Tuesday, L.F. 'Les' Bruns came by The Journal to bring a copy of the Sunday edition of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal in for re-production. The story contains the latest information available on the charges filed against Bruns for alleged "Cruelty To Animals," filed last fall

Bruns confirmed to The Journal that most of the information contained in the story is accurate, and reiterated his plans to file a law suit.

The story from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal states:

"Although the Lubbock Humane Society has been able to secure funds to continue operating at least through March, the organization's financial problems continue to grow.

"Much of the organization's financial problems have been attributed to a cruelty to animals suit brought last year against L.F. "Les" Bruns of Muleshoe.

"But now, Bruns is threatening to return the favor and sue the Humane Society. He alleges that the society failed to properly feed and care for 28 of his horses and caused the death of another horse while the animals were impounded.

Bruns was arrested July 27. 1984, after Humane Society

employee Gail Gallagher signed a criminal complaint. An investigation had revealed two dead horses found near the pen where Bruns kept the horses.

"A civil complaint accusing Bruns of being an unfit owner and requesting that the horse be sold was signed by a Bailey County Sheriff's deputy. Both cases were filed by Bailey County Attorney Linda Elder.

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"Justice of the Peace Jack Bates ordered the horses impounded and placed in the custody of Bailey County. The county requested that the Lub-bock Humane Society care for the horses.

'Bates found Bruns guilty of the criminal charge, but the case was appealed to County Court. Following a change of venue, Bruns was found guilty by the Randall County Court and ordered to pay a \$300 fine. That case is still on appeal.

'Bruns also lost the civil suit and appealed to County Court. The case was moved to Ector County on a change of venue. The court dismissed the charge against Bruns. Bailey County appealed the dismissal to the Court of Appeals for the 11th Supreme Judical District in Eastland.

"The appeals court dismissed the case Feb. 14 after Mrs.

Elder failed to file transcripts with the court within 60 days of the original dismissal by the Ector County Court. Mrs. Elder also failed to file a motion for an extension to file the transcripts within 15 days after the 60-day period.

"While the two cases were going through the lengthy appeals process, the Lubbock Humane Society provided feed and veterinary care for the horses. The society has not paid any legal fees for the two cases but has spent almost \$6,000 for veterinary care.

"The society still must pay the feed bill and the rent for the pastures where the horses have been kept.

"Now Bruns wants some compensation. He claimed his horses were not properly fed and that proper veterinary care was not administered. He says the result of the neglect is that the value of each horse has dropped from about \$2,500 when impounded to \$500. Bruns said it will take about two years to bring the horses back to good health and that the animals will never regain their full value.

"The rancher also wants to be compensated for the value of a horse which died a few days after the animals were impounded. Bruns claimed he lost money because of the loss of crop of foals while the horses were impounded.

"Gary Ward, Bruns' attorney, said the horses should have been given supplements and treated for worms. He claimed the animals were put out to

New Feline Vaccine Is Available Here

"Thanks to an innovative new vaccine, cat owners can now protect their pets from feline leukemia, one of the deadliest diseases affecting cats," says Dr. Barry Cowart of the Muleshoe Animal Clinic. "The world's first commercial feline leukemia virus vaccine has been introduced to veterinarians in the United States and Canada by Norden Laboratories, and it is presently available in Mule-

shoe at the Animal Clinic." Feline leukemia is generally considered to be the most significant life-threatening infectious disease of cats. This is because feline leukemia virus suppresses the immune system of infected cats These cats have limited ability to resist other infections, and as a result they are susceptible to a wide variety of diseases. Cats that survive these associated disease often go on to develop malignancies, or tumors. In either case, death is often the end result. Until now, there has been no means to control feline leukemia infection, said Dr. Cowart.

Of 50 million cats in the United States, an estimated 1.5 million cats (three percent) are thought to be permanently

infected with feline leukemia virus. Incidence of permanent infection is highest in households with more than one cat. This fact is significant because an estimated 70 percent of cats in the United States live in Multi-cat households.

The new feline leukemia vaccine, tradenamed 'Leukocell', demonstrated its ability to protect cats in extensive tests prior to government licensing. 'Leukocell' reliably protected cats from feline leukemia virus infection, added the local veterinarian. It also protected them from feline leukemia-associated diseases and lymphoid tumor development. Test cats were observed for more than two years to determine long-term effectiveness of the vaccine, and immunity was maintained

during that period. 'Leukocell' was developed from a prototype vaccine created by Dr. Richard Olsen at Ohio State University, and is the culmination of a 10-year research effort at OSU and Norden. The major obstacle was suppression of the immune system caused by the feline leukemia virus. However, because of a unique, patented production process, 'Leukocell' offers protection without immunosuppression.

This safety feature was demonstrated in tests conducted at Norden. Vaccination with 'Leukocell' did not cause disease in uninfected cats, nor did it change the course of disease in cats already infected with feline leudemia virus.

Safety of 'Leukocell' was confirmed in extensive field tests of the vaccine by veterinarians. Occasional postvaccination reactions, ranging from stinging on injection to hypersensitivity, were reported by some veterinarians.

Dr. Cowart said initial vaccination with 'Leukocell' consists of two doses given two to three weeks apart, beginning as early as nine weeks of age. A third, booster dose, is given two to four months later. Annual revaccination is required to sustain immunity.

In accordance with Norden's long-standing policy, 'Leukocell' will be sold exclusively to veterinarians. The vaccine is being distributed now to veterinarians in the United States and Canada.



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


