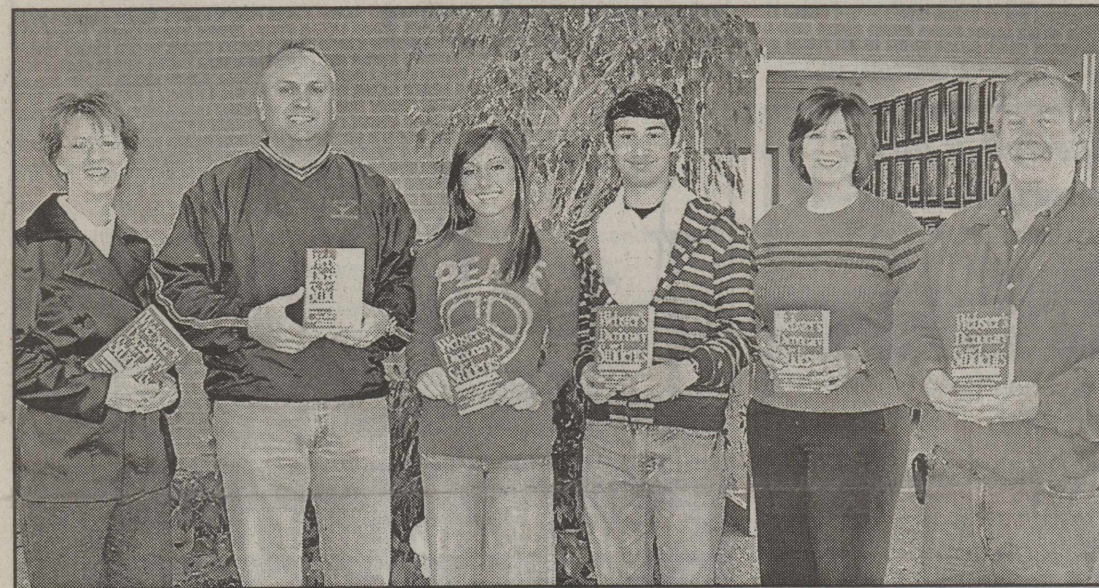

Grand Jury indicts 10

The grand jury, met on Thursday, Feb. 26, to review ten cases.

Brandon Welty, 23, of Lockney, was indicted for three second degree offenses: possession or promotion of child pornography on Nov. 4, 2008, and two cases of sexual assault, Nov. 11 and Dec. 14, 2008.

Christopher Lorenzo Perez, 34, of Plainview, was indicted for a third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated on Oct. 19, 2008.

Laura Mendez, 32, of Floydada was indicted for her Nov. 30, 2008, state jail felony offense of possession of a controlled substance, namely cocaine, in the amount of one to four grams.

Robert Earl Glenn, 48, of Floydada, was also indicted for his Nov. 30, 2008, state jail felony offense - which was enhanced to a third degree offense - for possession of a controlled substance, cocaine, in the amount of one to four grams.

David Lee Rosa, 21, of Floydada, was indicted for his July 22, 2008, second degree offense of indecency with a child.

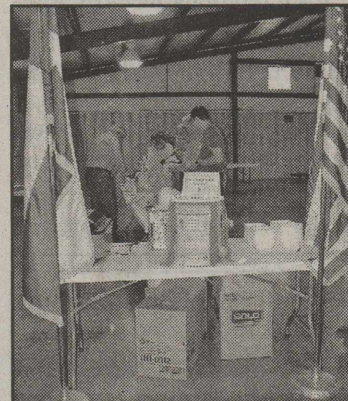
Diecisiete Rosa, 27, of Floydada, was indicted for his third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated on Oct. 3, 2008.

Amare Lavar Taylor, 25, of Floydada, was indicted for a state jail felony degree offense of burglarizing a building on Jan. 21, 2009.

Ponsiano Rosa, 20, of Floydada, was indicted for a state jail felony degree offense of burglarizing a building on Jan. 21, 2009.

Guy Edward Ledbetter, 49, of Floydada, was indicted for possession of a controlled substance, cocaine, in the amount of one to four grams. This Jan. 22, 2009, offense was a state jail felony enhanced to a second degree offense.

Joe Luis Castro, III, 20, of Lockney, was indicted for a second degree offense - indecency with a child on Nov. 14, 2008.



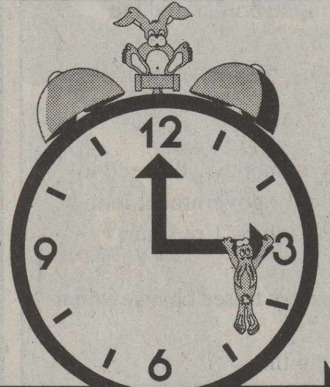
Chili supper ...

Floyd County asked to collect pop tabs

The small tab you pull to open your beverage can or canned food can make a big difference for the families who stay at Amarillo's Ronald McDonald House. While the aluminum can is valuable, the pop tab is made of purer, higher grade aluminum and is easier to collect for recycling.

The Ronald McDonald House Pop Tab program was begun by the Minneapolis/St. Paul community in 1987. Since then the idea has spread across the country and around the world. To date, more than 400 million pop tabs have been collected, generating more than \$4 million for Ronald Houses around the globe.

"We first began collecting aluminum cans many years ago and switched to collecting just the tabs about ten years ago," reports RMH Executive Director, Jan Reid. "Now we have many families and groups collecting the tabs for us, and the McDonald's restaurants in Amarillo and the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles and Eastern New Mexico are acting as collection sites for us. We have seen the number of tabs collected for us more than triple in the last few months since we have been letting people know about the project and asking them to help. We use the money earned from recycling the tabs to provide supplies and household items for the families who stay here to use. It's a huge help for them!"

This is a great project for schools, clubs, churches and other groups, large or small.

One local Floyd County resident, Charlene Brown of Floydada, has been collecting pop tabs for the Ronald McDonald House in Amarillo for about five years. Brown says, "Walter Davis has also been a big help. He's got two or three businesses in Lubbock collecting tabs for me."

Another group who has collected tabs for the House is Lorry Spear's fifth grade math class at Abilene's Johnston Elementary School. When they began collecting pull tabs, Mrs. Spear's goal was to visually demonstrate to her students the mass of one million items. Mrs. Spear learned that Abilene residents Linda and Charles Perkins were collecting pop tabs for Amarillo's Ronald McDonald House in memory of Amberly," wrote Mrs. Perkins. "Soon the entire school was collecting tabs. We piced up the collected tabs and the boxes filled the back of our pickup truck. We estimate 350,000 to 400,000 tabs were collected. They were weighed at the local recycling center and there were 287 pounds valued at \$115," Mrs. Perkins reported.

So you can see that while one tab may seem insignificant, collecting them can make a big difference for the families who make Amarillo's Ronald McDonald House their "Home Away from Home" at a difficult time in their lives. Your group or your family can make a big impact by "pulling together." And it's so easy. Just start popping the tabs from your canned

drinks, pet food cans, soup, fruit and vegetable cans, etc. Collect them in any container, a plastic bag, or one of the pop tab collection boxes available by calling the House at 806-358-8177. Then bring them to the House or drop them off at any local drop-off point in Floyd County.

Each returning member is required to earn nine hours; every new member is required to earn 16 hours.

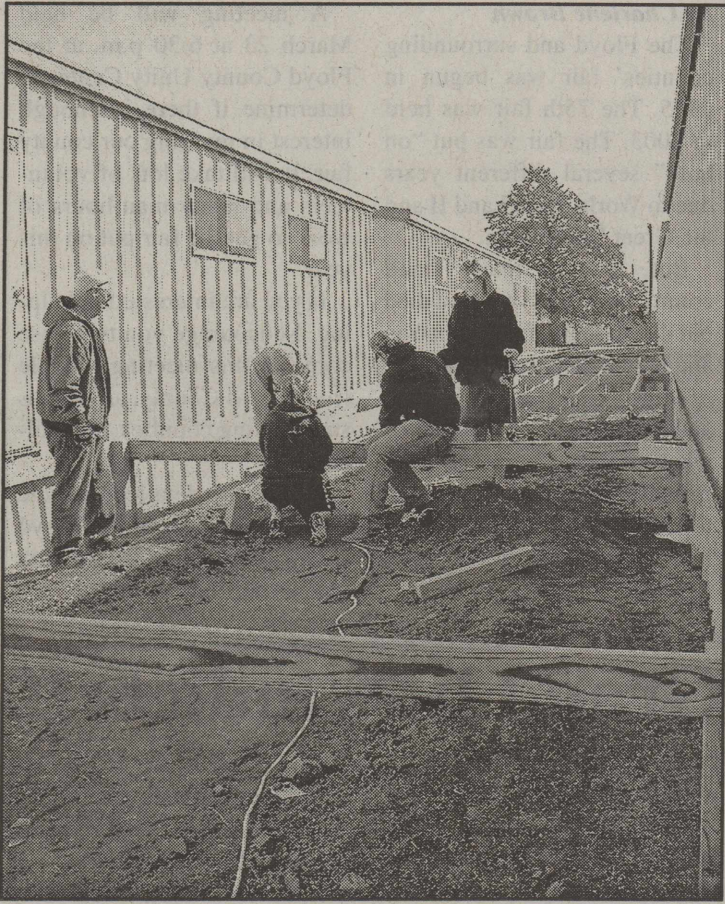
The following members earned three hours each: Aaron Wilson, Cheryl Edwards and Jessie Garza. According to

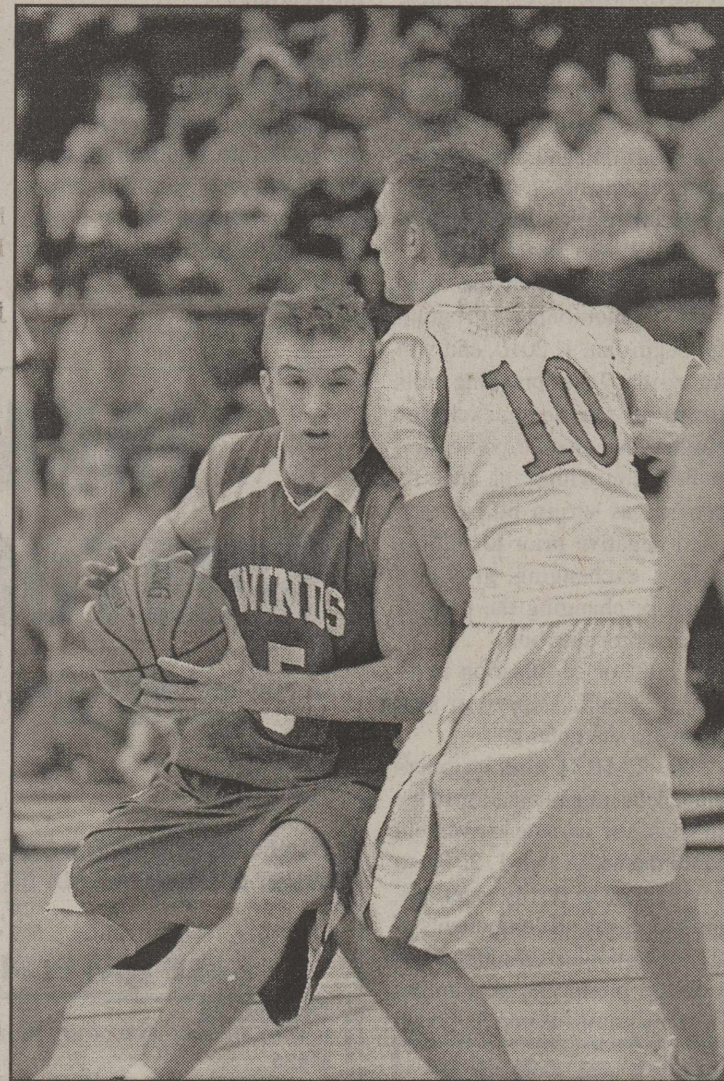
Coach Jaime Seago was doused with a bath of ice water by the team at game's end, as an inaugural celebration, to show a great start to beat a solid Post team.

Seago said, "It's good to get a win on the road and our first game. We had a good pre-season and our kids are working hard."

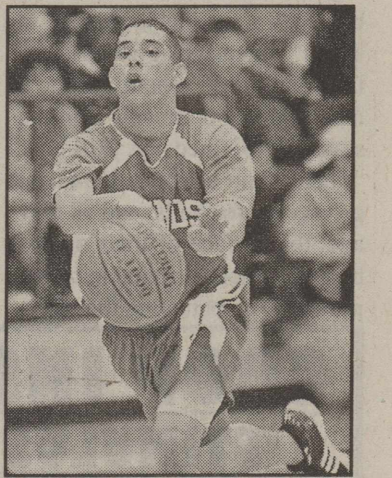
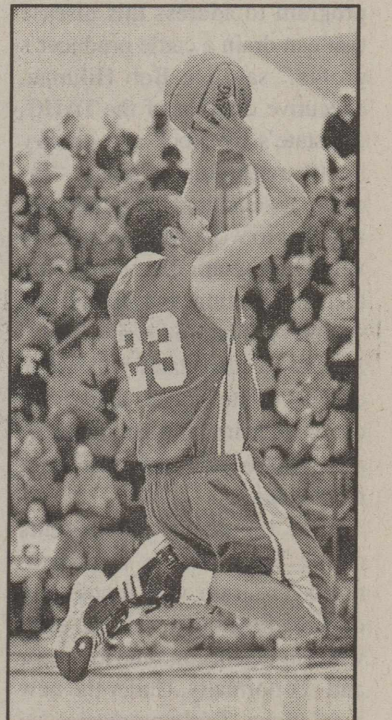

Texas Cattle Trichomoniasis Program Adopted

Beginning April 1, 2009, breeding bulls entering Texas from any other state must be either 24 months of age or younger and certified as a virgin, or be tested negative for cattle trichomoniasis within 30 days prior to entry. The entry requirements are part of a regulatory package adopted by the commissioners for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) February 24 to address trichomoniasis, a venereal disease of cattle that causes infertility and abortions, and results in extended breeding seasons and diminished calf crops, which costs livestock producers valuable income. Cattle trichomoniasis is not a human health issue. The second phase of the program, which will address in-state movement of Texas breeding bulls, will go into effect Jan. 1, 2010.

"Industry members had significant input into the development of these regulations," said TAHC Commissioner Coleman Locke, who represents the beef industry on the commission and headed the Trichomoniasis Working Group, comprised of producers, market operators, veterinarians, laboratory representatives and educators. "The 74 comments we received from associations and individuals regarding the proposed regulations were reviewed carefully, and adaptations to the proposed rules were made in the adopted regulations to make the program workable for the producers."

"We have worked for months with industry members, veterinarians and the working group, to gather information, develop the proposed regulations, and following the conclusion of the comment period, considered all comments to develop a viable, cost-effective program to address this disease that can drain a cattle producer's profits," said Dr. Bob Hillman, executive director of the TAHC, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "Industry associations and producers asked us to work with them to develop a program that would stop the introduction and unchecked spread of this protozoal disease. At least 15 other states in the western half of the United States have developed similar trichomoniasis programs to address the disease in their states."

"The regulatory components of the Texas' Cattle Trichomoniasis Program will focus only on breeding bulls, which, even when infected, continue to appear and act normally. Under the new regulations, Trichomoniasis also becomes a reportable disease in Texas, which will give us more information on where and how much infection already is in the state," explained Dr. Hillman. "There is no effective treatment or vaccine for bulls, and as they age, the surface of their organs becomes more hospitable to the protozoa, perpetuating the infec-

tion." "Although the primary impact of the disease is on cows, which can become infected during breeding and lose the fetus, the cow herd is not included in the regulations. The majority of infected cows will clear the disease in 120-150 days of sexual rest. A vaccine also can be administered to infected cows to help control the disease in the cow herd."

Dr. Hillman explained that the interstate, or state-to-state movement, phase of the trichomoniasis regulations will begin April 1, 2009. Breeding bulls entering Texas must be officially identified, and may come certified as virgins, provided they are 24 months of age or younger, and have not commingled with female cattle. A breeder's certificate must accompany the virgin breeding bull, signed by the breeder, and the information also must be included on the certificate of veterinary inspection. Routine documents also are required, including the certificate of veterinary inspection, and other applicable tuberculosis or brucellosis entry requirements must be met, depending on the state of origin, or if the bull is a beef or dairy animal.

Non-virgin breeding bulls or bulls older than 24 months of age entering Texas on and after April 1 must be tested negative for trichomoniasis within 30 days prior to entry. During the test period and prior to shipment, the bulls must have no contact with female cattle. Like virgin bulls, the non-virgin bulls must be officially identified with a breed registry tattoo or brand, a USDA metal ear tag, official RFID tag, official trichomoniasis ear tag from the state of origin, or other official identification. The animal must be accompanied by a completed trichomoniasis test document, certificate of veterinary inspection and other routine health documents.

In-State Breeding Bull Regulations Begin Jan. 1, 2010

The second phase of the Texas Cattle Trichomoniasis Program will begin Jan. 1, 2010, and will require that Texas breeding bulls offered for sale, lease, exchange or otherwise change possession for breeding within the state be certified as virgin bulls or be tested negative prior to selling, loaning, exchanging, giving or otherwise changing the possession of a breeding bull.

(No test or certification is required for bulls shipped or sold directly to slaughter.)

"The TAHC Commissioners delayed the implementation of the intrastate, or in-state movement requirements, to Jan. 1, 2010, to provide time to certify veterinarians to perform all components of the Trichomoniasis program, and to ensure producers are familiar with the disease, its implication to

herd health, and the requirements for testing or certifying the virgin status of Texas breeding bulls undergoing change of possession," noted Dr. Hillman.

Dr. Hillman noted that samples for testing must be collected by accredited veterinarians certified to conduct cattle trichomoniasis work, and tests will be run at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL).

Bulls of unknown status may be sold for breeding with one negative RT-PCR test or three negative culture tests, each conducted not less than one week apart. The breeding bulls must remain separated from female cattle during the testing. Negative test results will be valid for 30 days, but only if the tested breeding bulls continue to be separated from heifers or cows.

"Infected bulls will be restricted to movement for slaughter only, as there is no effective treatment for this disease," said Dr. Hillman.

"Producers who have encountered cattle trichomoniasis in their herd know how devastating this disease can be to their calf crop and production," stressed Dr. Hillman. "This program is directly in response to producer and association requests for help to stop the spread of this insidious disease, and to stop the importation of infected bulls into the state. It is important to note that since this is an industry-requested program, input from the cattle industry is critical to the effective functioning of the program. To this end the rules contain provisions for the program to be reviewed annually by a broad-based Trichomoniasis Review Working Group, which can make recommendations on changes or even abolishment of the program."

"By enacting the interstate requirements now, we can address the importation of disease immediately," he said. "Delaying the intrastate regulations until the first of next year will ensure that everyone can be 'on board' to attack this disease and protect their herds."

Cotton Market weekly

A bullish export sales report provided a shot in the arm for cotton on Feb. 26, helping cotton futures prices on the Intercontinental Exchange to close with moderate gains.

Ahead of the report, futures had closed lower for five consecutive trading sessions.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture reported net export sales of U.S. cotton totaled 586,900 bales in the week ended Feb. 19, a marketing year high and 35 percent more than the previous week. China was, by far, the featured buyer accounting for almost 300,000 bales of the total followed by Turkey with purchases of 48,800 bales. Vietnam, Pakistan, Indonesia, Thailand, Taiwan and South Korea also purchased significant quantities of U.S. cotton during the week. Net sales of 3,100 bales for delivery in 2009-10 were for Chile and Mexico.

Export shipments for the week totaled 147,200 bales, down 18 percent from the previous week and 13 percent from the four-week average. The primary destinations were China and Turkey. The shipment volume was disappointing but somewhat understandable, according to one analyst.

The sales volume now implies that weekly sales need to average less than 95,000 bales for the remainder of the marketing

year to achieve USDA's current export projection, he said. Another analyst commented that the pace of export sales could prompt USDA to increase its estimate for the current season which could tighten the balance sheet for 2009-10.

One possible explanation for the recent surge in export sales is U.S. cotton represents the two cheapest growths quoted in Cotlook's "A" Index. Previously, textile mills had been content to cover their needs through March; however, they are starting to extend that coverage through April, said one trader.

In a few cases, high grades of cotton are being sold for May delivery, he noted, adding that the weakness in consumer demand may have been "greatly exaggerated."

Spot cotton sales also have been surging in recent weeks. Producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas sold 45,484 bales online in the week ended Feb. 26 compared to 36,977 bales the previous week. Average prices received by producers ranged from 33.67 to 38.71 cents per pound compared to 37.96 to 43.37 cents per pound the prior week.

Abnormally warm weather in West Texas this week may have turned thoughts to the upcoming planting season. Record setting or near record setting high tem-

peratures in the 80s were seen in the Texas High and Rolling Plains, but much needed rain remained absent from near-term weather forecasts.

Windy conditions in South Texas were expected to further deplete topsoil moisture levels there. The optimal planting window is approaching in the Texas Rio Grande Valley, and rain is urgently needed to provide good seed germination. Dry conditions were not the rule in northern parts of the Memphis Territory this week. Scattered showers were reported in the area, making field work sporadic with growers applying fertilizer and preparing their fields wherever possible. In other parts of the Delta, field work proceeded at a steady pace.

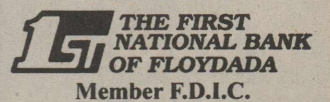
Elsewhere, dry conditions persisted in the Southeast where cotton producers would welcome any rain to help ease drought conditions.

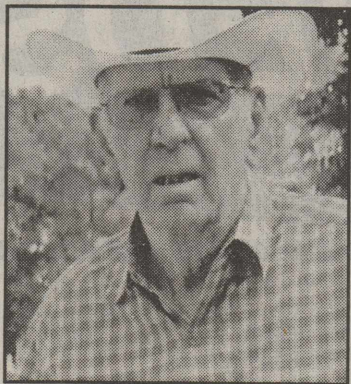
Gladys Vaughn Brannon, age 93, of Quanah, Texas died Wednesday, February 25, 2009 in Quanah.

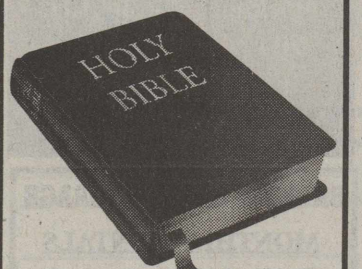
