Furniture for LHS

Donated classroom furniture arrives

Nine o'clock Monday morning, February 23, six weeks after Lockney High School burned, three trailers of school furniture arrived and were unloaded into the new portable classroom buildings in Lockney. Two trailers were from Brownfield School District and one was from Abernathy School District. Several teachers, coaches, students, board members, and others were on hand to help unload the trailers. Around 11:15 a.m. two large U-Haul trucks, each towing a trailer, arrived from Reagan County School District.

Superintendent Phil Cotham and high school principal Todd Hallmark were on hand to help move furniture and direct the process.

All eight of the portable classroom buildings are in place. Principal Hallmark said seven of the buildings will house two classrooms each, and one will be used for administration. "The southwest building will house administration," Hallmark continued. "East of it, will be the Library and English classes. The northwest building will house science classes; the center building will contain English classes; the north/center one will house history and math classes; the northeast one will contain math classes; the east/center building will be used for computer and special education classes; and the southeast one will house the reading and Spanish classes."

Referring to the buildings and the arrival of all the furniture Hallmark said, "It's just great, great, great."

loydada Chief of Police offers annual report

On Tuesday, Feb. 17, Floydada Chief of Police Darrell Gooch presented his annual report on racial profiling and statistics for 2008, which included a fairly detailed activity report, to the city council at their regular monthly meeting.

Total Reported Offenses 2008

Total reported offenses in 2008 were 155, compared to 215 in 2007 and 256 in 2006. In 2008, the number of misdemeanor offenses reported were 112, with 85 of them being cleared, leaving the department with a clearance rate of 76 percent.

The number of felony offenses reported were 67, and the department cleared 84 percent of those reported offenses.

Twelve traffic accidents were reported with

no fatalities.

Reception Tuesday for new EDC director

Justin Jaworski began his duties as the new executive director for Floydada's Economic Development Corporation on Jan. 2 of this year. Since then, he has been busy meeting the locals, visiting with small business owners and learning how he can best serve the City of Floydada.

Jaworski has already versed himself in the EDC corporate charger and bylaws, installed and updated current software on the office computers, reviewed recent projects and organized EDC financial records.

Also, the EDC board has already accepted Jaworski's proposal to reinitiate the Welcome Entrance project in cooperation with the P.R.I.D.E. committee - a community committee organized in the fall of 2005.

Jaworski said about the project, "At this point we're generating awareness of the project...trying to recruit corporate funds."

The Welcome Entrance project - also known as the Entry Plaza Plan - was first discussed in 2005 according to Sue Ward, vicepresident of the EDC board and city council member. The project will greatly improve the look of Floydada's most important "port of entry," which according to Jaworski, is a very important first step to developing Floydada economically.

On Tuesday, March 3, the EDC board is hosting a comeand-go welcome reception for Justin and his wife Teena in the First Baptist Church Parlor, 401 S. Main Street, at 3 p.m. This reception will allow the public to get to know the Jaworskis and help Jaworski to get a better idea how best to serve the people of Floydada.

LHS receives large donation of classroom materials

Lockney ISD recently received a very generous donation from Show What You Know® Publishing out of Columbus

The council also voted to abandon certain public passageways and thoroughfares around A.B. According to City Manager Gary Brown, Wetzel "pointed out the advantages of having an automatic meter reading system... answer(ed) several questions from the council, (then) asked the council to authorize the spending of \$300 for a preliminary study to determine if such a system would be beneficial to the city."

After a motion by Councilman Sam Green, the council voted unanimously to pay for the preliminary study.

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




My Dad is a mess. There is no other way to describe it.

Dad was diagnosed with Alzheimer's in 2006. Actually, he has Early Onset Alzheimer's also referred to as Familial Alzheimer's Disease.

Dad is now 66 and has no recollection of the past 50 years or more. He doesn't know anyone and every five minutes seems to be a new day.

I think the reason Dad's health declined so much, so quickly is due to the fact that he rode bulls for years. He was big into rodeo and suffered head trauma on several occasions. You can imagine what being thrown from a bull (with no helmet and no pad on the neck and shoulders) over and

My sister and I certainly hope that is the case. It is a daily worry for us just as it is with those of you who have family members with the disease.

Dad is a shadow of his former self. His motor skills decline monthly. He's weak and slender. He can still speak, but I imagine that too will be coming to an end. Dad now lives in Memphis Convalescent Center. They have an Alzheimer's Unit there and I

cannot describe the peace-of-mind they allow us to have. He was a resident at Childress Healthcare Center for a few months. Unfortunately, Alzheimer's patients require unique attention and a lot of it. They usually end up in a facility geared to handle them, hence the need to move him.

For those of you who feel like you or a loved one might be at risk of developing Early Onset Alzheimer's Disease, doctors around the world recommend incorporating strategies which can delay the disease's rapid progression. It's nothing fancy - just using your mind more.

Here are some suggestions I found at all-about-alzheimers.com:

Take up a new hobby.

· Read more and wider.

• Reminisce.

• Become part of a discussion group. · Research things you've always wanted to know.

• Take up chess, crosswords and other thinking pastimes. • Write about your life.

· Concentrate more on what is happening around you.

• Go on cultural outings (museums, art galleries, concerts, etc). Beyond stimulating your brain in new ways, there are also ways to improve your memory.

• Make a conscious effort to increase your concentration while trying to absorb new informa-

tion. • Where possible try to use all your senses (sight, sound, touch, smell and taste) to form a

memory

• Keep a positive 'I can do this' attitude.

Avoid distractions.

• Be patient. It's okay to learn things bit by bit.

• Constantly go over what you have learned in your head or in conversation till it becomes

• Find a way to connect new memories to old ones, this works well with word/visual associa-

Finally, I would suggest loving those around you as much as possible. I cannot possibly fathom a day when I cannot remember my sons, but there may indeed come such a day. Trust me, I'll do all I can to keep it from being the case, but this disease is on the rise. That being the case, I will hold my family until I can no longer lift them and I will do the

necessary things to keep myself as sharp as possible. If you are worried, I suggest you do the same. The loving part is guaranteed to make your immediate life better if nothing else.

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COTTON MARKET WEEKLY

Dropping commodities and equities prices pushed cotton futures prices on the Intercontinental Exchange (ICE) to two-month lows earlier in the week before trimming losses on Thursday. Cotton traders continue to be concerned about economic uncertainty and worries about the global recession cutting further into textile demand and ultimately cotton exports.

According to analysts, concerns that the world recession is deepening could lead to further downside pressure for the cotton market. Some of the few optimistic views on the cotton price outlook stem from either a potential tight situation next year if producers around the world cut cotton production or a situation where the world economy heats up after bottoming out and world demand begins to move higher from current projections.

According to traders, both of these are longer-term developments, but the short-term demand fundamentals look for the situation to worsen further. Some say increasing unemployment and a continued downward spiral in housing values suggest that U.S. and world demand numbers may need to be revised lower.

New clothes and new home furnishings seem to be near the bottom end of a list of things consumers will be spending money on over the near-term, a trader said.

Near-term supply is ample, and some traders are nervous that cotton export sales already on the books may be cancelled if the world economy continues to slow.

reduce inventory of cotton and are sitting on unsold inventory of finished textile products, an analyst explained. Even if there is a concern for potential tightness next season, few buyers are interested in committing to import cotton next year and pay for this commitment now. As a result, we could see slower than expected export sales and some cancellations of the cotton booked at higher prices last year, he said.

Mills are seeing a need to

Meanwhile, U.S. cotton producers intend to plant 8.1 million acres of cotton this spring, down 14 percent from 2008, according to the National Cotton Council s (NCC) 26th annual planting intentions survey.

If the 8.1 million acre projection comes to fruition, it will be the lowest cotton acreage planted in the United States since 1983. Based on survey results, all four regions showed decreases in intended cotton plantings from last season. Only two states indicated an anticipated expansion in acreage; Kansas at seven percent and Florida at three percent.

Texas growers expressed intentions of reducing area by nine percent to 4.5 million acres. However, even with lower planted acres in the state, reductions in other regions imply that Texas could produce approximately 57 percent of the total U.S. crop in the upcoming

Entity changes after sales closing, crop insurance impacts possible

Growers contemplating changes in the structure of their farming operations as a result of newly announced Commodity Program eligibility and pay limit rules should strive to have such changes in place before finalizing their 2009 crop insurance policies.

Growers need to be aware that even though the Farm Service Agency has extended the window during which entity structures can be altered for the 2009 crop, the Risk Management Agency has not made a similar announcement.

The dangerous water for growers who do make a change in their entity structure at FSA after March 15 and establishing their crop insurance policy under a different set-up is the potential termination of insurance coverage on all of their farms

Anyone contemplating a change in their entity or farming structure is advised to try and get those changes put in place BEFORE March 15.

Getting this work done before the crop insurance sales closing date will help mitigate the chance that entities referenced on a growers insurance documents and the entities on file at the county FSA office match.

Farm Bill Boosts Subsidy

Levels For Enterprise Units The 2008 Farm Bill may have given an insurance coverage option that most High Plains growers rarely considered a new lease on life in the world s biggest cotton patch.

Interestingly enough the changes may be enough to encourage a few High Plains growers to rethink their crop insurance program in 2009.

The change that was made involves a complete rework-

dies applicable to the Enterprise Unit coverage option. Among the many changes made in the 2008 Farm Bill

was Congressional authorization for the USDA Risk Management Agency to boost the premium subsidies available to farmers insuring crops at an aggregated level through the Enterprise Unit designation.

The new subsidies are significantly higher than the subsidy levels in place for Enterprise Units in 2008. Prior to 2009 a single premium subsidy schedule applied to all multiperil, crop revenue and revenue

In 2009 producers choosing to insure their crop under the Enterprise Unit coverage option will benefit from a completely different subsidy rate schedule, which may prove advantageous to growers. My advice that I mirror for them is simple - appreciate the natural world around you and the simple

when they were younger and played in the sun all day. In fact, a recent e-mail from a gentleman in Houston reveled, succinctly, a similar sentiment I hear from people all of the time. "...I spent most of my childhood summers and winters working farms in the blackland prairie of the

Pecan Gap and Ladonia [Texas] area. I couldn't avoid making my way to the rat race, but I look back and appreciate the experience of small town Texas and spending my childhood outdoors.

I d do good to take my own advice from time to time. I too get caught up in things that when looked back upon, don't seem nearly as urgent as they did at the time. In fact, we would all do good to heed, from time to time, the recommendation made by my little boy when I asked him what he was going to do when he got home from the hospital.

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

He was preceded in death by his wife, Arla, his son, Robert Stephen and all his brothers and sisters.


