

### Football teams hit field, prepare for first scrimmages

The Floydada Whirlwinds and Lockney Longhorns kicked off the football season Monday, August 6, with four days of acclimation and the beginning of two-a-

It's that time of year again. The summer days are being ushered out and football season is in the air.

Floydada and Lockney football teams began their first four days of acclimation, where players are only allowed to practice in shorts and t-shirts, Monday, August 6. Beginning Friday, helmets were donned and players dressed in full pads.

In the past, football teams have started their training with two-a-days, but the University Interscholastic League (UIL) has made some changes. Acclimation is required for the first four days and then teams may practice twice a day every other day after that.

"UIL has changed all that up this year," said Floydada Athletic Director Todd Bandy. "We're real behind in our offense, because we're four practices behind what we were last year."

Floydada's team will keep doing hurry-up offense, which does not utilize huddle time. According to Bandy, instead of running 45-60 plays a game, they are running 75-90 plays a game.

"Right now it's early (to make an evaluation)...we've got some younger kids that need to come through," said Bandy. "We're missing a couple that didn't come out...

we're low on numbers."

His team takes on the field with 36 players, 8 seniors.

The Floydada Whirlwind's first scrimmage will be Friday in Wellington (no time provided at publication.)

"We got to keep everybody healthy and eligible," said

In Lockney, the Longhorns were out on the field working hard and getting back into a winning frame of mind.

"There's a lot of retention on things we did last year and we remembered," said Lockney Athletic Director Malcomb Moerbe. "It's early in the season and there's a lot of things that we need to improve on, but for the most part we've been pleasantly pleased."

The Longhorns will still be using the N.E.W. philosophy (No Excuses Whatsoever), and adding "Work Hard, Play

"We figure that if you do those things, then everything else will kind of take care of themselves," said Moerbe. "But the No Excuses Whatsoever is an all the time kind of deal...we don't make excuses, we're responsible for our actions."

According to the state website, state and local taxes will not be collected during the weekend of August 17-19 due to the state's annual tax holiday. This exemption includes most clothing, shoes, school supplies and backpacks that do not exceed \$100 per item.

That is a savings of approximately \$8 per \$100 spent. It a single item costs more than \$99.99, taxes do apply.

According to the state guidelines, any Texas business that sells these qualifying items must comply.

The tax exemption includes items purchased in a store, as well as those bought on the Internet, television or by mail.







Frederick J. March of San Marcos, Texas, beloved and cherished father and grandfather, passed away on Monday, August 6, 2012, at the age of 73. He was born to Joe Murphy and Sybil (Gardner) March in Hollis, Oklahoma on February 18, 1939.

Fred served his country in the United States Army and was honorably discharged in

He served as a Professor Emeritus and Theatre Arts Academic Advisor at Texas State University, San Marcos. After receiving his M.A. from Texas Tech University, Fred joined the faculty at then Southwest Texas State College where he served as Technical Director for 16 years. Later he was named

Director of Theatre and then became Chairman of the Department of Theatre and Dance and served in that capacity for 11 years.

Professionally, he has twice received the Award for Outstanding Scenic Design at the American College Theatre Festival and since 1971 has been an active member of the United States Institute for Theatre Technology, Inc. In this capacity, Fred has served as a member of the National Board of Directors for U.S.I.T.T. and was one of the ten founders for U.S.I.T.T. - Texas in 1971.

A member of TETA since 1967, Fred has served on the Board of Directors for many years and as President from 1995 to 1997. He also chaired the University/College section of TETA and has served as a UIL Critic Judge for over 25 years. He continued to provide enormous energy and support to Theatrefest. He served Convention Director twice, as Project Chairman and presenter for at least 30 convention workshops. He received TETA's College/ University Educator of the Year Award in 1989 and TETA's Founders' Award in 1983.

His parents, his wife, Claudia Chesshir March (2010), brother, Arch March and sister, Doris McGill preceded him in death.

He is survived by two sons, Joe March and wife, Ann of Hoover, Alabama, and David March and wife, Joyce Griffith of Durango, Colorado; daughter, Wendy March Mueller and husband, Larry of Denver, Colorado; and three grandchildren, Madison and Caelan March, and Gemma Mueller.

# FROM THE ARCHIVES OF THE FLOYD COUNTY MUSEUM

A HISTORY OF THE LAZY F RANCH as REMEMBERED by FRANK BROWN

The Lockney Beacon, Thursday, July 7, 1988

In 1911, by grandfather, Sylvester Petus Brown bought a section of land that had one time been on the southern border of the land leased by the Lazy F Ranch. The 640 acre Brown home place (Section 28, block D-2)was purchased for \$12.00 an acre from Mr. T. N. Hutcheson. The section is 12 miles north of the present day town of-Floydada. Mr. Hutcheson was the only person to own the land before S.P. Brown bought it. The east half section was given to my father, Charlie Heywood Brown and the west half to my uncle, Ras Brown. I can remember when it was possible to see where a dugout and windmill had been on the south side of my father's land. There were some pieces of broken dishes in the grass where the dugout had been. The F Ranch's four barbed wire fence was on the south side of the section and there was a gate almost in the middle of the fence so that people could go southwest to Lockney or northeast to the caprock where there was another gate. Those were the only two gates between Flomot, Quitaque, and Turkey, below the cap, and Lockney,

on the plains. The wagon tracks were still visible across the Brown section when I was a boy. The old road up the caprock was on the south side of the canyon about two miles south of the present highway to Flomot.

h-vin Bennett remembered helping his dad drive cattle through the gate on the Brown section towards Estelline. He rode bareback and barefoot and he recalled stripping the heads off the tall stalks with his toes as he rode through the native grass. The Bennetts met a cattle buyer at the top of the caprock who bought the cattle and Irvin was disappointed he did not get to go on to Estelline where they had

intended to sell the cattle. At one time there was a ranch house on the Thomas section, about a mile and a half north of the Brown land. There was a windmill and a big dirt tank on the property. These improvements had been built by the F Ranch. The tank had at one time been about four feet deep and was used for watering the cattle. There was a large wire fence around the tank and the pen was used at roundup time for dividing the cows from the calves. The story is told that one night that after the F cowboys had driven the cows into the pen, the cowboys lay down to sleep by the fence. The

for their calves and the men started telling stories of cattle stampedes and of men and horses being trampled and killed by the hoofs of frightened, run away cattle. After the young tenderfoot was asleep the cowboys started velling and crying that the cows had stampeded. The men ran over me young man, knocking him down several times. When they let him up, he started running and the cowboys had to saddle a horse to catch

My father, Charlie Brown, built a two room house on his half-section and later two more room were added to the house before he died. When my father died in 1917, my mother's father Arthur Wedmore, came to live with us. My grandfather came to America from England when he was about 21 years old. He liked me western life, married, raised a family and never went back to England. In 1925, my grandfather hired some Mexicans to make some adobe brick and to build a six room house. The walls were 14 inches thick, counting the plaster on the inside and the stucco on the outside. The house was warm in the winter and cool in the summer. The old house still stands on the Brown farm which was at one time grazed by Lazy F cattle.

# South Plains College's Center for Allied Health slates Open House on Aug. 21

LEVELLAND - South Plains College will host an Open House for the new Center for Allied Health Education with a Dedication Ceremony and Ribbon Cutting at 2 p.m. on Aug. 21. The facility is located at 202 Clubview Drive.

"We know that 80 percent of nursing graduates from South Plains College stay here, work here and live here in our region where they provide quality care for our citizens," said Dr. Kelvin Sharp, President of South Plains College.

The new Center now houses the college's associate degree nursing, vocational nursing and physical therapist assistant programs. It will enable the two nursing programs to increase the number of students admitted into the programs by 50 per-

The Dedication Ceremony will include remarks from Mike Box, chairman of the South Plains College Board of Regents and Dr. Kelvin Sharp, president of the college. Officials from United Supermarkets will also be recognized for their support of the project through a \$150,000 contribution to equip the nursing skills lab.

Members of the Levelland Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors will host a ribbon-cutting to officially open the Center. Tours will follow the program until 4 p.m. The public is invited to attend the event.

The \$150,000 grant from

United Supermarkets has been used to equip the nursing skills lab that is a central component to the 36,000 square foot facility for the college's nursing programs. The funds have been used to make a hospital suite of patient rooms. The 14 patient rooms are equipped with electric patient beds, low fidelity Laerdal patient mannequins, wound treatment accessories for the mannequins, overbed and bedside tables and intravenous solution stands.

"When you walk into our skills labs, it will be like you are walking onto the floor of one of our local hospitals," said Sue Ann Lopez, dean of health occupations at South Plains College. "Our nursing faculty has carefully chosen the equipment that will be used to teach students care and treatment procedures. We are excited that our faculty can deliver a quality learning experience for our students. It will only make them better nurses."

South Plains College acquired a former grocery store space in Gentry Square located west of the Levelland Campus and adjacent to the community's medical district. The \$3 million renovation project features seven modern classrooms, three separate skills labs, an audio-video observation and recording suite, two computer testing labs and faculty offices and a capacity to accommodate more than 250 students each semester.

Charles Tyer made the motion to adopt a proposed tax rate of: Maintenance and Operation, \$1.17; Interest in Sinking, \$0.15521; for a total of \$1.32521. William Dean seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously.
