SENATOR NORRIS AND THE JAP PROBLEM As is the habit of young children and very old people, the venerable Senator Norris of Nebraska

made some comments about Japan the other day which most people recognize as truths, but upon which they attempt, too frequently, to apply coatings of wishful thinking. He remarked that Japan probably will go hunt-

ing for trouble if Germany definitely should knock Russia out of the war. No one can believe the Japanese are behaving themselves at the moment out of preference. They are doing it through fear.

Then Senator Norris remarked that he was "not so sure that war with Japan (at this time) would be a bad thing for us." That comment sounds far different from most of the blarney that has been handed out about love and friendship between the Japs and the United States.

There is every reason to believe that the Japs would cut our throats with a great deal of pleasure -that they will do it if they ever get the chance. There also is every reason to believe that we could make short work of Japan now, and that if we don't dispose of this problem while it can be done easily, we are going to have to do it the hard way later.

It isn't likely that our national policy in the Far East will be guided by Senator Norris' ideas. But there is a strong possibility that time to come will emphasize the wisdom of his suggestions.
