

Although Foreign Minister Enique Ruiz Guinazu said he had heard nothing regarding such a project, it was recalled that he advocated a similar conference several months ago when he made a state visit to Brazil, and that Oswaldo Aranha, Brazilian foreign minister, concurred in this recommendation

Site Is Tentative

Neither official stated specific ally that such a conference should be arranged, but Mexico's Foreign Minister Ezequiel Padilla said last month that "it would not be difficult to conceive that a conference American foreign' ministers ght be held in Washington on

nental defense. There was no indication as to why Washington should be chosen as the seat of the conference if it is called. Rio de Janeirio has been tentatively selected as the next neeting place of American foreign ministers, when and if they assem-

Series Of Visits Made There has been considerable dis-

cussion among South American foreign ministers this year, and new meetings are projected. Ruiz Guinazu, who was Argentine am-bassador at the Vatican, made official visits to the United States, Colombia, Brazil and Uruguay on his way home to assume the foreign office portifolio.

Dr. Luis Lopez de Mesa, Colombian foreign minister, has com-pleted a tour of several South American countries, visiting Peru, Chile, Argentina, Brazil and Vene-

Eduardo Anze Matienzo, new Bolivian foreign minister, has visited in Peru and Chile.

Dr. Aranha will soon visit Chile, and may stop off en route to Santiago or on his homeward journey to make an official call in Buenos Aires and perhaps in Monteviedo

Finally, circles close to the Chi lean foreign office said that Foreign Minister Juan B. Rossetti had been invited to Buenos Aires, and that he may go after the Aranha

Views Are Exchanged It is scarcely reasonable to assume that all of this traveling is for purely social purposes. The visits are more likely being made to exchange views among the South American governments regarding continental defense, inter-American trade, shipping and transpor tation, relations vis-a-vis the Axis powers, industrial needs in the face of difficulties imposed by United States priorities system, and even possibly their stand regarding the border controversy between Peru and Ecuador, This dispute may be mediated through the good offices of Argentina, Brazil

and the United States.

A Pan-American police and judicial conference is slated for some time this year in Buenos Aires. The purpose of the session will be to seek cooperation in combatting activities of agents of foreign bel-

Conference Work Important The agenda of the conference is being prepared by a committee in Washington, headed by Felipe A. Espil, Argentine ambassador to the United States. The delegations to the conference are expected to be jurists, and they may be aided by technical advisers, including police specialists, such, as for example, representatives of such bodies as the Federal Bureau of Investiga-



THE eyes of the world have re cently been riveted upon the steppes of Russia; on the Crimea and the North Atlantic. Therefore, little thought is given to another theater of war-in blistering Africa, where opposing forces are writing a grim history of human combat.

One of the chillingly dramatic sagas of World War II remains be chronicled after the siege of Tobruk has terminated either in defeat or victory for the Britsh garrison in that community of 23,000 souls. Tobruk is a Britishheld stronghold in an Axis sea of Libyan sand, threatened by Italy, which previously held the city, and by fresh German divisions which seemingly appeared out of where. Tobruk's strategic importance is so great that it may be the prize in a continuing tug-of-war until the sanguinary war is brought to a close.
