### Human Skull Found Recently In Oklahoma Puzzles Scientists

NEW YORK, Nov. 25-A haman skull found under about 25 feet of earth in Oklahoma is a candidate for the rank of America's No. 1

The skull has the brain size, height and contours of the million-year-old Peking man, earliest identified sub-human. It closely resembles, in the same features, the ape-man--Pitchecanthropus-who lived half a million years ago in

Java. But otherwise the fossit head has some of the fine structure which to date has been found only in modern

If really one of the apemen, this skull would give America a human occupation of hundreds of thousands of years. As a freak, the skull could come from the last 25,000 years, the period from which scientists generally agree the first evidences of man in America have been

LIVERPOOL, Eng., Nov. 24 — How the mate of a vessel torpe-doed in the Atlantic performed a clasp-knife operation in a drifting lifeboat and saved the life of a steward, was described when the survivors reached Liverpool.

The steward was Joe Wilkinson, 18, of Liverpool, His right arm was shattered; shell splinters were in the other; his foot was injured, and pieces of shrapnel were em-

bedded in his back.

Decide On Operation

The men in the lifeboat, 17 of them, held a conference to decide how to save his life and the second mate made the decision. "Some of that shrapnel in his

back is pressing on the lung," he said. "We must get it out." The operation was made with-

out fuss. There was an oil stove in the lifeboat and it was turned up. The second mate drew his knife and cauterized the blade in the flame. "Get started," said Wilkinson

grinning. The amateur surgeon slid the blade into the wound; probed and found the hidden metal, and with few deft strokes, recovered the shrapnel.

"Didn't Hurt A Bit" "It didn't hurt a bit," said the youth later. That was because the flesh was numb from exposure.

Then his pals set out to nurse him, as well as they could. They tore their shirts to make bandages to stop the bleeding and to dress

They held on to him constantly to stop the heavy seas from sweep-ing him overboard. This continued for four and a half days.

The lifeboat was sighted by another ship, and the survivors landed in Iceland. A doctor extracted the other splinters from Wilkin-son's arms. He said the youth's life had been saved by the prompt



He makes no estimate of the antiquity of this Oklahoma but says he may be one of the very antique Americans. For the peculiar \*character of the skull Dr. Shapiro says he has no demonstrable hypothesis. It might be an extreme type of early American or it might be a skull of degenerate form.





Members of the United Mine Workers (CIO) approved with only minor criticism the action of President John L. Lewis in submitting. the union shop demand to arbitration. More than 53,000 miners in the captive mines owned by the steel companies, had struck for a union shop, and were joined by approximately 150,000 workers in commercial mines who walked out

Forestalls Mill Shutdowns The miners' return forestalled widespread shutdowns of steelmills because of coal shortages. Several plants had curtailed operations? The Carnegie - Illinois Steel corporation, hardest hit, shut down 11 blast furnaces and estimated it would be mid-week be-fore it returned to full operation. By that time, officials said, 30,000 ons of steel will have been lost.

A Carnegie-Himois spokesma said operations would be "restored. as quickly as possible after coal deliveries are resumed.



In fact, we don't think that's enough pay for a capable, experienced and well grounded teacher. But we do not agree with Dr. rvin and the others who want a pecial session of the state legislature to make a special appro-priation to assure all Texas teachers of a \$1,200-per year minimum

We disagree with the idea because we do not think it is a function of the state legislature to assure any group a minimum wage

Upon several occasions in the past, this column has expressed the opinion that a majority of the school teachers in Texas-including Lubbock-are not paid in ratio to: (1) Their efforts and labors;

(2) Their worth to the community they serve.
We still hold that view unequivocally.

But we do not think that the State of Texas has any more business guaranteeing a wage minimum to school teachers than it has guaranteeing a wage minimum to bricklayers, painters, editors, lawyers, doctors, or bank

And simply because a highy organized teachers association may be able to exert sufficient political pressure to standard for teachers doesn't make the move either right, or

WE have never known a newspaper worker to be forced to either enter, or remain in, newspaper work.

No free adult engaged in the business we know most about has to stay in that business if he doesn't want to. If he can't make as much money as he wants to make in the newspaper field, he is free to get out and go into some other line of endeavor The same is true of the teach-

ers.

If they can't sell their wares for should as much as they want-or should have—they don't have to remain in teaching if they can do as well. or better, selling drygoods, pounding a typewriter, or in innumerable fields open to ambitious, intelligent individuals.

\* \* \* We have no quarrel with the teachers of Texas in their campaign to raise their econo-

We believe Texas teachers as a whole are worth more money and should get more money-although we also believe that from their ranks should be weeded out a very definite percentage of misfits and incapables.

But we don't believe the teachers have any more right special legislation than have the drygoods clerks, the stenographers, the social workers, or the filing clerks. \* \* \*

ECONOMIC AID TO MEXICO

A recent official report should help to a general appreciation of the importance of the apparent progress toward the adjustment of differences between the United States and Mexico, and the restoration of a relationship to improve the economic condition of our southern neighbor.

The report revealed that the average cash income in Mexico last year approximated only \$36. In the United States it was somewhat more than \$600 for each man, woman and child. The situation was even more unfavorable to Mexico than the figures indicate because the concentration of wealth and income there into a few hands is even more pronounced than in the U.S.

It isn't necessary to be a student of international finance to appreciate that little can be expected from a people with an average national income of only \$36. They can't be producing much. They can't be eating much. They can't buy much. Obviously, anything we reasonably can do to help them is going to help us
