Violent Deaths Claim 20 In Texas Over Week End

Long Holiday Is Marked By Tragic Events

Highway Mishaps Claim 14; Other Causes Included

Texas' prolonged observance of the second Thanksgiving holiday left its toll in dead throughout the state today as traffic, shootings and fire claimed at least 20 victims.

Automotive accidents killed more than a dozen Texans, one person was mysteriously shot to death and an East Texas pioneer burned to death when he fell asleep with a lighter pipe in his mouth.

He was August Krasne, 90, of Appleby near Nacogdoches, who fell asleep in bed while smoking and lighter pipe from the pipe set fire to his bed.

At Georgetown, C. M. Ewing, 32, a Coleman prospector, was found shot to death beside the entrance to a mine in which he was seeking Spanish treasure which legend said early patriots had buried there. Sheriff H. H. Davis said Ewing's death was accidental but no further report had been returned. Other miners who had been hunting for the gold to use a violent death.

Traffic Claims Most

Twelve highway mishaps took the lives of 14 persons. At least 14 persons were killed in the accidents and four persons were injured.

Musicians Are Killed

A musical duo consisting of a tenor and a soprano, members of an orchestra, were killed in an accident.

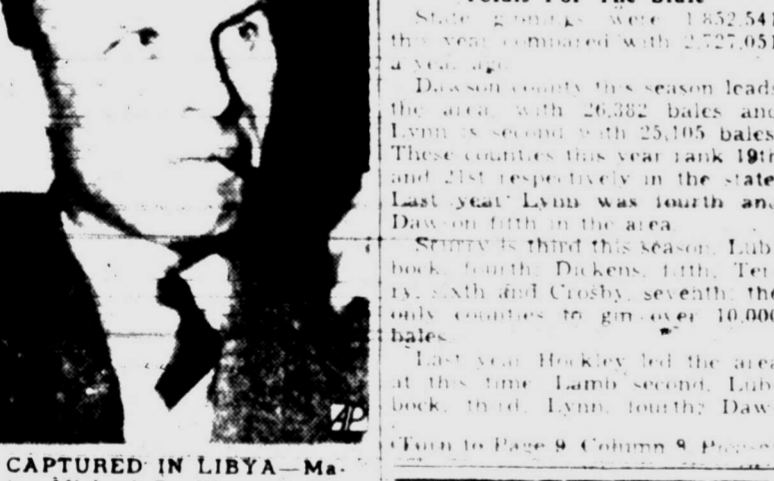

U. S. Army And Navy Alert To Any Emergency

Britain Pours New Troops Into Area; Philippines Ready

MANILA, Dec. 1.—United States army and naval forces in the Philippines were held in readiness for any emergency today as war fears in the Far East were fed by the arrival of fresh British reinforcements in Burma, intense military preparations in Thailand and reports that the Japanese were pouring additional troops into neighboring French Indo-China.

Branded Armed Aggression

Both the Japanese press and radio declared yesterday that establishment of such a patrol would be "an example of the most provocative armed aggression."

British 'Standing By'

In Hongkong all British troops were called back to barracks. The British command announced that the crown colony was in an advanced state of preparedness following a three-day defense test.

This was the tentative decision on a United States formula for peace restating basic Washington principles which ran counter to virtually every aspect of Japan's expansionist program.

Spending Spree Is More Reason Than Ever To Do Christmas Shopping Early

Shortage Is Predicted

NEW YORK, Dec. 1. — Better whip your Christmas list into shape and put on your shopping shoes earlier than ever this year.

The boys who check up on Big Business predict the greatest Christmas spending spree we have ever known. And before Santa starts out with his pack Christmas Eve, they say, we may face a shortage of some of the things we want most.

According to merchandise experts in New York's Christmas gift mart, buyers in big department stores have laid in a good supply for an average Christmas, and there will be plenty of most things for early shoppers. But defense job money and a feeling of "let's make the most of this Christmas for nobody knows what may come" are expected to send a huge flock of shoppers into the gift market to buy the stock on hand. When that is gone, some of it can't be replaced, the experts say, because of defense manufacturing demands.

Investigated Shortage

To find out what gifts may be scarce before Christmas I talked with the buying staff of Mc-Greevey, Werring and Howell, New York resident buyers, who purchase for department stores and shops from coast to coast. I also talked to other buyers and merchandise experts. And this is what they told me:

You'd better step fast if you're bent on buying your favorite lady glamour of the most expensive kind. Imported French perfumes and silk lingerie, trimmed with imported lace are not plentiful. But nobody expects to worry about domestic perfumes of lower-priced rayon lingerie. The more costly costume jewelry bangles (\$10 up) may run a bit short, too, because skilled technicians are now in defense work and stones are harder to get. But there promises to be plenty of less expensive costume jewelry.

Hurry For Handkerchiefs

If you have general gifts on your mind, don't waste much time. A large part of the supply, especially the embroidered ones, came from China and the supply is not increasing. Fairly large stocks are still on hand.

Cotton goods are scarce because of Uncle Sam's purchases, so if you have set your heart on remembering the bride with bath-towels or sheets, hurry along.

You should also shop early for gifts containing metal because of the general shortage of restrictions on basic supplies. Refrigerators and ranges are already restricted and such things as waffle irons, sandwich grills, pressing irons and chafing dishes may be hard to come by later. Tinplate shortages of silverware, cheap umbrellas are virtually out of the picture, though those from \$3 up are still in.

Don't dawdle about Johnny's metal toys. Toy buyers are generally well covered at present, but the supply of trains, tin automobiles, soldiers and such may run down before it is time to trim the tree.

Hint On Shirts

Don't delay your shopping for plain collared shirts, ash trays and other plastic gadgets. Don't shop late for furniture either. Many stores refuse orders for delivery under three or four weeks. Gifts we used to get from Europe, such as toolled leather boxes, are hard to obtain.

If you want to give shirts to the man in your life, you may find you have a problem already. White poplin ones are said to be especially hard to get. Pajamas, mufflers and ties of silk are other gifts to buy early—if you can.

After you have bought all your gifts, don't relax until you have boxed them. Reports in the market say there is a threatened shortage of pastboard gift boxes. There is one bit of solace. The merchandise men say that, though there is a scarcity of nylon hose, Madame can have her silk stockings again this Christmas.

Park Project Studied Here

A priority number will be sought at once so as to proceed as soon as possible with the development of a new city park in an area which will serve a large portion of the families of emmissioned officers to be stationed at the air base under construction west of the city, according to information given this morning by K. 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Fate Of Churchill Government May Hinge On North African Battle

U. S. Also Has Much At Stake

(By NEA Staffer)
 WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Upon the outcome of the British offensive in North Africa depend events that are momentous in ways clear only to a relative few in Washington.

Behind the obvious military objectives of the British Libya move, some well-informed observers here see a political objective: The Churchill government hopes to draw German troops to Africa from Russia not only to save Russia but, by saving Russia, to save the Churchill government.

The Churchill regime has been under a hot fire which will become a veritable barrage if Russia falls. In that event the government would be blamed for not having "opened a western front," notwithstanding information here that British military strength is not yet sufficient to attempt a continental invasion. Another attack on Churchill's position might be a charge that, to silence clamor, British and American spokesmen had collusively given out over-optimistic reports of Russia's chances.

Left Wing Becomes Bolder

The final explosion might come from English left-wingers. They have been so strengthened and emboldened by the Russian alliance that some conservatives have revived fears of some sort of Revolution. This would be more than the usual Parliamentary change in government. It might aim toward making permanent Britain's many Socialistic war measures, even taking her out of the war.

Such a peace surely could leave the United States right behind the famous ball with the unpopular number. We could be the one remaining enemy of a Hitler dominating a realm greater than Napoleon's—and we would be about half ready to dispute any effort he might make to extend it, especially to South America.

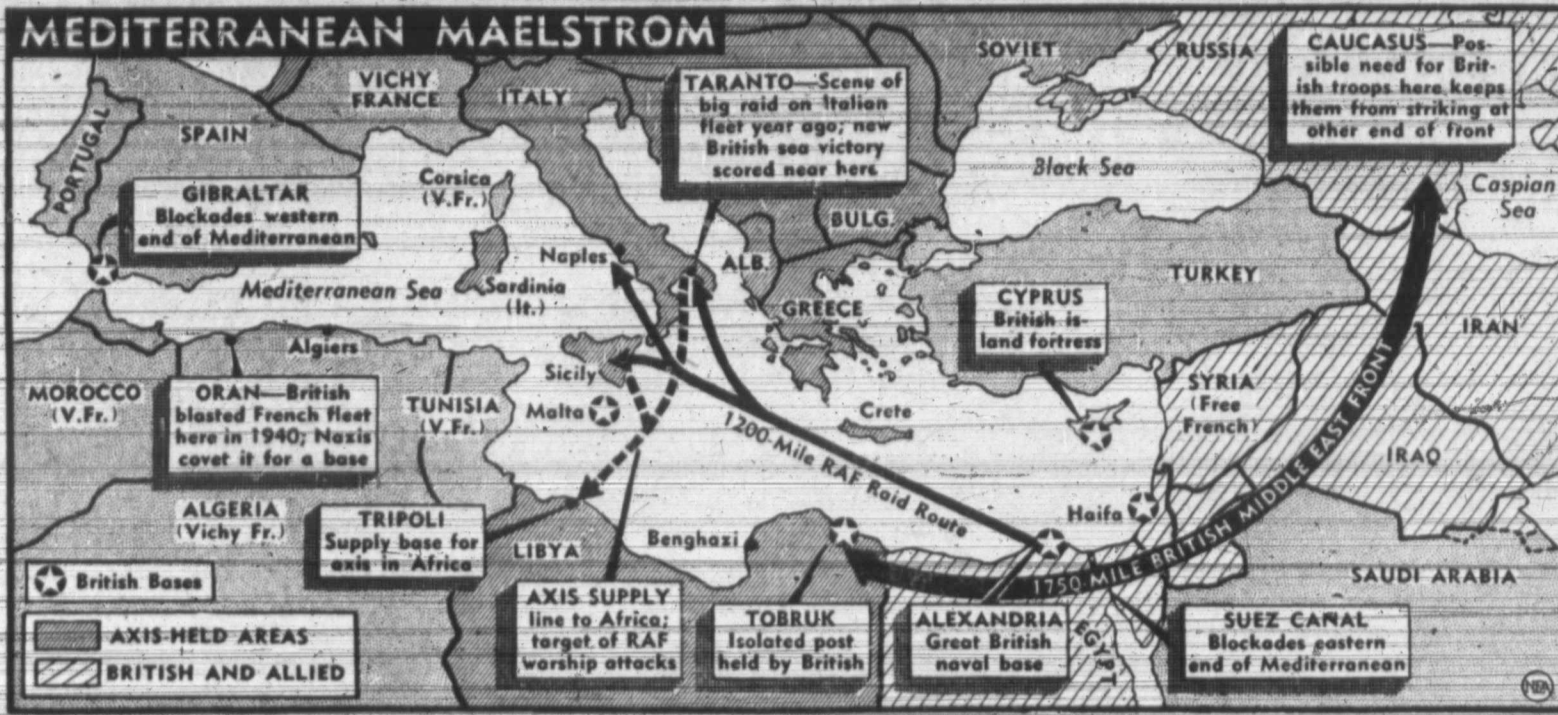
These things are being pointed out to our government by the British—in the hope, some say, of further bolstering Churchill's prestige by an immediate American declaration of war. But, say the realists, these possibilities are true anyway.

Churchill Safe—If

Hence our not-generally-suspected interest in Libya. If the British succeed there, Churchill stays. They may succeed too—thanks in unsuspected degree to India and South Africa.

Both are playing a bigger part than was expected. India's industries are now supplying her considerable force in Africa with almost all but tanks and planes. South African industry is coming faster than expected, her manpower much faster. Promising 50,000 men, she has nearly that in Libya, with enough more in Ethiopia and at home to total over 100,000 desert fighters superior to the well-advertised Australians because more disciplined.

Dist. 9—Breckenridge, won 8, lost 2, 219 to 63. Dist. 10—Temple, won 9, lost 1, 187 to 26.

Dist. 11—Tyler won 9, lost 1, 268 to 45. Dist. 12—Nacogdoches, won 6, lost 2, tied 2, 118 to 78.

Dist. 13—Houston Lamar, won 8, lost 2, 196 to 58. Dist. 14—Sweetwater Creek, won 10, lost 0, 275 to 59.

Post-War World Confederation To Insure Peace In Our Time Seen

U. S., England Would "Lead"

CHICAGO, Dec. 1. — A noted student of international law foresees a post-war world confederation in which Anglo-American sea power will insure peace and freedom of commerce.

Dr. Quincy Wright of the University of Chicago predicts that if Hitler is defeated, the Nazi chief's projected "new order" will be replaced by a world organization patterned in many respects after the League of Nations.

"The main tasks of the world system will be to maintain freedom of the seas, moderate freedom of commerce and to prevent aggression," he said.

Wright is the author of numerous works on international law, including an essay, "The Future of Neutrality," in which he predicted in 1928 that the traditional policy of neutrality for non-belligerent nations in event of war would be abandoned in favor of common action against aggression.

Wright believes the new world league will formulate a "basic declaration of the rights of man" including President Roosevelt's "four freedoms." To protect those rights, he predicted, the system will have the power to deal with and punish individuals in some cases. At present international law technically is concerned only with states leaving regulation of individuals to national authorities.

Like the old League of Nations, Wright thinks the new confederation will have three branches: A council or legislative body, an administrative authority and a world court which will arbitrate disputes between nations and questions of international law. It will promote world prosperity, chiefly through limitation of national tariffs, and it will act promptly against aggressors. Its chief weapon will be naval power provided largely by Britain and the United States.

Wright said American participation in the new world order is highly probable. "The American people have seen that their aloofness contributed to the death of the League of Nations," he said. "The strength of the isolationists has declined sharply since the first World War."

Continental Systems predicted. The universal confederation will enforce peace among the continental systems.

Wright also expects the rise of several continental systems, subject to the world league, but with more extensive powers over their numbers and more closely knit organizations. Among these, he believes, will be a "United States of Europe," an Asiatic system and a Pan-American union. Russia probably will remain outside of all the continental systems, he said.

Each of the continental systems probably will have a common air force, with national air forces outlawed or greatly reduced, according to Wright. Members of these air forces will owe sole allegiance to their respective system and to no nation. By means of its exclusive command of air power, each continental organization will be able to preserve the independence of small nations adjoining large and powerful neighbors.

Sovereignty and independence of individual nations will be retained, subject to limitations necessary to operation of the continental and world systems, Wright

Stream Of "V" Designs Sent In To Patent Office; Many Persons Have Unusual Ideas

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The popularity of the 22nd letter of the alphabet as a symbol for victory over the Axis has brought a stream of "V" designs to the patent office, a check of recent records showed today.

Many persons with ideas for dressing up the letter with shields, eagles, flags, lions and—most of all—dots and dashes have submitted their designs with requests for patents, and 12 of these have been approved within four weeks.

Possibilities Unlimited. Patent officials explained that the possibilities were nearly unlimited, since a design patent covers only the particular design and purpose described in the patent, as "substantially similar" designs and purposes.

Thus, it was pointed out, one cannot patent the letter "V" as such.

Among recently patented uses of "V" designs are emblems, lapel buttons, pipes, fabric figures, ornamental pins and a pennant.

The pennant was patented by Platho P. Scott of Tulsa, and is described as "the ornamental design for a flag or similar article, substantially as shown." It is a three-cornered flag with part of the border forming a V, inside of which are three dots and a dash.

International radio code for the letter.

This patent, officials explained, will cover only flags of substantial design.

Among persons granted design patents is Stanislaw K. Ostrowski of New York, who was awarded patents on three lapel buttons which use the "V" in connection with a lion rampant and two eagles.

Traffic Booming For Railroads At Border

EL PASO, Dec. 1.—The Pass from the North, strategically located transportation center, is enjoying a 20 per cent increase in railroad business, primarily because of the national defense program.

The Texas & Pacific railroad, which has its western terminal in El Paso, reports that business is better now than in the boom year of 1929.

Southern Pacific Lines has reported that its number of employees has been increased by about 10 per cent since last year.

Skilled railroad workers, particularly mechanics and warehouse and shop men, have been in so great a demand that Southern Pacific has raised its age limit to 65 years.

Officials say that approximately 400 carloads of perishables, fruits and vegetables, are handled in El Paso daily for rerouting over various lines for eastern points.

This represents a sizeable increase over preceding years.

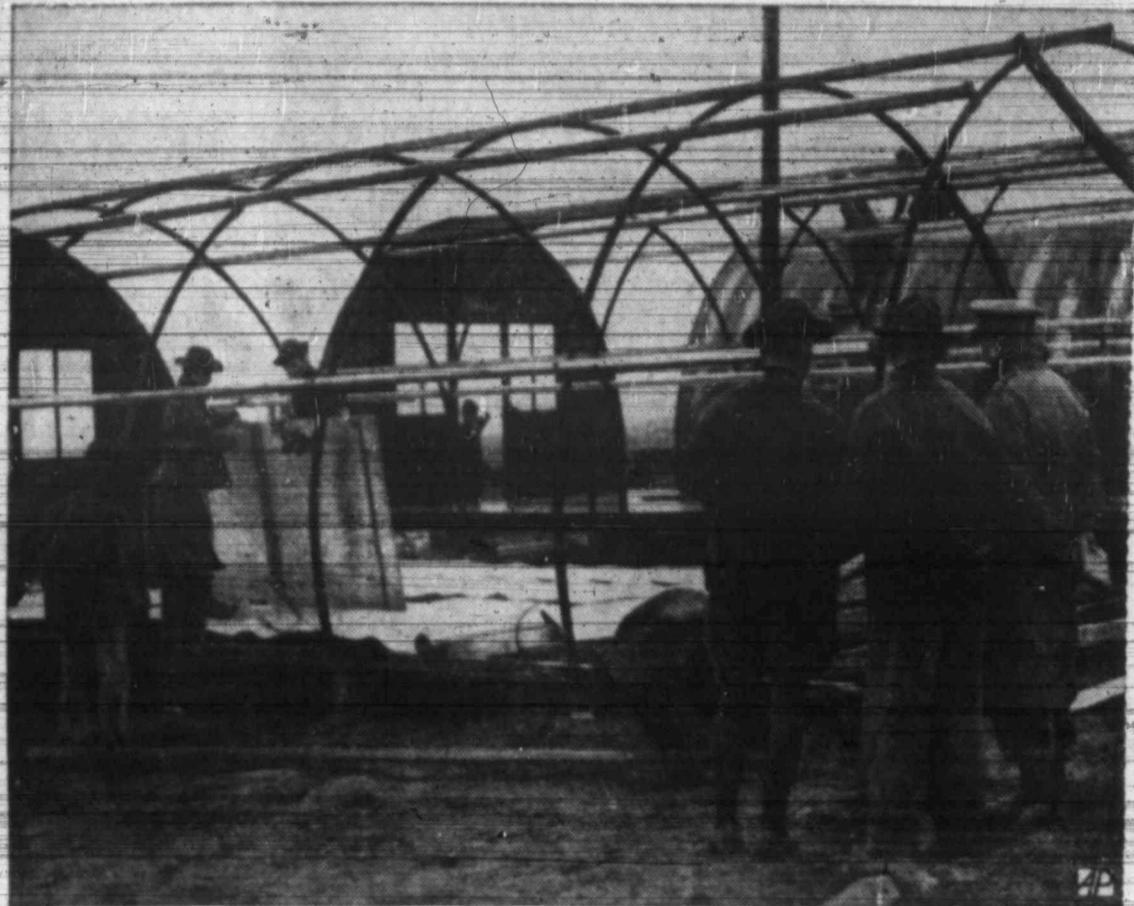

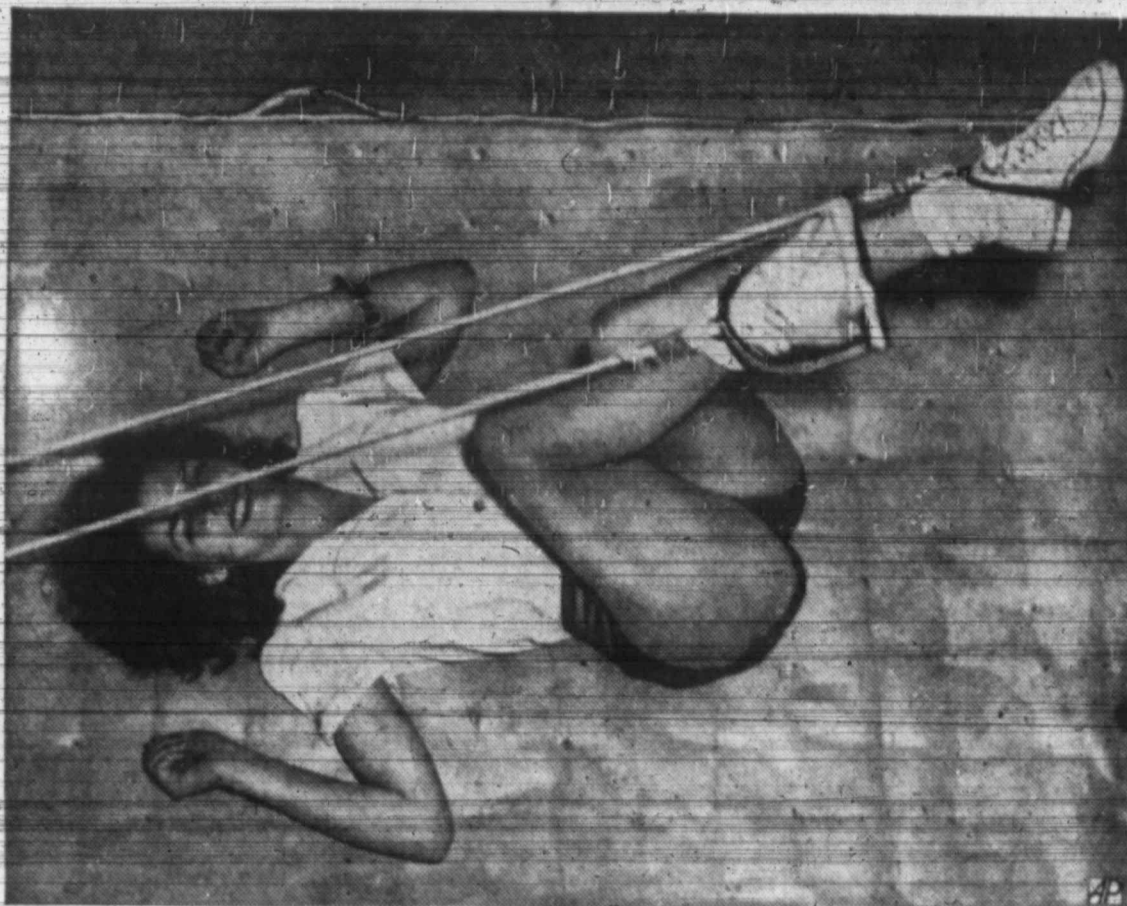

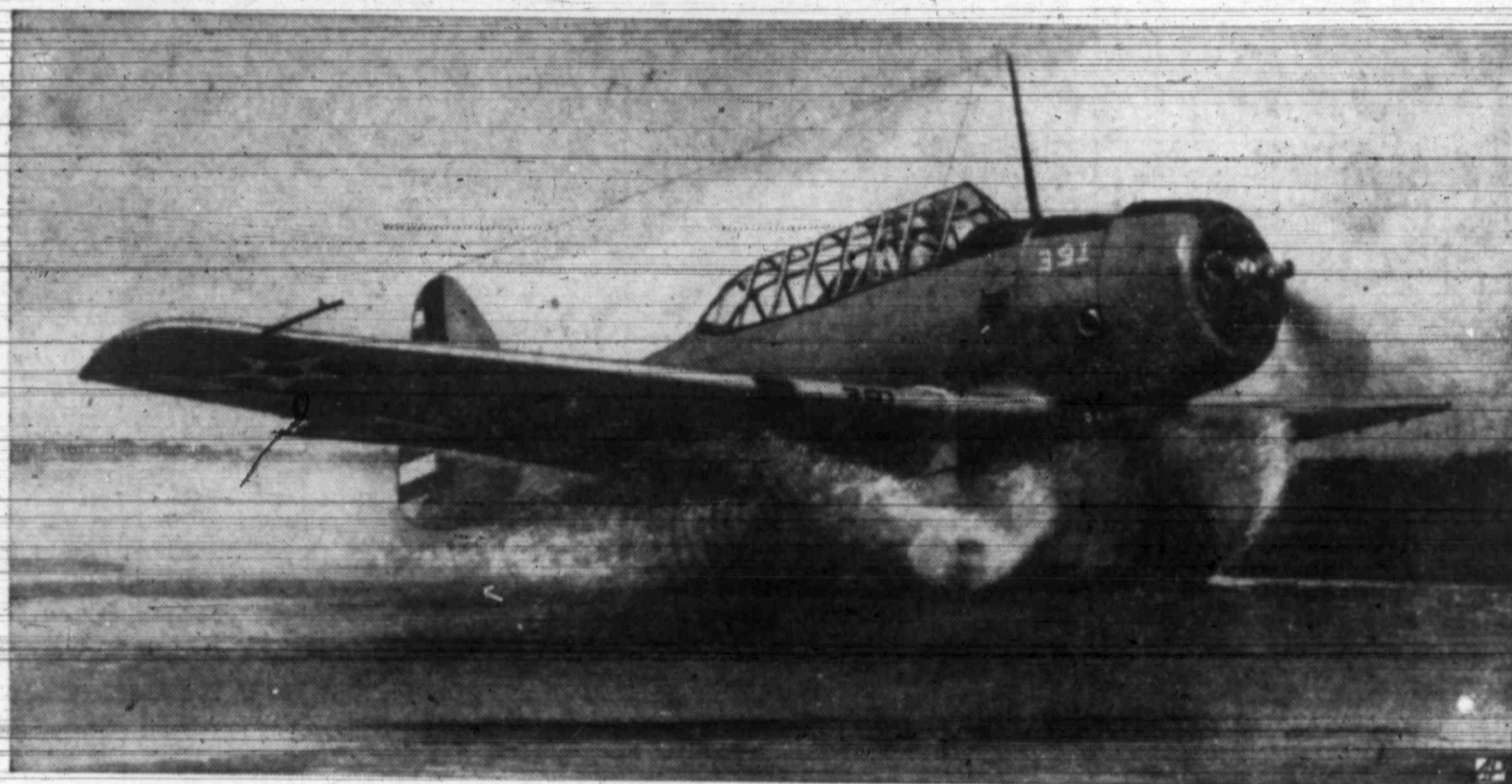

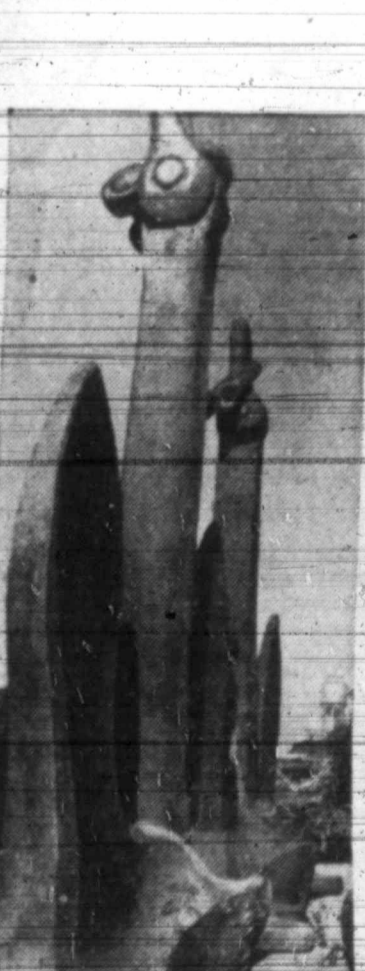

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European War Likely Influencing Japan

Nazi Reverses Are Reflected

Japan's decision to continue negotiations with the United States came as the breath of war was blowing hot upon the Pacific, but it isn't surprising since it bears out the indications that Tokyo is anxious to evade conflict with America.

This decision is impelled by necessity. It may even be that it is calculated to give the Japanese more time to try to make up their minds who is going to win the European war.

Japs Watch European Picture

One of Japan's greatest problems has been to guess the outcome of the conflict correctly. If she crosses swords with America and Britain, and Germany loses, it will be just too bad for the land of the rising sun. It might be just too bad anyway, but that is a hazard of another war.

This being so, it is quite possible that the reverses suffered by the Germans in these last critical hours of the Japanese cabinet's debate may have had much to do with the decision to continue negotiations with Washington. Had Hitler's forces swept on into Moscow, or knocked the Allies out of Libya, we might have had a different story from Japan.

Hitler Suffers Great Reverses

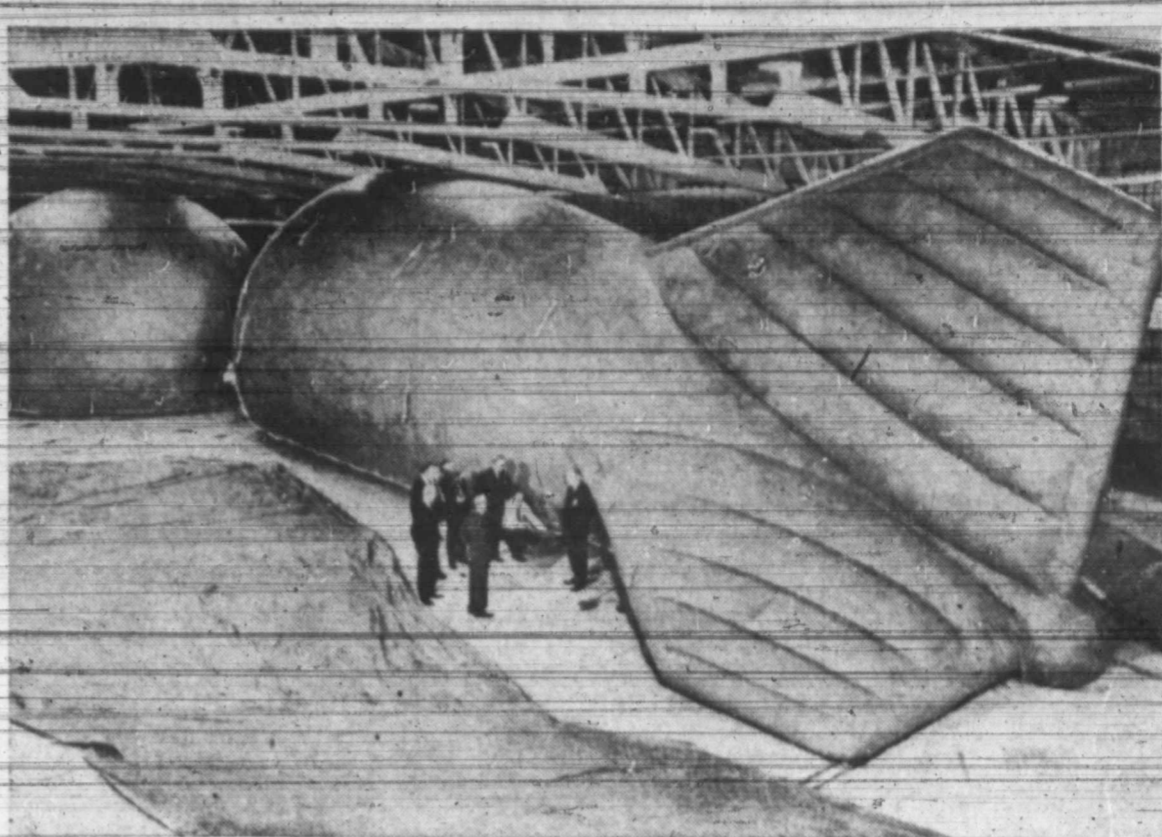
They call the Nazi chieftain "lucky Hitler" in Germany because of the uncanny frequency of his successes, but the past week end very definitely has been one of his off-times. The Allies have struck some powerful blows of great potential importance.

The fighter has had a tremendous setback in the sensational feat of the Red army not only in forcing the Nazis out of Rostov—the hinge on which swings the gate to the Caucasus—but in pushing back the invaders to the west along the Black sea coast. Indeed, if the Bolsheviks can hold the advantage they have achieved it will have a vital bearing not only on the outcome of the war but on its duration.

Here it is necessary to repeat what has been said in this column before to the effect that Hitler's resources aren't likely to stand the strain unless he can tap new supplies. Either he must knock Russia cold as he did France, or he must escape the increasingly chaotic conditions on the blockaded European continent by breaking into the Caucasus and the Middle East.

Supplies Hold Vital Answer

The greatest blow Hitler has had in his efforts to reach this land of milk and honey is the Red victory at Rostov and westward. These are few things which the Allies could have achieved that would have contributed more toward shortening the war in their favor. Don't forget that this conflict is going to be won on resources and the Allied strategy must be directed toward keeping the Nazis from reaching

Use Of Blunt Instrument In Death Of Woman Is Claimed

MONTERREY, Mexico, Dec. 1

Dr. Arthur Torrance's contention that his wealthy, elderly bride was injured fatally in an automobile accident was disputed today by the Monterrey municipal criminologist, who said an autopsy showed she had been killed by a blunt instrument.

Dr. Torrance, who is facing murder charges, has maintained that his wife—the former Mrs. Ada Loveland of Kalamazoo, Mich.—died of injuries suffered when her head struck the edge of a rear-view mirror after she had avoided striking an animal on the highway.

The criminologist, Gilberto Zandameta, asserted in a report, however, that a sharp object such as the edge of the mirror could not have caused the death. Zandameta said that the mirror, fresh supplies

As a companion piece of the Rostov victory, the Allied forces in Libya continued to maintain the advantage in their offensive against the Axis forces. The Germans and Italians appear to be trapped in Cirenaica for the Allies have traced westward across the hot sands to the Gulf of Sirte and bid fair to cut the Axis off from retreat toward Tripoli. In other words, the German-Italian forces in Libya are in grave danger of being annihilated or captured—a fact recognized in the fierce defense they are making.

152,000,000 Labor Hours On Coulee Dam

ABERDEEN, N. M., Dec. 1.—The giant Grand Coulee dam, now more than 99 per cent completed, is the product of 152,000,000 man-hours of labor—equal to the employment of 38 men on a 40-hour week since the birth of Christ.

The bureau of reclamation estimates further that the total so far is only a third of the labor that ultimately will be employed to develop fully the power and irrigation aspects of the vast Columbia basin project.

On the site of the dam itself, 56,000,000 man-hours have been expended. The remainder was employed in mines and factories and in transporting their products to Grand Coulee.

Bureau and contractor employes have earned more than \$52,000,000 in wages since the project was started eight years ago, with the total expenditure for labor, material and equipment reaching \$139,000,000.

The bureau figures that the completed Columbia basin project will have provided 476,257,000 man-hours of employment—175,165,000 at the dam site and 301,092,000 elsewhere.

After a year's hard work a 13-year-old industry of farthings for missionary work, parishioners of a church in Denham, England, presented the pastor \$250, representing 67,200 farthings.
