to saddle a horse to catch him. My father, Charlie Brown, built a two room house on his half-section and later two more room were added to the house before he died. When my father died in 1917, my
mother's father Arthur mother's father Arthur
Wedmore, came to live with us. My grandfather with us. My grandfather
came to America from England when he was about 21 years old. He liked me western life, married, raised a family and never went back to England. In 1925, my grandfather hired some Mexicans to make some adobe brick
and to build a six room and to build a six room
house. The walls were 14 house. The walls were 14
inches thick, counting the inches thick, counting the
plaster on the inside and the stucco on the outside. The house was warm in the winter and cool in the summer. The old house still stands on the Brown farm which was at one time
