



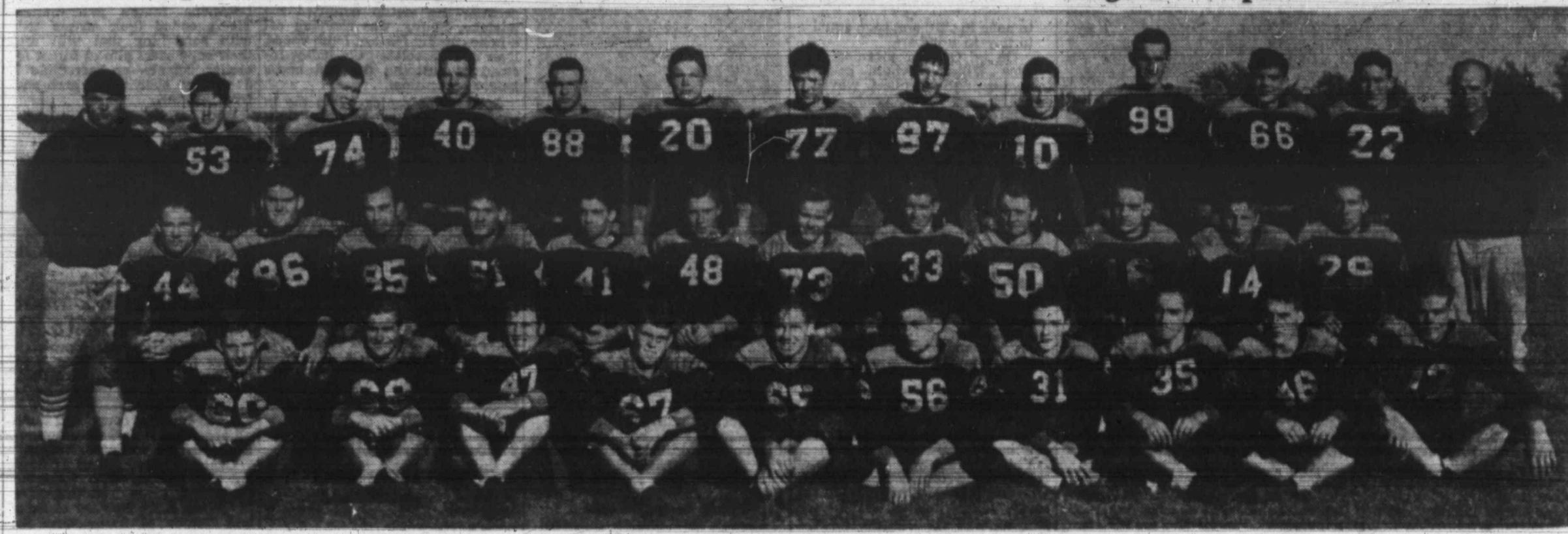

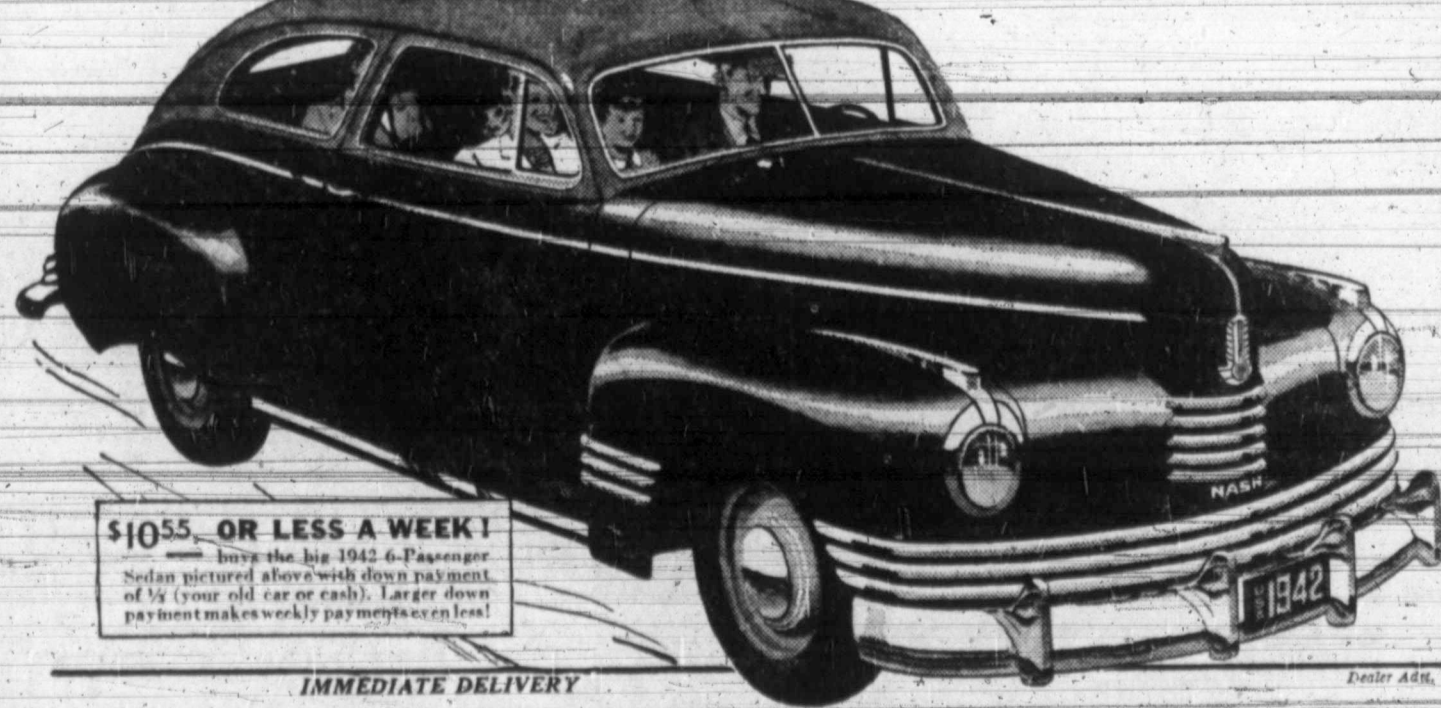

# Increasing New Oil Production Recorded In Area; Crosby Test Has 'Showing'

## First Producer In Crosby Seen

**By JOHN B. BREWER**  
Special Oil Writer

Five of the most northerly oil producing counties in the West Texas Permian Basin recorded increasing new production last week, 29 wells being completed with combined daily potentials of 32,852.30 barrels. This was 7,108.24 barrels more than was registered by 27 wells during the preceding week and nearly reached the recent high of 33,588.20 barrels by 33 wells during the third week in September.

Hockley county led last week with 13 wells rating 18,800.68 barrels in 24 hours, Cochran county added six producers good for 7,303.76 barrels daily. Terry county one for 952.20 barrels, Yoakum county six for 3,641.10 barrels and Gaines county three for 2,154.56 barrels. Twenty of the wells—all those in Hockley, Cochran and Terry counties—were in the great Slaughter field.

## Crosby Test Makes Oil

Crosby county had prospects of its first oil producer in the wildcat drilled by Callahan & Wagoner of Abilene on the ranch of E. M. Wahlenmaster of San Angelo, 20 miles southwest of Crosbyton. It showed an estimated four barrels of 39 gravity oil daily after shooting with 140 quarts of nitroglycerin from 2,900 to 2,930 feet, plugged back depth. Orders were awaited and acidizing was likely. The test is in the northeast corner of section 31-WTRK.

Ray Albaugh and Richmond Drilling Co. No. 1 J. J. Handley, promised pool opener in northwestern Dawson county, was cleaning out on bottom at 4,980 feet in lime, having been shot early in the month with 700 quarts of nitroglycerin. Results of swabbing had been unannounced for a week. The test is in the southwest quarter of section 34-M-EL & RR.

## Lubbock Test Abandoned

Dan Auld took a five-foot core from the wildcat on his ranch in Lynn county which Trinity Drilling company drilled to 5,202 feet, and recovered two feet of gray, slightly porous, fossiliferous lime with no shows. On a 25-minute drill stem test from 4,958 feet to the bottom 3,100 feet of drill string fluid was recovered and after a Schlumberger survey was made the test shutdown for orders. It is in O. T. Callison survey, 14 miles west of Tahoka.

L. C. Harrison and Tobe Foster abandoned dry at 5,510 feet in lime their No. 1 E. L. Steck, miles west and slightly north of Harrison and others' No. 1 W. G. Nairn estate, Lubbock county discovery producer. No oil shows of consequence were reported but lime and anhydrite cored from 3,320-48 feet showed sulphur water. The test was 467 feet out of the southeast corner of section 7-A-John H. Gibson, two miles northeast of Lubbock, with elevation of 3,247 feet.

## Hockley Test Coring

Anderson-Prichard and American Drilling Co. No. 1 W. L. Ellwood estate, Hockley county wildcat 14 miles northeast of the Slaughter field, in the northwest corner of section 15-A-R. M. Thompson, drilled soft formation from 4,678.81 feet and began coring. Honolulu No. 1-59-K. C. S. Dean, west outcrop to the Duggan sector of the Slaughter pool in Cochran County, in the southeast corner of league 58, Martin county, school land survey, had passed 4,530 feet in lime.

Amerda No. 1 Ruth M. Hudson, Gaines county wildcat three miles west of the south end of the Wasson field, had drilled below 4,910 feet in lime. It is in section 10-33-4n-T & P.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—A young doctor performed an operation at the point of a gun early today and helped three bandits to escape police by keeping his "word of honor."

Police squad cars were racing through Chicago's West side, searching for three robbers when Dr. James Mahoney telephoned police headquarters from the Clearing Industrial hospital.

## Forced To Remove Bullet

"I was just forced to remove a bullet from a man's shoulder," Mahoney reported, nervously, "while another man was pointing a gun at me. They left 15 minutes ago."

A squad of police interviewed Mahoney at the hospital while other patrolmen made a fruitless search of the streets.

## Kept His Pledge

Mahoney agreed and kept his pledge to the annoyance of police who lost track of the fugitives.

The bandits held up five taverns last night, obtaining about \$200. The wounded one apparently was shot when the trio nearly was cornered by police.

## Domestic Crude Oil Output Is Decreased

HOUSTON, Nov. 29 (U.P.)—Domestic crude oil output dropped 227,156 barrels daily for the week ending today but still was 81,450 barrels daily above the U. S. Bureau of Mines estimate of market demand for November, the Oil Weekly reported.

Production averaged 4,101,450 barrels daily, dropping as sharply as it climbed during the previous week. Texas production cut the national figure with a drop of 221,700, nearly all of the decline, the magazine said.

## Brown Funeral To Be Held In Slaton Today

SLATON, Nov. 29 (Special)—Funeral services will be conducted at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon for E. L. Brown, 78, retired farmer who had lived in Slaton 20 years, who died at 8 o'clock Friday night of pneumonia in Mercy hospital.

Rites will be at Slaton Methodist church, with Rev. H. C. Gordon, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. W. F. Ferguson, Baptist pastor. Williams Funeral home will direct burial in Lubbock cemetery.

## West Texas Towns Given Priority Ratings

DALLAS, Nov. 29 (U.P.)—Ballinger, Coleman and Stamford in West Texas have been rated in Washington as defense area towns, making them eligible for housing priority assistance.

The announcement was made here by Loren S. Green, chief housing examiner of the OPM in the Southwest.

# Navy Charges 'Organized Campaign' Waged To Undermine U.S. Civilian Morale

## Letters Revealed By Sec. Knox

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The Navy charged today that an "organized campaign" was being waged to undermine civilian morale by trading on the grief of survivors of American seamen lost in the battle of the Atlantic.

Secretary Knox made public copies of a letter which the Navy said had been circulated among parents of men lost when the destroyer Reuben James was sunk on October 31. The letter was put out, the Navy department declared, by "We, The Mothers, Mobilized For America, Inc." with headquarters in Chicago.

**Parents Make Expression**

The particular copy which Knox made public had been forwarded to him by parents of a man first believed lost on the Reuben James but later found safe. The parents, writing at a time when they thought their son was dead, told the secretary:

"We reject sympathy from such an organization. They belong with the Nazi. Wipe them out of the U. S. A."

A spokesman said on behalf of the Navy department that the letter was "part of an organized campaign to undermine civilian morale and the morale of the armed forces."

**Recruiting Picks Up Again**

Secretary Knox disclosed at a press conference Wednesday that naval enlistments had dropped 15 per cent since the Reuben James and Kearney torpedoed, but were slowly picking up again. He attributed the decline to the reluctance of parents to permit their sons under 21 to join the Navy.

The Navy said the letter circulated by "We, The Mothers, Mobilize For America, Inc." was signed by Lyri Van Hening, as president, and Grace Keefe, as secretary.

**Copy Made Public**

The copy made public by the Navy said that "our sincere and heartfelt sympathy goes out to your entire family in this dark hour of sadness for the loss of your beloved."

"The men lost when the destroyer went down were called 'brave, loyal Americans who obeyed orders,' by the letter added that 'this tragedy... might have been averted had the pleas of millions of our people all over this land been heeded by our officials in Washington.'"

It then declared that "any movement to avenge these, our dead, by throwing away the lives of millions more of our American men to punish a foreign nation, is but a false promise to involve us in war."

The writers said legal experts had advised them that officials could be sued in civil court if they unconstitutionally gave orders which resulted in the death of a member of the armed services.

"We owe it to our loved dead, to the country which they died, to call to account those who violated our constitution and heartlessly placed American men in the danger zone between two warring nations while we are at peace."

"This needless slaughter of American men constitutes the greatest of all blundering tragedies in American history."

## Housing Project Additions Likely

### Dopey, Pet Canary, Is Fond Of Whisky And Tobacco; Gets Tippy

ATLANTA, Nov. 29 (AP)—Dopey, her pet canary, has a fondness for whisky and tobacco, Mrs. Clint Hager says, and sometimes "gets drunk as a billygoat and wants to fight."

Dopey fell from her nest at birth a year ago. Mrs. Hager said she and her husband reviewed the featherless bird with a few drops of whisky, raised him in a shoe box incubator.

Now, she says, Dopey comes in for his share whenever cocktails are served, and at parties helps himself from anybody's glass.

Once, after a few drinks, the canary flew at the Hagers' bulldog. The dog flew out the back door. Now they are inseparable friends.

Dopey picked up the tobacco habit, Mrs. Hager said, from her husband's pipe. He picks the tobacco, grain by grain, from the pipe and swallows it.

The bird refuses to live in a cage, and Mrs. Hager asserts "sometimes treats us like we were his equal."

Officials here are "very hopeful" there may be substantial additions to the improved housing project for which the U. S. Housing administration already has earmarked \$515,000.

This was the opinion expressed Saturday by H. C. Pender, chairman of the Lubbock Housing Authority, and W. L. Bradshaw, executive director, who attended a defense-housing conference in San Antonio during the past week.

They would not speculate on what amount, if any, may be added to the \$515,000 already provided because, as Pender said, "There is no basis for any kind of guess-work."

**May Be Doubled**

It was revealed, however, there would be no special surprise if the present amount should be doubled so as to insure more adequate housing for the 300 or more non-commissioned officers and civil service employees to be stationed at the air base under construction west of the city.

Bradshaw was of the opinion, on his return from San Antonio, that it probably will be impossible to get work started on the 130 units included in the \$515,000 project before the first of the year. He expressed the belief, however, that the start will not be delayed very long beyond that time.

## Halliburton Employees To Receive \$350,000 In Year-End Bonuses

DUNCAN, Okla., Nov. 29 (AP)—Erie P. Halliburton, president of the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Co. announced today that he planned to pay year-end bonuses of \$350,000 to 1300 employees in 18 states.

The bonuses will amount to 10 per cent of each employee's annual wages—slightly more than five weeks of additional pay. The bonuses will average \$194 per worker.

Halliburton announced that men who have joined the armed forces or have been drafted during the past year will share in the bonus at the rate of 10 per cent of the money drawn from the company before leaving. He said the bonuses were not Christmas presents but were in appreciation of the service of his employees.

**Awaiting Routine Approval**

The chairman emphasized that the money earmarked from the project has come from the USHA. However, a subsequent plan now awaiting routine approval is to make the project available temporarily to the non-commissioned and civil service personnel at the air base until permanent provision for their housing can be completed.

If the present project is enlarged, or if provision should be made for another similar project, the money might come either from the USHA or, more probably, from the Defense Housing Agency.

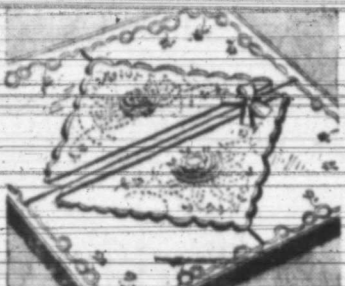

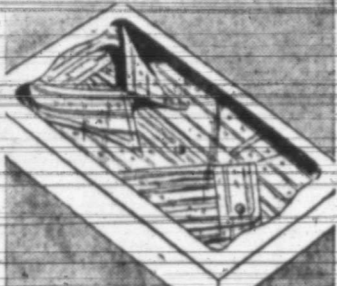

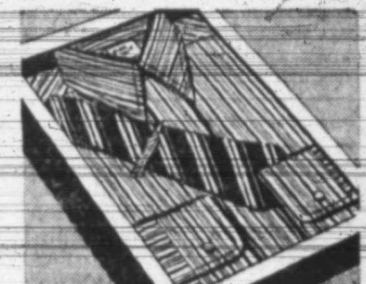

## Group Surveys Farm Needs

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 29. (AP)—South Texas today looked to an investigating committee from Washington for a solution to its farm labor problem.

Robert K. Lamb, staff director, and John W. Abbott, chief field investigator for the House defense migration committee, arrived here last night and left for a tour of the affected areas.

They were accompanied by Elmer Moore, assistant general manager of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, who warned that a serious loss threatened growers unless something were done to make help more available.

Also in the group was E. C. Caldwell, a farmer of San Patricio county, who will help the investigators during their tour.

**To Hold Hearing**  
Otis E. Mulliken of Washington, secretary to the agriculture labor committee of the department of agriculture, joined the group on the itinerary.

The investigation came after a request by the South Texas Chamber and Texas members of Congress, who petitioned the committee to make the study.

Direct result of the scarcity of laborers, Moore said, was a serious cotton loss.

The itinerary also will carry the investigators into the vegetable and citrus fruit regions of the state. Lamb said today a confidential report would be made to the congressional committee and the information gathered would also be used for a hearing in Austin in March.

## Bodies Kept In Home Are Finally Buried

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Nov. 29. (AP)—The bodies of J.F.E. Anhorn, who died in 1921, and his daughter, Fannie, who died in 1925, were buried today in the family cemetery plot here.

The bodies, in hermetically sealed caskets, had been kept by two surviving daughters at Pinehurst, the long-defunct boarding school which the Swiss-born father and daughters once operated in the piney woods near here.

Mary Gertrude Anhorn, one of the elderly spinsters who lived for years with the bodies, died here Oct. 22 at a rest home where she had been brought only a short time previously. Her sister Minnie remained at the abandoned seminary, authorities saying they feared efforts to force her to leave would endanger her life.

William, brother of Newport, R. I., another of Anhorn's daughters who never lived in the seminary, arranged for the burials.

She also had Mary Gertrude brought here for medical attention in an effort to save her life and arranged for Minnie's needs at the seminary.

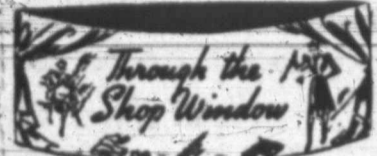

### Houston To Get Huge Steel Mill

(By The United Press)  
HOUSTON, Nov. 29. — Announcement that the Defense Plant Corporation will build a \$35,000,000 steel mill here was understood today to indicate that freight rate reductions for movement of East Texas iron ore either have been or will be granted.

Sheffield Steel corporation of Kansas City will operate the new plant which will be in addition to a \$12,000,000 plant now under construction on the Houston ship channel east of this city.

**To Use Texas Ore**  
Construction of the plant, which will use East Texas iron ore, was made possible by decision of the Reconstruction Finance corporation, through the DPC, to lend \$22,670,000 for the project. Texas Congressional leaders are seeking to have blast furnaces erected in East Texas for processing the iron ore on the spot. These plants would be built at Rusk, Longview and Marshall.

Washington dispatches indicated, however, that the new Houston plant was not connected with the question of additional blast furnaces in the East Texas iron ore region. The Office of Production Management was reported also to be considering additional steel plants elsewhere on the Texas coast.

**Can Turn Out Ship Plates**  
The federal loan to Sheffield, a subsidiary of American Rolling Mills company, will be used to construct one blast furnace, two open hearth furnaces, a blooming mill and a plate mill.

As originally planned, the \$12,000,000 plant now being built will make steel wires, bars, shapes and sheets. With the new blooming and plate mills in operation, Sheffield can turn out ship plates for use in shipyards along the Texas coast.

Sheffield officials evidently regard scrap iron available in Texas as insufficient for operation of the plants and plan to operate on steel made from Texas iron ores. The company has asked the Texas Railroad commission to lower freight rates on the ore.

**To Employ 1,000**  
Coke to be used in the Houston furnaces will come from Birmingham, Ala., and Oklahoma coal fields.

The Houston plant will have an estimated annual capacity of 264,000 tons of pig iron and 216,000 tons of steel plates. About 1,000 workers will be employed. Sheffield will construct the mill and operate it for five years, title being retained by the government through DPC and RFC.

Sheffield probably will have to import at least the nucleus of skilled workers who will be needed to operate the plant.

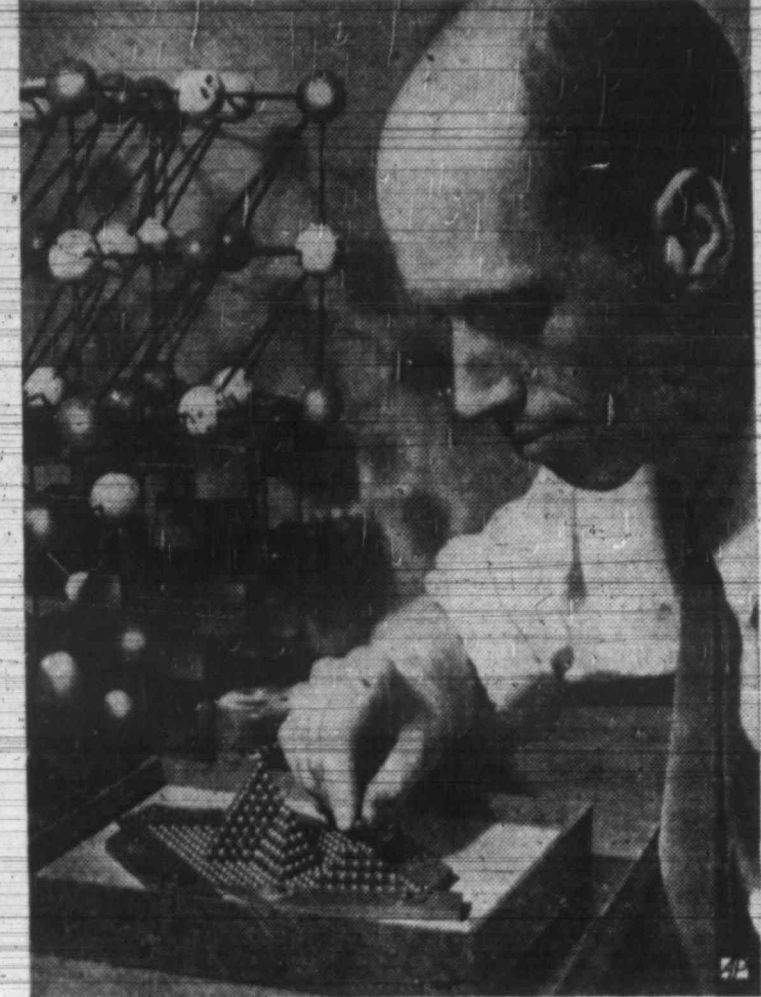
The animal will be kept at the farm of Lee Weems, in South-west Ward community. He lives about five miles southwest of town.

Money for the purchase came from a \$100 prize which club boys of the county won last year through the swine record. Prize paid for the animal was approximately \$30 it was said.

While the animal is expected to be used largely by Lubbock high school F.F.A. boys and club boys in this vicinity, Pool explained, he will be available to all boys of the county. The animal comes from a well known family of the Poland-China breed.

### Fire Department Officials Warn Of Added Fire Hazards Which Prevail In December

Renewed warnings that Lubbock will face, during the next few weeks, the most serious fire dangers in the history of the city were given by fire department officials Saturday.

Jammed into the month of December, they added, will be the combined dangers of hazards incident to the Christmas season, of profuse vegetation which is just now getting dry enough to burn rapidly, and the probable real beginning of cold weather.

As explained by fire officials, Christmas decorations and longer periods of cold weather so as to require more fires are hazards common to December. They are such serious hazards that, as an average, the fire losses during December ordinarily are the heaviest of any month.

**Grass Added Hazard**  
But a very serious added hazard during the coming month, according to fire department officials, are the weeds and grass which grow so luxuriantly because of the abundant moisture since early last spring.

Ordinarily, the worst part of this particular danger occurs during November. It usually is not one of the major fire hazards common to December.

This year, however, has been an exception to the rule, fire officials said. The first killing frost came somewhat later than usual. Not only was there much more vegetation to dry than normally is the case, but it was so filled with sap that it dried more slowly than usual. To aggravate the problem still further, the drying has been delayed by several days of moisture since the killing frost.

**Precautions Imperative**  
As pointed out by fire department officials, the added dangers make added precautions imperative if Lubbock is to be protected against the hazards of serious fires. All the protection that is needed, they explained, is a general practice by individuals of obvious rules of common sense.

With reference to the brush fire hazard, they suggested, be careful where matches and cigaret butts are tossed. To protect your own fences and buildings, cut weeds 10 or 12 feet back from them. Don't pile dead brush or grass against fences or buildings. If a grass or brush fire starts and there appears danger it might get out of control, call the fire department. A brush fire is easier to fight than one in a building, and it doesn't cost as much.

BOSTON, Nov. 29. (AP)—Fired for the first time in 20 years, big 12-inch mortars at Fort Andrews lobbed 1,046-pound shells five miles out to sea—but the fort got most of the damage.

As the first shell headed toward a towed target Thursday, the concussion from the coast defense mortars broke most of the windows in a wooden barracks about 100 feet from the firing pit. The second, third and fourth shots shook off window casings and a door and loosened clapboards on the barracks.

That wasn't all. The first shot so startled a cook that he jumped, scattered a plate of sliced bologna over the barracks floor.

# Twelve South Plains Counties Allotted 5,434 Acres For Potatoes Under AAA

## Lubbock County Gets 412 Acres

 Twelve South Plains counties have been allotted a total of 5,434 acres for the planting of Irish potatoes for the 1942 crop, according to an announcement from the state office of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.  
 Three counties, Briscoe, Parmer and Terry, have not heretofore been included in estimates of potato production and the acreage of the three is less than 50.  
 County AAA administrative officers have requested producers this year to estimate the acreage they desire to plant in 1942 and it was on these estimates that county allotments were based. Actual acreages are, for the most part, considerably below what most persons had expected to be in the crop.  
 Allotments in 45 Counties  
 Forty-five counties in the state have been allotted 20,330.3 acres for next year. Fourteen of these are in the northwestern section of the state, including Dallam and Potter counties in the Panhandle.  
 Several months ago a survey made by E. C. Kuykendall, general agent of the Fort Worth & Denver City railway and Cecil Kersey, traveling agent, indicated 11,650 acres in crop, both early and late, in nine counties. Based on an estimated yield of 100 to 200 sacks per acre, a crop of 1,414,000 sacks was predicted. The figures were given by county farm agents and AAA administrators.  
 Meantime the state AAA office had received complaints from other states where potatoes are grown, as well as from the Washington office, about the alleged "unbridled" competition in Texas. An allotment system was sought in order to reduce the competition.  
 Lubbock Has 412 Acres  
 Sixteen of the counties in the state have more than 300 acres in

allotments for 1942. Cameron has the largest, 8,986.5 acres; Deaf Smith is second with 1,946 acres; Bexar, third, with 1,490 acres. Other of the larger counties are: Castro, 797; Wharton, 775; Harris, 758; Hale, 553; Floyd, 521; Lamb, 481; Bowie, 456; Erath, 424; Lubbock, 412; Hidalgo, 371; Swisher, 339; Dallam, 310; Colorado, 310.  
 Comparative figures with 1940 showed that the estimated 1941 acreages were more than double those of the previous year.  
 An example of the situation that had previously existed in Lubbock county. Estimated acreage in 1940 was 700; in 1941, 1,300. When the AAA wrote to all known producers of potatoes asking for their actual acreage, it was found that only slightly more than 600 acres was in crop—at least that was the total reported to the county AAA office.  
 To Make Adjustments  
 On this basis, 462 acres was allotted the county, but actual requests indicate but 412 acres will be in crop. The remainder is being held by the county committee with a view to making needed adjustments in allotments when planting time comes.  
 Potatoes in Northwest Texas are grown under irrigation. The current season, just closed, was not the type that experienced potato growers prefer, they explained, because of the excessive rainfall. Growers here from Idaho have stated that one major factor in successful potato production is regular irrigation, that excessive rainfall greatly upsets a regular irrigation program and that results are less uniform.  
 The previous survey gave the following estimated yields in sacks per acre, Bailey, 100; Castro, 150; Deaf Smith, 100; Floyd, 115; Hale, 110; Hockley, 150; Lamb, 100; Lubbock, 200; Swisher, 100.  
 The 1942 allotments, 1941 estimated acreage and 1940 estimated acreage are as follows:

## Requirements Of Payments Listed

To earn his full AAA payment in 1942, a Lubbock county farmer must do three things.  
 First, he must devote at least 20 per cent of his land to soil-conserving crops or land uses exclusively throughout the program year. Second, he must plant within his acreage allotments. Third, he must earn his soil-building allowance.  
 These three points were emphasized by C. E. Lilley, chairman of the Lubbock County AAA committee.  
 Will Earn Only Part  
 A farmer falling below the 20 per cent minimum requirement will earn only a proportionate part of his cotton, wheat, peanut and Irish potato payments.  
 The soil-building allowance may be earned, as in previous years, by carrying out approved soil-building practices, the AAA official explained.  
 Payments for planting within allotments include cotton at 1.25 cents per pound; wheat, 10.5 cents per bushel; and peanuts, 7.25 cents per 100 pounds. The rate on Irish potatoes, for which allotments were established for the first time under the 1942 program, is 2 cents per bushel.

 Crops meeting soil-conserving classification include biennial and perennial legumes and perennial grasses; sudan, millet, and annual ryegrass for pasture; seeded cover crops of which a good growth is left on the land; summer-fallowed acreage protected from wind and

### Pointers Given On Destroying Shrubs In Pasture Areas

Special To The Avalanche-Journal  
COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 29.—Destruction of trees and shrubs in pastures is justified only where grass of greater value will replace them, advises Robert R. Lancaster, pasture specialist of the A. and M. College Extension Service. As grass values must pay the cost of clearing as well as offset any timber values, Lancaster cautions that straight-trunked trees, eight inches in diameter at a height of eight feet, and trees which will grow to that size should not be destroyed.

When making these reservations, he adds, fence any patches of shrubs, vines and briars growing along stream banks and in other places which cannot be mowed, as refuges for game and song birds and as a means of preserving landscape beauty.

**Tested At Spur Station**  
Among a number of chemicals tried out in tests of shrub killing under way at the Spur Texas Experiment station, sodium arsenite seems to have been the most effective and economical, Lancaster says. It may be applied in various ways for total killing of roots, trunks, limbs, sprouting stumps, and preventing regrowth of trees and shrubs of any size, standing or felled. Trees and shrubs can be cut off at the ground level and ground and sprouting prevented by poisoning fresh cut stumps. Single trunked trees and sprouting old stumps can be poisoned in frilled girdles around trunks close to the ground. The chief expense is in mixing and poisoning, cost of the poison alone being less than one cent per tree.

Sodium arsenite can be bought about as economically as mixing it in a pot in the back yard, and can be obtained in 50 pound drums in commercial form the poison is a powder called dry, grey sodium arsenite and requires only dissolving in boiling water. Users are cautioned to cover poisoned stumps with brush and to keep stock away from the area until rain washes off the application.

Lancaster suggests that land values should determine whether to cut and poison stumps or to girdle and poison standing trees. The latter is cheaper. A factor which will decide for many whether to undertake tree and shrub eradication is the need for plenty of pasture to provide meat and milk for the family.

### Stevenson Will Grant Reprieves For All

AUSTIN, Nov. 29. (AP)—Making it clear he was not opposed to capital punishment, Gov. Coke Stevenson Friday declared he would grant a 30-day stay in execution in every death penalty case in which he was empowered to grant clemency.

He has authorized a stay for Albert Wesley, Dallas county negro convicted of rape and scheduled to die today.

"I do not see anything wrong in granting anybody a 30-day stay," the governor said.

Stevenson's predecessor, Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel, a staunch opponent of capital punishment, never failed to grant a 30-day stay where possible.

The governor is empowered to grant one stay without recommendation of the board of pardons and paroles.

**Oil Freight Rates To East Coast Slashed**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (AP)—A 20 per cent reduction in basic freight rates for transportation of oil in tankers from Caribbean and United States Gulf ports to the East coast of the United States was announced today by the Maritime commission.

The new maximum rate is 40 cents per barrel on the basis of gasoline from Port Arthur to New York. The commission said port and product differentials would be announced later. The present rate is 50 cents a barrel.

Establishment of the new rate scale, the commission said, was in keeping with its policy of maintaining charter and cargo rates at as reasonable a level as possible.

### Bumper Christmas Season Forecast

The musical instrument field is now having its troubles because of the large amount of brass it needs for instruments and steel for stands. But here again, merchants placed orders early and production generally got off to a head start.

The same hold true in the paper industry. Book publishers got off to an early start. Makers of wrapping paper, cardboard boxes and twine were in steady production before the threat of shortages loomed, but current orders can not be filled. Cotton and woolen mills, some of which are now tied up with government contracts, also got in under the wire months ago.

**Sell Out Threatens**

IN THE hosiery field there was a sellout last summer when the embargo against Japanese silk was placed. Since then, most manufacturers have been using cotton, rayon or some other material for the toes, heels and tops of stockings to conserve what yarn is still available.

The best advice seems to be to shop early, not only to avoid the customary big rush, but to make sure you get what you want before there is a possibility of it being sold out. When the present supply is gone it's anybody's guess where more will come from in most categories. As for Christmas a year from now: No predictions.

### General Farm Prices Level Shows Decline

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—The general level of prices received by farmers for agricultural commodities declined four points between mid-October and mid-November, the Agriculture department reported today.

Although the decline was, the first to be registered since a farm price upswing began last April, the index of prices received at 135 per cent of the 1909-14 average—was 36 points above a year ago.

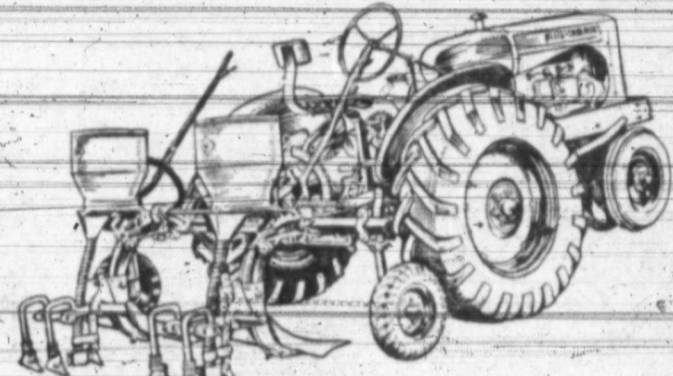

# Data On How To Cook A Wild Duck Given

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 29.—This year during the duck season many county home demonstration agents and other home economists in Texas have been asked, "How do you cook a wild duck?" To help hunters and hunters' wives, Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, offers the idea that recipes for wild fowl are quite similar to recipes for preparing any poultry.

Wild birds have a better flavor and are more tender if you hang them a few days before cooking, the specialist says. She adds the warning that the ducks must be kept at a fairly low temperature, otherwise they might spoil. Pluck them dry, remove all pin feathers, and then rub the down off. Remove the head and feet, and draw the bird.

Whether or not you use highly seasoned stuffing depends on the way you like your duck—whether you want to feature the "gamey" flavor or disguise it. Instead of stuffing wild duck, many people cut down the wild taste by putting a sliced apple, an onion, and a piece of two of celery inside a duck when roasting it. All should be removed at serving time.

Most people like wild duck roasted well done.

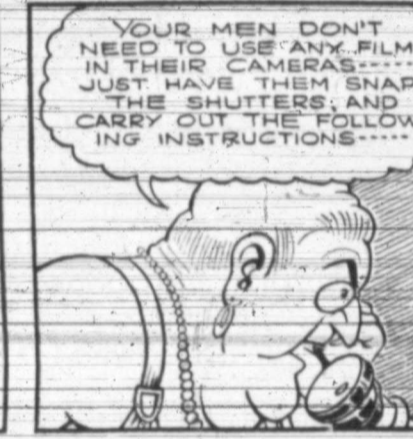

# Japan Must Take Definite Action Soon, One Way Or The Other, Observers Say

## 'Strangulation' Makes Headway

MANILA, Nov. 29.—Japan must take some definite action — one way or the other — soon in order to ward off economic strangulation, competent Far Eastern observers said today in an analysis of the background of the Japanese-American negotiations.

Japan's choice was said to lie between two alternatives: Agreement with the United States, which would mean withdrawal from the Asiatic continent and from the Berlin-Rome-Tokyo axis; and further military action in Asia, which probably would mean war.

**Agitation Is Increasing**  
All available reports from Japan indicate that there is increasing agitation there to break what the Japanese call economic encirclement by the United States, Britain, China, Netherlands East Indies and the Soviet Union.

In the words of the Japanese, this has become a "strangulation" choking off their country to death economically and surrounding it with a tightening ring of steel.

**Industries Closing Down**  
In short, while United States airplane factories, shipyards and munitions plants are working day and night in a great program just getting under way, Japan's industrial machine is creaking to a halt.

The Japanese are reported to be completing shortly two and possibly four 45,000-ton battleships, but otherwise the shipbuilding industry is crippled by lack of steel and Japan has no hope of matching the U. S. building program.

Japan normally imports 33 strategic raw materials, but today she is getting nothing beyond coal from China, cotton from China, Brazil and Peru, some crude oil from Mexico, some rice and rubber from Indo-China, and rice and tin from Thailand.

**Fuel Can't Be Replaced**  
Every gallon of aviation fuel burned by Japanese planes is non-replaceable.

World markets are closed tightly to Japan's exporting silk and cotton industries except in Indo-China, Thailand and occupied China.

The bulk of the Japanese merchant fleet of 5,000,000 tons is tied up.

Japanese leaders feel that they cannot wait much longer while the United States, Britain, China and the Netherlands East Indies strengthen their naval, aerial and land forces in the southwest Pacific; while the Chinese air force, strengthened by American-made warplanes, prepares for action against Japan and while the United States continues to send war materials to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's Chungking government over the Burma road.

### Selective Service Medical Officer Dies

DENVER, Nov. 29.—Col. J. W. E. H. Beck, 65, medical examiner for the Selective Service Board of Texas and a former Texas State Health department official, died at Fitzsimons army hospital late Friday.

Fitzsimons officials said Col. Beck underwent an operation this morning for removal of a lung tumor.

He was admitted to the hospital only a few days ago.

The body will be sent to Dallas tomorrow, accompanied by Mrs. Beck.

### Negro Prisoners At Marshall Break Jail

MARSHALL, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Three negro prisoners—two of them under penitentiary sentences, overpowered and bound a Negro trusty, James Furness, and escaped Friday from the Harrison county jail.

Sheriff J. H. Wilson said they were Willie Franklin, under 25-year sentence for burglary; Jake Fletcher, under a 10-year sentence for forgery in Gregg county; and L. H. Ladd, charged with assault to murder.

## Dallas Woman Receives Lesson On How To Fire Rifle And Hits Buck With First Shot

MARSHALL, Nov. 29.—Around the hunting lodge on the C. L. Martin and sons ranch here, they tell this one about Mrs. Jack Boles of Dallas:

Before her arrival at camp, Mrs. Boles had never fired a rifle. Seth Martin, one of the ranch owners, took her out and showed her a buck. He handed her a rifle with which to do the shooting. He instructed her about lining up her sights, while the buck waited patiently. He showed her how the little bronze bead on the fore-sight must be on the buck; yet at the same time resting snugly in the crotch of the rear sight.
