## Supreme Allied War Command Is Considered

British Again Are Forced To Retreat Before Jap Blows

(By The Associated Press) A supreme Allied war authority to direct high strategy against the Axis was reported in the making late today as Japan's land, sea and aerial offensive struck new blows from Burma to Dutch New Guinea and developed its sharpest threat on the Malayan road to Singapore. London sources said it was believed that Washington should be the headquarters of the prospective Allied grand council, and the British press association reported.

**Jap Bombers Striking**—In the capitals of each of the four great Allied powers (United States, Britain, China and Russia), leaders and spokesmen have already indicated their agreement to the general principle of a supreme authority for direction of the war. Japanese bombers carried out widespread attacks, striking at Kunning, the Chinese terminus of the vital Burma road, and Sorong, Dutch New Guinea, while Japanese land forces smashed deeper into northern Malaya and forced the British to make a new strategic withdrawal.

**Outlook For British Dark**—Britain's struggle to halt the Japanese drive toward Singapore took a darkening turn as British and Indian troops were acknowledged to have withdrawn below the southern border of Kedah, apparently yielding the 115-mile-long Malayan peninsula state to the Japanese. Kedah state lies opposite Penang island, and London quarters said the withdrawal from Kedah meant that Penang—second only to Singapore in importance throughout the Malay archipelago—was in jeopardy. The island is about 65 miles south of the Thailand frontier, jumping-off spot of the Japanese invasion.

British headquarters said defense forces were being reorganized south of the Irian river, on the southern border of Kedah, after disengaging operations during the night. With Singapore itself admittedly

(By The United Press) MANILA, Dec. 18.—Pretty Mrs. Mildred Sherk walked down to the beach at Legaspi to watch Japanese forces landing. She was so close she could have reached out and touched the butts of their rifles. She thought they looked as bewildered as the natives whose lands they were invading. She fled through a rice field and a leper colony, and after six days of walking and hitch-hiking through the steaming jungle, reached Manila yesterday, the first white woman to have seen a Japanese land invasion of the Philippines and reached here to tell about it.

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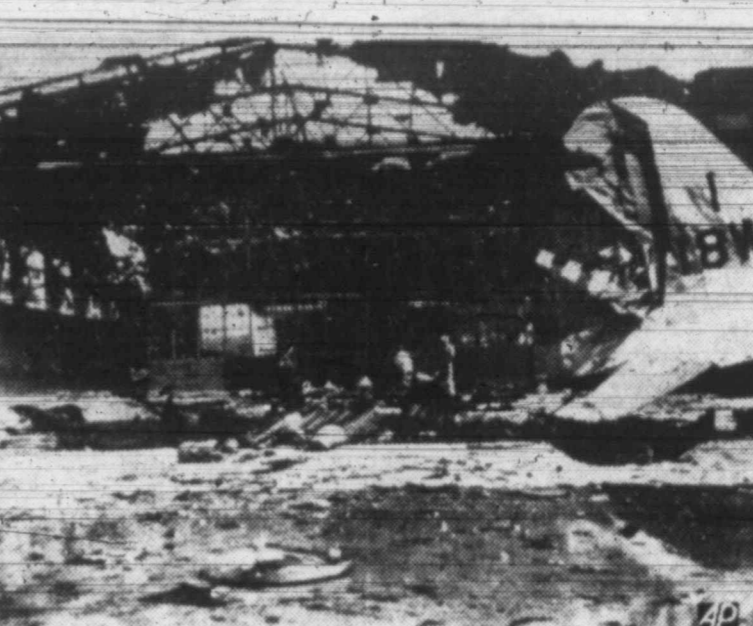

## Axis Invaders Said Fighting Among Selves

Beginning Of End For Germany Is Said In Sight

(By The Associated Press) A great, perhaps decisive turning-point marked Europe's war on two fronts today as Britain announced officially that the Axis front in North Africa has been completely shattered and Russia declared that Adolf Hitler's invasion armies were fleeing in chaos.

A Soviet broadcast reported bitter hatred flaring among the Axis forces, asserting that Russian cavalry in the Donets basin had captured retreating German, Italian and Rumanian troops when they fell to fighting one another.

**Rumanians Back Italians**—The broadcast said Rumanian soldiers joined with the Italians against the Germans.

"Exactly one month to the day after Britain's desert armies struck back into Libya in the second North African offensive, British Middle East headquarters announced:

"Axis forces in eastern Cirenaica (Libya) are now in full retreat... the enemy front has everywhere been broken... yesterday our troops relentlessly pursued the enemy for a distance of nearly 30 miles."

**Beginning Of The End**—Thus, in staccato sentences, the British command foretold the apparent beginning of the end of the African campaign, while on the Russian front, the story of Axis disaster was even greater.

Premier Joseph Stalin was quoted as describing the ill-clad, fleeing Germans as "resembling the forces of Napoleon" in the bloody retreat from Moscow in 1812.

Havas (French news agency) dispatches said the German withdrawal in the Ukraine had brought the great industrial city of Khar'kov, the Russian Pittsburgh, into the hands of the more, and on the central front, Russian cavalrymen were reported to have chased German troops to within 10 miles of Orel, 200 miles south of Moscow.

## Langer Facing Senate Ouster

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Chairman Hatch (D-NM) announced today the Senate elections committee voted 13 to 3 in favor of a resolution recommending that Senator Langer (R-ND) be denied a seat in the Senate.

The action climaxed a year's consideration of charges involving moral turpitude which grew out of Langer's actions as an attorney and former governor of North Dakota.

**Has Been Serving**—Langer has been serving in his post since last January. The final outcome of the proceedings. The Senate membership must finally decide whether he shall be unseated.

Hatch said the committee's report would be made to the Senate as soon as possible but declared it was his understanding the case would not be taken up by the Senate until after the holiday season.

Senators Lucas (D-Ill), chairman of the subcommittee which handled preliminary investigations, and Senator Austin (R-Vt) were appointed by Hatch to prepare the report for the committee and to take charge of the matter in the Senate.

## U. S., Filipino Forces Smash Luzon Threat

Nipponese Lose 12 Raiders; Suffer Bloody Setback

(By The Associated Press) Filipino jungle fighters were officially credited with a slashing victory over Japanese troops in the 12-day-old battle of Luzon island today as U. S. fighting forces in the mid-Pacific set out under fresh commanders to avenge Japan's treacherous attack on Pearl Harbor.

Army, fleet and air chiefs in Hawaii were changed. In Tokyo, the Japanese naval command admitted that five "special type" Japanese submarines, apparently 41-foot, two-man midgets, failed to return from the Dec. 7 attack on the U. S. naval base at Honolulu.

The Japanese claimed, however, that aerial observation showed five U. S. battleships, two heavy cruisers and an oil tanker had been sunk in the assault on Hawaii, and that 450 American planes had been destroyed on the ground and 14 others shot down in air duels. These claims appeared fanciful in the light of official U. S. reports.

**Claim Subs Sunk**—Three "enemy" submarines were listed by Tokyo as having been sunk in the Pacific. The Japanese also acknowledged the loss of 29 planes in the Hawaiian attack and said that a U. S. aircraft carrier previously re-

**Eight Men Aboard Overdue Plane**

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The War department announced today an army plane carrying Major General Herbert A. Dargue, commander of the 1st Air Force, had been missing since December 12 on a transcontinental flight.

There were seven other passengers in the plane, five of them officers and two enlisted men.

**Believed To Have Crashed**—Secretary of War Stimson said the ship was last reported near Palmdale, Calif., and it was believed that it had crashed or been forced down in that vicinity.

(By The United Press) MARSHALL, Ill., Dec. 18.—The bodies of 10 NYA enrollees were recovered early today from the flaming wreckage of a bus which overturned near West Union, 10 miles south of here.

### No Volunteers Will Be Taken

**Army Will Depend Entirely On Draft**

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Secretary Stimson announced today the War department was planning to expand the Army to the greatest strength needed and would depend for the increase entirely on the selective service system.

All voluntary enlistments are to be halted as soon as "the present rush subsidies," Stimson told a press conference.

**Increase Is Proposed**—An immediate increase of more than 150,000 men already has been recommended in a bill which Stimson said was on President Roosevelt's desk.

The war secretary apparently referred to the \$10,077,000,000 military appropriations bill signed today by President Roosevelt. It provided for a net increase of 277,026 in the Army's enlisted strength, bringing to 1,840,934 the total for whom appropriations were made. It also included funds for 27,995 additional commissioned officers, and 5,765 more warrant officers.

**To Take Examinations**—Stimson also announced: All reserve officers not yet called to active duty have been ordered to take physical examinations, but he said this step did not mean they necessarily would be called immediately.

After Jan. 1 all graduates of officer candidates' schools will be ordered to duty immediately. Previously those so desiring have been awarded certificates of capacity and permitted to return to their former enlisted ranks.

**Orders For Defense**—Commanders of the four air force interceptor commands in the United States have been charged with ordering blackouts, air raid alarms, all clear signals and silencing radio signals.

Stimson said the purposes were to prevent false alarms and unnecessary interference with production. Both difficulties, he said, had been in evidence in California

## War-Crushed France Faces Sad Yuletide

Food, Drinks And Gifts--There Are None Under Nazis

(By The United Press) VICHY, Dec. 18.—France is facing its poorest and saddest Christmas since the German siege of Paris in 1870.

Within a week of the Yuletide there is no Christmas spirit and no season shopping. There are no plum puddings, no turkeys, no metal toys, no foie gras, no chocolates, candied chestnuts, not even Christmas trees.

**Champagne Unavailable**—To a Frenchman Christmas is not Christmas without champagne—and champagne has disappeared from the market.

Germany took 14,000,000 bottles of champagne last year and ordered another 20,000,000 bottles this year. That pumped the great Rhine caves dry. The few bottles left are being hawked by bootleggers at prices which would have staggered even a New York speakeasy owner during prohibition.

Other wines, especially those high in alcoholic content, long ago were distilled to make fuel for German tanks. Not even the corks are left. They have gone into floats which the German army uses for river crossings.

**Even Dolls Affected**—Beer now is made without hops and barley—it looks like beer, but isn't.

In the shops of France, there is nothing with the Christmas touch to entice French spending—even if the French had francs to spend.

Each Frenchman is allowed 40 points a year for purchasing clothing. A gift scarf takes nine points. A pair of socks—uses up five.

Stores throughout France show only wooden toys. Even baby dolls have wooden heads because all the doll heads formerly used in making French dolls came from Czechoslovakia, and the war has killed the traffic.

**German Diplomats To Get Hotel Quarters**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—The State department said that German diplomats would be lodged in a "comfortable hotel," until arrangements can be made to exchange them for American diplomats in Germany. Members of the Hungarian legation are to be placed in another hotel in the same undisclosed locality. Members of the Japanese consulates are to be "assembled at a hotel in a locality to be determined," and members of the Japanese embassy were requested to confine themselves to the embassy's premises. The department's announcement also dealt with newspaper correspondents from enemy countries who were caught here by the war. The German correspondents in custody pending investigation are to be lodged with the German diplomats, and Japanese newspapermen in custody pending investigation already are being placed in a hotel.

# War May Be Won Or Lost On Air Strength, Is Warning

BY DEWITT MACKENZIE  
Wide World War Analyst

The Japs continue to trail in their race to beat the Allies in their reinforcements can arrive to take a hand in the battle of the Pacific, nothing of a decisive nature having yet occurred in any of the several strategic zones where the Nipponese are attacking—and that is good news at this stage.

However, a little item from the distant Russian front today reminds us forcibly that Hitler undoubtedly is preparing to strike again in some other direction, and that his fresh blow will be calculated to divert as many Allied resources from the Far East as possible. An Associated Press correspondent after a three-day tour of the Moscow front reports that there have been no signs of the Nazi air force. That is ominous.

**Air Superiority Vital**  
Any Hitlerian offensive which will put an added strain on Allied air and naval forces will be fine for the Japs. This is especially true of the aerial arm, because the Oriental battle at the moment is turning on control of the air.

So important is the question of air control that a newspaper editor has asked this column to comment on it, on the basis that "it does seem that the first phase of the war will be determined in the air."

Rear Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, former commander of the Asiatic fleet, goes even further and declares the United States will win the war of the Pacific through air control.

Certainly air power is a vital factor in the battles now raging about the Philippines, Singapore, Hongkong and lesser air bases. Air reinforcements or lack of them—especially fighter planes to fend off attacking bombers—may spell the difference between victory and defeat.

**Might Cause Holocaust**  
Probably the question most of concern in the public mind relates to our chances of bombing Japanese

cities. Remember Pearl Harbor? Interest undoubtedly has been stimulated by the knowledge that the dropping of incendiaries on the flimsy built towns of the island empire would be likely to produce a holocaust.

I should say that right now our chief striking power must come from aircraft carriers. We have no bases near enough to the Japanese mainland to enable us to do much practical bombing, employing the long distance bombers commonly in use by America and Britain. These ships can fly some 3,000 miles without heavy load, but obviously their serviceable bombing radius is considerably less than half that distance because allowance must be made for adverse winds, maneuvering and the return trip home.

**Allies Again Blast Nazis**  
Of course, you will remind me that the newspapers long have been discussing bombers which are said to do much more than 3,000 miles. Also it's true that emergencies like the present frequently produce quick improvements. However, for the purpose of this article we will stick to the bombers now in general use. If we have anything else in mind for the Japs they will hear of it soon enough—and they may have cause for the concern they have been showing about possible air raids.

So much for that. While you and I have been bombing Tokyo mentally, news bulletins have come over my printer machine to report further Allied successes in the western theater of war. The British claim that the Axis forces in eastern Libya are in full retreat, and the Russians are said to be continuing to smash back disorganized German troops in the Moscow sector.

Both these operations mean a tremendous strengthening of the general Allied position in the European war.

## Four Men Enlisted For Marine Corps

Marine corps recruiting officers, in Lubbock from district offices in Oklahoma City, reported four enlistments here Wednesday.

The office in room 19 at the Lubbock postoffice was established by Dr. W. E. Meneray and Sgt. F. E. Healy of the district office. Sgt. Rowlett has been placed in charge. In addition Sgt. Marvin G. Myers and Staff Sgt. John L. Simpson are here and will go to Tinkka Friday and Saturday to recruit men.

Men between 17 and 30 years old and 64 to 74 inches tall, single, white and in fair physical condition are eligible for enlistment, Sgt. Rowlett said. Men under 21 must have parental consent but no high school or birth certificate is necessary.

Minor physical defects will be corrected by the corps after a man is enlisted. Men are sent to Oklahoma City with all expenses paid for final examination and then are transferred to San Diego. Men registered for selective service are eligible until they are ordered to report for Army induction.

# Russian, British Triumphs Over Germany Great Boosts To Allies

## Nazi Setbacks Hurt Nippon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The mightiest blow yet struck for victory in the Pacific, many military men here believe, has been driven home—not in the far-flung battle zones of the Far East but on the blood-stained snows of Russia.

The surprising Nazi reverses at the hands of the resurgent Red armies, they asserted, were unquestionably a severe setback to Tokyo, despite the initial Japanese successes at Pearl Harbor.

This upset of the Axis timetable, some officials believe, may well explain the fanatical intensity of the Japanese drive to knock out Hongkong and Singapore.

**Victory For Allies**

Unless the Japanese can take these British strongholds quickly, it was said, they must face the dread possibility of fighting the British and Russians simultaneously on the Asiatic mainland, as well as the United States in the Pacific islands. And a Russia more or less victorious in Europe, could concentrate formidable strength at Japan's Siberian backdoor.

In terms of long-range results, the Nazi reverses represent a victory no less for the defenders of Hawaii, the Philippines, Singapore and Hongkong than for the Russians themselves because, as these experts view the war, every plane, gun and man lost by the Germans in Russia is a loss in potential reserve strength for Japan.

**All Part Of Same War**

The extent of Russian successes remains to be measured in its entirety by the magnitude of the German retreat. The same is true of the British drive against German and Italian forces in Africa.

But the point which the military strategists make is that the great battles of Europe, Africa and Asia are all part of the same war, and whenever the Axis suffers a setback in one area it is weakened all along the line.

This understanding of the broad strategy of the conflict, was said to be behind the administration plans for continuing full lend-lease assistance to the nations fighting the Axis, regardless where the battle fronts may be.

In the broad strategic picture, the task of the United States is threefold.

**Must Hold Philippines**

The Philippines must be held and used for offensive air action against the enemy, insofar as possible.

The U. S. Pacific and Asiatic fleets must destroy as much of Japan's Navy as can be brought to battle, and

America's great industrial plants must produce a veritable torrent of munitions—sufficient to supply not only U. S. forces, but also the British, the Russians and all others who are fighting the Axis.

One need for continuing to pour planes and guns into both the British Isles and North Africa was said to arise from the fact that none can tell to what new adventure Hitler may turn, assuming he finally is able to establish a strong defense line in Russia.

Three major possibilities were mentioned:

1—A major drive through Turkey into the Near East in an attempt to cut Allied supply lines through Iran and Iraq and to knock out British armies in North Africa.

2—A military-political cam-

## Dawson Wildcat Is To Be Abandoned

One wildcat test in southwestern Dawson county has been plugged and abandoned while another in northern Hockley county appears to be a failure, according to reports here Wednesday.

The Dawson duster, Placid Oil company, Shreveport, No. 1 Higginbotham, quit at total depth of 4,983 feet in lime. A core from 4,985-83 feet was fully recovered. The top six feet were sand and the bottom 12 feet lime carrying sulphur water. No oil shows were logged by the test.

## Secretary Of Navy Is Given Broad Powers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Broad powers were granted the secretary of the Navy, under legislation approved by the president today, to block employment of any person he disapproved as a radio operator on any vessel of United States registry.

The bill would make it unlawful, during the emergency, for any person to be employed as a ship's radio operator if the secretary disapproved such employment for any specified voyage, route, or area of operation.

## Derelict Vessel Of Dynamite Reported

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Mariners were warned by the Navy's hydrographic office to be on the lookout for a derelict barge loaded with dynamite somewhere in the Pacific ocean south of Honolulu.

The office reported that the derelict was observed on Dec. 8—the day after the Japanese attack on Honolulu—about 500 miles southwest of Honolulu.

Whether there was any connection between the previous day's battle and the fact that the load of dynamite was floating around loose was a question which went unanswered by the Navy department.

### Oregon State To Seek Intersectional Boost

Pacific Coast Team Has "So-So" Record In Intersectional Football Competition

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 18.—Oregon State, which entrains tomorrow for North Carolina to play Duke on New Year's Day in the transplanted Rose-bowl game, has behind it a tradition for being only so-so in intersectional football.

The Durham duel with Duke will be the 20th intersectional engagement since OSC went in for football. Of the previous 19—none has been in the Rose bowl—had side-stepped a trio of games with the University of Nebraska, his alma mater, in 1933-35-36. The Huskers whipped OSC 22-0, 26-20 and 32-14. Long before Stiner—ever thought of coaching at Oregon State, Nebraska took a couple of falls out of the Beavers, 17-7 in 1917 and 14-0 in 1924.

Disregarding Nebraska, the western Rose bowlers look pretty good intersectionally. Certainly the school has a record for upsetting eastern favorites. OSC sky-rocketed Pacific coast grid stock in 1933 by winning a stunning decision, 9-6, over a powerful Fordham team that was being nominated for national honors. That game came after OSC had held the long-unbeaten Southern California Trojans to a scoreless tie using only 11 men. The team was hailed as the giant-killer of the year but a week after the Fordham game it stopped off at Lincoln to play Nebraska. That ended the glory.

Unbeaten Duke's January 1 rival began playing intersectionally in 1915. The Oregon Aggies (the name was changed to Oregon State in the late 1920s) of that vintage knocked over the Michigan Aggies 20-0 at Lansing. Later in the same year Syracuse came to Portland and won 28-0.

# "It Can Happen Here!" Civilian Air Raid Precautions Are Issued

## U. S. Is Urged To Be Ready

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Here's part of the answer to the popular query: "What can I do to help defend my country?" This is the second of three daily stories by John Lear, of Wide World.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18—What can you do to defend yourself and your country from enemy attack? Join the civilian protection army and get ready for bombs.

No matter where you live, no matter how safe you may seem to be, the government urges you to look around your home and decide which is the strongest room, the one with the least windows. Prepare it as a refuge for the time when the sirens cry.

**Precautions Outlined**  
Put a table in it, a table with strong legs. You can crawl under when the time comes and it will save you from splinters, flying glass, falling walls.

If you have a spare mattress, put it under the table. It will make you comfortable and absorb shock.

If you can't do that, make up your mind which mattress you will use and have it as handy and as easy to move as possible.

Take magazines and cards and other means of entertainment to this refuge room. Don't forget the radio.

Measure the windows and prepare black paper to fit them. Find Out Air Raid Signal.

Learn the gadgets which turn out the pilot lights on gas stoves,

water heaters, and refrigerators. What is the air raid warning? Usually it is short blasts, of rising and falling pitch, similar to wailing on whistles and horns. But it varies, depending on what your neighborhood has to wait with.

Don't guess about this signal. Find out for sure.

If your neighborhood doesn't have a warden and isn't organized against raids, you can ask the mayor or the members of town council for an organization.

**Be Calm Is Warning**  
When the air raid warden is named, it is his job to visit your home and designate a member of your family as air raid warden for your home.

Confirm with him the air raid warning signal, and the "all clear" signal.

Volunteer to help him if you wish.

Carry out his suggestions for storing emergency water, sand, or other fire fighting material.

Before he leaves, place him well in your mind. Remember what he looks like. Get his name and address.

Don't guess about any precautionary measures. Know!

Don't keep too many lights on, so that in an air raid warning sounds there will only be a few switches to throw to darken the house.

Don't worry about air raid shelters. England has found them not worth the trouble in most cases. Army officers say, "Your own refuge room is best, and your own common sense in preparing it."

Subject to the advice to the air warden—be calm. The enemy strategy is to cause panic, break

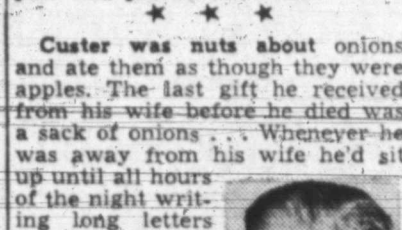

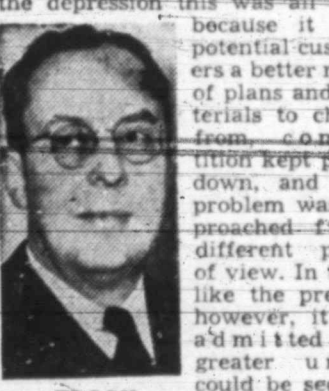

CUSTER always believed in fighting an enemy when he sawed without stopping to consider the cost. When he was a kid, he once attended a dance and noticed one of his enemies poking fun at him outside by making faces and gestures through the window and pushed his fist right through the pane into the guy's snout. Custer was a showman who knew how to do things in a manner that hit people between the eyes. He was the Civil War, the Army paraded in review before the President and other dignitaries in front of the White House. Just as he approached the reviewing stand, the cadets at West Point, nicknamed Custer "Fanny" because of his blue eyes, blond hair and pink cheeks...

THE cadets at West Point, nicknamed Custer "Fanny" because of his blue eyes, blond hair and pink cheeks. In the Army, where he was the youngest general in his history, he became known as the "Boy General with the golden locks." Because Elizabeth Bacon, the girl he loved and married, ran away from him (when she met him, the street slightly intoxicated) Custer swore off smoking and drinking and never touched either again. Frontiersmen like Buffalo Bill wore long hair as a challenge to the Indians who were collecting scalps. Custer wore his hair long merely because it was the tradition of cavalrymen.

IT took a month to make Custer's last stand for the film, "They Died with Their Boots On." The movie couldn't have lasted more than half to three-quarters of an hour, Custer's men were so hopelessly outnumbered. Although Sitting Bull is usually credited with having been in charge of the massacre, actually he was as far away from the battle as his horse could get him. As soon as he heard of Custer's defeat, Sitting Bull returned, claiming that he had been in the hills using his power with the Indian gods to bring about victory. The Indians didn't know until after the battle that it was Custer they had been fighting. In making "They Died with Their Boots On," the last stand alone cost \$140,000 to film.

One of the greatest military wizards of all time, Custer was almost expelled from West Point for having the worst record of any student there. Any cadet who gets 100 demerits over a period of six months is automatically tossed out of the military academy. During his first half year at West Point Custer piled up 129 demerits. (He was saved by a sympathetic instructor who reduced them to 100.) In his studies he was at the bottom of his class, and probably the only reason he was graduated was that the Civil War started and the Union army needed officers. (Even so, no one is sure that Custer ever actually

co-ordinator of inter-American affairs, prepares the material for South America. The Office of Facts and Figures will, eventually, advise all the other defense information services on the material they issue for home consumption. Training of defense workers was split up between OPM's labor division, a training within industry program, the WPA, the Office of Education, the National Youth Administration and the CCC camps. The youth relief programs are now about to be consolidated or otherwise liquidated.

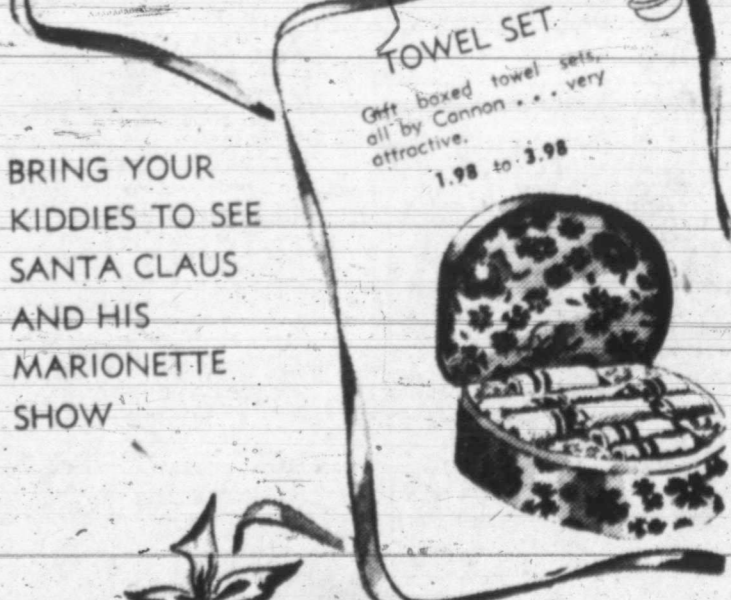
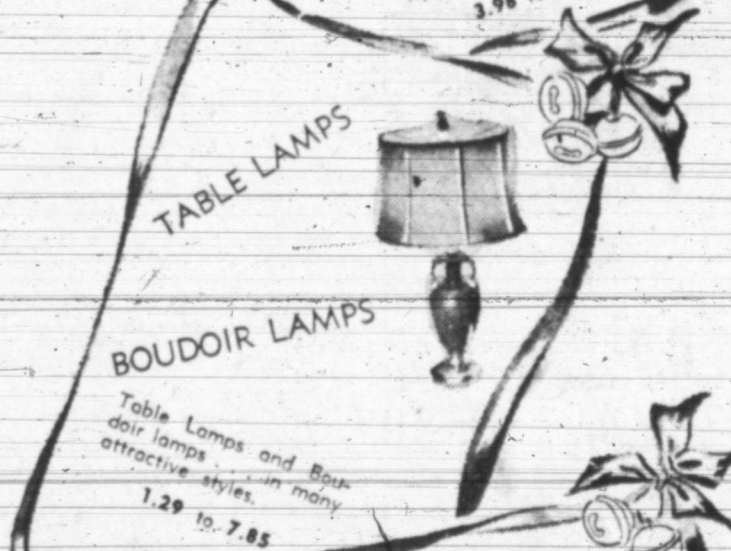
