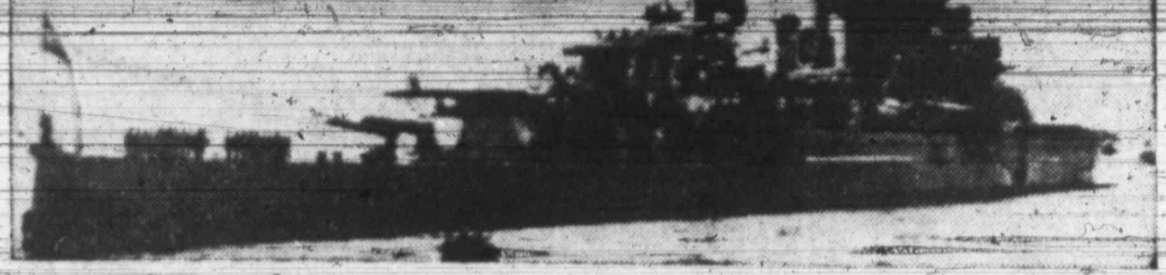


American Reporter Says "British Courage Unparalleled" As Japs Sank The Prince Of Wales And Repulse Off Malayan Coast

Eye-Witness Paints Graphic Picture Of Ship Sinkings

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The first eye-witness account of the sinking of the British capital ships, Prince of Wales and Repulse, was received by the Columbia Broadcasting System today from its Singapore correspondent, Cecil Brown. Brown was aboard the Repulse.

Cruiser Repulse when she was sent to the bottom under a fierce Japanese attack in the South China Sea far off the Malayan coast. As I was swimming in thick oily water, I also saw the Prince of Wales go to the bottom a half mile away in the greatest British naval loss of this war. Like hundreds of others, I jumped 20 feet into the water when the Repulse was already on its

side and swam as fast as possible to avoid the suction and the expected explosion. "The Japanese pressed the attack home with all the daring of the British at Taramo. I saw six Japanese bomber planes shot down in a burst of flames 500 yards distant. "At least 700 have been saved on the Repulse. Perhaps the same number were saved on the Prince of Wales.

Admiral Sir Tom Phillips, commander-in-chief of the Far Eastern fleet, and Captain Leach of the Prince of Wales were last seen gliding into the water from the bridge of the Wales. "Captain William Tennant of the Repulse was saved. "When it was obvious that the Repulse was sinking and numerous dead were lying beside the guns, I was stand-

ing on the flag deck with the only other reporter to witness this great blow to British naval strength. He is O'Dowd Gallagher of the London Daily Express. I was the only American witness to this engagement. Captain Tennant spoke through the ship's microphone: "All hands on deck. Prepare to abandon ship. (Turn to Page 8, Column 5, Please)

Plans For Blackouts Over Texas Are Announced

Casualty Lists Grow Longer

Blackouts, M-days and plans for blackouts became epidemic in Texas today following the surprise anti-aircraft workout in the lush lower Rio Grande valley that paralyzed rail and highway traffic but brought no accidents.

The state of alert—labelled officially as a practice—continued from 10:30 p. m. Tuesday until 2 p. m. Wednesday.

Texas Casualties Reported

The list of Texas casualties in the war with Japan grew.

William F. Brownlee, 30, air corps enlisted man, was killed at Hickam field, Hawaii, in action in defense of his country, the war department Wednesday notified his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William J. Brownlee, Young Brownlee was graduated from the Corpus Christi high school in June, 1939, and enlisted in the army four months later. He was an only son.

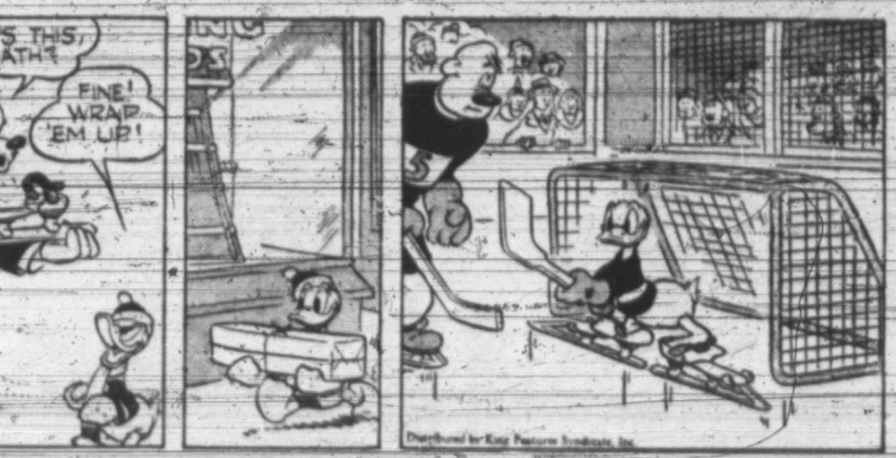

SON AT MIDWAY

HOUSTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—Mrs. R. J. Gillan, 43, said today that their son, B. J. Gillan, Jr., was stationed with a U. S. Marine detachment at the Navy air base on Midway island which is under attack by Japanese navy forces. They received a Christmas card from him yesterday by mail.

He was a messenger boy in World war No. 2. He works from eight to five in the office in his business.

More Instructions Are Issued For People During Air Raids

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11—Here are more instructions issued by the Office for Civilian Defense for the guidance of the people in case of air raids:

Put out lights.

Whether or not blackout is ordered, don't show more light than is necessary. If planes come over, put out all lights at once—don't wait for the "blackout" order. The light that's out will never guide a Jap. Remember, a single light may be seen for miles from the air.

If you have portiers, overdrapes, or curtains, arrange a double thickness over your windows. Blankets will do, if you have heavy black paper, paste it on your windows. Don't crowd or stampee stores to get it, however. You probably have everything you need at home. Be ingenious—improvise.

Should you get an air-raid warning, remember to shut off gas stoves, gas furnaces, and gas pilot lights on both. Bomb explosions may blow them out from blast effect. Gas that collects may be explosive later.

Axis Declaration Expected; New Trick By Hitler Is Hinted

Soviets Score New Successes

The declaration of war against the United States by Germany and Italy, in alliance with Japan, was fully expected and doesn't alter the position materially.

Herr Hitler, as overlord of the Axis, undoubtedly hopes that the moral effect of this declaration, delivered at a moment of great triumph because of Japanese successes, will benefit his cause. However, it is likely that the effect has been largely discounted in advance.

U. S. Bombers Holding Ground

True, this may preclude more direct action against the United States. Indeed one would expect this to be so. But that action would have come in any event, for the normal Axis strategy is to strike without warning. It happens to suit Hitler's purpose now to make a show of the formality.

As for the Japanese end of our new offensive, the long-run is showing some slight curbs, even though no turning has developed.

We have some good news to go with the bad. Foremost is the announcement by an American army spokesman in Manila that the situation is completely in hand in connection with the Japanese landings on the island of Luzon, of which Manila is the capital. With this is recorded the fine success of our bombers in making three direct hits on a Jap battleship off Luzon and leaving it a blazing mass.

Must Control Bases

The battle of the Pacific at this moment pivots on the Japanese assaults against the two great Allied bases—our own Philippines and Britain's Singapore.

Possession of these two powerful bases is essential to control of the Pacific.

While the word from Manila is cheering, we shouldn't jump to conclusions. The Japanese attack is continuing, with fighting forces shown at various points, and a further landing of parachute troops at an airport near Dilanga was reported this morning. We

have to sail through a lot of dirty weather yet.

Russians Claim New Successes

The sensational success of the Japanese in the first round of this fresh conflict very naturally has distracted attention from the European war. Had the world taken trouble to glance at this theater it would have learned that the Russians have had further successes, both in the Leningrad and the Moscow sectors, and report inflicting bloody losses on the Germans.

Simultaneously the Nazis announce with apparent complacency that their advance forces have withdrawn in winter lines along the Russian front. The military spokesman in Berlin, said the German push eastward was finished until spring. That is cheerful news for the Allies, for it will give the Bolsheviks a chance to recuperate from the effects of their fierce struggle this fall.

May Raid Atlantic Coast

London, however, isn't entirely happy over reports from Moscow, and it may seem a curious coincidence that this is due to the fact that the Bolsheviks claim to have gained air superiority over the invaders. For Britain that means Hitler has withdrawn many warplanes from Russia for use elsewhere. In other words, the latter appears to be cooking up a fresh scheme to employ against the Allies.

What are we to expect? There are several possibilities. Among these, and of peculiar interest to the United States, is the possibility that the Germans may be preparing to intensify their attack on Atlantic shipping and may carry their attack into American waters. There always is the possibility also that they may attempt air raids against the Atlantic coast for the psychological effect.

Montgomery Ward

Churchill Foresees Eventual Victory After First Grave Setbacks

Big Job Faces Allied Nations

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Prime Minister Churchill spoke gravely today of United States and British naval losses in the Pacific and the Far East, declared Adolf Hitler committed a colossal blunder in attacking Soviet Russia, and predicted ultimate British victory in North Africa despite unexpected reverses.

"It may well be," he declared in a sweeping review of the broad-end war, "that we shall have to suffer considerable punishment, but we shall defend ourselves everywhere with the utmost vigor and in close cooperation with the United States and Netherlands navy."

Losses Termed Serious

"No one can underestimate the gravity of losses inflicted on the United States nor underestimate the length of time it will take to marshal the great forces necessary in the Far East for absolute victory."

He said bluntly that because of American naval losses Britain must expect that United States naval aid in the Atlantic and the volume of American supplies for Britain to be reduced, but added:

Expects Greater Effort

"I cannot doubt now that the 130,000,000 people of the United States have bound themselves to this war and once they get settled down to it... That the flow of munitions and aid of every kind will vastly exceed anything that could have been expected up to the present."

Of the sinking of Britain's battleship Prince of Wales and battlecruiser Repulse by Japanese air attack off Malaya, the prime minister said he understood they were without support of their own land-based fighter planes "because of an attack which had been made on the airdromes."

Japanese Air Base Attacked

BATAVIA, Java, Dec. 11.—A Netherlands East Indies army communique declared today that Australian bombers based in the Netherlands East Indies territory during the last 24 hours. The war bulletin said "one aircraft failed to return from these operations" and added:

"No hostilities have taken place within Netherlands East Indies territory during the last 24 hours."

A Netherlands Indies naval communique said Netherlands naval forces had reached the big British base at Singapore.

Three Are Killed In Midland Crash

MIDLAND, Dec. 11.—A head-on automobile collision, two miles west of here in a drizzling rain coat the lives last night of State Rep. Taylor White, 50, the Rev. John T. Kee, 24, and Mrs. E. F. Edwards, about 40, all of Oklahoma.

Injured were Mrs. White, Mr. Edwards and Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Munde of Sweetwater. The Mundees were going to Sweetwater where the Rev. Kee officiated at the wedding of his brother.

GRADUATE OF TECH

State Rep. Taylor White, reported killed Wednesday night in a head-on collision of cars near Midland, was a graduate of Texas Technological college. Having taken a master's degree in animal husbandry in 1931. He wrote a thesis on "Costs of Producing Milk in Texas-Supported Institutions."

He was one of the first vocational agriculture teachers in northwest Texas, it was recalled by Dean A. H. Leidigh, Ray C. Mowery and W. L. Stangel, all of the agricultural division of the college.

Army Air Base Men Given New Offices

At least two portions of the city hall took on something less of a sardine-can appearance this morning with a shifting of quarters of some of those connected with the air base under construction west of the city.

Lieut. Col. Thomas L. Gilbert, commanding officer of the field, moved his staff of more than 20 members from the first floor front of the city hall to the old Montgomery-Fraser building at 702 Main street. The transfer company offices now are located at 1108 Twenty-fifth street.

Major H. S. Bishop, sub-depot commander at the base, and staff have moved from a temporary office in the chamber of commerce, on the second floor of the city hall, to the quarters vacated by Col. Gilbert.

Major Bishop, five members of his civilian staff and one to two staff members of the chamber of commerce have been sharing an office measuring approximately 10 by 10 feet. The unoccupied space in their office has been used to interview applicants for civilian jobs at the base.

BRIGHT FUTURE

TOKYO, Dec. 11. (Official radio received by AP)—Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo declared today that the German and Italian declarations of war against the United States "together with the marvelous achievements of the Imperial (Japanese) armed forces unfold a bright future for the Japanese empire, which is proceeding resolutely with the construction of a new world order."

LOSSES REPORTED

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Adolf Hitler told the German people today that up to Dec. 10 the German forces had taken 3,806,865 Russian prisoners and captured or destroyed 21,391 Russian tanks, 32,541 guns and 17,325 aircraft.

ARRESTED IN BERLIN

LONDON, Dec. 11.—A number of United States citizens, including newspapermen, were arrested in Berlin today, DNB said in a report issued by Reuters.

DESTRUCTION LIKELY

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Destruction of the entire German and Italian armored forces in eastern Libya appears now to be a probability, an official spokesman said today.

STILL MAKING RAIDS

SINGAPORE, Dec. 11.—A British communique reported today that Japanese mobile air and sea forces still appear to be engaged in raiding operations over wide areas of the Pacific.

TO RAID STORES

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Dec. 11.—The AFL central trades and labor council instructed its 21,000 affiliated union members today to go through downtown stores at noon Saturday, seize any merchandise made in Germany or Italy and throw it into the streets.

New Army Camps In Texas Are Proposed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Congressman Wright Patman (D-Tex.) said yesterday he expected the war department to send Congress "in a very short time" a request for legislation to permit construction of fourteen new army camps, including three in Texas.

The Texas camps would be located at Paris, Killeen and Bastrop. Patman said he discussed the proposed construction with war officials yesterday.

Holiday Extension Announced At Tech

Announcement of extension of Christmas holidays at Texas Technological college was made this morning following decision by the administrative council to change date of closing of the holidays from Jan. 2 to Jan. 5.

The change was made because the former arrangement would have prevented faculty members from attending closing sessions of the national convention of the American association for the Advancement of Science to be held in Dallas during the holidays. Holding of the convention in Texas offers a rare opportunity for many faculty members to attend, it was pointed out. The change also gives students and faculty members wishing to attend the Sun bowl game, in which Tech will play New Year's day, longer to return to classes.

Time of opening of holidays, 5 p. m. on Dec. 20, was not changed. Classes will be resumed at 8 a. m. Jan. 5.

Refugee Soldiers' Morale Is Praised

CAMP DAVIS, N. C., Dec. 12.—The 26th coast artillery is not worried about the morale of one group of soldiers—the refugees drafted into the U. S. army after fleeing Europe.

One youth, who was not allowed to wear a Nazi uniform, said he was so proud of his American uniform he wanted to send his picture to Hitler, housepainter, Berchtesgaden.

Another soldier, who got out of Germany in 1937, said he would rather serve five years in the U. S. army than "three days in a concentration camp." He was a baker before fleeing his homeland; the coast artillery had put him to work baking bread for American soldiers.

Army authorities here said that, uniformly, the refugee soldiers have the best morale in the army.

UNDER DEATH SENTENCE

HOUSTON, Dec. 11.—Richard Robinson, 38, Houston negro, was under a death sentence today for criminal assault upon a white woman here on Aug. 8, 1940. District Judge Langston G. King pronounced sentence after confirmation of the penalty by the state court of criminal appeals.

STEVENSON'S UNCLE DIES

EL PASO, Dec. 11.—Funeral services were being arranged today for Edwin M. Stevenson, 88, an uncle of Gov. Coke Stevenson. Stevenson died last night.

Texas Defense Plans Pushed

AUSTIN, Dec. 11.—County judges and mayors of 436 Texas cities now have detailed organization charts and suggestions for every phase of local defense work recommended by state and federal agencies.

Persons wishing to volunteer for the many services should contact the office of the mayor or judge in their community.

Two Divisions Proposed

Explaining generally the nature of proposed programs, the governor's office today issued the following statement:

Two broad divisions are proposed in the local defense organization—civilian protection (relating to emergency services in case of disaster), and community programs (designed to promote the general well-being of the populace to stimulate industrial production, etc.).

Under the civilian protection section, defense divisions are proposed in the fields of fire, police, emergency medical services, public works and utilities.

These functions are essentially the responsibility of the public officials, assisted by such volunteers as they may need. A control center is provided for each locality and these emergency functions will be coordinated there.

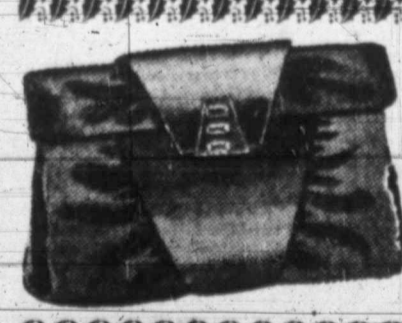

Schoolboy Quarter-Finals Expected To Attract Large Crowds This Week End

Ysleta Invades Wichita Falls

Sunset, Austin In Role Of Favorites

Some of the fans may bring their portable radios so they can tune in the war bulletins but the schoolboy quarter-finals are expected to bring the football faithful out in large numbers this week end.

Estimates of attendance at the four games Friday and Saturday range up to 35,000, with the Highland Park-Dallas Sunset game at SMU's Ownby stadium slated to draw around 20,000.

War or no war there was plenty of football enthusiasm around the state.

Ysleta, Temple Play Friday

The Friday game pits Ysleta and Temple at the latter city in an afternoon game.

The other three games, all on Saturday afternoon, find Ysleta at Wichita Falls, Sunset at Highland Park, and Houston Lamar at Austin.

Favorites are Wichita Falls, Coyotes, Sunset's Bisons and Austin's Maroons. The Temple Wildcats and the Tyler Lions are about equally backed.

Here's the comparative dope on the quarter-finalists, based on season records:

Wichita Falls Favored

Ysleta-Wichita Falls—Winners of 10 straight after a season opening loss to Masonic Home, Wichita Falls Coyotes have developed a passing attack no team has come anywhere near stopping, and also have the best defensive record in the state. Coyote passer Gene Hill pitches them like baseball's Bobby Feller and has completed nearly two of every three passes he has tossed. The Coyotes outscored Ysleta 260 points to 221, having yielded only 32 points to Ysleta's 44. Ysleta, a squad of opportunists, beat a bigger team last week—Sweetwater. The odds are against the Indians repeating the upset Saturday.

Sunset-Highland Park—Unbeaten and untied in 10 games, with one of the fastest, if not the fastest backfield in the state, Sunset's Bisons are favored over their cross-town opponents, the Highland Park Highlanders. The game shapes up as Sunset's running game against Highland Park's passing attack.

Highland Park is a team with black-haired, good-looking Jack "the sharpshooter" Sharp, the Highlanders have a passer in Gene Hill's class. Against favored Paris last week, he tossed 17 completions for 246 yards. Highland Park has scored 283 points to Sunset's 261 in one more game, but lost two games to Sunset's nine, one to Adamson, a team the Bisons swamped. A Highland Park victory would be an upset, but the team has improved fast in the last month and last week was at full strength for the first time this season.

High Scorers Seek Title

Tyler-Temple—Tyler has the high-scoring team of the eight quarter-finalists. The Lions have 296 points to Temple's 260. Temple, the second undefeated, untied team left in the race, has the best defensive record—33 points to 52. Like Wichita Falls, Tyler lost the season opener, to Sunset, and then won 10 straight. Temple played 10 games, won them all, but occasionally by just a touchdown margin. Temple will be outwitted, and Center L. G. Martin's nose has not recovered from a sinus operation. He will not play. Last time the schools met, in 1938, Temple won on penetrations.

Lamar-Austin—Two individual stars meet in this game—Chuck 'in' Charley' Munson of Austin and Raymond Borneaman of Lamar, the former a great passer, punter, field general, the latter a tall well-built boy whose running has a Jack Crain deception to it. He looks slow, but isn't. Lamar seems to be Borneaman and little more, for he has counted 164 of 203 points. Munson is a mainstay of the Maroons but they have a balanced club and did not need

The Raiders were champions of the Border league last season, and have most of their lettermen back.

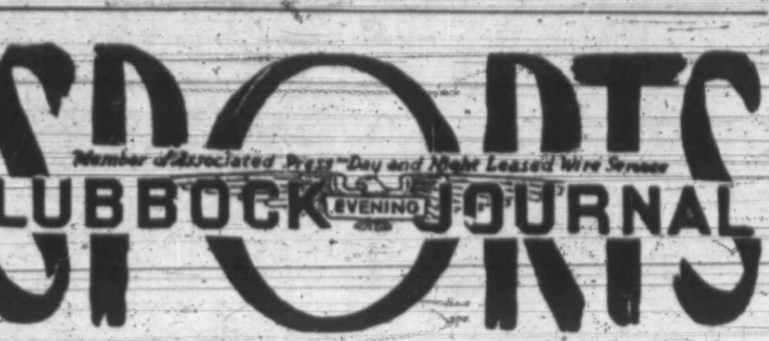
Tech's home court victory record, now standing at 24 consecutive games, will be under heavy fire.

"Sports As Usual" Also Out Of Question

What effect will the war emergency have on Lubbock's sports program?

That remains to be seen, but it's certain that a general curtailment cannot be avoided, even if authorities wished to do so.

Like most other boys of fighting age, athletes will flock to the colors. Basketball, football, baseball and so on seem pretty insignificant in these times. Whether you're a player, a sports writer or a fan, it's hard to keep your mind on sports these days.

If the 1918 pattern is followed, you may be sure that the West Texas-New Mexico league will not operate next season. During the last war, most of the minors did not even open the season, and the majors curtailed the schedule considerably.

The member clubs of the league continue to make plans for the 1942 season, however. That's about all it's possible to do when you don't know what's going to happen you can only hope for the best.

It may be that authorities will decide that continued operation of baseball leagues is desirable for purposes of morale. Even in that event, the WT-NM would face a serious player shortage.

High school football will be least affected by the emergency. Only the oldest of the players are eligible for army or navy enlistment. Biggest problem will be obtaining coaches. Many schools never found a coach last year, and many more will do without next year. That means that a lot of school teachers past the death limit will take over football

"It Was Fun To Watch While It Lasted"

Yawkey's Gaudy Effort To Buy A Pennant Fading As Father Time Calls On Former Stars

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—In a little less than 10 days the old guy with the scythe who is known as father time has put an end to \$500,000 worth of the boldest, gaudiest and most expensive attempt to buy a pennant that baseball ever has known and probably ever will know.

That is the \$4,000,000 globe experiment carried out by Tom Yawkey with the Boston Red Sox as the guinea pig. It lasted for six years and technically speaking it failed because not even millions of dollars and dozens of great stars could boost the Sox to the top rung of the American league ladder where Yawkey wanted them. And now it's all over.

Three Main Stars Fade

It's over because in just a few days more than a week the three musketeers of the Yawkey experiment have passed out of baseball as active players. One of them is gone for good; another may find a temporary place with some other club and the third will stay in Boston—but as a bench strategist rather than an active player.

For when the Sox take the field for their 1942 opener there will be a new man at first base in the place of Jimmy Foxe. Another new player will have been assigned to the short-stop slot where the fans have long been accustomed to watching Joe Cronin. And although he hasn't been officially designated as yet, there'll be a third new man in the pitcher's box to take over the chores of old Mose Grove.

Foxe cost Yawkey \$150,000 and two players.

Was Fun To Watch

Grove preceded Foxe to Boston from the city of brotherly love by two years. He cost around \$125,000—if you exclude the four players who figures in the deal, but he never paid off like old Double-X.

Cronin was bought by Yawkey in between Foxe and Grove and his usual barrage of passes to subdue Corpus Christi's Buccaneers last week. The Maroons, who have scored 295 points, will be district favorites.

On the same date this year, Wednesday, 116 men students and 41 women students, a total of 161, had withdrawn.

Princess Arrested In Roundup Of Aliens

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 11 (AP)—The Record says that Princess Stefanie Hohenzollern-Waldenburg-Schillingfuerst was arrested here yesterday and sent to the U. S. immigration detention station at Gloucester, N. J.

The princess, who successfully fought deportation proceedings last May, was taken to the detention station with two German men, the newspaper said. She was reported among 63 German, Italian and Japanese nationals rounded up in Philadelphia and eastern Pennsylvania by Federal Bureau of investigation agents.

DALLAS, Dec. 11 (AP)—Police Chief J. M. Welch said today he had received a tip that enemy planes planned to dynamite buildings occupied by national defense schools. "This tip in the schools was no phony," Welch declared. "It was the straight goods." A heavy police guard was thrown around the buildings.

Auto Use Tax Due Feb. 1

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Application forms for the payment of the new federal use tax on automobiles will be mailed about the first of the year by the various district offices of the collector of internal revenue.

The tax, which will be levied on a fiscal year basis, becomes effective Feb. 1, 1942. The five-month period from Feb. 1 to the end of the current fiscal year, June 30, 1942, will require each motor vehicle owner to pay \$2.00 for "use" of his vehicle. Upon payment of the tax owners will receive as a receipt an internal revenue stamp which, under present plans, shall be displayed on his vehicles.

Application forms will be mailed to lists of owners of vehicles obtained from state records by offices of the collector of internal

Parents Are Advised To Spare Children Gory Details But Answer All Questions

TULSA, Dec. 11 (AP)—Spare your child the gory details of the war but answer his questions calmly and frankly. Such was the advice given parents today by Dr. L. S. McLeod, professor of psychology and dean of the college of arts and sciences at the University of Tulsa.

"Parents should make it a point not to bring up war news before children," Dr. McLeod said. "If children don't want to talk about it just let it go."

"But if the children ask questions, the parents should answer them in a calm, restrained manner. A fair question deserves a fair answer. Morbid questions of children, however, should be passed over as best as possible."

"The chief danger to children in these times, I should say, is the intensifying of the child's emotional responses, bringing about a tendency toward morbidness, the development of irrational fears and a sense of insecurity."

"Try to keep the emotions of the child reasonably balanced and normal."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The United States has authorized Mexican troops to cross through United States territory to reinforce the defense of Lower California.





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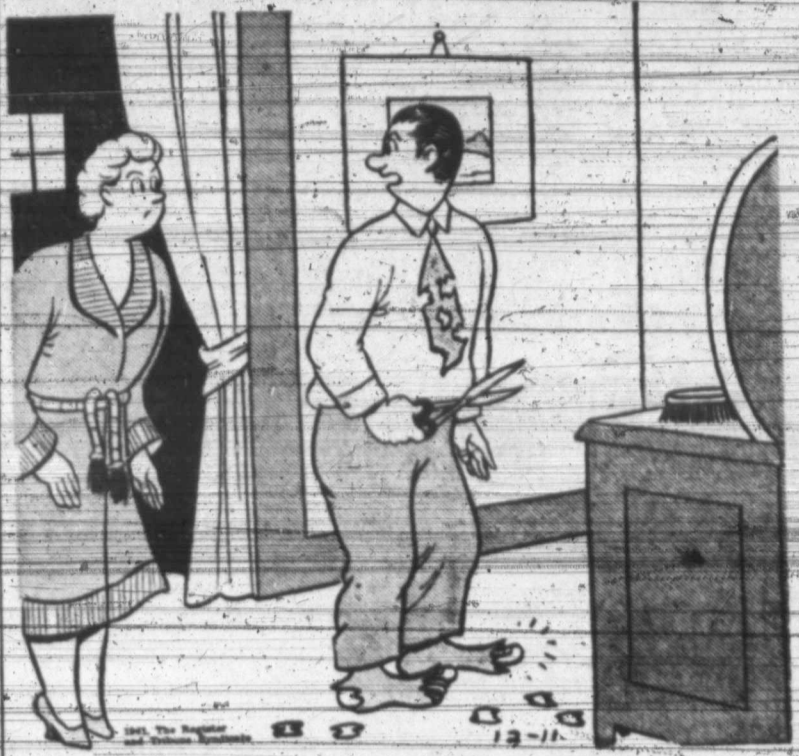
