A Scholarship was set up in honor of the late Dylan Thomas: the Dylan Thomas Memorial Stock Show Schol-

During last weekend's 65th annual Floyd County Stock Show, Montana Williams exhibited a cross bred barrow in the name of her late brother, Dylan

The animal was sold for \$1,500, plus there were donations given bringing the total amount up to \$1,975. The proceeds went to fund the scholarship. Cory Johnson, of local radio station KFLP, read the following to those in attendance Saturday night:

"Montana Williams is here tonight exhibiting this cross bred barrow appropriately named "Bubba," in honor of her brother Dylan Thomas. All of the proceeds this animal earned in tonight's auction will go to the Dylan Thomas Memorial Stock Show Scholarship, which was established last May in Dylan's honor. Although this is a bittersweet moment for the Williams family, they are excited that they are able to continue to build Dylan's legacy.

Dylan was passionate about many things including life, family and friends. He served and honored God and was always willing to pitch in when anyone needed help, including rebuilding a home in the Ninth Ward in New Orleans after hurricane Katrina.

Dylan was an honor student at Floydada High School where he was also a member of FFA, and participated in football, baseball, power lifting as well as UIL Academics. 4-H was a very large part of his life since he was 8 years old. He loved caring for his animals and judging livestock. He had an un-

relenting eagerness to learn and never stopped trying to figure out how to be the best. "Commitment," "Intensity," "Hard work," "Love for the game," "Victory," "Power," "Determination" and "Strength" were the words posted on the walls in his bedroom. Over the years these few simple words had become his motto. He lived and breathed each word and applied them to every aspect of his life. One thing Dylan never lacked was

The objective of his memorial fund is to provide scholarships to students who share the same passion and commitment as he did in 4-H activities, namely showing and judging livestock, which were very close to Dylan's heart.

Last May, the Williams family was privileged to honor two students with the First Annual Dylan Thomas Memorial Stock Show Scholarship, Senee' Foster of Lockney and Brady Ragland of Floydada. Dylan looked to Senee' for guidance, inspiration and knowledge in livestock judging given her success at showing heifers for 4-H since she was 8 years old. Dylan also tried to emulate Brady and repeat his success since childhood while showing and judging

The Williams family looks forward to presenting more scholarships throughout the years to many of the young participants of Floyd County and would also like to thank the Stock Show Association for this opportunity to carry on Dylan's legacy. They would like to thank the communities of Lockney and Floydada alike for all of the love, support and prayers over the past eight months. Lockney Lady Horns traveled to Littlefield for a tournament over the holidays and came out with a win!

Starting the tournament on Monday, Dec. 29, the Lady Horns played Snyder, winning 62-37. On Tuesday the Lady Horns traveled back to Littlefield to play Artesia, NM, beating them 57-44. Later that evening they played Dalhart, edging out the Golden Wolves 41-34 to advance to the championship.

COTTON MARKET WEE

Despite quiet volume at the end of the year and many players on the sidelines at this point of the season, cotton futures prices on the Intercontinental Exchange (ICE) climbed higher this week, settling on strong gains. Cotton advanced on Wednesday, building on the previous day's sharp rally as limited buying took nearby contracts to two-month

highs. However, traders said the market may see a downside retracement of the recent rally at the beginning of the New Year as traders face bearish demand news and continued weakness in economic numbers over the near-term. There are even reports of weak manufacturing data in China and talk of recessionary

demand from the east. Newspapers in China report textile profits for companies there slipped for the first time in more than a decade and said textile exports in the first quarter could fall by as much as 30 percent from 2008. The fact that Chinese officials have been building a reserve of cotton and buying the commodity from Chinese producers to support the local market may have helped provide some underlying support to the global

cotton market recently. Additionally, China's cotton crop is expected to shrink 10 to 30 percent in 2009 due to weak demand for textiles as world economies suffer from sales in the holiday-shortened

recession. Despite the Chinese government's effort to support the commodity, a survey on the China Cotton Association's probably still will plant less cot-

"The Chinese acreage reduction could set the stage for a price recovery in 2009-10, provided that cotton consumption doesn't fall with acres," an analyst said.

Traders continue to be concerned about poor global economic data that suggests further deterioration in demand for consumables in 2009. However, the figures contained in USDA's export sales report were stronger than expected, giving a boost to

"The weekly data released by USDA actually was lower, but still was much better than we had expected this time of year," a trader said. Net export sales of U.S. cotton in the week ended Dec. 25 totaled 67,800 bales, down 43 percent from the previous week and 32 percent from the four-week average. Primary buyers were Turkey, China, Indonesia, and Colombia.

At 136,200 bales, export shipments were down 35 percent from the previous week and 37 percent from the four-week average. Major destinations included China, Turkey, Vietnam and

> Meanwhile, the 2008-09 cotton season now is coming to a close. Most of the Texas crop has been harvested with minimal cotton still in the field in the High Plains region.

Estimates indicate that almost 100 percent of the state's crop has been harvested and approximately 70 percent has been ginned. Remaining field work was expected to progress quickly this week as clear, warm, dry

weather was in the forecast. "Going forward, I think the cotton market will find support from expectations that U.S. and Chinese producers will cut acreage in response to competition from grains coupled with decline in textile demand in 2009," an observer said. "However, if demand continues to dwindle as world economies grapple with recession, prices may continue to suffer for a while."







ARE THESE THE GOOD OL' DAYS? - Part 2 How 60 years of game management has enhanced wildlife populations



In 1945, Texas big game was already recognized as a significant source of recreation and income for hunters and landowners. Partly due to poor land use practices and screw worm infestations, white-tailed deer were relegated mostly to the Hill Country and South Texas, with pockets of deer in suitable habitats scattered over much of the lower two-thirds of the state. Today, it is no secret that whitetail populations are booming.

"From 1939 until 1990, TPWD was heavily involved in trapping and relocating of whitetails," says Mitch Lockwood, white-tailed deer program leader for TPWD. "In that time, approximately 34,000 deer were moved from the higher density areas of Texas to those areas with very low numbers of deer."

Lockwood explains that the combination of relocation efforts, white-tailed deer research conducted on wildlife management areas such as the Kerr, and working with private landowners has been key to spe-



working with private landowners has been key to species population growth from 238,000 in 1939 to more than 4 million today.

cies population growth from 238,000 in 1939 to more than 4 million today.

"The contributions of private landowners to the success of Texas white-tailed deer are huge," emphasizes Lockwood. "Almost all of the management takes place on private landowners and hunters are the ones doing habitat and population management on virtually all of the Texas deer range. They are setting prescribed burns, removing noxious brush species, and promoting a healthy habitat through their actions."

Because of landowner interest and involvement, other species with smaller statewide ranges are also the book, were only found in a single pocket in the Palo Duro Canyon in the Texas Panhandle with the majority of the population found in the Trans-Pecos region. Today, mule deer are still found in abundant numbers in the Trans-Pecos and have expanded their ranges over much of the Caprock Escarpment area of the Panhandle and South Plains, as well as in the Red, Canadian and Pease River basins.

Pronghorn antelope, with a range specific to the wide open country of western Texas, nearly doubled in numbers from 1941 until 1990, when a prolonged drought affected their populations over much of their Trans-Pecos range.

"For desert animals like the mule deer, I would have to say that

"For desert animals like the mule deer, I would have to say that the good of days will come and go with the rain," explains Clayton Wolf, big game program director for TPWD. "Landowners can do things to mitigate circumstances during a drought, but history has shown us that prolonged droughts will have a negative impact on overall numbers. It appears that West Texas is currently in a recovery mode, and mule deer are doing well and have been for several years."

Wolf agrees with Lockwood on the role of private citizens in game animal successes. "The private citizens' role is critical. Most deer were stocked on private lands, and it is private landowners who provided the habitat and the protection during the restoration years. Hunters also played an important role, because without the revenue from the sale of hunting licenses, we wouldn't have had the resources to trap and relocate deer
