Coach Quisenberry becomes winningest football coach in Devine Warhorse football history

When Coach Chad Quisenberry came to Devine 18 years ago he was hired as an assistant coach under his own old high school coach and mentor, Dean Bates, who had just accepted the head coaching position in Devine. Quisenberry had played for Bates at Floydada High School many years earlier. Coach Quisenberry was promoted to Head Coach in 2004, and the Warhorses haven't skipped a beat; they have made the playoffs in all eight seasons since. With the win against Carrizo Springs last Friday, Coach Quisenberry became the winningest head football coach in Devine Football history with a 67-20 mark in his eight seasons as the head man.

"I feel good about the mark, but we are very fortunate to live in a community where they let us coach hard," Coach Quisenberry stated.

Previously, the great Marvin Gustafson was one of the winningest coaches in Devine Football History. Gustafson was the head coach of the Devine Warhorses from 1960-64. Coach Gus was 47-9-2 during that time. After his five years of coaching, he was also known as the longest tenured head football coach in Devine

Years later. Coach Bates beat that mark in 1999, when he celebrated 6 seasons as the Warhorses head man. He won his 43rd game to break Coach Gus's record in the sixth game of the 2000 season against Jourdanton. The Warhorses won the game 41-6 and went on to have a 7-4 record in 2000.

Coach Bates left Devine after the 2003 season to become the Athletic Director at Pleasanton, a position he held up until January of last year. The 2003 Devine Warhorses went 7-6, losing to Rice Consolidated 48-7 in the Alamodome. Coach Bates' record at Devine in his 10 seasons as the head coach was 66-42-1, which is a winning percentage of 61%.

Since 1994, the Warhorses are 133-62-1, and it's all about consistency. Coach Bates was here 10 seasons and Coach Quisenberry is in his 8th season as the Warhorses head coach. Coach Gus was here 5 seasons, and staying at one place for more than two or three seasons is a major factor in building a successful program.

The other major factor is having a great coaching staff, and the Devine Warhorses do have that. Of the 13 coaches on the Warhorse Football Staff, four of them have been here for one or two seasons, and two of the four are from Devine and have been a part of the


Warhorse tradition for years.

"We are also fortunate that we have the opportunity to have the staff that we do. We have great men that are great coaches and they want the kids to be successful, not only on the playing field, but the classroom as well," added Coach Quisenberry.

"I truly believe the kids know that these coaches care about them, no matter what sport they are involved in, the kids know that the coaches care about them and their success on and off the field. We have great coaches that coach other sports here at Devine High. We have a great program, it's not just football. Coach Cozby has done a remarkable job with the Devine Warhorse Track Program. Coach Gomez has done well in baseball, and now with the Devine Arabian and Warhorse Power Lifting programs. Coach Beaty has done well with the Devine Warhorse Basketball Program, and Coach George Villa has continued the success of the Devine Warhorse Baseball Program," added Coach Quisenberry.

"For me and some of the staff it was a privilege to be here for Coach Bates' success, and it is still a privilege for us to be here for the success that we have continued to have here at Devine High,"

In a recent school board meeting, trustees for Floydada's Independent School District voted to join the fight that will hopefully change the State's current policy for funding public schools.

As reported in the Sept. 29 issue of the Hesperian-Beacon, schools all over the state, including Lockney, have joined forces to file a lawsuit against the State of Texas over the unfair system that is currently being used to fund school districts in the

In a nutshell, Floydada, along with seven other districts around the region, will be teaming up with taxpayers, parents, and the Equity Center in order to fight for the fair treatment of Texas taxpayers and school children;

the lawsuit will be a prerequisite before any law can be changed in legislation.

The argument for the lawsuit is that tax rates, which fund school districts, do not bring in the same amount of revenue as they do for other districts. For example, a school district with a \$1.14 tax rate is able to accumulate See LAWSUIT

Another great **Punkin Day**



to stay busy. He loves to dance and attends at least three dances each week with his friend and dance Twila partner, Bolinger.


Claude is a true gentleman who likes to volunteer, enjoys helping others and generously given of his time throughout life. Lockney has been blessed be-

From the Lockney Beacon February 5, 1978 **FAITH STIMULATES RUBY HARTMAN'S** APTITUDE FOR HAPPY LIVING

Ruby Hartman's belief that faith is a higher ability than reasoning is applicable first of all in her religious realm. She has found that it also serves in the task of refinishing a piano, quilting a quilt or learning to drive a Model A Ford with no one sitting beside her to instruct her.

"We were always so poor when I was growing up that we didn't know whether we would have enough to eat. It didn't bother us. were happy," she says.

She says that there is a way of facing disappointments. "When it happens, it's done. You just have to face it and go on."

"As a Christian, I know the Lord will see me through. He always has.

"We had hard times and disappointment, I am sure, but I don't remember anything but the happy times. There was so much happi-

"Daddy was a preacher. Three of my brothers are preachers. I had four sisters and four brothers, all still living. Mother always played the piano at the church. She still can play at the age of eighty-two. She also played an old pump organ some."

Since they were a preacher's family, they always lived in town. This would have been a handicap for some, but not for the Crawford children. A vacant lot nearby served for drawing off a baseball diamond. It was a good place for many games, but before Ruby and her sisters were old enough to drive the family Model T Ford, they pushed the Model T all over the vacant lot. Why? She doesn't remember.

"After we were older, we often asked Papa to let us drive our old Model T Ford. My sisters always made me do the asking. He nearly always let us have it. Some times, we would have a flat. Papa would come to fix our flat; he never would say a word," she remembers.

The main family entertainment was in music. Early there was an established relationship in the family through music. With the pump organ centrally placed and with the mother pumping and playing, the family gathered around and sang.

Music still plays a part in Ruby's life. She has a seventy-five year old piano that belonged to her husband's family. The piano could be much older. There is no way to arrive at a definite date.

Once her husband's grandmother and grandfather made a trip in a wagon from Collingsworth County in Texas to Springer, New Mexico and had the piano with them in the wagon. It speaks for the sturdiness of the piano that no harm was

This old Strochber piano the quilt became more narhas its original ivory keys. Once she asked a piano authority's advice on putting new ivory on the keys. His answer surprised her.

"Why put new? This that is on there is worth a fortune. You couldn't afford to put new ivory on even if you could get it.'

It was agreed that the piano needed a new finish job. Ruby herself did the finishing.

"I had never done any furniture refinishing. I just called Johnny Kellison, step by step on the work. Five coats of old varnish had to be taken off down to the wood. I took the piano all apart and sanded down to the cracks. It took me all summer. I'll never do it again," she is emphatic when she says that.

The name plate on the front of the piano was misplaced during the finishing time. A new hand painted name plate takes its place. The information for the hand painting was gleaned from the inside of the pia-

Once during the depression a piano tuner wanted to buy the piano for \$350. His offer was the result of his having valued the worth of the instrument while he was on the inside tuning. An offer of \$350 for nearly anything during the depression was a big offer. The piano is an upright. It has been in Ruby's possession for forty years.

There is not a great deal of connection between music and quilting only that Ruby Hartman does both.

"There is a secret in quilting and quilt making—you have to like it to do it. I just like seeing something built. Quilting is an old form of hand work, but I see it is growing in popularity again. The younger people are taking it up,"

There was a time when people quilted because of necessity. They had to have something to cover the bed. That was when Ruby quilted so many that she learned to like it.

"I can't remember how many I have quilted. Once when mama and papa were gone, four of us decided to put a quilt in the frames to be quilted. We used a quilt top that mama had waiting to be made into a quilt. When mama and papa came in, we had it half quilted.

"Mama began to laugh when she saw the quilt. You have to put the lining in wrong side out," she

The raw seams were onthe outside. She has kept that quilt all these years," Ruby tells, laughing.

Ruby Hartman has "always known how to quilt." She just "grew up" knowing how to quilt.

Back when housing space was quite limited, it was necessary to swing the quilting frames from the ceiling, so when the quilt was not being quilted on, it could be swung high above the heads of the family members. All the while,

row in the frames as row after row was quilted and rolled toward the center. "In the last three years,

I have made and quilted six quilts. I have made no more than fifteen all together. Some of these have been large enough to use as bed spreads."

Mrs. Hartman laughs when she says she prefers a blanket on a bed to a quilt for cover.

"This one is square in the middle," she says indicating one she has in the frame." "The pieces are cut in a hexagon shape The center design becomes a shape. The center design becomes a huge diamond with each of four points touching the ends and sides of the quilt." She has an "Around the World" quilt cut in squares.

"I can't talk about these things without thinking of some funny things that used to happen."

Once the girls decided to have a chicken for dinner. After a lengthy chase, they caught a chicken. Then he was caught by the head and whirled round and round just like it was supposed to be done to wring a chicken's neck. When he was dropped to the ground to finish the dying process, he flew to the top of the house instead. They had to chase him down again.

There was a little funny thing that we laugh about yet. I just loved clabber, so did my sister, Ruth. We never could get Ruth to taste it though, until I had tasted it and approved the flavor."

There were prankster and jokers in the family, but "our mother was the real prankster."

"Once we were having a slumber party. The girls in our family and friends were sleeping out. Our mother out on Dad's overalls and old hat, slipped out the window and came down the road in the moonlight look like a beggar. We became so frightened and screamed so wildly that she laughed until she almost lost her balance, then we thought she was staggering drunk."

Mrs. Hartman admits that there is nothing in learning to drive a Model A Ford. Just remember what you have seen other people do and get in and drive down for the mail. She mentions nothing about repairs on the mailbox and front yard

Even though the piano is "never" to get refinished again, and there is no doubt that Mrs. Hartman can drive as well as anyone, she will not be out of anything to do. She has "enough quilt scraps" to keep her busy for a long time.

Coach Ouisenberry said.

The Warhorses now sit at 526-355-32 all-time in the school's history, dating back to 1921. The Warhorses celebrated their 500th win back in 2008 when they beat Comfort 42-19. The Warhorses went on to have a 7-3 mark that season losing to Rio Hondo 48-43 in the Area Round of the Class 3A Division II playoffs. The Warhorses have not missed the playoffs in 9 seasons, and they have made the playoffs 13 out of the last 17 seasons, dating back to 1994 when Coach Bates arrived as the new head coach at Devine High.

Let me say this, Coach Quisenberry really didn't want to put much into this achievement, but being the sportswriter I wanted to recognize the accomplishment.

He told me earlier in the season, that it was all about team work not individuals, and he is right, but I felt it had to be noticed and marked in the annals of history.

"We do believe it is in the best interest, of Floydada ISD to join the lawsuit initiated by the Equity Center." commented Floydada ISD Superintendent Gilbert Trevino, "By joining this lawsuit, FISD can proudly say that we expect and want equity for the students and tax payers of this wonderful school district. We are already taxing at \$1.17, so we are doing everything we can locally to generate revenue. The state must do their part; Texas ranked 43rd in per pupil spending in the nation according to the US Census Bureau. With the results of the most recent legislative session, Texas will drop to number 47. Texas has an outstanding educational system aside from school funding. All we ask is that the funding to become more equitable."

A prime example of this gap can be seen in Lockney, where the district is cutting corners on books to make ends meet, while

some schools with the same amount of kids and the same tax rate can afford to Astroturf their football and baseball fields, and install a new swimming pool.

The lawsuit is designed to attack the legislature's actions on four fronts according to the Equity Center; they will look to achieve equity, both for students and taxpayers; look to change the arbitrary fund distribution scheme; achieve adequacy; and set up tax so that it operates as a state property tax.

Overall, what the group seems to be expressing, is that a student's education should not have to suffer because they move to community that doesn't have enough tax revenue because they don't have a booming economy that brings in big tax revenue.

Successful lawsuits in the past, like Edgewood and West Orange Cove, have opened the doors for more change that will hopefully make funding distribution a little more even.






