THE VALUE OF BORNEO TO THE JAPS An elementary knowledge of geography is all that is needed to bring home an appreciation of the size of the job the Japs have undertaken in attempting to over-run the East Indies island of Borneo.

Borneo is one of the world's largest islands. Its area of some 290,000 square miles makes it approximately 25,000 square miles larger than the State of Texas. It is approximately twice as large as all of the islands of the Japanese empire, combined.

Its physical features will add to the difficulties of conquest. Many portions of it are mountainous, some of the peaks towering to heights of more than 13,000 feet. In it are swift rivers, jungles that are among the most impenetrable in the world, and deserts. The population numbers a scant 3,000,000, including many wild tribesmen. Its wealth is known to be fabulous, but for the most part is undeveloped and could not be made of material value to the Japs for a long time-especially if the reports are true that producing oil wells have been blown up.

The most immediate value of a conquest of the island would seem to be the springboard it might provide for other aggressions—and that would unlikely be a value of any immediate decisive importance.
