British Youngsters Bend To Studies With Ears Alert For Bombing Raids Schools Open In Range Of German Guns

(By The United Press)
DOVER, Eng., Oct. 21 — There were piles of plaster dust behind the radiators and most of the windows were boarded up, the glass having been broken by the concussion of German shells, but Dover's schools were open again today, for the first time in 16 months.

By the pale afternoon light filtering through the remaining window panes, 25 young-
sters bent earnestly over their books, following the story of an unfortunate cat who wanted milk to make rice pudding for its kittens.

An eight-year-old arose beside his narrow desk. "I can't, sir," he said. "No sir. Only a few little words."
"They've forgotten almost all they knew," Peck said. "Why, we've found two eight-year-olds who are unable even to write their names. It's all to do over again, I'm afraid."

Of the school buildings, two have been damaged severely by bombs and four have been requisitioned for military purposes or for storage of furniture from bombed homes. Three 90-minute sessions are being held daily for children aged eight to 14. There are never more than 25 children in a group at any time, nor more than two groups in a building.

The students are children who were not evacuated under the government plan that took most youngsters into the interior. New Advances Are Scored By Nazi Invaders

Stalino Is Taken; Soviet Defenders Resist Fiercely

Adolf Hitler's high command announced a new blow to the backbone of Russia's war fortunes today with the capture of Stalino, big armaments center 100 miles north of Rostov-on-Don, and on the central front, Nazi troops were reported within 50 miles of Moscow.

Informed London quarters, picturing the Moscow-area as aflame with vast and bloody battles of tanks, infantry and artillery, said it was "a good guess" that the Germans had scored a 15-mile advance from the Maloyaroslavets sector, 65 miles southwest of Moscow, after six days of violent tank assaults.

Are Resisting Fiercely

Soviet armored forces, however, were said to be fiercely resisting in this sector, and Red army counter-attacks near Kalinin, 95 miles northwest of Moscow, were reported to have thrown the Nazis back across the Iuzh river.

On Main Rail Line

Stalino, a city of 455,000 population, lies on one of the two main rail lines between Moscow and the great Caucasian oil fields.

Covered With Snow

At several points, the Russians declared, Soviet counter-attacks have turned back the Nazi offensive over battlefields covered with snow.

FLOODS IN KANSAS

Eleven Towns Inundated By Rising Water

(By The United Press)
TOPEKA, Kans., Oct. 21 — Across the plains of central Kansas six rivers flooded today, joining their rampaging torrents to form gigantic lakes under which lay cities, towns, transcontinental highways, railroads and communication lines.

No lives had been reported lost but thousands were homeless, business districts in three major cities and at least 11 towns were inundated, thousands of acres of farm lands under water and hundreds of head of livestock were destroyed.

Many Are Rescued

State guardsmen, highway patrolmen, highway maintenance workers and federal troops from nearby Fort Riley, mounted jeeps, boats, high-wheeled army trucks and road-building tractors to navigate throughout the flood area and rescue stranded motorists and farmers.

Cities Are Flooded

They poured their waters over banks and into lowland. The mid-Kansas cities of Salina, Abilene and Emporia were flooded, Burlington, Florence, Dunlap, Herkington, Council Grove, Marion, Strong City, Lindsay, Enterprise, Solomon and Junction City also watched the flood waters lap at their homes.

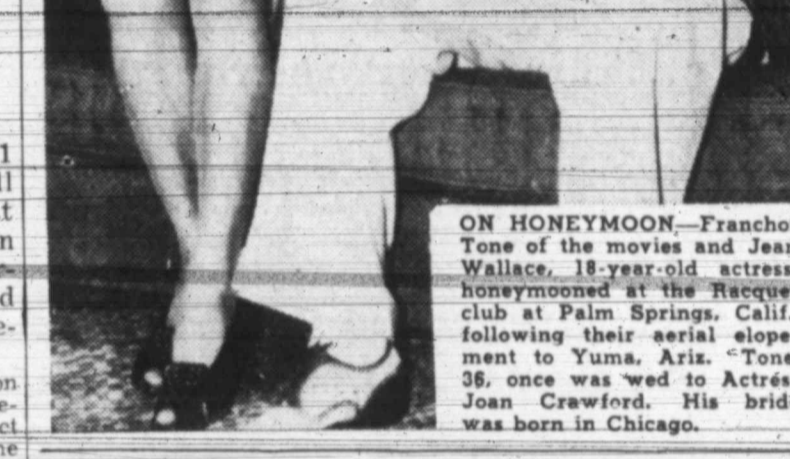

Budget Bureau Names--Not Recommends--Ways To Save

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—The budget bureau today told Congress three ways to make big cuts in non-defense expenditures—did not recommend any of them—and said the greatest reduction would hit the federal work-relief, farm and youth-aid programs.

The bureau report, prepared in response to a Senate finance committee resolution, said that "many of the indicated downward revisions would seriously impair the defense effort and other vital government activities."

Economical Management
Saying that the budget could be reduced only by more economical government management, curtailment of economic and social aid programs or reduction of existing governmental functions, the report disclosed that \$450,000,000 of "reserves" already had been set aside from appropriations for the 1941-42 fiscal period.

Under the finance committee resolution, Budget Director Harold D. Smith was requested to supply three budgets showing a non-defense spending reduction for the present fiscal year of \$1,000,000,000, \$1,500,000,000 and \$2,000,000,000.

Reduction Required
Smith's report showed that a \$2,000,000,000 cut would require a reduction of 94.8 per cent in the aid-to-youth program, a 73.9 per cent reduction in work relief, a 45.5 per cent slash in agricultural expenditures and a 75 per cent cut in supplemental items among all agencies.

For a \$1,500,000,000 reduction, the cuts would be 67.5 per cent for aid to youth, 49.3 per cent for work relief, 44.1 per cent for agriculture and 50 per cent for supplemental items. A \$1,000,000,000 reduction would provide cuts of 51, 31.6, 28.6 and 25 per cent for the respective items.

State Fair Of Texas Sets Attendance Mark
DALLAS, Oct. 21 (AP)—The weather wasn't too helpful, but Texas' 1941 State fair was a record-breaker just the same. A new all-time high for attendance—1,282,527 paid admissions—had been established when the big show closed Sunday midnight.

The figure compared with a 1940 attendance of 1,116,487, the previous record, and a goal of 1,250,000 set by fair officials. Some 104,144 persons pushed through the turnstiles yesterday despite two morning showers.

Priorities Granted For Remodeling Here

Notification that priorities in obtaining defense materials are available for the remodeling of homes so as to create additional accommodations for defense workers has been received by the chamber of commerce from the federal Office of Production Management, according to announcement this morning.

These regulations, officials said, should hasten the provision in Lubbock of the housing that will be required for commissioned officers and others to be stationed at the air corps training school under construction west of the city.

Officials of the chamber of commerce reported that a considerable number of houses available for renting has been listed with the chamber of commerce. Many of them, however, are short of the standard required for such houses, it was explained.

A question has existed, officials said, as to whether the materials could be obtained to bring those residences up to the required standard.

The new instructions were interpreted as meaning that necessary remodeling work can be done.

Ickes Claims That Time For Decision At Hand

Claims Nation Faces Danger

(By The Associated Press)
 CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Declaring that America should not be content merely to play the role of arsenal of democracy, Harold L. Ickes asserted last night that the time had arrived when "we must decide which is our side and take our stand irrevocably and determinedly on it."
 "We have tried to put off the evil day of decision by pretending that no evil lies in wait for us, or that, if lying in wait, we can fend it off by some of our customary wishful thinking," the interior secretary said in an address prepared for the Sinal Temple forum. "But who, if he can read and think honestly and objectively, longer doubts that the time for our final decision is here. We must face the issue."

Asks Neutrality Repeal
 Ickes did not say directly whether he referred to the issue of war powers. He declared "we must throw overboard the absurd idea that an all-out effort to preserve democracy can go skipping under the trees, hand in hand with 'business as usual'." He also called for repeal of the "obsolete and unwise" neutrality act.
 Contending that this country's armament effort had been far short of needs, Ickes laid much of the responsibility on "our appeasers and our defeatists," on business men interested chiefly in profits, and on workers unwilling to forego strikes.
 He recalled the Nazi attack on Greece and Yugoslavia and this country's inability to send substantial aid to the Greeks and Yugoslavs. "We had spent too much time wool-gathering," he said. "Too long had America listened to its Lindberghs, its General Woods, its Chicago Tribunes and its Burton Wheelers."
 His reference, in addition to the Chicago newspaper, was to Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, General Robert E. Wood of Chicago, and the senator from Minnesota. All have criticized the administration's foreign policy.

Panama Okays Arms For Merchant Ships
 PANAMA, Panama, Oct. 21 (AP)—The new pro-American government of Panama officially approved the arming of merchant ships of Panama registry today as the answer to "unjustified" attacks by German sea raiders.
 The government of President Ricardo Adolfo de la Guardia thus reversed the last decree signed by Dr. Arnulfo Arias before he flew to Cuba and was overthrown two weeks ago. Arias, who has Nazi leanings, has been in jail since his return to Panama last week.
 The government's new decision was set forth in a resolution which described the Arias government's action as "from all points of view inconvenient considering that recently there have been occurring sinkings of Panama flagged vessels by naval forces of the German government."
 Many new industries have been started in Panama since the beginning of the war.

Federal Control Of Oil Is Discussed

TULSA, Oct. 21 (AP)—The questions of federal control and priorities were studied today at opening sessions of the joint convention of the Independent Petroleum Association of America and

the National Stripper Well association.
