

The survey, made on square yards of soil picked at ranom on the college farm, indicated an average of nine egg pods per square yard of soil, Each egg pod contains from 24 to 26 eggs. Howell said he believed eggs

had been laid in large num-bers within about a 30-mile radius of Lubbock He expressed the belief

# Suez And Red Sea Pictured As "Ungodly Terror" For U. S. Seamen

# **Axis Bombing** Raids Deadly

HONOLULU, T. H., Oct. 24 Fierce and deliberate attacks of German and Italian bombers on United States flag ships have made Suez and the Red sea "an un-godly terror" for American seamen, crew members of a returning freighter said today.

While their ship was docked at suez two months ago, they said, three other American ships were hit by aerial bombs and a fourth struck a mine. One was sunk and the others were damaged so severely they were forced to drydock

Others Not Named The sunk vessel was the Steel Seafarer and the mine victim was

(Maritime regulations forbade naming the returning freighter. The state department announced Sept. 7 the Steel Stafarer sink-

John Stowe of Brooklyn, N. Y., quartermaster of the freighter said that the only reason there were fewer sinkings of the clearly identified American ships was the poor marksmanship of the Nazi

"On the night of our arrival at Suez," he said, "we anchored to await dock space and soon German planes started dive-bombing the ship. We weren't hit but we sought a quieter port to await dock space. "We returned to Suez three days later. That night 300 German

planes, plus Italians, bombed the harbor continuously more than six hours. "The decks were littered with steel bomb splinters but there were no direct bomb hits and no casualties. Our ship was lifted almost clear of the water but these near misses only loosened some

In this riad, he said, 48 persons were killed ashore at Suez. The poor German marksmanship was matched by that of the British anti-aircraft batteries which were ineffective in either hitting or driving off the planes, he said.
