Tech Grad Dies In Plane Crash

John P. Vinyard Of Turkey Killed When Training Plane Falls Near Florida Base

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 16. — Aviation Cadet John P. Vinyard, 24, of Turkey, Texas, was killed when his training plane crashed today about 28 miles southwest of the Jacksonville naval air station.

A station spokesman said the tail of his plane was nicked in a slight collision with another craft while he was flying in a three-plane formation near the auxiliary Postwick field.

The ship went into a shallow dive and then got out of control at about 600 feet altitude. Vinyard's body was found 100 feet from the plane, his parachute partly opened. Station officials did not know whether he attempted to bail out or was thrown from the plane when it crashed.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Vinyard of Turkey, Texas. He was graduated from Texas Tech in 1940.

Victim Attended Tech From '36 Through '40. Vinyard was graduated from Texas Tech with a bachelor of arts degree, major in chemistry, records in the office of Registrar.

PERHAPS it is because he is getting older with the years; perhaps it is because the problems of his office are growing greater with the hours.

WASHINGTON — The Franklin Roosevelt who met the press today in the regular semi-weekly conference was, to all casual appearances, the same Franklin Roosevelt of nine long, epochal years ago.

But, confident, immaculately barbered, the President of the United States showed only slightly the murderous effect of the physical and mental strain which must accompany eight and three-fourths years in the toughest job on earth.

Only one who carefully has observed him from time to time since his first nomination in Chicago in 1932 could possibly detect the changes time has wrought in this most unusual man.

The President today is more like himself of five short months ago—the last time The Plainsman wangled his way into the oval room of the White House's executive wing.

Late last May, beset by problems both domestic and world-wide, the President was both pensive and almost intolerably high strung.

Today, beset by problems even more delicate, he was his old, good-natured self—quick to pun and quicker to laugh.

In his dealings with the White House press corps, he was both generous and helpful. In fact, his 48-minute period with the reporters was identical with similar conferences during the "honeymoon" at the New Deal long before the press of the nation began to find serious differences with the man and his program.

TRUE, the nation's first Third Term President is appreciably thicker about the middle than he was nine years ago when he broke all precedents by appearing, in person, before his party's convention to accept the torch of leadership.

True, his hair is thinner; he shows signs of "nerves," and there is no tan on the long face or the jutting jaw.

Axis' Invaders Battering Way Into Big Port

Russians In Death Stand As Struggle Rages In Streets

German and Rumanian armies have battered their way into the big Russian grain port of Odessa and are fighting in the streets against the last resistance of the garrison and people's army which held out through 59 days of siege.

The Rumanian high command announced today.

The announcement by Vice Premier Mihail Antonescu, acting premier while his uncle, Gen. Ion Antonescu is in command of Rumania's armies at the front, said fighting was spreading tonight through the city.

The city is being destroyed by flames within defense lines manned by every man woman or child able to bear arms, military dispatches declared.

They said—hundreds of feet high could be seen for miles, lighting scenes of confusion and ruin.

Tokyo Cabinet Quits Amidst Grave Crisis. The cabinet resigned today in disagreement over issues of empire as Japan stood apparently at the crossroads weighing peace against a possible open break with the United States or war in Soviet Siberia.

Her choice seemed linked closely with developments in the war of the west where halfhearted Moscow had come to its hour of peril with the mechanized assault forces of Japan's Axis ally, Germany, reportedly only 62 miles from the Soviet capital—her onrush still unimpeded.

Japs Leave Moscow. Authoritative sources in British and Russian-guarded Iran said the Soviet government and foreign government missions had completed arrangements to move 450 miles east of Moscow to the crowded provincial city of Kazan if Moscow could not be saved.

The Japanese embassy already has quit Moscow for an undisclosed destination, reportedly at the advice of the Russian government.

The resignation of Premier Prince Fumimaro Koyama's cabinet came out of a week of high government conferences just three months after his previous government fell.

Visions Of Electric Chair Haunt Youth After Murder

PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 16. — Police held for "safe keeping" today an Alexandria, Va., teen-aged trio — a boy and two girls — after the boy tearfully related, a assistant County Attorney Richard S. 'Make Ready! War With Germany Certain,' Pepper Warns Nation

Senator Says U. S. Should Wipe Out All Enemy Fleets

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. — Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) counseled the United States today to prepare for "certain" conflict with Hitler by "immobilizing Japan" and by sweeping the seas clear of the Japanese, German, Italian and French fleets.

"It is just as certain that we are going to have to fight Hitler as it is that the United States and Great Britain are going to continue to exist," Pepper told newsmen.

Must Decide Struggle. "We and Hitler are going to be the eventual ones between whom the struggle will be decided."

The Florida senator, a member of the foreign relations committee and a vehement advocate of more active aid to Axis foes, declared that Japan was awaiting the outcome of the Russo-German war before taking new military steps.

"If Hitler should destroy Russia," he said "it follows as night after day that the Japanese will strike with further aggression."

A long time ago we should have used our naval and air forces, plus relentless economic pressure, at points where that would do the most good.

Not Yet Too Late. "It is not yet too late to draw a line and tell Japan if it is crossed we will shoot."

"The time is long past when we should have taken the initiative. It is just as certain that we will have to fight Hitler as it is that the sun will shine. At least we should drive Hitler off the seas, and destroy the Japanese, Italian and French navies. That would make it impossible for him to get to us for a few years at least, and during that time we could consolidate our strength."

Fight To The Last Drop Of Blood Is Russian Pledge

MOSCOW, Oct. 16. — Russia admitted today that its forces were being driven back steadily by a desperate German attack on Moscow and that the Germans had broken through in one important sector.

"Wednesday the position in the western direction (the central front) suffered a change for the worse," the morning war communique said. "The enemy throwing in a large number of tanks and mobile (motorized) infantry, succeeded in breaking through one section of our defense."

Compelled To Retreat. "Our troops offered heroic resistance and inflicted heavy losses on the enemy but they were compelled to retreat."

This was the news that greeted the people of Moscow this morning, as the thunder of the guns and the crash of bombs drew nearer to the ancient city, the heart of age-old Russia.

The afternoon war communique said: "Our troops continued to fight the enemy all along the front. Fighting was especially tense in the western direction. The German forces continue to throw into the battle many new units."

Germans Seek "Knockout" Blow

U. S. Back In Pacific Crisis

BY DEWITT MACKENZIE
Journal War Analyst

The Russian command at mid-day indicated that the Red lines were holding firmly against the increasingly violent Nazi assault on the defenses of the capital, but while the Muscovite statements were cool and determined they plainly were calculated to emphasize that the beleaguered city is in dire peril.

The German encircling movement continues, but the main force of the Hitlerian thrust is being flung against the defenses directly west of the metropolis along the old Napoleonic route. An authoritative source in London said that the battle here probably had reached its crisis, and this would seem to be true.

Nazis Make New Assaults
By this he meant that the Nazis and Bolsheviks are at grips close to the main bulwarks of the city in this frontal zone, if these fortified positions are reached and give way, the chief obstacle remaining before the Germans will be a wall of grimly battling Red soldiers.

The Nazis are pouring a steady stream of reinforcements, both manpower and mechanized equipment, into the conflict here in an effort to smash through these vital defenses by sheer weight. The conflict is bloody, and the dead are piled high.

U. S. May Be Affected
As a companion piece to this great crisis, another has boiled up in the Far East, and our own United States is indirectly involved in this. The Japanese government has fallen because of a disagreement over the method of pursuing the national policy of expansion.

The powerful military group has been anxious to take advantage of Russia's perilous position and strike at Siberia. More cautious advisers have feared that such a move might bring war with America. The fall of the cabinet undoubtedly means that at last the issue is to be faced squarely.

Famous Black Tomb Of Lenin Now Closed

MOSCOW, Oct. 16 (AP)—The famous black tomb of Nicolai Lenin which stands before the walls of the Kremlin is now closed.

Winter and summer, year after year, the tomb with its glass case in which one could see the body of Lenin preserved by a secret process, attracted millions of Soviet pilgrims.

The last official utterance regarding Lenin's body was that of the vice-commissioner of foreign affairs, S. A. Lozovsky, who said on July 24: "The dead Lenin is alive for us. He is with us wherever we are."

(There was no indication in this dispatch whether the closing of the tomb had any connection with the present crisis in the battle for Moscow.)

their lives on the western front? Should Tokyo decide to issue such a challenge, there can be no doubt that possibilities of American involvement in the war would be greatly increased.

The Japanese have for weeks been watching the progress of the Nazi invasion intently. As the German success has piled up, so has Japanese eagerness to profit by the situation increased.

Could Russia stand a war on two fronts? That gets us into the realm of pretty vague speculation because much would depend on external circumstances—the attitude of Uncle Sam, for example.

However, it can be said that if the Bolsheviks are able to pull their fighting lines back and establish a firm front for the winter, then they should be able to cause any Japanese invasion plenty of trouble.

It mustn't be overlooked that Siberia is organized as a unit in the matter of defense and defensive production. Also the Reds have a large standing army in the Far East—unless they have withdrawn it for service in the west, and while they may have brought back some forces it isn't likely that they have stripped Siberia, in view of the Japanese menace.

Leases Are Awarded On School Lands

AUSTIN, Oct. 16 (AP)—The state school land board today awarded leases on 8,394 acres of school land, submerged areas and river beds in eight counties to high bidders, without exception.

Bids to the land, located in Andrews, Aransas, Crockett, Ector, Gaines, Pecos, Terry and Victoria counties, were opened Oct. 7. The leases netted the state \$76,999.

The board, consisting of Gov. Coke Stevenson, Atty. Gen. Gerald C. Mann and Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, with the latter as chairman, also sold 1,863 acres of excess land, located as follows: 34.5 acres in Foard county, 22.7 in Ochiltree county, 237 in Kent county and 1,510 in Mason county.

Minimum Pay On Farm Asked

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Six representatives of the Southern Tenant Farmers Union appealed to Congress today to fix minimum wages for all farm laborers and ban child labor in agriculture.

The six men, weary from riding all night in an automobile to testify before a Senate labor subcommittee, supported a bill by Senator Langer (R-ND) which would deny farm benefits, subsidies and loans to farmers who employed child labor or failed to pay minimum wage scales fixed by the secretary of agriculture after public hearings.

J. R. Butler, president of the tenant union, testified that machine farming had expanded greatly in recent years with the result that thousands of tenants and sharecroppers had been forced off cotton farms and reduced to the status of day laborers with work available only a few months each season.

J. Clayton, 63-year-old principal of a negro school at Little,

Tex., said that reduced acreage and farm tractors were making it impossible for thousands of small farmers to make a living. "These people drift into towns and cities," he said, "and soon mix with crooks and gangsters. The Southern negro is happy on the farm and he'll stay there if he can make a living. Producers in Area Finished

Five producers owned by the Texas company were completed in the Slaughter field of the North Permian basin Wednesday, according to reports received here. Shell Oil company, Inc., No. 1 Mary L. Hammer estate, in the Owby pool of southeastern Yoakum county, flowed 577 barrels of oil a day through open two-inch tubing. Oil was diluted 5.2 per cent with water. The well has a gas-oil ratio of 700-1 and was acidized with a total of 10,000 gallons in pay lime. It went originally to 5,700 feet in lime, showing water in the lower horizons, and was plugged back to 5,351 feet for completion in the regular pay horizon of the pool.

Drilling Plus
In eastern Yoakum, Honolulu Oil corporation No. 1-13 L. H. Wright is drilling plug with cable tools from 5-1/2 inch casing cemented at 5,183 feet. Total depth is 5,262 feet in lime.

A wildcat in central Yoakum, Sinclair Prairie Oil company No. 1 Charles J. Kleiner, is drilling past 1,580 feet in red beds. American Drilling corporation No. 1 W. T. Hufnagel, western Terry county wildcat, topped anhydrite at 2,420 feet, datum of plus 1,108, and is drilling ahead below 2,430 feet. Its anhydrite top checks 140 to 180 feet low to L. E. Hults No. 1 Ross, dry hole three and a half miles north and slightly east, and 30 feet low to Texaco No. 1, S. T. Murphy, failure four and a half miles to the southwest which showed a promising amount of oil.

Full Of Sulphur Water
A scheduled 7,200-foot test in extreme northwestern Gaines county, Liking and Hall of Midland, No. 1 Dr. E. H. Jones is drilling in anhydrite and shale below 4,065 feet. Some geologists picked first Yates faulted quartz grains at 3,200 feet, datum of plus 467, but this is believed anomalously low and it is probable that the Yates top came in higher.

In Crosby county, Callihan and Waggoner No. 1 Ed M. Wahlenmaier is drilling past 2,366 feet in lime.

Ed McAdams No. 1 K. Stoker
Garza county wildcat, is carrying a hole full of sulphur water as it drills in lime below 3,360 feet. Sam Weiner, Ted Weiner and Garley No. 1 Kleen, Swisher county wildcat, is drilling in salt and shale below 2,590 feet.

Magnolia and Atlantic No. 2-193
Havemyer and Jenny, in the Seminole pool of central Gaines county, has been completed for natural daily potential flow of 291.92 barrels at 5,230 feet.

Largest in Hockley
Texaco No. 59, Bob Slaughter was largest of the firm's quintet of new producers in the Hockley county part of the Slaughter field. It made 2,277 barrels of oil a day after acidizing with 10,500 gallons at 5,005 feet.

No. 24 Slaughter flowed 1,192.32 barrels a day at the same depth; No. 42 Slaughter, 1,026.72 barrels daily also at 5,005 feet; and No. 7-B Mallet Land and Cattle company 1,523.52 at 4,997 feet, and No. 8-B Mallet 1,170.24 barrels at 5,014 feet. All received acid treatment.

Drilling and Exploration company, Inc. No. 1-B Ed Randall
in the Wasson field of southern Yoakum, flowed a rated 138 barrels of oil a day after a 47-quart nitro shot, bottomed at 5,100 feet in lime.

Drilling Approaches The 4,000-Foot Mark
Drilling in the Lee C. Harrison-Tobe Foster No. 1 E. L. Steck, wildcat oil test two miles northeast of Lubbock, approached the 4,000-foot mark this morning, according to reports by operators. The Harrison No. 1 W. G. Nairn estate, east of the city, is being prepared for a pumping gauge, they added.

No. 1 Nairn, discovery well of the county 3-1/4 miles northeast of the city, bottomed at 5,002 feet in lime, has been cleaned out to 4,985 feet and two-inch tubing set at 4,980, according to reports.
