Journal War Analyst The martial spirits of the old notguns are stirring uneasily as Japan debates whether to accept Washington's sweeping terms or to pursue expansion at the risk of war, but the signs still read the same - that Nippon would like to avoid an armed clash with America and Britain if it could find some face-saving escape from its dilemma.

The Tokyo government appear ed to be feeling its way cautiously through the crisis today, and foreign office spokesman Kishi dis-creetly avoided anything more than non-committal comment on the volcanic situation. In other words, whatever the Japanese might have in mind, they weren't prepared to throw Secretary Hull's verdict back into his face.

Spur To Nazi Efforts I think we can say that war isn't inevitable. We shouldn't be mart in going further than that.

Certainly the Japanese govern-

ariously as a feather on its no As this column has pointed out before, much depends on whether the Japanese believe the Axis will win the war, and the position at the moment is such that a great Axis victory or defeat might determine Japan's course. That's one reason why Hitler is straining every nerve to capture Moscow to save himself from the Allied offensive in Libya, and to force the French government at Vichy to become a partner agains

Japs Watch Entire Picture Nazi success in any one of these crucial situations might temp Japan to risk the big break with the United States, and that would mean a fight with England as well. Undoubtedly the position of the European war is playing a large part in the anxious discussions of the Tokyo cabinet today.

Hitler's best prospect at this writing is against Moscow. Aged Marshal Petain, French chief of state, apparently is being stuboorn about making all-out concessions to the fuehrer, and the Allies still retain the initiative in the battle of the desert.

### **Progress Reported In Drive To** Stem Rising Tide Of Accidents In U. S.; Christmas Drive Is On

CHICAGO, Nov. 28 - The National Safety council today reported progress in the na tionwide effort to dam the rising tide of accidents in the United States.

The increase has not been stopped, the council said, but a peak rise of 23 per cent in traffic deaths in August has been cut to a 13 per cent increase in September and 12 per cent in October.

It was in August that President Roosevelt called upon the council to lead a defense emergency safety campaign to curb the growing menace. In an attempt to offset the usual rise in traffic deaths this yearend holiday season, the council and 130 cooperating organizations are undertaking a special Christmas safety drive with the theme, "give courtesy for Christmas.

The October traffic toll was

4,050, approximately 400 greater than in October, 1940. but the 12 per cent rise was the smallest for any month this year. Traffic deaths for the first ten months of 1941 totaled 31,620, a 16 per cent rise over the 27,210 toll for the same 1940 period.

Travel in September, the latest month for which mileage figures are available, was 13 per cent greater than in September, 1940. identical to the fatality in-crease. For the first nine months of this year travel was up 12 per cent and the mileage death rate 4 per cent. Cities of 10,000 or more population reported an average death increase of 4 per cent in October, compared with 6 per cent rise in September

and 18 per cent in August. For cities of all sizes a 6 per cent increase was record-



North of the capital, the Russians appeared to have at least a momentary advantage, reporting that Red army troops violently counter-attacking in the Kalinin sector, 90 miles north of Moscow, drove wedges into enemy lines and reoccupied many villages.

There was no mention, however, of the more immediate danger in the Klin sector, 50 miles northwest of Moscow.

Front-line reports to Pravda, Communist party newspaper, said the Germans were striking sayagely on both flanks of Moscow's defense arc, with the heaviest blows apparently falling on the





## Troops Free To Fight In Libya

LONDON, Nov. 28 - British quarters said today that the Italian surrender of Gondar would release thousands of British and Indian troops and the south African air force for the Libvan cam-

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The British regarded the fall of Gondar as representing the final re-conquest of Ethiopia, a region of 350,000 square miles, and military experts said that if ever the British were forced to withdraw from Egypt, they could fall back on the Red sea coast of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan without danger of attack from the rear. Italy took Ethiopia after a brief campaign which began on Oct. 2, 1935, and ended, except for paci fication operations, with the occu pation of Addis Ababa on May 9, 1936. A few days before Emperor Haile Selassie fled to denand "justice for Etthiopia" be-fore the League of Nations and later to enter exile in Britain. 

The British imperial forces bit at the Gondar defenses, little by little, but relied mainly on starving the garrison. One by one the outer bastions were taken and aerial bombs and artillery were used to soften up the remainder. For a time the British permitted Ethiopian couriers to carry mail between the Italians in Gondar and their families in British-occupied Erftrea. But this month the mail route was cut and the Gondar Italians, isolated even from their families and friends by mail, offered severely from lowered Control Atl East Africa

Gondar first came under heavy pressure on Sept. 27 of this year then the big rains in Ethiopia ceased. In just two months, accordingly, the real campaign to bring about its fall was concluded. The operations which gave the British control of all of Italian East Africa was conducted by Lieut, Gen. Sir Alan Gordon Ci ningham, now commanding the British drive into Libva,
