

TWO BRITISH SHIPS SUNK!

Mighty Bow Is Struck English Navy By Japan

BERLIN, Dec. 10.—(By The Associated Press)—D.N.B. quoted Japanese naval authorities today as announcing they had reason to believe that the 35,000-ton British battleship King George V also had been sunk with the Prince of Wales and battle cruiser Repulse in air attacks on Britain's Far Eastern fleet.

(The German wireless, heard in New York, carried this: "Flash—Tokyo—The Japanese naval office announced that also the British naval battleship King George V has been sunk.")

LONDON, Dec. 10.—British lost two of her mightiest capital ships today—the powerful new 35,000-ton battleship Prince of Wales and the 32,000-ton battle cruiser Repulse—both sunk by the Japanese off Malaya in the most disastrous single blow struck to the British navy in the whole war.

Their loss was announced by the admiralty without word of how they were sent to the bottom of the Pacific ocean or of the fate of their crews, together more than 3,000 men.

A Japanese communique said they were destroyed by air attack.

This, if confirmed, would be the first known sinking of any warship of the size either of the Prince of Wales or the Repulse by aerial bombardment.

Prime Minister Churchill made public the announcement in a terse statement before the shocked House of Commons.

He gave the news bluntly:

"I have bad news for the House which I thought I should impart to them at the earliest possible moment," he declared. "The report has been received from Singapore."

"No details are yet available except those contained in a Japanese official communique which claims both ships were sunk by an air attack."

"I shall take occasion at an early date to make a short statement of the general war situation which has, from many points of view, both favorable and adversely undergone important changes in the last few days."

Flagship Of Far East Fleet

Colonial Secretary Lord Moyne made a similar statement in the House of Commons.

The Prince of Wales, only recently dispatched to the Pacific, was the flagship of the fleet British had massed and organized to defend the empire in the Far East.

The warships went down in one of the British navy's blackest days while carrying out operations against the Japanese attack on Malaya.

The admiralty said:

"It is a major blow which yet available except those contained in the Japanese official communique which claims that both ships were sunk by air attack."

The Prince of Wales was flying the flag of Admiral Sir Tom Phillips, commander of the British fleet in eastern waters.

The loss of the Prince of Wales, one of the newest and most powerful of the British battleships and a vessel especially armored against air attack, was a particularly grievous blow to the Royal navy.

Previously, in more than two years of war, Britain had lost only two of her capital ships, the battleship Royal Oak, 29,150 tons, (Turn to Page 8, Column 3, Please)

FRANCE IS NEUTRAL

VICHY, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A government announcement tonight said a Franco-Japanese accord had been reached at Hanoi, French Indo-China, whereby France will remain neutral in the Pacific war.

PLANES SAID DESTROYED

MANILA, P. I., Dec. 10.—(AP)—The Japanese Domei news agency broadcast from Tokyo today that it was understood Japanese naval forces attacking American air bases in various parts of the Pacific had destroyed more than 300 American planes, including 40 Boeing flying fortresses and 20 other long-range bombers.

GREATEST BATTLE

LONDON, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Radio Berlin, quoting a German official spokesman, said today that the greatest naval battle in history was now in progress in the Pacific.

"It is too early yet to say that Britain and the United States have been forced on the defensive," the Berlin radio quoted a German spokesman.

MOBILIZATION ORDERED

BIG LINER IS SAFE

Its 500 passengers, most of them navy wives and children, showed relief at arriving safely.

Treasury Will Seek Billions

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The treasury today made its immediate war-financing objective the borrowing of an estimated \$10,000,000,000 of the money which individuals and businesses normally set aside each year for savings.

The amount realized by this method may not be enough to pay for the difference between taxes and spending during the war, but only after that much has been borrowed will the treasury have to dip into the accumulated earnings or savings of past years.

Accumulated bank deposits alone are near \$70,000,000,000.

Will Tap Savings

The first goal of the treasury, as described by one of its highest officials, will be to tap the nation's current savings because that form of borrowing will also help stave off inflation.

The machinery for this drive is already set up, for the most part, in the defense bond savings campaign of the past year.

JAP ATTACK BLASTED! 'GHUTISTS TAKE PORT

Philippines Are Invaded; Bombs Strike Manila

United States Army and Navy forces have blasted a sea-borne Japanese attack against the west coast of Luzon island in the Philippines, the war department said today, but other Japanese troops have effected a landing on the north end of the island in the first full-fledged enemy landing on American soil since the War of 1812.

Dispatches from Manila quoted the Philippine constabulary as saying Japanese parachute troops had captured Vigan, on the coast 200 miles northwest of Manila.

Two waves of Japanese bombers raided Manila and its suburbs, pounding military centers including Nichols air field, Fort McKinley and the Nielson airport districts. This was shortly after noon, Wednesday, Manila time.

Manila dispatches said American and Filipino troops had gone into swift action against Japanese invaders who landed at Aparri, on the far north coast.

U. S. Army headquarters reported that Japanese troop transports and naval forces in great numbers were hovering off the north coast on a 150-mile stretch from Vigan to Aparri.

In Washington, the war department, issuing its first communique of the war, said the army and navy had smashing defeated a Japanese attack on still another section of Luzon—between Vigan and San Fernando to the south.

U. S. Planes Lead Defense

The war department's communique was based on "information received last night" from Manila, but in view of the 13-hour time difference between Manila and Washington it apparently referred to action of Wednesday morning, Manila time.

Associated Press dispatches from Manila definitely placed the landings as occurring this morning, Wednesday, Dec. 10, Manila time. When it is Wednesday noon in Manila it is 11 p. m. Tuesday in Washington.

The war department's communique on the attempted Japanese landing on the 75-mile stretch between San Fernando and Vigan indicated that only U. S. Army and Navy planes, not warships, repulsed the attack.

No Panic in Manila

There was intense excitement but no panic in Manila. Many rushed to leave the city but conveyances were hard to find. No taxis were running, and most of the two-wheeled, horse-drawn cabs were engaged. Business continued normal.

All indications were that a heavy battle was raging all along the northern and northwest coasts of the island, with naval air and land forces involved.

The army communique said the exact strength of the attacking Japanese forces was not known, but declared gravely:

Enemy In Heavy Force

"The enemy is in heavy force off the northern coast of Luzon, extending from Vigan to Aparri."

The announcement declared that six Japanese transports, escorted by large naval units and aircraft, were engaged in landing operations off Vigan about 7:30 a. m. 5:30 p. m. CST Tuesday but did not say whether a landing actually had been effected there.

In terse official language the bulletin told of the damage inflicted upon the attacking Japanese flotilla by the American air force:

Created Grave Damage

"Our bombing attacks on these ships created grave damage. Three transports were directly hit, one immediately capsizing. Bombs were observed hitting close to three others."

Advices relayed from the constabulary commander at Tuguegarao, capital of Cagayan province, where Aparri is situated, said the Japanese had paved the way for the landing attempt there with a nightlong aerial bombardment.

San Francisco Facing Danger Of Bombings

(By The United Press)

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—Northern California was blacked out for 65 minutes early today when the army air corps Fourth interceptor command flashed a "red" alert indicating "aircraft overhead."

The army ordered police here to broadcast a "blue" warning indicating approaching aircraft at 2:18 a. m. PST, 6:18 a. m. EST, and a few minutes later issued the "red" alarm.

Radio Broadcasts Halted

All California, from Bakersfield to the Oregon state line was ordered blacked out. Radio stations were ordered off the air. What defense measures the command took and full particulars of the alarm were not immediately revealed.

A report received at McClellan field air base at Sacramento, said that "hostile aircraft" approaching the coast caused the alarm. Authorities refused to elaborate.

The clear was issued at 3:23 a. m. PST, 6:23 a. m. EST.

Blackout Improves

Los Angeles radio stations also were ordered to cease broadcasting except for one-minute announcements every hour and the federal communications commission forbade any announcements as to when they might return to the air.

San Francisco, lashed by an army commander for its "criminal apathy" toward its first air raid warning Monday night, did better today and blacked out completely during the alarm.

Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt, commander of the Fourth army, last night bawled out a civil defense meeting for the city's complacency during army-ordered air raid alarms Monday night and warned that "death and destruction" would be the result.

Draft Army Of Millions Will Be U. S. Goal

(By The United Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Congress is ready to pass legislation today permitting the army to use selectees and national guardsmen anywhere in the world.

The action will come amidst indications by members of the House and Senate military affairs committees that an American expeditionary force of millions of men will be needed to crush Japan and to defeat Germany if formal hostilities with that nation begin.

May Revise Draft Law

Chairman Robert R. Reynolds, D-N. C., of the Senate military affairs committee said "you can't win with only sea and air power," in discussing reports that the army soon may ask to subject all men between the ages of 18 and 44 to the draft.

"You can't conquer and subdue a foe with battleships and airplanes," he said. "You've got to hold land with foot soldiers to win. It is necessary to send an expeditionary force to Hongkong, Indo-China, Japan, Dutch East Indies or the Malay states. I'm willing that that be done."

Other members of the House and Senate military committees admitted that if the United States

Japs Capture British Air Base In Malaya

(By The Associated Press)

SINGAPORE, Dec. 10.—The British apparently have lost Kota Bharu, the northern Malaya air base where the Japanese have landed strong forces, just inside the Thailand frontier, but a complete statement today says they have bailed Japanese drives both in that area and at Kuantan, only 200 miles north of here.

The communique, issued at 10 p. m. 6 a. m. C.S.T. said: "Our units have now reorganized themselves south of Kota Bharu. Elsewhere our frontier remains unbroken. There is no change in the situation at Kuantan. Our position remains intact."

The Netherlands East Indies threw strong reinforcements of warships and warplanes into the battle of southern Malaya today. Dutch bombers and fighters flew in yesterday and already have joined British, Australian and New Zealand air units which have been pounding Japanese transports and land bases in southern Thailand since dawn Monday.

Warships In Action

The Dutch fleet also have been fighting alongside British empire air forces to contest Japan's admittedly vigorous efforts to win quick mastery of the air.

Dutch warships are with Britain's Eastern fleet in the China sea.

British land and air forces were reported in action this morning trying to check Japan's latest and nearest threat to Singapore at Kuantan, on the Malayan east coast 200 miles north of this vital fortress.

One Cisco Resident Killed In Mishap

BROWNWOOD, Dec. 10.—(AP)—One Cisco person was killed and two were injured early today when a train struck their automobile at a crossing near Camp Bowie.

Robin C. Boone, 21, was killed, and his wife, 19, was injured. Jay Richardson, 31, was taken to a hospital, where Boone died two hours after the collision.

EXCHANGE PROPOSED

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The United States through mediation of a neutral European country has proposed to Japan the exchange of nationals in each country, radio Tokyo said today in a broadcast heard by NBC.

Snow Due In Area Tonight

Although the temperature in Lubbock at noon today was 22.5 degrees below the maximum reading of Tuesday afternoon, the mercury stood above the freezing point at 36.7 degrees.

However, much colder and intermittent snow were on the way and seemed due to arrive almost momentarily, according to the official weather bureau forecast for the Panhandle and South Plains.

Skies Heavily Clouded

Skies were heavily clouded throughout the morning here, but no moisture of any kind fell. It was popularly described as "snow weather," even though there had been no snow. An 18-mile wind blew from the northeast.

The minimum temperature in Lubbock during the night was 32 degrees, exactly the freezing mark, and represented a drop of 26.2 degrees from Tuesday's maximum of 38.2 degrees.

The project, it was explained, has no connection with

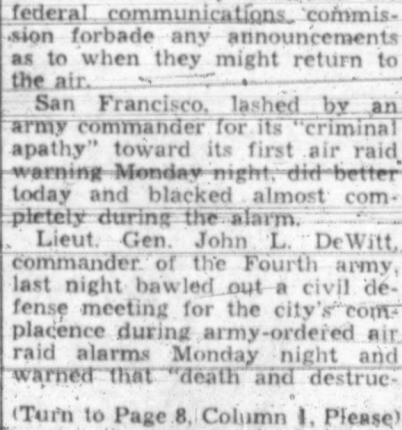

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Roosevelt Warns Nation Long Struggle Necessary Before Victory

Coasts Are In "Front Line"

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—President Roosevelt, in a radio address to the nation, today warned that the United States navy in the Pacific today, despite the serious losses the fleet suffered in the surprise outbreak of the war.

He dismissed as "fantastic" Japanese claims that they had gained the ascendancy and all kindred rumors circulated by enemy sources for propaganda purposes.

Score Double Blow

But within a few hours the Japanese scored another smashing double blow against the Anglo-American naval strength in the Pacific by sinking one of Britain's newest 35,000-ton battle ships, Prince of Wales, and the 32,000-ton British battle cruiser, Repulse.

The new vessels served to underline the words the president used last night when he told the American people in his first war report that the United States faces a long, hard struggle before it can win the war and the peace that follows.

Coasts In Front Line

And, as commander-in-chief, he warned the country in the frankest words that its coasts were in the front line of the war that exploded without warning Sunday morning.

"The attack at Pearl Harbor," he said bluntly, "can be repeated at any one of many points—in both oceans and along both our coast lines and against all the rest of the hemisphere."

The radio carried the president's words from a dimmed-out, heavily-guarded White House.

"We are now in this war. We are all in it all the way. Every single man, woman and child is a partner in the most tremendous undertaking of our American history. We must share together the hardships and the good news, the defeats and the victories—the changing fortunes of war."

He made no attempt to minimize the character of the initial news—it all had been bad, and he could

not say officially how much Hawaii had suffered until further surveys had been completed.

But all his words bespoke calm confidence of the final outcome.

"We are going to win the war and we are going to win the peace that follows."

To speed that day, the president announced that the government had decided on a seven-day week for all war industries, including the production of essential raw materials.

He also disclosed that there would be a tremendous expansion of the nation's munitions production industries, by the construction of new plants, the enlargement of old ones and the mobilization of small plants in the production drive.

Condemns Japanese

Mr. Roosevelt "condemned" his blueprint for the victory effort with a scathing condemnation of "treacherously criminal" Japan. She had been egged on by the "deserters" by Germany's promise that a triumphant "new order" would parcel out as Japan's share of the world loot "the complete and perpetual control of the whole Pacific—and that means not only the Far East, not only all of the islands in the Pacific, but also a stronghold on the west coast of North America, Central and South America."

Japan, he continued, was working in complete accord with the Axis grand strategy, and he added these words:

"I remember always that Germany and Italy, regardless of any former territorial claims, consider themselves at war with the United States at this moment just as much as they consider themselves at war with Britain or Russia."

Aid Program To Continue

And he made it plain that there could be no complete victory while the Hitler and Mussolini regimes remained untoppled.

With this in mind, he announced that the lend-lease program would continue that the job of American assembly lines would pour out the vast quantities of munitions needed to supply both the armed forces of the United States and the other armies and navies of the world which were fighting the Axis.

In talking of the mighty production effort necessary for a long war, Mr. Roosevelt, in effect, told the people to expect to feel the pinch. He was confident, he said, that each would make his contribution cheerfully and he refused to speak of those contributions as sacrifices.

Food Situation Satisfactory

There was no need to worry about the food situation. He reported that supplies were ample for domestic and lend-lease use and he did not believe "we shall have to curtail the normal use of articles of food" for the present.

However, he continued, there was a definite shortage of metals for consumer purposes. More than half of the metals now used for civilian goods, he said, would have to be diverted to arms production. Therefore, many articles would have to be given up entirely for the duration.

That other materials would be affected was taken for granted. Rubber was high on this list. The office of Production Management was getting ready to order a two-

Military News To Be O. K'd

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The War department announced today that henceforth news concerning all military operations, including air raid warnings, in the continental United States will be released through headquarters of the four field armies.

The statement of policy was issued in response to inquiries here as to the air raid alarms on the West coast during the night. Officials said that commanders of the four armies are in charge of field operations, and that their reports will not be released through the bureau of public relations here until "cleared through official channels which will necessarily involve some delay."

Headquarters Listed
Headquarters of the four armies are: First, New York; Second, Memphis, Tenn.; Third, San Antonio, Tex.; Fourth, San Francisco.

The Statements
Military operations affecting units of the army in continental United States are directly under the command of the four armies. Information for news agencies concerning such operations should be obtained from the public relations officers at the appropriate headquarters.

Restrictions Invoked
Government agencies invoked certain press restrictions and imposed controls over short-wave radio, wireless telegraph and cable communications.

Officials said the machinery would be extended within the next few days and that steps would be taken to co-ordinate censorship activities of the various agencies. So far, varying degrees of censorship are being exercised by the army, navy and the office of co-ordinator of information.

Chairman James L. Fly of the Federal Communications Commission said that military agencies were studying extension of restrictions on rebroadcasts of radiocasts originating from points outside the United States.

There also were suggestions in official quarters that censorship of the mails and domestic telegrams will go into effect shortly.

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—State department officials said today that there was no accurate census of Americans in Japan, but that developments in Japanese-American relations in recent weeks had caused all but a few American citizens to leave that country.

The largest contingent of Americans still in Japan are 45 American diplomatic and consular officers.

In addition to Joseph C. Grew, the American ambassador, the latest American foreign service list gives the following diplomatic and consular officers assigned to Japan:

Embassy at Tokyo: Eugene H. Dooman, counselor, New York City; Frank S. Williams, commercial attaché, Kansas, Miss.; George A. Makinson, first secretary, San Francisco; Edward B. Crocker, first secretary, Fitchburg, Mass.; Charles E. Bohlen, second secretary, Clayton, N. Y.; H. Merrell Benninghoff, second secretary, Chicago and Rochester, N. Y.; William T. Turner, second secretary, Cincinnati, O.; David T. Ray, language officer, New York City and Berkeley, Calif.

The embassy are listed as Lieutenant Colonel Harry I. T. Creswell, military attaché, Lieutenant Colonel Henri H. Smith-Hutton, naval attaché; Major C. Stanton Babcock, Captain Karl T. Gould, Captain Dana W. Johnston, and Captain Archibald Stuart, assistant military attachés; Lieutenant Everet L. Phares, and Lieutenant Martin R. Stone, assistant naval attachés. No home addresses of the military and naval officers were immediately available.

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Japanese Seek Quick Advantage

Nipponese Not 'Superhuman'

BY DEWITT MACKENZIE
Wide World Analyst

The further Japanese successes in the war of the Pacific — notably the sinking of the great British warships Prince of Wales and Repulse, and the landing of troops in the Philippines — make grim reading for the Allies, but they are far from decisive and need not cause any discouragement whatever.

Probably there is little danger that we shall allow ourselves to fall under a complex which attributes superhuman capabilities to the enemy, but we should guard against any high tendency. A lot of folk get the superhuman complex regarding the mighty German war-machine, and it was two years before the Russians defeated the invincibility halloon.

Speed, Surprise Used
The Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, despite the fact that in three days of bombing they have inflicted damage which the Germans haven't been able to do in more than two years with what once was the greatest air force ever created. And what's the answer to that?

The Nipponese fighting machine doesn't compare in power with that of the Nazis. Certainly, the Japanese aren't better warriors. I think we have the answer in three points:

(1) The Japanese created a vast advantage by a surprise attack, and have worked with terrific swiftness since the start; (2) their bombers have been favored with a good fortune which hasn't fallen so plentifully even, on the

Germans with all their skill and power; and (3) they have been fighting a "suicide" war thus far, striking widely and with utter disregard for consequences to equipment or their own lives.

Japs Risking Everything
That last point is important. The Nipponese are risking everything in these early hours in an effort to secure an advantage which will carry them through. That type of warfare brings either great rewards or terrible disasters. It is the sort of thing the Japanese are well adapted to, for a people who are endowed with such courage that they don't hesitate to commit hara kiri to satisfy honor surely aren't going to hesitate to sacrifice themselves in this emergency.

The Japanese are carrying out a strategic program which is Hitlerian in its daring and scope, and it is given to wonder whether Berlin hasn't had a considerable hand in shaping the plans. The line of strategy now begins to take form.

Striking At Chief Base
Their immediate objectives are the occupation of, or at least the impairment of, the two great allied naval bases of the Far East—Britain's Singapore and our own Philippines.

If the Japanese could knock out both the Philippines and Singapore, they would have secured command of all those waters.

The object of the Japanese assault on the narrow Malay peninsula is twofold: to give them a land base from which to strike at Singapore, which lies at the end of the peninsula, and to cut the

lines of communication between the Philippines and Singapore.

It is a bold plan, and it is one that the Japanese are well adapted to carry out. They are well adapted to surprise attacks, and they are well adapted to the use of force.

Japan has been dependent upon the United States for the bulk of its vital war supplies. There is only one direction in which the Japs can now turn, and that's to the Dutch East Indies. Unless the resources of the Indies can be tapped, Japan's war effort is in a dangerous position.

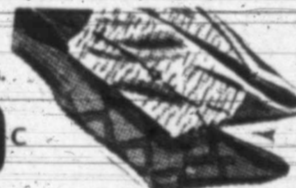

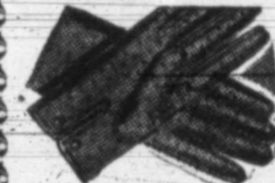

Omaha Has One Regular

The Mexicans, national champions of the southern republic for the last three seasons, defeated the Indians, 44-36, and 48-30. Incidentally, the Chihuahua team defeated Texas Tech last winter at El Paso, 43-40.

Coach Huffman indicated last night he would start Elvis Erwin and Bob Phillips at forwards.

Stratton was one of the leading pitchers of the American league until three seasons ago when he lost a leg in a hunting accident. Since then he has served as a coach for the White Sox. His home is at Cedar Rapids, Texas.

Whether or not the West Texas-New Mexico league will operate next season is a matter yet to be determined, of course. Recommended for taking your mind on the war news: Tonight's basketball game between Texas Tech's Red Raiders and Omaha University's Indians.

They play a whirlwind game, these Red Raiders, the kind of play you like to see even when your favorite loses. And even in these troubled times, it's safe to predict that the Raiders won't lose very often this season.

Also recommended, and given four-star rating by this department, is Friday's regional championship football game of Brownfield, involving the Brownfield Cubs and the Ballinger Bearkats.

Both teams are unbeaten this season, and each has improved steadily in rolling through an eleven-game schedule. Brownfield's first serious threat came last week in Bi-district play, but the Cubs passed it successfully by edging out Merkel, 13 to 12.

Ballinger, which played a scoreless tie with Lorraine in its season opener and has since won all its games by margins of three touchdowns or more, had an easier time, tripping Monahans of District 7-A, 33 to 7.

Ballinger is the coaching stronghold of Pooch Wright, originator of the blocking recorder. When the Bearkats play their home games, a part of the scoreboard is a blocking chart for the benefit of the fans—and perhaps as an effective means of persuading the Bearkats to block more efficiently.

Each player's name is on the scoreboard and beside it a red light, if he carries out his blocking assignment in acceptable fashion, the light remains off; but if he misses, the red light glares accusingly for all to see.

Incidentally, if Gene Hill and Robbie Dee, and Bobbie Lee Smith, the Wichita Falls terror, hadn't moved to Coyoteland a few years ago, both Brownfield and Lubbock probably would be happier.

The Smiths and Hill, who is their cousin, attended grade school at Brownfield. Had they remained there, what a football team the Cubs would have now!

Brownfield has no passing attack at all, though its running game can compare with any AA team. What a difference those boys would make! If the Cubs had Hill and the Smiths, we would not want to see the Westerners play them with title ambitions at stake.

But if the Cubs had the Smiths and Hill, we wouldn't be at all afraid to bet on the Westerners over Wichita Falls.

If there's any better man around at coin-tossing than Brownfield's coach, Alvin Nooncaster, we have yet to hear of him.

At only two places were the selections close—at one guard and one end post.

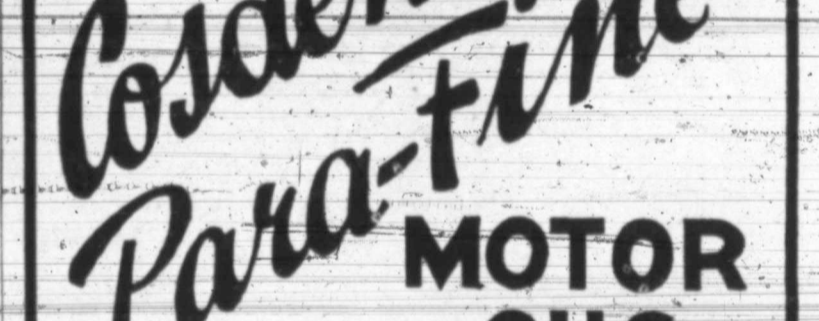
In the guard race Art Goforth of Rice and Ted Ramsey of Southern Methodist split the coaches and

The war is only a few days old, but even now most of us realize that we Americans must learn to "take it" while we're getting into better positions to "dish it out."

To those who fondly believed that last Sunday that a war with Japan would be nothing more than a brisk workout for our arm-

And because we were not as fully prepared as we all now wish we had been, likely will have to pay in priceless American blood, as well as in sweat, tears and dollars, over a considerable period before we will be able to secure full command of the situation.

The Plainsman, like everyone else, has heard from time to time in recent days criticism of our lack of preparedness for war.

While it is undeniably true that we were unprepared—and may continue to be for weeks or months—now is no time to criticize.

The job of winning a war has been dumped squarely in our laps and despite whatever handicaps which confront us, we're going to win!

Topping the world in warfare, as well as in other lines, is more than a habit of the people of the United States of America. It is a tradition.

And none of us propose to drop that tradition overboard now, for any reason.

The criticism which has been voiced in recent days, no matter how needless or illogical under the circumstances, is readily undesirable.

It really isn't criticism, per se. Instead, it is born wholly of disappointment and of shock which naturally followed the first few hours and days when all success in maneuvers appeared to be resting with the foe.

But to those who for any reason see fit to cry out over our unpreparedness, let us drop this gentle reminder:

The fact that we were not prepared may be a grievous fault, but it is not a fault which can be lodged upon the shoulders of any individual or group of individuals.

We were unprepared to put up, from the start, the kind of a fight we eventually must put up, simply because in recent years American thinking has not been attuned to that of most of the rest of the world.

All of us now are fully aware of the fact that for years—too many years—we failed to match the other world-powers in building defenses against attack while building armed forces capable of waging an offensive war.

But was it the fault of our national administration—present or past—of the congresses which did not make the necessary appropriations?

We think it was not the fault of either. We know it wasn't.

For up to three years ago, the great majority of our people would have screamed to high heaven against the expenditure of billions for war when there was "no war in sight."

As a whole, we Americans—a peace-loving people—saw no reason for girding for war which, as we believed, then, "probably never will come."

This is the time for brutal honesty between ourselves and The Plainsman freely admits that his, thinking was identical with that of the majority until the spring or summer of 1939. Furthermore, that type of thinking was shared by everyone he knows in both public and private life, whether or not they will admit it today.

Therefore, whatever blame there may be in connection with our lack of preparedness, it cannot be placed upon the shoulders of any one man or any few men in high authority.

If there is blame attached, it must be placed squarely where honesty dictates it must be placed, namely upon the overwhelming majority of us all!

DERHAPS crying over split milk may be justifiable in some cases, but it is not justifiable in the current national emergency.

We ought to have, or I wish we had, or "what was the matter with us," has no place today in

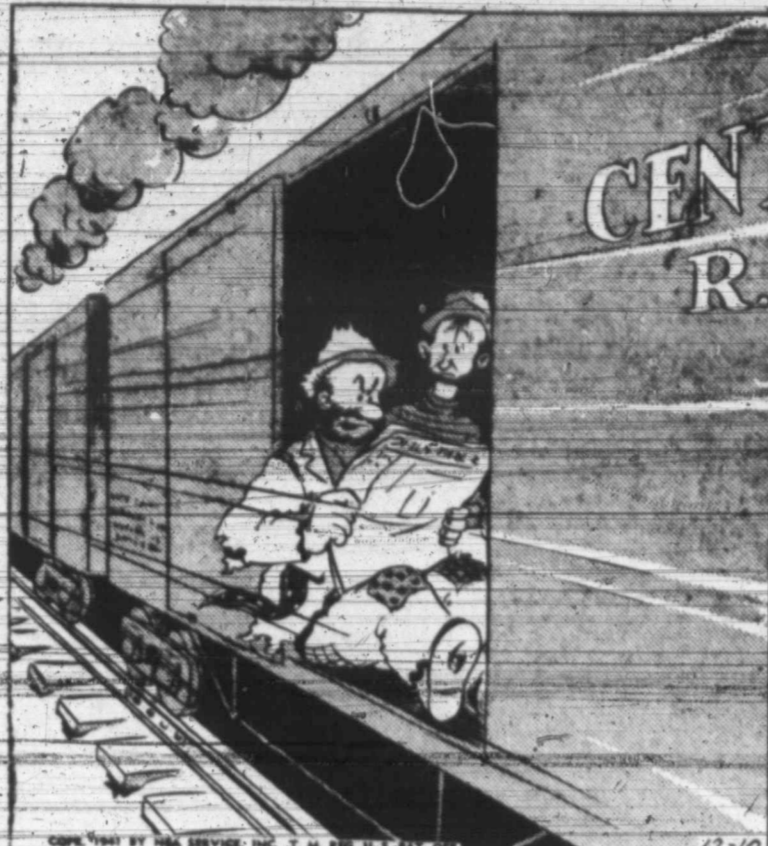

A New Minister Takes Up His Abode And Starts Work In U.S. First Indian Envoy Talks About His Job Here

BY MILTON BRONNER Journal Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—For the first time in all its long history, India has sent to a major power, namely the United States, a Hindu diplomat whose job it will be to make Americans fully India-conscious.

He is Sir Girja Shanker Bajpai, whose official title is agent general and who ranks as a minister. Small, gray-haired, and sporting the authentic Oxonian accent of a graduate of New College, Oxford university, Sir Girja talked with me at the press office of the British embassy.

He was at great pains to explain that his job of making America India-conscious did not mean that he was to gaily trot around the country to counteract what more rabid Hindu-followers of Mahatma Gandhi have been saying against British "oppression" of India. His task is to consult with the proper governmental departments on anything that affects India, and especially in its war-time relations with the United States. He reports back to the viceroy of India.

FEARS HITLER VICTORY

GANDHI and his followers demand complete independence for India. Others would be satisfied with something like dominion status, similar to self-governing Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. Many of them visiting this country have disapproved on the fact that the British government put India in the present war without consulting the Indian people.

"We are in this war," said Sir Girja, "not only for the sake of Great Britain, but mainly for ourselves and for our survival. We know what fate awaits lands conquered by Hitler and we understand the wicked implications of his racial theories. Sometimes we in India think things move slowly in the way of self-rule, but they do move. We had elections and we had a large measure of self-government in the provinces of British India."

"The very fact that the post-1914 hold has been created and that I have been named to hold it is a further advance in British recognition of India's wants and needs. I am only a little person, but have been picked for this honor."

The army has increased from 170,000 Indians to more than 1,000,000.

"FIGHTING IN LIBYA"
INDIAN troops are fighting in Libya. They are on watch in Egypt. They take part in the fighting in Iraq and Iran and are still stationed there. They are on guard in Syria. In the east they are on the frontiers of Burma and all over the Malay peninsula. They form an important part of the troops who would be engaged if the empire had trouble with Japan.

"India not only sends troops, but it makes much of the material they use. This includes guns up to seven-inch, trench mortars, machine guns and rifles. We have started making armor for tanks and also have a modest airplane manufacture. Our small navy consists of cargo ships and sloops. Two of our corvettes, manned by Indians, did not lose work in recent convoys. We are proud of that, because the Indians have not been a sea-going race.

"Our armaments factories, plus our food and our manufacture of boots and khaki cloth, have become so important that India, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa now have a group supply system. They supply each other and plant our mutual supplies for our mutual needs, relieving Britain as much as possible from this war burden."

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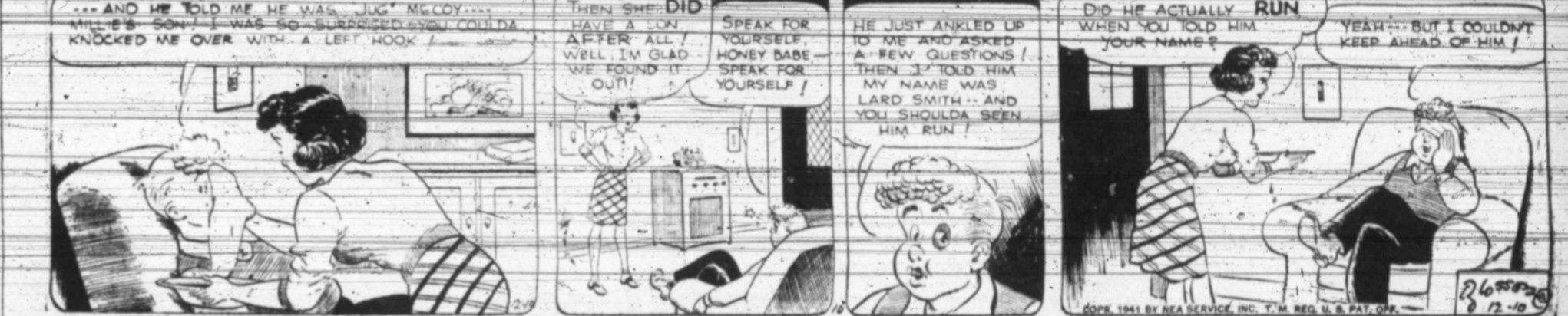

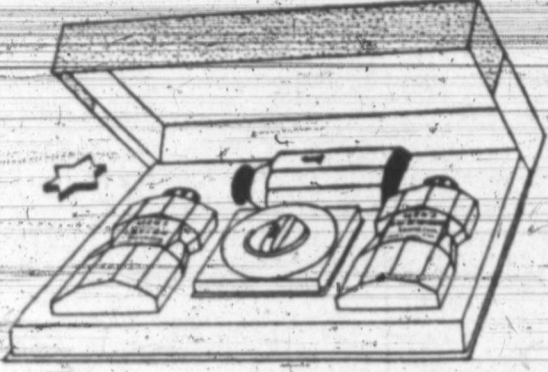

Ellwood 2216, northeast in Hockley wildcat 15 miles northeast of Slaughter production, had drilled unchanged to 5,386 feet in anhydrite and lime. Contract depth is 5,500 feet. North of Leveland in Hockley, Standard Oil and Texas company No. 1 Victor, 1-William is reported to have topped brown lime at 3,360 feet and first gray lime stringer at 3,660. It was reported drilling below 3,750 feet in lime.

Flow Is Gauged
In the Slaughter field, Hockley sector, Honolulu Oil corporation No. 10-4-51 Mallet Land and Cattle company flower reported 1,190.96 barrels of oil a day after swabbing with 10000 gallons at 5,070 feet, plugged back from 5,078 feet. Also in Hockley, Whittington brothers No. 2 Alewine rated daily flow of 474.72 barrels of oil, plus 46 per cent water, following acid treatment with 6,500 gallons at 4,955 feet. Likins & Hall, Midland No. 1 E. H. Jones, scheduled 7,200 foot test in northwestern Gaines county, as drilling past 6,100 feet in hard lime. American Petroleum corporation No. 1 Ruth M. Hudson, northwestern Gaines wildcat three miles west of the south end of the Wasson field, has recovered 261 barrels of oil by swabbing, representing a net gain of 33 barrels over total oil load of 228 barrels. Hole is swabbed dry at intervals and makes 1.01 barrels of fluid an hour after swabbing dry. Last shakeout showed dilution of 56 per cent acid water. Bottomed at 5,000 feet in lime, the well has been shot with 96 quarts and acidized with 3,000 gallons. Blacid Oil company, Starveport.

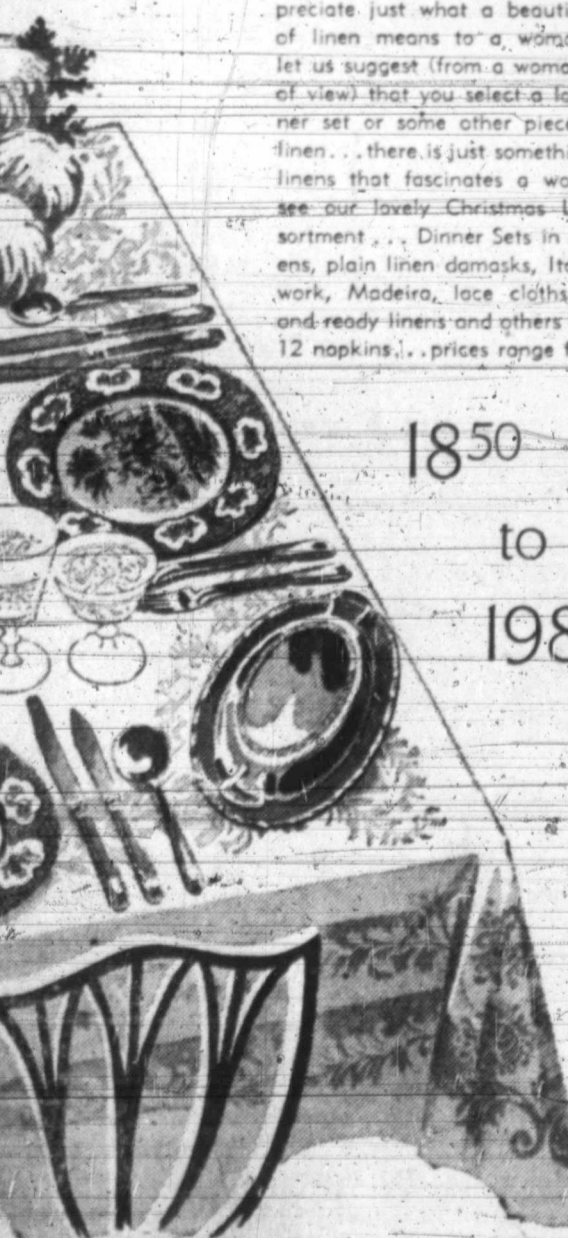
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
