Floyd County Voter Turnout Low on Election Day

Voter turnout was low in Saturday's election, though not as low as in previous years.

Incumbent Bobby Gilliland received 58 votes during early voting and 67 on election day, for a total of 125 votes. Challenger Henry A. Bolton received no votes.

Voter turnout for Floydada was 5.84 percent, 125 out of 2,139 registered voters.

According to City Secretary Karen Lawson, this election cost the city approximately \$4,300. Lockney Independent School District's election to fill seats for Precincts 1 and 2 brought out 48 voters, for an 8.13 percent turnout.

For Precinct 2, incumbent Cheryl Edwards received four votes, losing to Mike Lass who earned 11


Floyd County Losing Extension Agent

This permit will not authorize a discharge of pollutants into waters in the State. ICEQ received this application on January 23, 2009.

The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located approximately 0.1 mile south of U.S. Highway 70 and 1.0 mile east of Farm-to-Market Road 378, and southeast of the City of Lockney in Floyd County, Texas. The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located in the drainage basin of White River in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

The TCEQ executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permits. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under the facility must operate. The Executive Director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, technical summary and Executive Director's decision and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at the Lockney City Hall, 218 East Locust Street, Lockney, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trail in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name; address, phone; applicant's name and permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and the statement "(I/we) request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are germane to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. TCEO may act on an application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION: The Executive Director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the Executive Director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TCEO Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. 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


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
