying onshore and offshore locations around the world.

"This is an example of the outstanding technical innovations that are being produced by Texas Tech today," said Robert V. Duncan, Texas Tech vice president of research. "It is exciting to see this new radar technology emerge, that will be used to optimize wind plant energy production based upon data that we have never had access to before now."

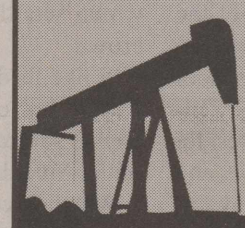

When it comes to entertaining an 8-year-old grandson, a buffalo stampede works pretty well, especially with thunder and lightning. Throw in an Indian raid and some colorful historical spirit guides projected on thin air for the ultimate package.

Spirit guides? They're the latest thing in museum guides - robust apparitions with voices and identities. Among the seven spirit guides at Frontier Texas!

as in Abilene is Pat Garrett, who tells how he shot Billy the Kid. Another is Cynthia Ann Parker. She's skinning a buffalo hide the whole time she talks about being Comanche. When you've got a hide to flesh, you don't quit working to talk. Those are big hides.

The guides speak from dark cave-like spaces. Tap a touch screen and they come alive. When they're through talking, they disappear on their own. Poof.

It's technology today's 8-year-olds take in stride, although grandson Cutter showed some hesitancy as he approached the abode of the first guide. When children exhibit caution, you've got their attention.

In other museum areas, Cutter and another youngster gravitated automatically to interactive computer screens to see images of spears, bows and arrows. The real items were creatively displayed before their very eyes. "Look, here's the real thing!" I wanted to say. Maybe I did say it. Cutter finally looked up to see the real stuff.

Be assured today's museum designers know

what they're doing. For youth, technology works best. Maybe it always has.

The museum I remember visiting when I was only 9 was a Stephen Foster museum in Florida.

INTERNET RESEARCH PAUSE. Yea! It's still there. White Springs is the place. Here's what else I learned:

Although Stephen Foster himself never set foot in the Sunshine State (maybe because he died young), his "Old Folks at Home" has been Florida's state song since 1935. Florida liked the way the song drew attention to the Suwannee River, even though Foster changed the name to Swanee to make it fit his melody. Who knew?

Anyway, back in 1956 my attention was drawn to dioramas behind glass, each based on a Foster song audible with the push of a button. Some stuff moved. People sitting on a porch rocked their rocking chairs and tapped their feet to "Old Folks at Home." Horses went around the track for "Camptown Races." Nothing moved in "Jeannie with the Light Brown Hair." Bummer. But overall, I was impressed. I played some songs twice.

I'd like to go back. If those dioramas are still in place, they themselves are history - outdated museum technology that probably wouldn't hold Cutter's attention more than a minute. But maybe the songs would catch his ear. He's probably never heard any of them. Foster's out of vogue.
