## Savings Bond Drive Opens Here

The annual Savings Bond drive opened today on the base with personnel urged to allot pay regularly to purchase bonds to "Strengthen America's Peace Power."

Maj. Frank Fleming, accounting and finance officer, is wing project officer and project officers have been named for each unit.

"U. S. Savings bonds have solved the saving problem for millions of Americans who could never save before," the major said. "They can do the same for every military man and civilian at Reese.

"Fiscal soundness of our federal government is every American's personal concern.

"The 1957 increase in interest rates on Savings bonds and the general pay raise for all federal personnel should create a favorable situation for all Americans to buy bonds regularly through payroll deduction."

President Eisenhower and many other officials have vigorously endorsed Savings bonds.

"The readiness of our people to invest their savings into bonds is one of the features that

## Vacancies Announced in 21 Areas For Study Under AFIT Program

Vacancies exist in 21 training fields for Fiscal Year 1960 in the Air Force Institute of Technology, the Reese education office has been advised.

Officers interested in these programs should request evaluation of their background without delay. Assistance will be given by the education office.

Most vacancies are in engineering, including aeronautical, architectural, civil, electrical, advanced installations, materials mechanical, molecular, and safety.

Study also is possible in mathematics, science, and engineering instructors, applied and mathematical statistics, biophysics, geodetic sciences, meteorology, advanced logistics, and Air Force academy instructor.

Training-with-industry is available in the fields of operational

space vehicles, nuclear reactor technology, nuclear shielding technology, instrumentation-guidance, and transportation.

The Extension Course institute also has announced 104 courses available to officers and airmen, covering many career fields.

## General Stresses Rights Under Law

Brig. Gen. Bertrand E. Johnson, ATC staff judge advocate, was speaker Wednesday night at observance of Law day by South Plains lawyers.

Introduced by Capt. John J. C. O'Shea, Reese staff judge advocate, he urged emphasis on the law as supreme, governing all equally, and protecting "individual rights we take for granted."

Formal opening of the new Reese Service Club building is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, with open house starting at 2 p.m.

All facilities of the club will be open to guests, including the game equipment room and airman's office, director's office, information desk where aid will be offered on Lubbock activities and courtesy passes are to be issued, the lounge room, hobby room, pool area, listening room where Hi-Fi equipment will operate, the kitchen where cooking classes will be offered, the ballroom, and patio with chairs and tables.

## Reese Aids ATC In Another Win Of Safety Award

With major contribution from Reese, Air Training Command again has won top honors in reducing ground accidents.

ATC has won the National Safety Council Award of Honor for the third consecutive year. This is the council's highest citation and was made to ATC for "outstanding achievement during 1958 in the reduction of ground accidents."

Military accidents in the command during 1958 were 24.87 percent lower than the 1956-57 average. Accident cost during 1958 was 22.82 percent below the average of the two previous years.

Reese in 1956 had three fatalities, in 1957 two fatalities, and last year one death from accident. Accident cost in 1956 was \$110,020; in 1957 it was \$76,151; and last year's cost was \$53,343, to give a 42.68 percent reduction from the 1956-57 average.

## Class Openings Grow Stronger

Several applications for admission to the Air Force academy are expected from Reese airmen as chance for admission grow stronger, it was said this week.

Applications are on the increase, but chances for becoming a member of the class of 1963 are twice as good as when applicants were listed in 1955.

As of April 30, applicants were 6,724 for 750 vacancies, as compared with 6,489 for the first class. Chances for Class 1963 are nine to one, while those for Class 1955 were twenty-one to one.

Details for application may be secured from the wing personnel office.

The Sunday program will include introductions of Mrs. Daphne A. Hargett, club director; Maj. Robert L. Beckner, Personnel Services officer; Col. Harold T. Babb, Air Base group commander; and Lt. Col. Homer L. Parsons, ABG executive officer.

Col. Dross Ellis, base commander, is expected to cut the ribbon to open the club.

Members of the NCO and Officers Wives clubs will serve refreshments and serve as guides. The Amarillo AFB band is scheduled to play.

Mrs. Hargett said many activities will be offered in the new club, including quiet areas for TV, reading and writing; teaching of sewing, copper work, leathercraft, model building, drawing, and sketching and cooking; and operation of rooms for dancing, parties, and club meetings. A snack bar will be open.

Open house also will extend through Monday, from 2 to 8 p.m., with all areas again open.

Monday night the Amarillo AFB band will play for a dance from 8 to 11 p.m. with hostesses present from Beta Sigma Phi of Lubbock. The dance is to be semi-formal.

Regular club activities will be resumed Tuesday, with sewing classes, leathercraft, and games scheduled.

Wednesday coppercraft classes are scheduled for 10 a.m., leathercraft for Girl Scouts at 3:30 p.m., drawing and sketching at 7 p.m., and games at 8 p.m.

The Thursday schedule calls for games from 2 to 8 p.m. and dancing at night. The Friday schedule calls for leathercraft at night, along with championship pool and games.

Saturday is planned for model craft in the afternoon and open house, with games, at night. The Sunday Coffee Call is scheduled for 2 p.m. and open house from 2 p.m. until 10 p.m.

## Carswell AFB Colonel Addresses Class 59-G Graduation

Col. Richard E. Evans, commander of the 3958th Operational Evaluation and Training Squadron at Carswell AFB Texas, was speaker Thursday as Class 59-G completed pilot training at Reese.

Silver pilot wings were awarded the 17 student officers and 20 aviation cadets of the

USAF and a Pakistan student who became a pilot officer on graduation. The USAF cadets were commissioned second lieutenants.

Colonel Evans flew B-17 and B-29 aircraft in World War II and the Korean conflict, has experience in the B-47, B-52, and Boeing 707, and is checked out in the B-58 and T-33.

Between World War II and Korea, he wrote more than a million dollars yearly in life insurance for four and a half years to qualify as the youngest member of the Million Dollar Round Table.

He has been director of operations and has been active in service testing at MacDill AFB Fla., and was chief of the requirements division of SAC

headquarters prior to going to Carswell.

He holds the Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medal with two clusters.

Lt. Col. James W. Weaver, commander of the 3500th Pilot Training Squadron was master-of-ceremonies for the graduation which followed a wing review. Lt. Col. Charles M. Lyons, commander of the 3501st PTS, in-

troduced the speaker, presented awards to the honor graduate, and awarded diplomas to graduates. First Lt. Lionel W. Harden, military training instructor, administered the oath of office to former aviation cadets, and 17 instructor pilots presented wings to students they taught to fly the T-33. Chaplain John O. Ballantine gave the invocation and benediction.

Make it a point on your next records review to check each entry to see if it is correct. Check any additional AFSCs to see if you are still qualified. You could be reassigned on the basis of an additional AFSC. In the case of airmen,

check your performance reports and see if you are correcting any weaknesses or doing your utmost to improve your effectiveness. Your Emergency Data Record should be complete and current. Your wife, children or parents could suffer considerably if you neglect this form.

Your record is "you" and you should know it as well as you know yourself.

# Former Chaplain, Author of TV Series, to Conduct Mission Here

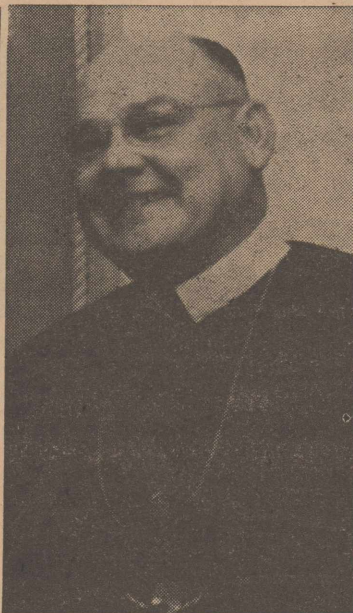
The Rev. Harry F. Wade, C. Ss. R., author, TV writer, and former Air Force chaplain, will conduct the Catholic Mission at Reese starting Sunday and ending Friday night.

Daily mass will be at 7 a. m., 12 noon, and 7:30 p. m., with talks to the ladies Tuesday and Thursday at 1:30 p. m. in the Chapel annex.

Father Wade, native of New Orleans, was ordained at the Redemptorist seminary in Wisconsin, and took supplementary courses at the Holy Redeemer College in Illinois, St. Mary's of San Antonio, Catholic university in Washington, D. C. and Harvard.

He has been parish priest, director of youth recreational activities, and an Air Force chaplain.

While serving in the China-Burma-India theatre of World War II he had to bail out over the "hump" and was rescued after an eight-day trek through

the Burma jungle. A report of his experiences was contained in a book, "Five Miles Closer to Heaven." He frequently gives survival talks to Air Force personnel.

He gave missions on the front line during fire in Korea and was spiritual advisor to servicemen in remote outposts of Alaska.

His articles and playlets have been published in many magazines and papers.

Presently Father Wade is writing a teleplay for Airborne Productions in Hollywood. His series, "Flight," has been showing and his next series, if contracted will be "Gyrosyn."

"Father Wade has lived an Air Force life and knows Air Force men," Chaplain Henry C. Bielski said. "His talks are down-to-earth."

# Pope Discusses Communism

A statement by Pope Pius XII:

"We reject Communism as a social system by virtue of Christ's doctrine. We also reject the opinion that the Christian today ought to see Communism as a phenomenon or a state in the passage of history, one of the necessary 'moments,' as it were, of its evolution, and consequently to accept it as if decreed by Divine Providence." (Vatican City, Dec. 24, 1955).

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# Trio of Ex-Missilemen In Pilot Training Here

Three missilemen were discovered this week at Reese, all veterans of research and launching activities.

The three, aviation cadets, hope to return to missiles after several years of flying.

One of the trio, Peter T. Gamage, Thursday received his commission as second lieutenant and was awarded pilot wings, in addition to assignment as a member of the SAC B-47 crew at Lockbourn AFB, O.

Remaining in pilot training are Cadets Byron W. Evans, Class 59-H, and Arthur E. Smith Jr., Class 60-A. All three entered pilot training after contributing to missile work in 1956-57-58.

Evans was stationed at Orlando AFB from March, 1956, to February, 1958. He helped take over work when the first operational MATADOR outfit moved to Formosa.

Smith also was assigned to Orlando AFB, but was with a Tactical Missile squadron about the same time. He was working with a launching team and had a part in the first successful launching of an all-weather MATADOR.

Gamage was assigned to Patrick AFB, near Cape Canaveral,

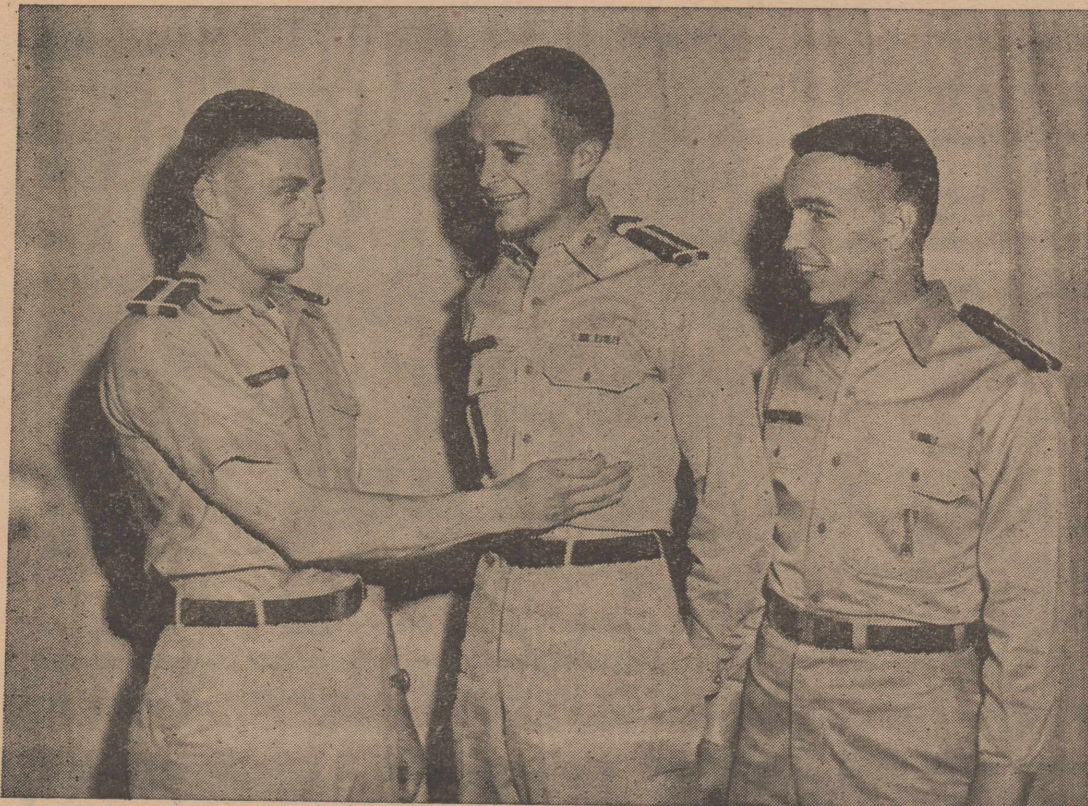
aiding in the last acceptance tests for the MATADOR-C, and with the SNARK-62. His was the first outfit to work with the MACE-76 missile.

For all three, training came through technical schools and cross-training on the job in missile work. All three requested missile activity, and were selected for high grades in the Stanine tests.

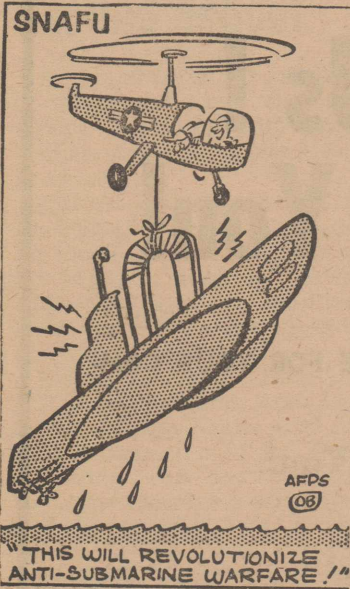
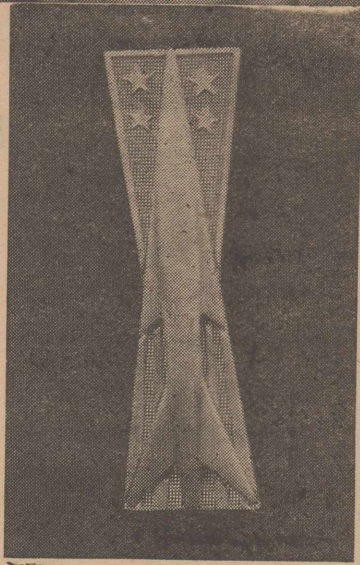
"We all entered training because we wanted to fly; but we all want back in missile work in a few years," Gamage commented.

Evans and Smith have been together since technical school work at Lowry AFB. They, with Gamage, received primary pilot training at Spence AFB. All are 23 years old, with Evans and Smith in service four years, and Gamage three years.

Evans, 1954 graduate of high school and skiing and mountain climbing addict, is from Klamath Falls, Ore. Gamage, from Winchester, Mass., is also a high school graduate, and a tennis letterman. Smith, from North Cambridge, Mass., lettered in high school basketball.

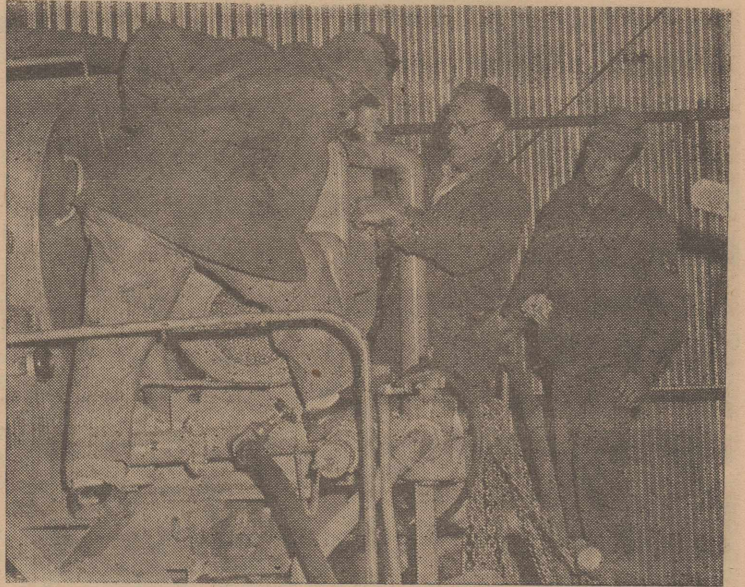
## Airman Selected District Officer

## Twelve Entries Compose League

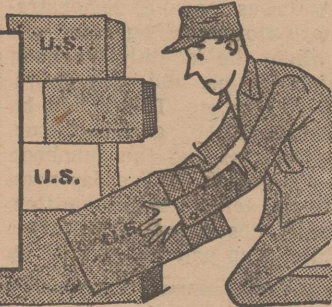
The Summer Intramural Golf League began last Monday with 12 teams entered in the round robin tournament.

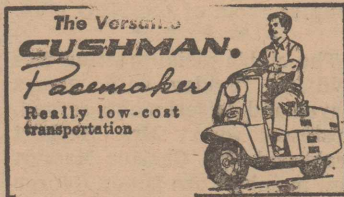


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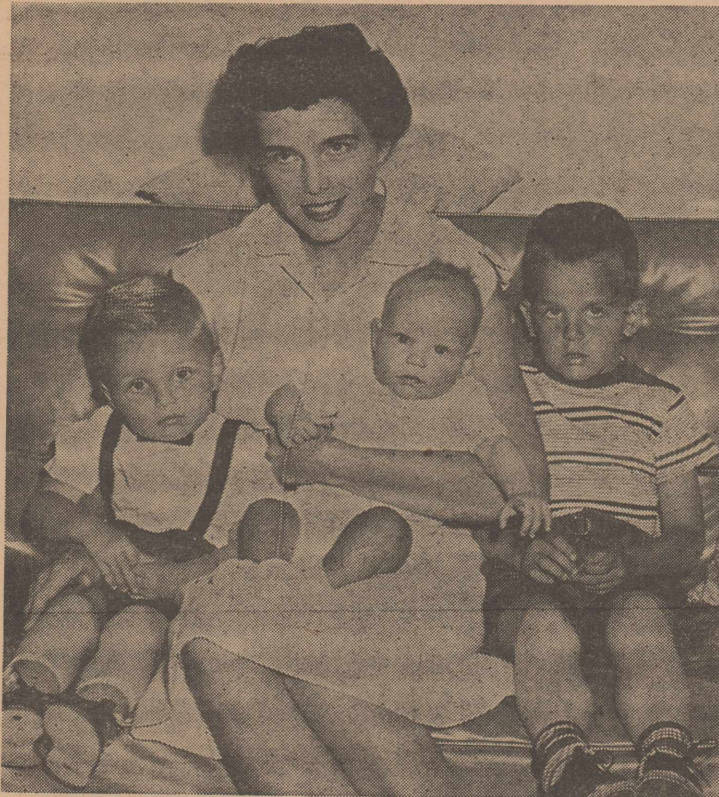

A Reese wife, Mrs. Joseph T. Herr, is a new citizen of the United States, rated outstanding in the class naturalized last week-end by the federal court in Lubbock.

Mrs. Herr, the former Vanda Irene Loveday of Gloucestershire, England, represented the class in brief questioning by the court on life in this country. She was selected by Judge Witfield Davidson from the 24 persons who composed "an outstanding group of applicants for citizenship."

Mrs. Herr met her husband while he was stationed at Schulthorpe, England, and has been married five years. She remembers sharply raids in England during World War II and was visiting in London when the house next door was demolished by a German bomb.

"I just love it in America," she said. "But I sometimes wonder if our way of living doesn't spoil us. The standard of living is so much higher. Just look at the refrigerators, washers, and other fine equipment in the majority of homes. I wonder if that makes us a little soft and spoiled. It is so much different than the way people live in England."

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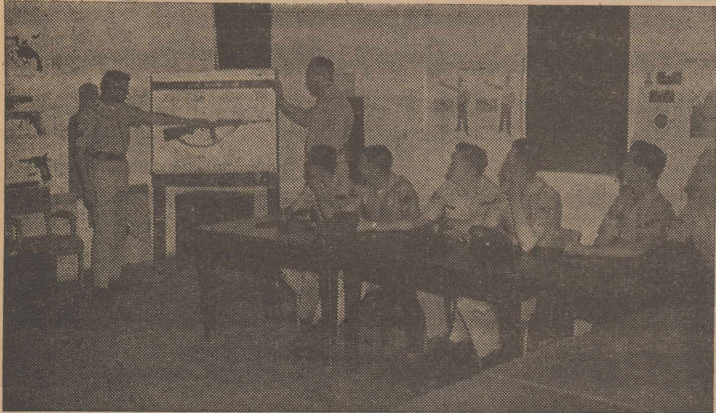

we must count upon, if we are to have a successful America; if we are going to be able confidently and permanently to counter the Soviet threat to our form of life," the President said.

"It is the kind of thing that bespeaks morale and faith in America. Certainly without this kind of work, the debt management by the federal treasury would be more difficultly — I would say well-nigh impossible."

"Savings, and incentive to save, built this country. We must not destroy this incentive."

Each person at Reese will be asked to join the payroll savings plan, and those buying bonds regularly will be asked to increase their savings. Any amount may be set aside each payday for bond purchase.

To be promoted, an E-7 needs eight years of enlisted service
