I have never heard nor thought of a satisfactory explanation of why Charlie Jones' fall from the roof of such serious damage to his leg, that spring day of 1908. The fact that it did is enough to say, Dr. R. A. Childers, who was called, had a dim possibility of saving the member. At Charlie's insistence he undertook to do so, however.

Later when gangrene made its appearance in the damaged part the doctor told the patient and suggested immediate amputation of the leg somewhat above the ankle. There
were other days and other warnings were other days and other warnings
as the infection took further toll. Then the day when the doctor told the patient he must have the amputa tion if he wanted a chance to live.

When the patient consented, preparation was made to do the operation at once. I have been told (and Ulmer White thinks that is probably correct) that the operation was done Britain. They laid Charlie out on a table and after the anesthesia (chloroform in those days) was given, the doctor probed for healthy flesh and found he must cut above the knee the infection had traveled up the leg so fast.
Whit
White doesn't recall who administered the anesthetic. But he doe recall quite well he was assigned the task of holding the leg that was bethat was built on the style of a wood saw, only it was different in size, in the kind of teeth and the angle the saw was set in the handgrip.
What White remembers best is
that he had a hard time keeping from was finished and the leg was his. He held himself together sufficiently to lower the limb into the tub of liquid prepared to preserve it until burial of the severed part could be made.

The doctor was most fearful that his "operating room" would not be germ free, but he did his utmost Charlie survived the ordeal in a fine way, had no complications or infecway, had no complications or infec-
tions. He recovered and adjusted so tions. He recovered and adjusted so
well that two years later he married well that two years later he married
the girl of his dreams and with her lived a long and useful life.

When Charlie's severed leg was taken downtown it was stored
temporarily at White Drug Co. (and unwittingly) under a dripping water faucet. After some hours the patient cried out in agony, "Cold water is dripping on my leg," he moaned. Sure enough it was. The leg was covered a little more deeply in the brine or preservative mixture and moved to avoid the drip, which solved the problem. Shortly thereafter when the leg was interred his
toes began to pain the patient as toes began to pain the patient as
though they were too tightly bound. W. A. Gound it was who went out to the burial ground and relieved the bound parts so the patient could rest in comfort.
