Base To Aid In Training Academy Men

Reese has been selected to participate in Operation Third Lieutenant of the Air Force Academy and next summer will assist in training nine cadets.

Under the program Air Force Academy cadets are sent to various bases for short training periods to aid them in picking permanent service careers and to bring them wider knowledge of Air Force activities. Major Robert Hill is project officer and will attend a conference at the Academy late in April.

From June 10 to 23 Reese will be assigned four cadets for on-the-job training. Each is assigned to a specialty. One will train as assistant maintenance control officer, another as assistant flight line maintenance officer, a third as assistant pilot training group operations officer and a fourth as assistant field maintenance officer.

Five other cadets will be assigned the base from July 8 to 21. Four will perform the same duties as their predecessors, while the fifth will be assistant air electronics maintenance officer.

Reese supervisors will keep an accurate record of training given and work performed in order that the information may become a part of each cadet's school record.

Deadline At Hand For Aid Application

April 1 is the deadline for those who want to apply for scholarship benefits under the provisions of the Gen. Henry H. Arnold Educational Fund, the Air Force Aid Society has announced.

Established in 1946, the fund provides financial assistance to young men and women who want a college education or some vocational training after completion of high school. Although priority favors children of deceased personnel of the Air Force, children of Air Force personnel presently on duty, also may apply.

Applicants must be non-veterans, under 21 years of age and unmarried.

Each complete year of college work must be applied for separately.

Personnel Officer Honored

Tom Ireland, civilian personnel officer, has been assigned by Air Training Command to serve as guest instructor in the Program Management Course of the Air Force Development Center for civilian personnel March 26-April 13 at Air University, Maxwell AFB, Ala.

Ireland, who has an outstanding record at Reese, will represent ATC as an instructor.

Reese during 1960 was one of 22 installations in the Air Force given an "excellent" rating for its civilian personnel program. It was one of seven given special mention and Ireland was given a certificate for outstanding leadership, the only civilian personnel officer in the Air Force to receive the award for four consecutive years. The special recognition came to Reese for surpassing qualifications for the "excellent" rating.

Ratings for 1961 have not been issued.

Secretary, General Speak On Pay, Promotions, Housing

WASHINGTON — (AFNS) — Before the Senate Appropriations Committee Air Force Secretary Eugene M. Zuckert and Gen. Curtis E. LeMay touched on a wide-range of personnel and pocket-book matters.

PAY. General LeMay said: "I do not envision our competing with industry in take-home pay for skilled personnel. I do think, however, that we should strive for comparable compensation so there is not too great a difference between industrial and military pay scales. Where I would make up the difference would be in fringe benefits, better commissary and exchange privileges, better recreational opportunities, better housing. These fringe benefits not only make sense but they are available at very little cost."

HOUSING. General LeMay noted: "One of the main reasons our people leave the service is that on the whole we have not been able to provide adequate housing. We are losing valuable, trained men because we cannot provide them with housing and because there is inadequate private housing near many of our installations."

BUILD - UP "OUTS". Mr. Zuckert noted: "The military personnel estimate before your committee, providing an average strength in FY 1963 of 867,000, assumes that nearly 27,000 Air National Guard and Reserve personnel, called up last year in connection with the Berlin crisis, will be released as of June 30, 1962. As Mr. McNamara pointed out, some adjustment will be required in either the FY 1962 or FY 1963 strengths, depending upon the exact course of events."

FLIGHT ACCRUAL PAY. Mr. Zuckert testified: "We are hopeful of the enactment this year of the Accrual Flight Pay Bill (H.R. 7651), which was passed by the House of Representatives in August."

This legislation will be of continuing assistance in dealing with the rated inventory problem, which has deep implications in terms of morale. In the meantime, we are making good use of the "over 20/over 15" legislation provided by Section 614 of Public Law 87-144. At the end of FY 1961 we had taken 1,665 pilots off active flying under this provision. By the end of FY 1963 this number will increase to about 6,300. Under this legislation we were able last year to maintain a proper balance between rated inventory and rated requirements despite the fluctuations caused by our increased readiness actions. Pending final approval of the Accrual Flight Pay Bill, I hope that you will continue the current waiver authority in the FY 1963 Appropriations Act."

RECREATIONAL FACILITIES General LeMay testified: "For the airmen who cost \$25,000 and three years to train, we have spent only \$83 from public funds per man per year for all clubs and dormitories and dining halls and athletic facilities we built for him over the past seven years."

Reese Majors Receive Higher Rank March 15

Six Reese majors were officially notified this week of their selection for promotion to lieutenant colonel.

They are Harold G. Barber, commander of the headquarters squadron section of Air Base Group; Joseph B. Burdick, chief of administrative services for the wing; Francis E. Fleming, accounting and finance officer; Martin L. Hooper, base supply officer; Charles W. Merritt, Air Base Group supply officer; and DeMay H. White, commander of the 3501st Pilot Training Squadron.

Date of rank for Majors Fleming, Hooper, Merritt and White is set at March 15, while Majors Barber and Burdick will assume higher rank later. Notification was given by Col. L. C. Hess, wing commander.

Major Barber, assigned to Reese in June, 1960, has been in service 18 years and spent 8 years overseas in England and Okinawa. He is a former student of Kent State University in Ohio and came to Reese from Okinawa.

Major Burdick, at Reese more than four years, served as Officers Club officer and commander of the 3502nd Periodic Maintenance Squadron prior to assuming present duty two months ago. He has been in service 18 years, also, and served in Europe and Greenland. He came to Reese from the now closed Stallings Air Base, N. C.

Major Fleming, at Reese since September, 1960, has 18 years in service and came to Reese from England. He has served two tours in England and one in Alaska. He is a former student of Northeastern University in Massachusetts.

Major Hooper, at Reese a year and a half, has a master's degree from the University of Chicago and came to Reese from Alaska. He is from Houston and has 20 years in service.

Major Merritt, stationed at Reese about six months, reassigned to the base from Harlingen AFB, Tex., has 19 years of service and served in Europe, Korea, and England. In England he attended the Royal Air Force College at Blackwell.

Major White, in service 19 years, served in the Southwest Pacific, Caribbean, South America and Japan. He came to Reese three years ago from Goodfellow AFB, San Angelo. He is a graduate of the University of Omaha and of the Air Force Military Instructors School of Air University.

RECORD SET

Craig AFB set an all-time local record for flying hours on Jan. 23 when pilots logged 595.3 hours.

Service Center Moves Office

The Family Service Center operated this week in new quarters with promise of expanded service as a result.

Saturday the Center was shifted from its quarters in Building T-825 to the space formerly occupied by the base housing office at 101 Mitchell Boulevard. The four rooms and former garage space are being used.

In its new quarters the Center will remain staffed throughout the lunch hour, in addition to its former hours of morning and afternoon. Service offered is intended to give all possible assistance to incoming and outgoing families in getting properly situated in new housing and in moving with the smallest amount of trouble to assignments elsewhere. The Center maintains supplies of furniture and household equipment which is available for loan before incoming shipments arrive and after outgoing household effects leave.

Volunteers, wives of airmen and officers, operate the Center. About the same time as the Center shifted headquarters, all volunteers entitled to pins were awarded them. Pins are given for each 500 hours of service and guards are awarded for additional service.

Reese presently has three women with 1,000-hour pins. Mrs. Raymond Aulgur, one of the three, remains active in the Center. Mrs. Alex Goodkin and Mrs. Donald Heskett, holders of 1,000-hour pins, have turned over duties to others, 2nd Lt. Hugh Ravatt, personal affairs officer, said.

The new Center will hold open house soon, possibly late next week, the lieutenant said. All personnel will be invited to attend.

Flight 1 Set Safety Record Believed Best In UPT Bases Of Command

Flight 1 of the 3501st Pilot Training Squadron at Reese has established itself as the outstanding safety unit in the undergraduate pilot training program.

The flight initiated jet flying training at Reese in 1948 and since then has flown more than 45 consecutive months without a major or minor aircraft accident. Almost 23,000 student flying training hours without accident have been logged, a mark believed untouched at any other UPT base.

The figure does not include instructor proficiency time during the period.

"The nearly 23,000 accident free hours in a training program, many times under adverse weather conditions, is truly indicative of the professional capabilities of the students, instructors and supervisors of Flight 1 and the 3501st Pilot Training Squadron," wrote Col. Charles W. Sawyer, Pilot Training Group commander.

Flight 1, under supervision of Capt. Mervin Parrack, flight commander, was the first flight at Reese to train students in T-37 jet aircraft in the UPT program of Air Training Command.

Students in the program begin T-37 training without previous knowledge or experience in flying.

Since innovation of the UPT program at Reese on April 6, 1961, Flight 1 has flown more than 9,500 accident-free hours in T-37 student training. Captain

Ronald K. Dutton has been flight commander the past two months. Reese is the only one of the original seven UPT bases in ATC to be assigned T-37s which has not had a T-37 accident.

In addition to the twin-engine training record, Flight 1 has completed almost 13,500 safe flying hours in T-33 jet aircraft, the trainer used for students who complete the primary work in T-37s.

Flight 1 officials also cite that much of the flying during the

long accident-free period was completed with high student-instructor ratio. T-37 instructors are former T-33 instructors and have lengthy experience in teaching and in proficiency.

First students to finish T-37 training at Reese have moved into the more advanced T-33 work.

The Flight 1 record has aided materially in keeping Reese among leaders in flying safety throughout the Air Force, officials state.

From The COMMANDER'S DESK

Promptness is a virtue which every supervisor and leader must not only possess himself, but must instill in his subordinates. Being prompt for appointments and meetings, getting to work on time, making sure correspondence meets suspense dates are only a few examples of a prompt individual.

The work day holds the same number of hours for everyone. The way we manage our time often means the difference between success and failure. There is no way to reclaim time that has been wasted.

The Air Force cannot afford this waste. Broken or late appointments, tardiness, or missed suspense dates waste somebody's time.

I encourage each supervisor at Reese to develop a basic feeling for promptness and establish an example for his subordinates.



Heroes — Now And Then

For older people it was spring of 1927 all over again. The crowds were huge and widely enthusiastic. In Washington the procession was triumphal; in New York the ticker tape showered down in torrents on Broadway. America was taking a hero to her heart.

Now at last a younger generation, fired by the achievement of Astronaut John Glenn, can understand the fierce mood of adulation that swept the nation 35 years ago when Charles A. Lindbergh — Lucky Lindy — The Lone Eagle — came home after his historic New York-to-Paris flight in the Spirit of St. Louis.

For Lindbergh represented all that was best in the American character. This tall, lanky, open-faced man of 25 seemed a modern Viking. Adventurous, modest, dedicated to the life of a pilot, he was a living refutation of the charge that America in the mid-twenties was a nation grown fat and materialistic. His solo flight fired the national imagination.

Who could have foreseen that, only 35 years after the frail little silver monoplane came down out of the night sky over Paris after a 3,600-mile flight in 33 1/2 hours, another American would orbit the earth in less than 90 minutes? Yet it is the irresistible continuity of man's forward push into the universe — from the Wrights to Lindbergh to Glenn. "Knowledge begets knowledge," the astronaut told the joint meeting of the Congress that honored him. In 1927 it was the Lone Eagle who carried the torch; today it is the hero of Friendship 7.

And tomorrow? We know it will be Americans in their daring and fortitude, men whose names, like those of Lindbergh and Glenn, will be imperishable. (AFPS)



Best Airman Sought Here

Work has started at Reese and other bases of Air Training Command this week to find the most outstanding airman to represent the command at the annual Air Force Association convention Sept. 18-23 in Las Vegas.

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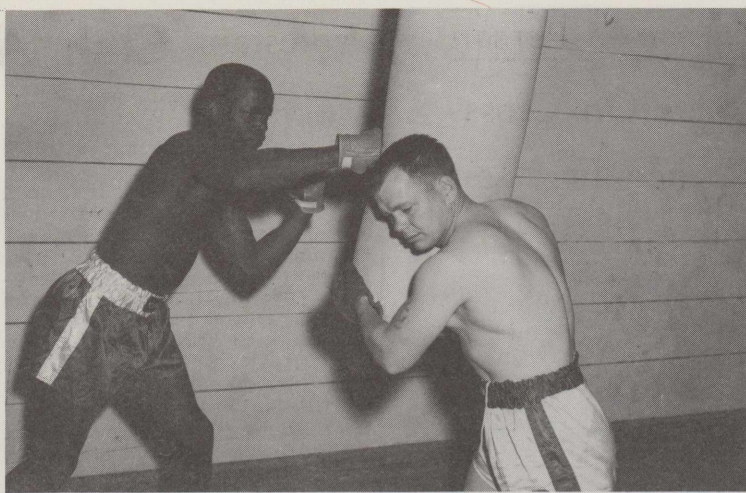

THURSDAY—Pork and gravy, English pea salad, buttered squash, hot bread, apple pie, milk.

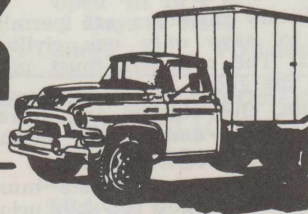
FRIDAY — Salmon croquettes, macaroni and tomatoes, buttered asparagus, hot bread, pumpkin pie, milk.

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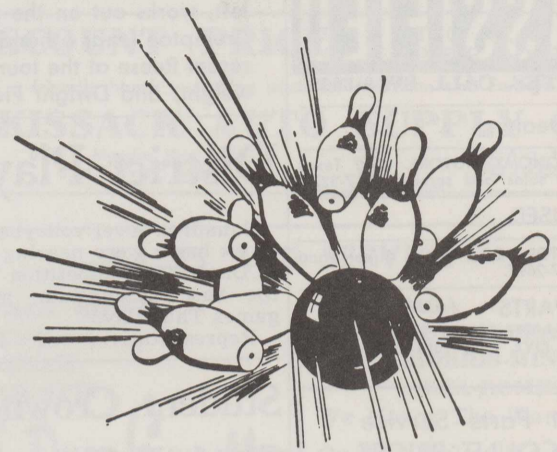
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
