"Try As We Will, We Cannot Escape" Impact In World Of Flames

U. S. Must Provide Power And Leadership To Prevent Future Bloodshed, He Says

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 1.—Secretary of Navy Knox declared today that once the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo axis has been defeated the United States and Great Britain must pool their forces "to stop new aggression... at its beginnings" in the post-war world.

The United States, said Knox, "must provide both the major power and the dominant leadership" for the task.

The navy chief outlined his views on the nation's future international role in a speech prepared for the 64th annual convention of the American Bar association.

Repeatedly he emphasized American insistence on freedom of the seas—"it is for this we have fought two wars and now, for a third time, have declared we shall insist upon at whatever cost—what may be."

Should war come, he said, "far better a distant war, than one at home."

He dwelt on the advantages now accruing to the United States and Britain because of the combined control of the seas by their two fleets, and predicted: "Eventually we shall lock Nazi Germany up in an iron ring, and within that ring of seapower she shall perish."

Appros of the American navy's operations, he reported: "We are already sweeping the German pirates from the North Atlantic, and bringing to England the products of the arsenal we have set up here."

"We Are Already Sweeping Nazi Pirates From North Atlantic," Convention Told

That statement aroused controversy whether the secretary had positive evidence that the navy's new shoot-on-sight policy was clearing raiders out of the Atlantic.

There was food for speculation, too, in the mention Knox made of Japan when he talked of ultimate Axis defeat. In recent months President Roosevelt and other key administration officials have omitted references to Tokyo in denouncing the Axis, and not long ago a series of conversations began between the two countries on outstanding differences. But the secretary had this to say:

"That Nazism will be defeated, I have no doubt. That we shall proceed from one measure to another measure"

Barbary Pirates Menaced Freedom Of Seas--Until U. S. Stepped In

Navy Loses No Time In Battle

Of the recent sinkings of American ships, President Roosevelt declared, "This is piracy. He recalled how the U. S. navy ended the menace of the Barbary pirates from the nation's young. Here is the story of the heroic incidents in that early feat of the U. S. navy. This article is the second of six in the series, "Our Navy Fights... and Wins!"

The Bashaw of Tripoli was in a rage. His pride was wounded; his dignity slighted. President John Adams, of the upstart United States, had signed an agreement to pay tribute to the fierce Barbary States (Tripoli, Morocco, Tunis, Algeria) in return for promises not to molest American shipping. But President Adams sent the Bey of Algiers a frigate to bind the bargain. And what did he get? Nothing.

U. S. Uses Blockade
America was at war with Tripoli, whose pirate hordes were the terror of the eastern seas. The war dragged on in a desultory manner from 1801 to 1803, the Americans relying chiefly on blockade.

Then in the winter of 1804, Capt. Edward Preble arrived in the Mediterranean to take command. His flagship was the new 44-gun frigate U. S. S. Constitution. He wanted none of this quiet blockading. He wanted action.

But the seas blew heavy all that winter, and there was no chance for a fight. Late the next spring, Preble returned to Tripoli. He borrowed six gunboats from the King of Naples, and by mid-July sailed toward the forts of Tripoli.

Tripoli was a formidable objective. A huge walled city, it was protected from the heights by a series of forts which mounted 115 heavy cannon. Further, a shoal extended some miles to the east of the city, forbidding entrance to a ship of the Constitution's draught.

Gale Holds Up Action
Preble brought his flagship to the outer harbor on July 28 and anchored. Suddenly a gale sprang up, and for a week the American fleet of gunboats battered down to ride out the storm. The wind did not abate until August 3. Preble, tired of waiting, raised sail at dawn and ran down before an easterly breeze until noon. Found him within three miles of the harbor batteries.

The Constitution could go no further. Preble gave final orders to the smallest ships warned against letting the pirates, expert powderers, swarm aboard, bid God-speed to all.

The United States fleet of small craft started into the harbor. Just before three in the afternoon the hatches opened first on the town. Tripoli's forts roared in reply. The battle had begun. The Constitution's guns blasted away at the forts while the smaller boats moved into battle.

History To Be Made
The Tripolitan came out to meet the attackers. Before long all six of the American gunboats were in the thick of it, their crews fighting desperately for their lives.

It was gunboat number four that day. She was commanded by

Stephen Decatur, a young man who had already made a name for himself in this Algerine war. Early in the winter of 1804, when Capt. Preble first arrived in the Mediterranean, he discovered that the U. S. frigate Philadelphia had been captured by the pirates. Her seizure was doubly serious for the Americans, decreasing their naval strength, increasing their enemy's.

Preble hit on a plan. If he could sneak into the harbor, he could destroy the Philadelphia. He made sure her guns were never used against him. He talked over the idea with Decatur, who was then in command of the U. S. S. Enterprise. It would be a dangerous job, he pointed out, for the Philadelphia was under the very nose of the harbor guns.

Decatur not only approved of Preble's plan, he begged for the honor of leading the expedition. Preble consented.

Creep Up At Night
To avoid being recognized, Decatur used a captured blockade runner, renamed Intrepid. With a hand-picked crew of volunteers, he crept into the harbor late one night, and sailed up close to the Philadelphia's stern before being discovered. By then it was too late for the pirates.

"Board!" yelled Decatur, and the hidden American sailors poured from the hatches and over the Philadelphia's stern. It was over almost before it began. Decatur himself just had time to jump back onto the Intrepid to avoid being blown sky-high with the Philadelphia's flaming timbers.

With enemy cannon making the water white around him, Decatur sailed out of the harbor to safety—and fame. Even Britain's

Lord Nelson called the deed "the most daring of the age."

Such, then, was the commander of gunboat number four as, with the harbor forts foaming and the Constitution hurling back death-laden replies, the battle began in Tripoli harbor on August 3, 1804.

Beats Pirates To Punch
Decatur, remembering Capt. Preble's warning against letting the pirates board him, took the initiative himself. Over the side he and his men swarmed as the first pirate craft came alongside. The air was foul with smoke, horrid with bloodcurdling cries as pistol and pike went into action. Saber and tomahawk clashed with dagger and cutlass. When it was over, the pirates had struck their flag.

Stephen Decatur was in an exultant mood when another of the American gunboats crossed his stern. "We've taken a pirate," he hailed. "How goes it with you?"

"Bad news," came the reply. "Your brother James was killed boarding a pirate after she had struck her colors. He . . ."

Stephen Decatur did not hear the rest. Bringing his boat about, he bore down on the nearest pirate ship. Over the side he went, his crew on his heels. Decatur made straight for the captain, a huge Turk Cutlass raised, Decatur lunged at him. The Turk swung his pike. Decatur's cutlass snapped at the hilt. Now the pirate captain rushed at him. It looked like the end.

Has Terrific Fight
But Stephen Decatur parried the blow with his arm and jumped on the captain. Down they both went, locked in a death grip.

Discussing the good points of the Oklahoma A. & M. team despite its 10-0 defeat by Oklahoma university Saturday, he said, "I'm afraid they are going to try to play that O. U. game over, and ours, too, all in one night, and if they do we're going to be in for a lot of trouble."

POWDER DRY 128 YEARS
LAWRENCEBURG, Ind. (AP)—A powder horn that came from VIRGINIA 128 years ago and still holds some of the original powder, bone dry but ready to use, is in the gun collection of Robert H. Nantz.

For almost a quarter of a century. There were few spectacular actions, but the U. S. West Indies squadron systematically hunted down the pirates. It was all over by 1825.

The United States had twice shown the world what was meant when it was said that the U. S. navy would "maintain the American policy of freedom of the seas."

U. S. Navy Triumphant
It was the beginning of the end for Tripoli. The war dragged on for a year before its final termination. But when it was over, all the Barbary States had new respect for the navy of the young American republic. The Algerine piracy came to an end.

The United States navy had trouble with pirates only once more during the next century and a quarter. This was right in our front yard. Buccaneers, based in the West Indies, were seizing and sinking American ships, killing their crews and passengers. The navy went to work.

This war on piracy dragged on

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Former Deputy Sheriff To Face Charge After Shooting

Man Is Slain After Quarrel

(By The United Press)
TEXARKANA, Ark., Oct. 1—Murder charges were filed today against former Miller County Deputy Sheriff Harry H. Oliver, who last night fatally shot Lee Clements, 37, as pedestrians ran from the bullets before a bus station.

Sheriff W. E. Davis said that the men had fought a short time before at a filling station over payment of gasoline which Oliver ordered, and that Clements beat him with a hammer and invited him to "go get your gun."

Unidentified Man Along
 Attendants at the station said that the men, with a third, unidentified companion who has not been located, arrived in Oliver's light truck. When Clements did not pay for the gasoline, Oliver borrowed a hammer and swung at Clements. He wrested the hammer from Oliver and hit him in the chest and stomach with it, witnesses said.

Oliver ran to the truck and as he got in, Clements shouted: "Go home and get your gun; if you come back, I'll whip you." Clements and the other man took a cab to the bus station, six blocks away.

A short time later, Oliver drove up there and approached Clements. He fired once with a 38-revolver. Clements doubled up, grabbed his abdomen, and crept behind his friend, using him as a shield.

There were shouts as bystanders ducked or ran. A second shot struck a bus. The unidentified man fled.

Oliver stood quietly as Clements died on the sidewalk. Police arrived as scores of theater-goers gathered. They took Oliver's revolver from his shirt, then took him to a hospital for x-rays. He was held in the county jail pending preliminary hearing Friday.

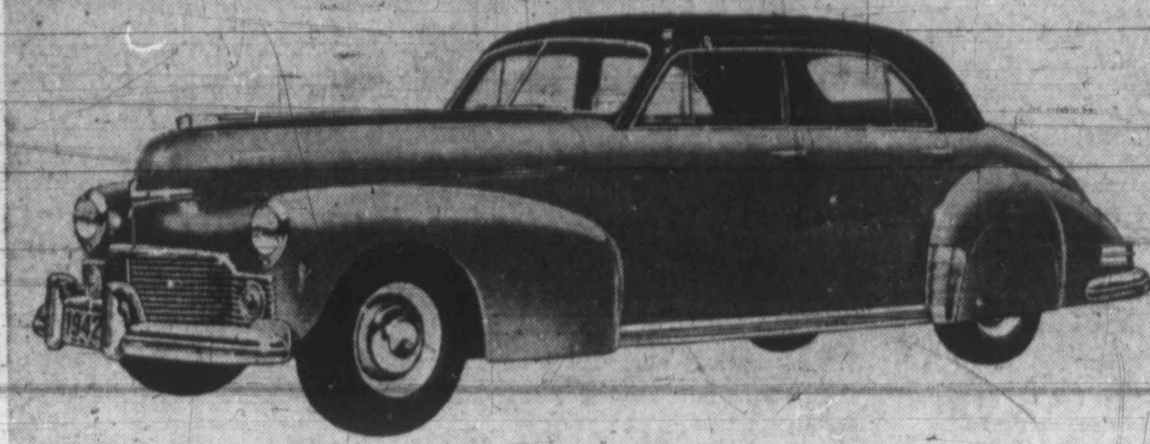

Motor Is Cushioned

Stoke Up Those Hungry Stomachs With Meals Made For Snappy Days

Square Meals Suggested

BY MRS. ALEXANDER GEORGE
It's time for stews, pot pies, savory escalloped dishes and other homespun dishes relished by the family when there is snap in the air.

MEAT PINWHEELS are satisfying, friendly to the budget and have their full quota of health-making material. Make up a softening biscuit dough, pat it into a 14-inch thick spread lightly with butter and with a pound of hamburger, cooked 5 minutes in water to cover and then drained (reserve the drained stock). Season the meat with salt, pepper, diced celery, parsley and onion and roll up. Cut off 1/2-inch slices and grease flat sides up, in shallow greased baking pan. Bake 20 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Cover with gravy made from the reserved stock and milk. Serve in the dish in which baked.
Bake a cottage pudding or gingerbread along with the pinwheels and have it for dessert topped with a hot orange sauce.

MACARONI SCRAMBLE is another main-dish just right for a chilly day. Simmer 5 minutes in a cup each chopped onions and celery in 6 tablespoons fat (bacon suggested), add 3 cups cooked macaroni, 2 cups tomatoes, 1-1/4 teaspoons salt, 1-4 teaspoon each of powdered cloves, paprika and poultry seasoning. Simmer 20 minutes—stir frequently—with a fork. Add 1-2 cup grated cheese, mix well and serve.

VEAL CURRY goes under a pastry top. Cut a pound veal shoulder into inch cubes, sprinkle with flour and quickly brown in 4 tablespoons fat heated in frying pan. Add 1-4 cup each chopped onions, green peppers and celery. Cook 5 minutes. Pour in 3 cups water, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon curry powder, 1 teaspoon salt and 1-4 teaspoon paprika. Cover and simmer an hour or until mixture is very tender. Pour into buttered baking dish, add a cup cooked peas and cover with rich biscuit dough with 2 tablespoons grated carrot mixed in. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven.

DRIED BEEF AND CORN—2 1/2 cups corn, No. 2 can, 1/4 cup dried beef, 2 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 cup condensed mushroom soup, 4 baking powder biscuits or rolls.
1. Drain corn and save liquid for gravy.
2. Brown corn and shredded dried beef in butter in saucedpan until slightly dry; add flour and continue browning for two minutes.
3. Add soup and liquid from corn and cook about 5 minutes over low direct heat, stirring until thickened. There should be 1/2 cup of liquid; if not enough corn liquid, use milk.
4. Break baking powder biscuit or rolls in half, toast-and-butter them and top with dried beef and corn.

Formal approval of the largest tax roll in the history of Lubbock independent school district was given by members of the board of trustees at a meeting Tuesday night.

Discussion also centered around what was termed an acute overcrowding of schoolroom facilities.

The new total of both real and personal property of \$39,596,399 will net the district \$318,622.98, the board revealed. The 1941 tax total will exceed that of 1940 by \$28,268.96.

The tax is 95 cents on each \$100 of taxable property.

There's A "Slight" Fee If You Join Taxpayer's Club

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is the text of three articles to appear in the Evening Journal concerning the new tax which Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Public must pay in 1942 to help finance the U. S. defense effort.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1. — In 1942 Uncle Sam is going to take the equivalent of \$97.03 from every man, woman and child in the country. On top of that, state, county and municipal tax collectors will take an additional \$69.62 per person.

That's the way things would be if the estimated 22 billion dollar tax bill for 1942 (counting the new federal tax of three and a half billion and the expected state and local levies) were divided equally among the population.

The treasury expects, the national income next year to be 90 billion dollars. But before we can begin jingling this around in our pockets we're going to have to turn over to Uncle Sam a quarter of it to the various branches of government.

The Income Taxpayers' club, otherwise known as the Society of Perpetual Gripe, will welcome 2,256,000 additional members into the organization next March 15. Congress has considerably reduced exemptions in order to permit these additional citizens to share the fun.

A slight initiation fee of \$40,000,000 will be charged these new members, which is approximately the price of 100 new super bombers. Bringing the figures down-stairs where we little fellows can understand them, the picture fits together something like this:

If you are a single man or a career girl earning \$20 a week you now pay Uncle Sam a mere 7 1/2 cents a week. In 1942 you'll have to cut 41 cents out of the budget pie every week and serve it to the government.

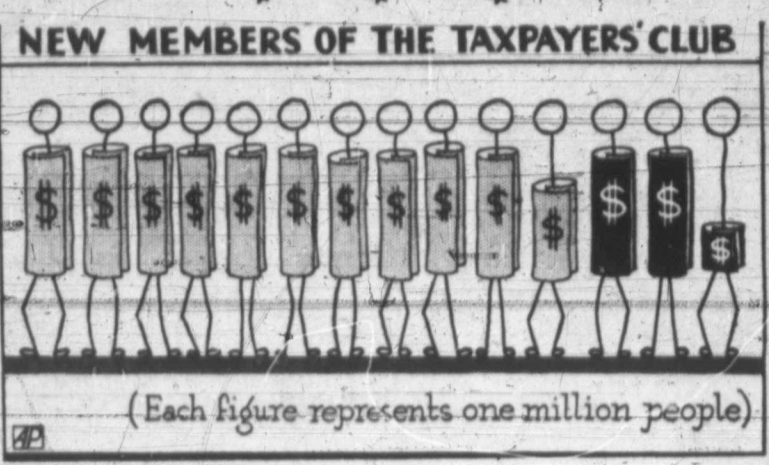
If you are a married man with no dependents, earning \$40 a week, you never before had to worry about income taxes. But your day has come, oldtimer. In 1942, every week you'll have to set aside for the federal tax collector 81 cents, or enough money to keep you in cigars.

If you are married, have two dependents, and net \$60 a week, you, too, are a newcomer to the Income Taxpayers club and your fee will be \$1.12 a week.

You may think it would be nice to have a million dollar annual income, but at \$19,230 a week you would have to kick back \$14,098 to the federal collectors, which is \$283 more a week than this year.

And you might shed a tear for the multimillionaire. If he has a net income of \$96,153 a week he will hand over \$75,444 of it to the U. S. government.

This being the situation, the people's representatives have a



pretty good idea of just how black things are going to look to Mr. Average American on the evening of next March 15 when he gets to fooling around with a scratch pad. So the gentlemen on Capitol Hill got a lot of government accountants to do the paper work, the deducting and crediting and exempting, so that all the taxpayer who earns less than \$3,001 will

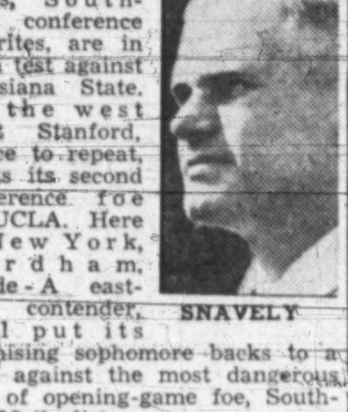

Rumania Is Reported To Be Tiring Of Costly Russian Campaign

Heavy Losses Are Blamed

(By The United Press)
ISTANBUL, Turkey, Oct. 1—Trustworthy informants arriving from Rumania asserted today that Gen. Ion Antonescu had relinquished command of all Rumanian troops outside Rumanian territory on the eastern front and had named himself defense minister, giving up the prime ministry in favor of Michail Antonescu.

Antonescu named Gen. Iosif Iacobici, who had served as defense minister, as chief of the general staff, the informants said. Michail Antonescu is a former minister of justice in the Rumanian cabinet.

Authority Disowned
 By his action, informants said, Antonescu had formally disowned authority for any advance by Rumanian troops outside what the claims for Rumania, which includes the Bessarabian territory Russia took before the Russo-German war broke out.

Informants pointed out that his attitude was somewhat like that of the Finns, who are reported to be eager to go outside the Finnish boundaries as they were before the Russo-Finnish war.

Bore Brunt Of Attack
 They said the Rumanians, by themselves bore the brunt of the attack on Russia in the south all the way to the Black sea, and that the Rumanians considered the price too heavy for the territory regained.

Despite this situation it was said, Gen. Antonescu continued to send Rumanian troops outside Bessarabia for service on the front and had mobilized three additional army corps (90,000 men or more) by calling up men as old as 49 years at the demand of Germany.

It was said that German troop movements in Bulgaria were still being intensified. Experts suggested they might be intended first to put moral pressure on Turkey and secondly to attack Turkey if the pressure failed.

Wages Alleged Due Are Sought In Suits

Wages alleged due under the fair wage act were sought in two suits on behalf of three persons filed Tuesday in the 99th district court of Judge E. L. Pitts.

N. E. Clifton and Cecil J. Lamb sued Shamburger Lumber company and G. F. Perry of Levelland named George P. Livermore, Inc. as defendant.

Clifton asked \$664.65 wages due and a similar amount of liquidated damages. Lamb set out \$900.95 unpaid wages and liquidated damages in the same amount. Each asked \$1,500 attorney's fee.

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Small Decline In Tech Enrollment

Enrollment of Texas Technological college has shown a much smaller decrease than most colleges and universities as result of the national emergency, according to report Tuesday by college authorities.

W. P. Clement, registrar, said that only the home economics division has shown an increase over last year.

Late registrations have increased enrollment to 3,555, or approximately 6.37 per cent less than last fall's total of 3,797.

Comparative enrollment figures by divisions for this year and last year are: Agriculture, 421 this year, 492 last year; engineering, 762 this year, 812 last year; home economics, 446 this year, 431 last year; arts and sciences, 1,926 this year, 2,062 last year.

Number of women students is 1,416, and total men students is 2,139, compared to 1,370 and 2,427 last year.
