## Smith named 'Director of the Year'

The National Council of Farmer Cooperatives (NCFC) has awarded its prestigious Director of the Year award to Eddie Smith, chairman of NCFC-member Plains Cotton Cooperative Association.

Smith, who has been a cooperative member since 1973, farms 10,000 acres of cotton, cattle and row crops in Floydada, Texas, in partnership with his son Eric.

"Eddie has provided strong and able leadership to PCCA in his nearly 25 years on the cooperative's board. During this time, he has been part of the effort to have the cooperative adopt cutting edge technology to improve both cotton marketing and member services, positioning Plains Cotton to compete effectively in a changing marketplace," said Charles F. Conner, president and CEO of NCFC. "He is truly dedicated to the principles of farmerownership and innovation, and I congratulate him on being named Director of the Year.'


The Farmer Cooperative Director of the Year Award was established to recognize the outstanding achievements of a farmer cooperative director who takes the lead to help their board of directors make decisions vital to their cooperative. Farmer Cooperative Director of the Year nominees were examined by a panel of judges representing the NCFC

members and outside experts. In selecting the winners, judges looked at four broad criteria: how well the nominee understands his cooperative; the ability to provide leadership and be a team player; the possession of good business judgment; and the ability to communicate effectively. Two awards are given out, based on the nominee's length of board tenure. Smith won in the category for those directors with more than 12 years of board tenure.

The winner for directors with 12 or fewer years tenure was Nicholas Bozick, of Mecca, Calif., the chairman of Sunkist Growers. The awards were presented on Thursday, Feb. 5, 2009, at NCFC's 80th Annual Meeting.

NCFC is a national association representing America's farmer cooperatives. There are nearly 3,000 farmer cooperatives across the U.S. whose members include a majority of our nation's more than 2 million farmers, ranchers and growers. These farmer cooperative businesses handle, process, and market agricultural commodities and related products; furnish farm supplies; and provide credit and associated financial services. Earnings from these activities are returned to their members on a patronage basis. Farmer cooperatives also provide jobs for nearly 300,000 Americans, many in rural areas, with a combined payroll of over \$8 billion.

## County back to five day work week

First thing Monday morning, Jan. 9, the Floyd County Commissioners discussed the four day work week the courthouse has been keeping since the beginning of August 2008. Before the discussion ensued, Commissioner Nathan Johnson made a motion to go back to a five day work week. Judge Penny Golightly reminded the commissioners to keep in mind when making their decision the savings the county had already gained while giving their employees a benefit. According to Judge Golightly, the estimated savings per year - figured on the savings of this past quarter - would be around \$10,000.

Next, County Clerk Marilyn Holcomb addressed the commissioners' court on behalf of the courthouse employees and other elected officials. She started by saying, "thank you," and sharing the appreciation of all those who work in the courthouse. Holcomb then said, "But even more important to me (than the energy savings) is that the morale of the courtouse employees has been very low for the past couple of years and having Friday off has really boosted the morale and improved the attitudes of everyone immensely.'

Holcomb also pointed out that except for the excellent retirement plan Floyd County offers, she could not remember anything over the 25 years she has worked for the county that she would call an incentive for the employees

Additionally, she shared that she has received no complaints about the days or hours that the courthouse keeps and that instead, she has received compliments from people about the earlier and later hours, as well as about being open during lunch.

Commissioner Jon Jones expressed his reasoning for going back to a five day work week, "We're a big business and most businesses conduct their business in five day work weeks. That's one of the services we provide the public."

Commissioner Mike Anderson suggested the court give the change a full year to see in reality what the savings would be for the county and to see how the public would respond once they were used to the change.

Finally, Commissioner Lindan Morris seconded Johnson's motion to return to a five day work week. Jon Jones also voted for the motion. Anderson and Golightly voted against the motion. The return to the five day work week will go into effect the first of March.

In other business, Floydada City Manager Gary Brown addressed the court concerning the Downtown Sidewalk Grant the city received. "We will be improving the sidewalks, bringing them up to ground level," Brown told the commissioners. "(The sidewalks) will go from the pavilion to the driveway break on the other side (of the courthouse).'

The commissioners agreed to Brown's proposal to remove the diagonally placed sidewalks in front of the courthouse. The county will be providing \$5,000 in labor and equipment to help with the removal and replacement of the sidewalks.

Tracy Cumbie with TxDOT was present to discuss with the court about the exchange of caliche for the county. The caliche was designated to all four precincts, and the county will take possession of it so it can be used even after TxDOT's July 31 removal deadline.

J.D. Ragland, Floyd County Extension Agent, updated the court, "It's dry out there. Producers are making field preparations. A lot of wheat (fields) have been having pivots going.

The court also decided to leave each commissioner and department head in charge of deciding about random drug testing. Also, the commissioners voted to approve the county's agreement with Allied Compl who contracts with the county to do all their random drug tests.

The burn ban was left in effect after the commissioners agreed that the county still needed more rain before it would be safe enough to lift it.


The court voted unanimously to approve two new members to the Texas Historical Commission for 2009-2010. The two new members are Carolyn Cunningham and Amanda Hinsley.

Five farm contracts were approved and three were voided. The five approved farm contracts included Rob Everett's request to build up a terrace for conservation, Bud Taylor's request to build up dykes, the W.R. Ware Estate's request to repair a ranch road one mile east of Hwy. 97, Baker Farms' request to move dirt away from a pasture fence southwest of Cedar Hill, and Mike Buchana's request to clear a drainage ditch in order to clean and conserve water.

# Saddle donated to historical museum

Some things seem to last for-

Wilson Barton's father, the late Al Barton, was quite the cowboy. Foreman of the old 'F' Ranch for 20 years, Al did plenty of horseback riding. When his saddle was found lying in an old shed back in 1925, it had already seen many miles on the trail.

Donnie Turner, a long-time friend of Wilson, retrieved the saddle in August of 2006. "It fell apart when I touched it," Turner

The saddle is estimated to have been lying in the shed for approximately 80 years - from around 1925 'til 2006. Turner worked on rebuilding the saddle for two years, then presented it to Wilson on Aug. 18, 2008 - Wilson's 93rd birthday.

Wilson was thrilled to receive the saddle, remembering how he rode on horseback with his dad to town when just a small boy. "It's in pretty good shape," he said.

On Thursday, Jan. 22, Wilson donated his father's saddle to the Floyd County Historical Museum where it will be proudly displayed for many years to come. Just a few weeks later Wilson passed away after a long and happy life.

Nancy Marble, treasurer and one of the charter members of the museum, said, "We are very pleased to accept the donation of this historic saddle. I know everyone will be interested in viewing the saddle, along with viewing the additional information and history the museum has available concerning the Barton family."

The age of the saddle is not know, but Al died in 1921 at the age of 73, so if he owned this saddle for at least the last 20 years of his life, it could be well over 100 years old. Like we said: some things seem to last forever.



## Cotton

Cumulative Upland cotton marketings for the first five months of the 2008-marketing year totaled 3.576 million bales according to information released January 30, 2009 by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service.

That figure is 2.5 million bales below the 6 million bales marketed through the same period for the 2007-crop.

The low numbers reinforce the reality of the lagging pace of cotton consumption worldwide. The figures are also expected to support forecasts for a further reduction in total cotton acres planted in the U.S. and around the world during the 2009 growing season.

According to the USDA report, estimated December 2008 marketings totaled only 781,000 bales. The average selling price reported for the month was 51.9 cents per pound.

Based on these figures, the 2008 Upland Cotton Weighted Average Price calculated through December 2008 stands at 54.53 cents per pound. With the first five months of the marketing year now past, the calculated 2008 Weighted Average Price continues to fall closer to the 52-cent Upland cotton Base Loan rate.

Price forecasts for the remainder of the 2008 marketing year are following the same downward trend as well. The preliminary mid-month price reported for January 2009 was 47.40 cents per pound.

Lower price expectations were also echoed in the recent announcement of an advance 2008crop Counter-cyclical payment rate of 5.03 cents, which is 40 percent of the maximum possible

Upland cotton CC rate of 12.58 cents per pound.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the associated weighted average price based on prices and cumulative marketings from August 1 through December 31, 2008.

The 2008 Counter-cyclical payment rate authorized under the 2008 Farm Bill will be based on the 12-month Weighted Average Price Received by growers. For cotton the 12-month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2008 marketing year.

The 2008 cotton marketing year began in August 1, 2008 and ends July 31, 2009.

## Profitability Workshops An **Opportunity To** Learn How To Evaluate Potential Crop Mixes

Figuring out what to plant to maximize profit is a yearly task for farmers. Unfortunately, that task is often complicated by the fact that a farmer may not have all the information they need to accurately weigh the pros and cons of a particular crop selection or mixture of crops.

To remedy that situation, and provide farmers an opportunity to learn how to use new analysis tools, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service has scheduled two "Profitability Workshops" at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. The first workshop will be held February 17 and the second will be held March 5.

Instructors for the workshop include: Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Economist; Jay Yates, Extension Risk Management

Specialist; Dr. John Robinson, Extension Cotton Marketing Economist; Jeff Pate, Extension Risk Management Specialist; and Mark Welch, Extension Grain Marketing Economist.

The workshops will begin at 9:00 a.m. and conclude at 4:00 p.m. on both dates. Registration for the workshop is \$20. Call Wendy Durrett at 806-746-6101 to make a reservation or to obtain additional information about the workshop.

Included in the \$20 workshop registration fee are packets containing printed copies of the workshop presentations, 21 crop budgets and a CD containing a copy of the "Comparative Profitability Spreadsheet" that the workshop is centered around.

This spreadsheet is a Microsoft Excel file and includes budgets, breakeven tables, and etc. Also on the CD will be supporting files and web addresses that will help each participant use the spreadsheet.

The primary objective of this workshop is to provide farmers the tools and the data along with the skills to evaluate the potential profitability of alternative crops for the 2009 crop year. In today's high cost, low price farm economy, increasing a grower's ability to examine the economics behind each potential crop choice is critical. In addition to the Profitability Workshop there are several other meetings and events on the calendar between now and planting time that will be of interest to

Cotton futures trading on the Intercontinental Exchange (ICE) stayed in a holding pattern much of the week. The market searched for a clear direction as much of the U.S. cotton supply continued to look for a home, demand remained depressed, and mills were in no hurry to change their hand-to-mouth buying pattern.

No large market swings are expected to take place before the release of two key reports this month. Traders await concrete supply and demand news from USDA which is scheduled to be released on Feb. 10. They also are anxious to get a glimpse into the future of the U.S. cotton crop when the National Cotton Council (NCC) releases its 2009 planting estimates on Feb. 13.

Preliminary estimates from market analysts peg this year's planted acreage around 8.5 million acres, which would be down from 9.47 million last year. Acreage for the 2008-2009 crop year was at a 25-year low.

"Expectations for lower plantings in the U.S. and China have been the preliminary argument for the bull's case, especially if yields are off this year due to poor weather, demand recovers, and the tighter stocks become a significant issue," an analyst said. "However, if economic recovery is slow, demand does not recover, and crop yields are decent, the situation isn't all that bullish because it would likely leave stocks at an adequate level," he explained.

In other news, dwindling demand in cotton consuming countries coupled with falling production in exporting countries led the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC) to push its world trade figure to 30 million bales in 2008-09, a 21 percent reduction from the previous year.

China, the world's leading cotton importer, is expected to import 6.8 million bales of cotton in the season, a 41 percent reduction from 2007-08, ICAC said. The committee anticipates India and Uzbekistan, the second and third leading cotton exporters, will ship roughly 40 percent less cotton in 2008-09 as compared to the previous year.

Despite a large drop in do-

mestic consumption, the United States is likely to remain the world's leading cotton exporter by shipping 11.9 million bales of cotton in 2008-09, ICAC said. The figure is a 12 percent reducto 44.37 cents per pound versus tion from the previous season.


Meanwhile, USDA reported one week earlier. net export sales of U.S. cotton totaled 92,400 bales for the week ended Jan. 29. The figure was 14 percent lower than the previous week and down 60 percent from the four-week average. Featured buyers were Pakistan, Mexico, Turkey, and China. Net sales of 4,100 bales for delivery in 2009-10 were for Mexico.

Export shipments of 194,500 bales were up 41 percent from the previous week and a 13 percent increase from the four-week average. Primary destinations were China, Turkey, Mexico, and

"After adding this week's sales number, we now have total export commitments of 9.2 million bales for the current marketing year, of which just 5.9 million bales have been shipped," a trader said. "There still is a whole lot of U.S. cotton to get rid of and with China not likely to be very active in the foreseeable future; we expect a tough battle on the export front in the months ahead."

On the spot cotton scene, sales in the week ended Feb. 5 were considerably lower as producers

in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas sold 2,062 bales online compared to 22,792 bales the previous week. Average prices received by producers ranged from 30.05 36.49 to 44.58 cents per pound

# Russell Graves Outdoors The Brim Bird Marsh

I remember talking to a Texas Parks & Wildlife department biologist when I lamented the lack of good water-fowling spots near Childress. I grew up in northeast Texas and with plenty of water around, I learned to love the abundant ducks that I'd watch all winter long. In Childress, though, I wasn't so lucky - at least I didn't think so.

"One of the best wetlands I know is just north of Childress," the biologist confided. "Really..." I deadpanned.

Hanging up the phone I cold-called the owner to ask permission to come see his place. Typically, I'm a bit apprehensive about calling someone unannounced but this one felt right. Turns out, it is one connection I am glad I made because not only did I gain access to an incredible property, I made friends with an amazing couple.

While I can use a litany of adoration-laced adjectives to describe Dr. Burl and Mary Brim, it's safe to keep it simple and say they are good,

Ray Kinsella in the movie Field of Dreams once heard an encouraging voice in his cornfield saying "if you build it, they will come..." The same inspiration must have inspired Dr. Brim when he decided to build and enhance a naturally high water table at the core of the farm in which he was raised. What's coming, however, aren't old-school baseball players as featured in the movie. Instead, each winter, ducks by the hundreds and thousands show up on the Brim Bird Marsh.

affable Texas Panhandle people.

"My dad was a conservationist before people even knew what the word meant,"

explains Dr. Brim as we stand in his restored dairy barn which now serves as his art studio. As we speak, I can't help but notice how the soft light from the windows spill across a watercolor in which he's working and punch-up the colors on the painting. Peering out the western facing windows, the broad marsh is only steps away from where dairy cows once lumbered through the barn for a daily milking. "I grew up on this farm and my dad taught me to love this land and everything that lives here."

A career in academia took the Brims away from the farm but upon retirement, the couple settled back on the same land Dr. Brim spent so much time as a boy. Just a mile north of the Childress/Collingsworth County line, the bird marsh seems curiously jux-

taposed in an area whose rainfall patterns are notoriously fickle. Moreover, the marsh lies just about a hundred yards from their front door.

"We wake up every morning and watch the marsh come alive," says Mrs. Brim, "We could almost do without a calendar or clock because without fail, the birds always know what time it is."

The purpose of the public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments, and the Executive Director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and, the statement "(I/we) request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the groups, representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the groups

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for the consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Futher, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

If you wish to be place on the permanent and/or the county mailing list, clearly specify which list(s) and send your request to TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.
