fair that a school brings in more money than the other, but they are saying that the educational funding system is not balanced; so students re not getting the same ed ucation across Texas. "We do believe it is in the best interest. of Floy-
dada ISD to join the lawsuit initiated by the Equity Cen initiated by the Equity CenISD Superintendent Gilbert Trevino, "By joining this lawsuit, FISD can proudly say that we expect and want equity for the students and tax payers of this wonderful school district. We are already taxing at $\$ 1.17$, so we are doing everything we can locally to generate do their part; Texas ranked 43rd in per pupil spending in the nation according to the US Census Bureau. With the results of the most recent legislative session, Texas will drop to number 47. Texas has an outstanding educational system aside from school
funding. All we ask is that the funding to become more equitable.
