All Americans Aboard Have Been Rescued

Capital Relieved After News Of Crew's Rescue

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Secretary of State Hull today labeled the torpedoing of the American freighter Lehig-off Africa as an act "in harmony with all the definitions of piracy and assassination."

This sinking of a vessel flying the American flag, and travelling without cargo between Bilbao, Spain, and the African coast, was a perfect example, Hull told his press conference, of the "Nazi policy of attempting to create a reign of terror, frightfulness and absolute lawlessness on the high seas, and especially on the Atlantic."

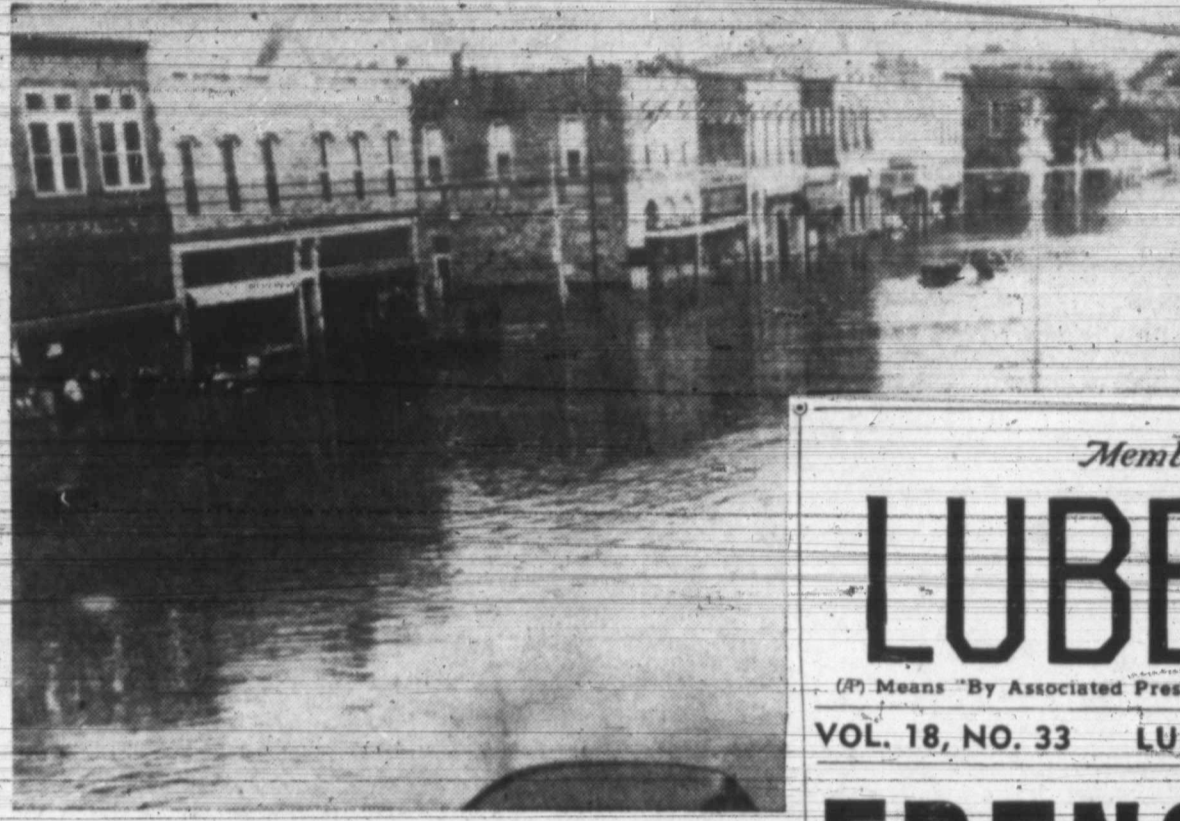
Americans Are Rescued
Hull spoke shortly after the Maritime commission said it had been advised of the rescue of all the 39 Americans of the Lehig crew.

New Driver's Licenses Will Be Issued

Applicants To Receive Tests

Issuance of new driver's licenses will be started by the Lubbock office of the state highway patrol within a few days, according to an announcement of Sergeant J. B. Walling.

New forms have not been received but they are expected shortly and may be obtained at the patrol office in the basement of the courthouse.

But there's a few more things to be considered than just stepping in and asking for one.

Must Get Permit

Those who are just learning to drive must get an instruction permit which lasts for a 90-day period. Then they will be given the regular test for drivers.

Operators' licenses are required for regular drivers, but if the applicant is under 18 and over 14 years old, he must make special application to the county judge.

There are some persons who may drive without a license. They include those driving an official vehicle in the service of the United States or those operating a road machine, farm tractor or other agricultural vehicles.

Here's The Exam

And here's that examination. The questions:

1. Are you able to read and understand the road signs used on Texas highways?
2. Do you know the rules about driving a car in Texas?
3. Can you see well enough to drive safely?
4. Have you the skill and experience to operate an automobile so as not to endanger pedestrians and other motorists?
5. Have you any physical or mental handicaps which would make your driving dangerous?

Four Main Parts

The examination contains four main parts:

1. Road sign test—Applicants will be shown several road signs and must tell what they mean.
2. Eye test—Applicants must read standard letters from a chart. If an applicant cannot pass the test without wearing glasses, he will be required to wear them while driving.
3. Road rules test—At least 10 questions concerning Texas road rules are given. This is a written examination.
4. Driving demonstration—Applicants will be asked to drive for some distance and to do such things as are experienced in ordinary driving.

Each license certificate has an expiration date. If the license is taken to an examiner before this date it may be renewed without an examination.

Licenses Cost 50 Cents

A new license or renewal costs 50 cents and is good for two years. It is not necessary to own a car to obtain a license but the person making application must bring a car with him which must be in good condition with horn, brakes and windshield wiper in working order.

People caught driving without a license are subject to penalty. The offense is punishable the same as for breaking of any other traffic law.

Licenses are issued at the Lubbock office on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 1 to 5 o'clock. If you have any doubt of your ability to pass the test you can get a free booklet, "Your Driving Handbook," which is issued by the state department of public safety. It contains all the information necessary.

Shipbuilding Catches Up With Sinkings

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Oct. 22. (AP)—Rear Admiral Emory S. Land, retired, chairman of the U. S. Maritime commission, disclosed today that American ship construction has caught up—ton for ton—with the sinking of Allied shipping in the European war.

The admiral paid a surprise visit to the California Shipbuilding yards and the Consolidated Steel Corp. at nearby Long Beach, before leaving by plane for San Francisco.

"Six million tons of Allied shipping a year is being sunk in this war and we are just now catching up to that in American production," Land declared in an interview. "We are making every effort to go ahead of that figure."

Island Empire Is Vulnerable

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—If Japan goes to war with the United States, Britain, Russia and the Dutch East Indies—or even if she goes to war with the United States alone—then Japan stands an excellent chance of committing hari-kari for Hitler's benefit.

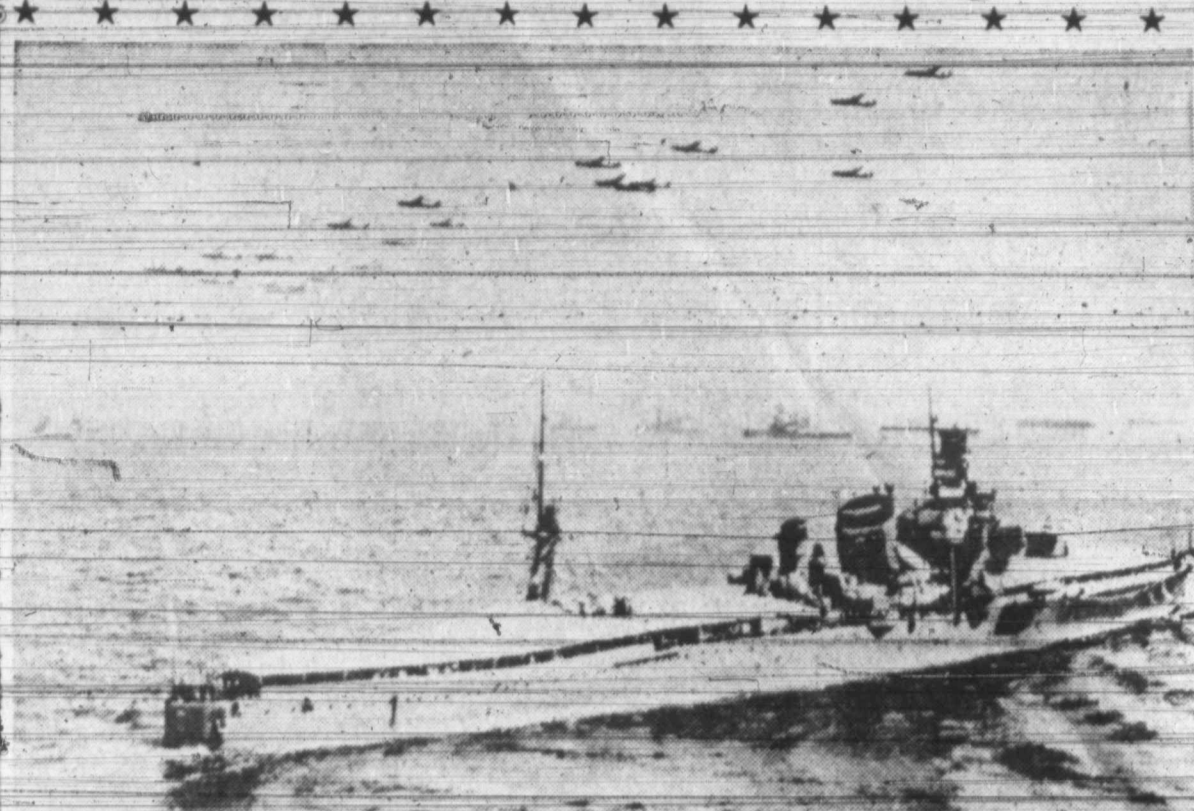
She would draw off some forces and supplies that would otherwise hinder his conquest of Russia, but those forces and supplies would very probably crush her before Hitler could cross Siberia to her aid.

Sea Decision Seen
That seems to be the sum of the factors in a war that would probably be decided at sea. Narrowing it down to the naval odds as between this country and Japan, they seem to be 2 to 1 against Japan.

If her navy is, as a spokesman has just said, "fitting for a fight," then the tilt is of recent origin; for her admirals, who get around more than her generals, know that they are very apt to emerge from such a fight quite literally burning with defeat.

Difficulties For Japan
How that defeat came about would depend upon where the war was fought. If Japan goes northward against Siberia, she hits terrible weather, two tough Red armies aided by many submarines operating from Vladivostok against Japanese supply routes and bombers blasting Japanese cities within easy range. If only to protect the Vladivostok entry-port for supplies for Russia, President Roosevelt conceivably would risk some opposition here and send the Pacific fleet the shorter way from Hawaii to engage the Japanese, before the Nazis could fight their way the tremendous distance from Europe.

If Japan goes southward, she aids Hitler less but herself more directly. For southward are the raw materials she craves. And sea attacking British-Singapore means difficult jungle fighting and brings in the Dutch East Indies and Russia surely, and perhaps this country, to protect our rubber, tin and Singapore naval base and the Philippines.



A U. S.-Japanese war would mean twilight for the Rising Sun, thinks the U. S. navy. Naval air power is the trump that would turn the trick, while the axes up Japan's sleeve, two to four "super-cruisers," are probably vulnerable.

And from the Philippines, American forces could attack the exposed sea routes for a Japanese army pressing southward.

War Strategy Studied
One of two American naval conceptions of a war against Japan has envisaged our attacking supply ships and transports down the coast of China—plus a long-range blockade of trade routes leading to Japan itself, for the purpose of starving Japan's war industries. It could be done largely from Manila with cruisers, submarines, destroyers and planes, leaving heavier ships and some fighter for the Battle of the Atlantic.

But the Japanese have some reserves, and if Hitler approached Siberia, the time factor might well force the United States to more aggressive action. Then the Pacific fleet, with every battleship and heavy cruiser that could be spared, would rush from Hawaii westward. It is 3300 miles to Japan, from our only major Pacific fleet base. But almost unnoticed is the fact that, since the navy recently built up its "train" of supply and repair ships, it has almost a "floating base." This, with the fleet's planes, means that the U. S. navy has greatly reduced the handicap of sea-miles in choosing the scene of battle.

From admiral to bluejacket, our navy believes that even though the Pacific fleet has been weakened, chances are 2 to 1 they could beat the Japanese in a stand-up fight. Politely agreeing, the Japanese have prepared to run away or fight at extreme ranges. Japanese battleships average faster and perhaps slightly safer than ours, and are newer; but their armor, like the ill-fated Italians', is thin (12-14 inches vs. 18), especially on the turret. Our big guns could crack them at nine to ten miles, but they must close to six to crack ours. Our new 16-inch guns are better than theirs, our total gun-power would probably be near 50 per cent greater.

Our heavy cruisers outgun theirs, though on light cruisers, destroyers and submarines terms would be nearer equal—depending on how many American warships were kept in the Atlantic.

Both Navies Have Trumps
Both navies hold trumps. The Japs' trump are two to four mysterious new "super-cruisers" of 12,000 tons and 12-inch guns. But our navy asks: "Remember the Graf Spee?" and points out that these pocket battleships could be attacked with a new 8-inch armor-piercing shell, fired from our heavy cruisers.

The American trump recalls another German naval disaster, the Bismarck, which succumbed to air power. Naval authorities believe we have the finest naval aviation in the world, sending up from carriers bigger and better planes than the Japanese navy boasts—planes better enough, with crews better enough, to maintain that 2-1 superiority. That includes superior spotting for our superior gunners, plus dive-bombing against Japanese ships.

Air Force Stronger
The American trump can take two tricks. Navy heavy patrol bombers (range: 3000 to 5000 miles) could operate 1000 to 2000 miles offshore, against Japanese ships, or attack Japanese cities. They can reach them from the Philippines or even more easily from Vladivostok, where the Russians also have many heavy bombers. The United States has strengthened its Far East air force, especially since the naval war has shown that within certain limits bombers can replace surface vessels which were sent to the Atlantic when we occupied Iceland.

And all this American air and sea power would be reinforced by the 75,000 Russian subma-

lines believed based at Vladivostok; the considerable forces of the Dutch East Indies, and by British capital ships now in the Pacific.

Japan's present sea strength is less than it will be any day from now, when Tokyo will place in commission new capital ships that now are nearer completion than ours. In two years, the balance would swing back in the U. S.'s favor. And in three years the United States will have, to all intents, its long-projected two-ocean navy.

Wildcat In Eastern Yoakum Fails; Other Tests Brought In With Good Production

Apparent failure of a wildcat test in eastern Yoakum county and several completions featured oil activities in the North Permian basin Tuesday.

The Yoakum test, Honolulu Oil corporation No. 1-13 L. H. Wright, is carrying 860 feet of sulphur water, representing an accumulation over a 32-hour period, while drilling at 5,344 feet in lime. Only a scum of oil is present. The owner plans to halt operations at 5,360 or 5,370 feet and quit the well. It went into the sulphur water horizon at 5,277 feet and logged steady increases in while drilling progressed.

Four miles east of Plains in cen-

tral Yoakum, Sinclair-Prairie Oil company No. 1 Charles J. Kleiner, a structurally high wildcat, is drilling below 4,350 feet in anhydrite.

Producer Computed

In the Wasson field, southern Yoakum, American Liberty Oil company completed its No. 7 W. S. Knight for 269.12 barrels per day and its No. 14 Ellen Keller for 90.72 barrels net oil daily, plus 39 per cent water. On the northwest Gaines side of the field, Amon G. Carter No. 7-A W. M. Moore made 662.40 barrels per day.

Broderick and Calvert, Inc., and associates have set 10-inch surface

pipe at approximately 250 feet in their No. 1 Hayward, new wildcat nine miles southwest of Muleshoe in Bailey county.

Reliable reports from Lee C. Harrison and associates' No. 1 W. G. Nairn estate, discovery well three and one-quarter miles north of Lubbock, credit it with pumping six to seven barrels of oil hourly, with a small amount of salt water also present. No official gauges have been released by the owners. The well is bottomed at 5,002 feet and is producing from time of the Clear Fork, Lower Permian.

In the Hockley county part of the Hugh Slaughter field, Honolulu No. 15-10-B Mallet Land and Cattle company flowed 1,028.56 barrels per day; the Texas company No. 47 Bob Slaughter was good for 1,620.24 a day; Texaco No. 40 Slaughter made 1,569.16;

Oil, Cotton And Cattle Join Defense Spending In Boom In Texas

Vast Resources Being Tapped

By ARNOLD DIBBLE
United Press Staff Correspondent

DALLAS, Oct. 22. — You talk about a boom? Well, that one and one-half billion that Uncle Sam is spending is just Saturday night money to Texas. They think in powerful big figures down here, mister, and there's a reason.

This biggest state is feeling the most prosperity since the oil-mad days that gushed for the first three decades of this century. Oil is spouting again, and cotton and cattle are restored to their former importance as money industries. That's a triple-dip combination for Texas, but the emergency now may make it possible for them to tap vast stores of minerals and timber and other natural resources that only high prices can bring out.

Shouting For Canal
That's why North and East Texans are shouting over the long-proposed Trinity river canal outlet to the Gulf of Mexico. It will cost \$115,000,000, will extend 200 miles from Fort Worth to the Gulf, and Congress already has approved \$15,000,000 to dredge a nine-foot channel from the Gulf to Liberty, 59 miles upstream. The proponents say it's Texas' answer to prosperity, any time.

Economists and geologists back them up, the latter pointing to the untapped potash beds, the 23 great oil pools, the undeveloped beds of native iron and bauxite, 10,000,000 acres of forests that could bear 3,000,000 tons of lumber without making barren its verdure, and where are still untouched—sulphur domes, naval stores of resin, turpentine and pine oil, clays, building stone, Fuller's earth, bentonite, kaolin and many others. Down here they claim that the Trinity valley is the richest in the world and has barely begun to be exploited.

Department Store Sales Up
Whether the canal will be completed in time to aid America's push to become the strongest military power on earth and an arsenal for all other nations engaged in the battle to keep democracy alive depends entirely upon appropriations from Congress, its supporters claim.

Meanwhile, department store sales in the larger cities are up as much as a third, cattlemen are getting a third more for their stock than they have in many years. Cotton planters find the market is almost double a year ago, and cottonseed brings the highest price in history at more than \$50 a ton.

Oil production is at one of the highest levels since prohibition was instituted and if the producers are successful in bringing about a raise in the price of crude, they will be in an enviable position. Non-defense building for the first nine months of the year reached a new high with contracts totaling \$383,091,868. Payroll increases are up 27.5 per cent and employment 15.4 per cent higher than a year ago. Payroll figures show that the lumber industry is also having good times—with planning mill payrolls 68.3 per cent above last year.

Backlog Orders Seen
According to reliable surveys the government has already spent or has promised to spend in the form of backlog orders—more than \$1,500,000,000 here for defense purposes.

The four largest cities in the state—Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, and San Antonio—have, of course, concentrated the greatest amount of defense contracts. Dallas, with the huge North American Aviation factory near its city limits, has close to \$200,000,000 in defense contracts. In Fort Worth, where the Consolidated Aircraft is erecting a \$15,000,000 bomber assembly plant, the government will spend at least \$200,000,000.

Houston, connected with Gulf by a ship channel, has more than \$300,000,000 in defense contracts for tank ships, and steel and chemical products.

San Antonio boasts four army posts with more than 30,000 in personnel. It also has government contracts totalling nearly \$90,000,000.

The call on other Texas communities: Texarkana—\$98,000,000; Beaumont, \$150,000,000; Corpus Christi, \$61,000,000; El Paso, \$15,500,000 with Biggs field and Fort Bliss troops there to spend their paychecks every month; Abilene, \$17,000,000; Austin, \$12,000,000; Fort Arthur, \$8,000,000; Orange, \$116,683,000; Harlingen, \$11,000,000; Hitchcock, \$10,000,000; Mineral Wells, \$17,000,000; Wichita Falls, \$20,000,000; Lubbock, \$5,000,000; Midland, \$5,000,000; Waco, \$12,000,000; Brownwood, \$18,000,000.

Jap "Assistance" To Thailand Is Urged

Move Seen As Threat In East

The Japan Times and Advertiser, a newspaper controlled by the Japanese foreign office, has added a handful of tinder to the Far Eastern fire by urging assistance for Thailand (Siam) against what are described as foreign, anti-Japanese elements.

"Assistance" presumably would take the form of Japanese troops which again raises the red-hot question of the occupation of Siam.

Would Be Challenge
Now this little country lies right up against British Malaya, at the base of which is the great British naval base of Singapore, and London has once more made it clear through a spokesman that the occupation of Siam would be a direct threat to British interests. It also would be a challenge to the position the American government has taken.

In other words such a move by Nippon might easily precipitate war. That being the case, and since the Times and Advertiser wants to talk on this subject, it is permissible for us to enter the discussion without backing into it apologetically.

U. S. Is Confident
The other night down in Tulsa, Oklahoma, I joined in a talk-fest with a dozen big-time oil men and other prominent citizens, and the topic of war between the United States and Japan came up. Someone asked if there was any doubt at all about the United States winning such a conflict, and the answer to that is definitely in the negative — no doubt whatever. "However," I added, "I may
