Old-Time Meeting At Jim Ned July 17

The first annual Jim Ned camp meeting will be held at the little Jim Ned community, 22 miles southeast of Abilene, beginning Sunday, July 17.

Calvin Rogers, descendant of pioneer parents who moved to "this wilderness" more than half a century ago, is in charge of arrangements. The authentic camp meeting, instead of being the center of ringed prairie schooners, will cater to trailer houses and pitched tents. A layman-sponsored institution, it will be interdenominational. Several preachers of different evangelical denominations will participate in the activities. Emphasis will be given to reaching the unsaved and to reviving the drooping Christian. Doctrinal sermons will be taboo.

The camp meeting will be held on the site of old-time brush-arbor meeting in the 1870's - 1890's. A large circular saw brought to the area in the 1870's by pioneers will sound to summon worshippers from camps to the steel-frame tabernacle twice daily.

Free water, camping sites and other conveniences such as electric light, will be available. One or two noted evangelists will bring the message twice daily, and other ministers will conduct old-fashioned "grove" prayer meetings immediately preceding the sermons.

"We want to make this a typical camp meeting," Rogers said. "Bring your trailer house or tent, spend a week or longer camping and attending and giving of your prayers and efforts to a great soul-saving campaign."

It is hoped to make the camp meeting an annual affair. It might grow to the proportions of the nationally known Bloys camp meeting held annually in the Texas Davis Mountains, Rogers said.

Coleman Rodeo July 13-14-15-16

Coleman's 23rd annual RCA professional Rodeo, a feature attraction on the Great South-west rodeo circuit, will be held in Coleman Wednesday through Saturday, July 13-16, with night performances only, beginning at 8 p. m. Afternoon parades will be held each day at 5 p. m. with a dance at the National Guard Armory following each rodeo performance, featuring the music of Don Allen and his Sunset Ramblers of Lubbock.

Rodeo producer Bueter and Son of Elk City, Okla., will furnish the livestock. In addition to the bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling and bull riding, stellar feature attractions are included on the program. J. W. Stoker will present a trick roping and trick riding act, and Junior Meeks will thrill the crowd with his bull fighting. An unusual highlight will be a chariot race, featuring the white horses used in the Ben Hur film. These horses come from Rome, Italy. Rodeo officials state that the chariot race will be one of the most spectacular events ever staged here.

Also, there will be a special matched calf roping each night, between Rex Beck and George Epperson, two of the nation's top ropers. Another feature will be the cowgirl's barrel race.

Miss Becky Hemphill, queen of the rodeo and "Miss Rodeo of Texas" will appear in the arena each night. Miss Hemphill will represent Texas in the Las Vegas finals to select "Miss Rodeo of America."

Robert Lee Elliott, 84, a retired Texas and Pacific Railroad employee, died at 1 p. m. Tuesday in a Big Spring hospital, apparently the victim of a heart attack. He had entered the hospital June 25.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 10:30 a. m. at the Presbyterian Church here. Rev. Frank Waggoner, pastor, officiated, with burial in the Ross Cemetery, Wylie Funeral Home was in charge.

He was born in Memphis, Tenn. Oct. 12, 1875, and lived in Albany until coming to Baird in 1900, about four years after his marriage to Miss Ella Kay Fite of Albany. She died in 1956.

Mr. Elliott was a member of the Odd Fellows Lodge, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, and was an elder in the Baird Presbyterian Church.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. James Asbury of Baird, Mrs. Charlie Powell of San Angelo; two sons, R. L. Elliott Jr., of Dalhart, and Horace Elliott of Baird; six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

New Cattle Law In Effect July 1

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texas cattle owners today that a new law went into effect July 1 aimed at controlling livestock on designated US and state highways.

The new law makes it illegal for a person knowingly to permit his domestic livestock to roam at large and unattended on state and federal highways. It applies regardless of whether or not the highway right-of-way is fenced. Maximum fine for such violation is \$200, and each day the violation occurs may be considered a separate offense.

Farm to market roads are excepted from the law. The new law also gives law enforcement officers the authority to have such livestock picked up, when unable to locate the owner, and turned over to the sheriff or constable in the county.

The law does not prohibit the driving or herding of livestock across or along highways. It gives peace officers the authority to enforce provisions of the act without a warrant.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said state patrolmen will enforce provisions of the law in an effort to reduce the traffic hazard caused by animals on designated state and US highways. He said that during the year 1959 a total of 1406 rural traffic accidents occurred in Texas involving animals of all types.

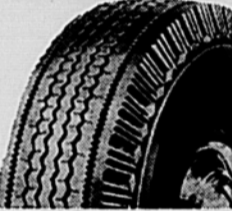

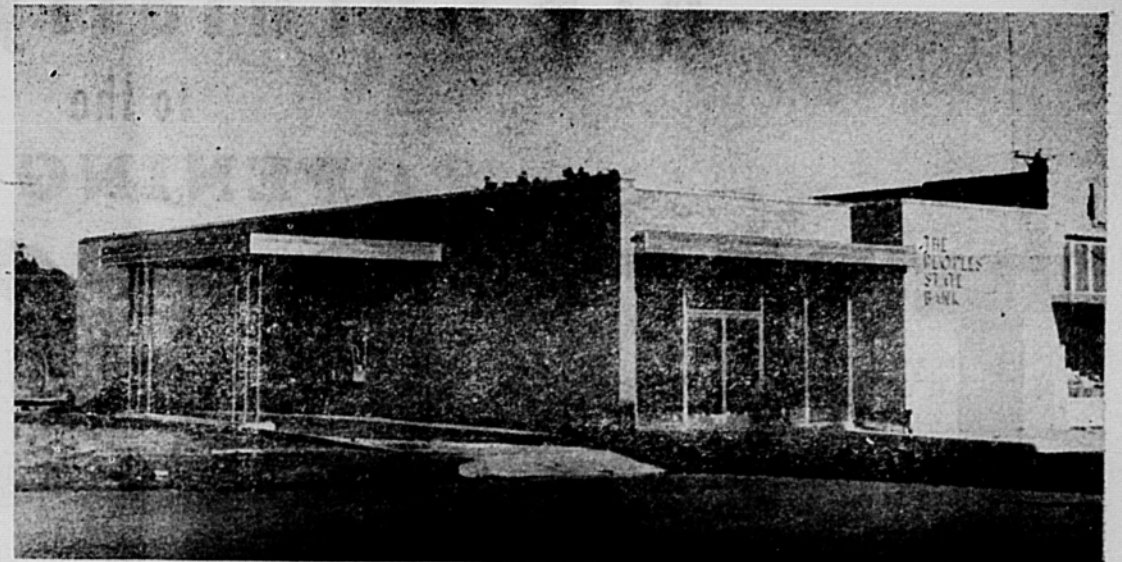

Opening of The Peoples State Bank of Clyde Saturday, July 9th marks the realization of many months of planning by citizens of Clyde and the Clyde trade territory who saw the great need for a home owned bank. Friends from throughout the Clyde area and neighboring towns are expected to join Clyde Saturday to visit and welcome the new bank.

A group of business men went to Austin and made application with the banking commissioner, Mr. J. M. Faulkner on Nov.

25, 1959, for permission to build The Peoples State Bank of Clyde. The state charter was granted March 3, 1960. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held Wednesday morning, April 13, 1960. Construction was begun immediately and was to be completed within 75 days. Mr. Oscar Rose of the Rose Construction was the builder. Other contractors participating in the work were, Webb Plumbing Company; Roy Willis Electric Co.; Abilene Sheet Metal Co.; Architects were Bridges and

Campbell all of Abilene.

The building completed at a cost of \$38,000.00 is of buff colored brick, has 2664 square feet of floor space. Located on a 50 by 150 foot lot at North 2nd and Main streets next to P. C. Steen Hardware Store.

The furniture, fixtures and equipment was installed at a cost of approximately \$20,000.00 Insurance by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation has been granted with the opening of the bank. Mahogany paneling is used

throughout the building, terrazzo floors, the latest modern equipment, year round air-conditioning, tellers cages are also of the mahogany paneling, walls in lobby are of silver toned ivory with matching drapes of case-ment cloth. Paintings by Betty Loper. Lobby furniture in color scheme of turquoise, coral and browns, same colors are used in the president's office and directors room.

Night depository, modern lighting fixtures, and parking area at the rear of the building.

Clyde Businesses Show Steady Growth

On November 25, 1959, application was filed with the Banking Commissioner J. M. Faulkner in Austin for a bank in Clyde, to be known as The Peoples State Bank. The application was granted March 3, 1960.

With the approval for a bank for this small town of 1109 (new census), other public spirited business men and women showed their faith and confidence in the future development of Clyde. During the past three years, many new homes have been built, and in the new additions, houses are under construction, two, three and four-bedroom homes, many of them construction of brick and brick-trim.

Since the first of this year, several new businesses have been established, including Work's Dry Goods, featuring general dry goods, ladies ready-to-wear and men's work clothes. Owner is Bill Work of Baird.

The Keeton's Men Shop was opened here in April of this year by R. L. Keeton of Strawn. He also operates a Men's store in Strawn.

Betty's Tot-To-Mom Shop was opened here the first of this year by Mrs. Jerry Callaway.

Homer E. Swofford, owner of Clyde Insurance Agency, is having his building remodeled to add a suite of offices, to be occupied by his son, Gaston Swofford. Gaston received his degree from the University of Texas law school June 7, this year, and completed his State Bar examinations this week. His wife is the former Mary Elaine Scott of Wylie. They have two children, Diane 6, and Charles Robert, 3. They will live in their new home in Oakview Addition.

The upward trend of business in Clyde during the first six-month period of 1960, is expressed by T. H. Odom, manager of the Clyde Telephone Exchange. He reports an increase of 12% since January 1, and also an increase in business each year since he purchased the exchange in 1951. At that time, there were 118 telephones, and at present 700. The exchange employs a staff of five operators.

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Rudder are owner and operators of the City Cafe since April of this year.

Postal receipts show an increase of 8% the first 6 months of 1960 over the same period of 1959, according to Post Master Dan South. South also said the Clyde Post Office is now serving 3,300 people. Six years ago, the number of patrons did not exceed 2000.

Clyde School Superintendent L. F. Newton stated the new football stadium is completed; has a total seating capacity of 1,300 people and plenty of parking space. Newton also reported the cafeteria under construction will be completed for the Fall term. The building is separate

from the grade school building. It will be modern in every respect, and air-conditioned throughout. Mr. Newton said the cafeteria will be adequate to accommodate the present enrollment and any increase up to 800.

The School Band under direction of Mrs. Benton Pruet, has 67 members in the summer class now in progress.

Clyde school system employs 26 teachers. Four new teachers have been selected for the Fall term: Mrs. Lloyd Huff, Mrs. James Berry, Wayne Berryman, all of Clyde, and Mrs. Eddie Harris of Ranger. These replace the four who resigned.

Rev. Harold Watson, pastor of Clyde Baptist Church, stated the new educational building is completed, and dedication services will be held Sept. 18. The building was erected at a cost of \$50,000.00, veneered with field stone.

Three Atlas Missile Bases are located in the Clyde area, bringing additional workmen and their families into the area.

Clyde maintains an efficient Volunteer Fire Department with C. C. Poe as Fire Chief.

Under direction of the Clyde City Council, a new City Hall building was completed early this year. Mrs. Ollie Burrow is City Secretary.

Clyde has several civic and cultural clubs, including The Clyde Study Club, The Thursday Club, The Big Heart Garden Club, all members of the General Federation of Womens Clubs. Clyde also has an active Lions Club, and all clubs are active in civic work for the town and community.

County Agent's Column . . .

There have been several grass fires recently. The Owens ranch lost about 300 acres of grass to fire last week. John D. Isenhower of Putnam also lost about 300 acres of grass. Every one should do his best to prevent a fire getting started. Watch those matches and cigarettes, they can be costly when handled carelessly. It's a good idea to have some kind of fire fighting equipment handy when you burn trash, even a bucket and a burlap sack is enough when a fire is small. Do not leave a trash fire unattended.

Claim forms for refund of Federal tax on gasoline used on a farm are available at the County Agent's office and at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains, Farm Bureau office in Baird and at the County Judge's office. You can file a claim after July 1, and before September 20. There was a change in the tax rate on October 1, 1959, so be sure to use the correct rate when computing your refund.

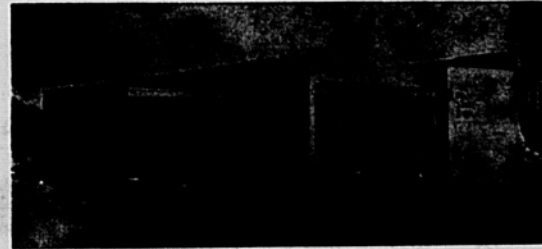

Safety Rules For Water Skiers

Six million Americans going splash - splash - and often flip - flop - in the water.

That's the picture as a nation of water skiers nonchalantly skims over miles and miles of waterways - or tries to, at least.

Little information is available on what happens when a water skier is unsuccessful in his attempts to remain upright, since reporting of mishaps on water - America's new - found playground is far from complete.

While the facts on water skiing accidents may not be handy you can find plenty of information on the art of skiing in summer.

From the National Safety Council, for example, come these tips for skiing fun:

1. Don't ski if you can't swim.
 2. Don't ski at night, in rough water or in shallow or unknown waters.
 3. Don't ski near swimmers, docks or other obstructions.
 4. Don't ski with an inexperienced boat operator. Make sure an extra person is in the boat to keep an eye on the skier.
 5. Never wrap a tow rope around your body. If you start to fall, throw the tow line clear of yourself.
 6. Always approach the shore at an angle - never straight in.
- If you fall the experts advise:
1. Stay with your skies - they'll help keep you afloat.
 2. Raise your hand to signal the boat operator of your plight.

3. In congested waters, raise a ski so other boats will see you. The experts also say that consideration for others and safety consciousness go a long way toward preventing water accidents.

"We're not trying to be wet blankets about water skiing," said Ralph Kuhl, the National Safety Council's director of Public Safety. "We want you to have fun. We just want you to stay alive and healthy to enjoy it."
